Handicapped kids Michigan are working harder than ever in therapy sessions. . and having fun! Thanks to an expanding 4-H horseback riding program, they're discovering they can do something other kids do, says Dave Merry, 4-H changes he saw in handicapped specialist and the project's coordinator.

Thirty-six kids with various handicaps, learned to ride during Genesee County's 10week pilot program. They also learned about horse anatomy, got a lot of help from 75 4-H United States. horse project leaders and members, who volunteered their

time, horses and riding area. Cheff Center for the handicapped loaned protective head gear and body harnesses; and the center's director became technical advisor. Mobile home dealers constructed and donated a mounting ramp, while United Cerebral Palsy and other 4-H organizations gave additional staff and financial support.

From its pilot start, the program has evolved into an established five-day-a-week, two-semester course. And when it goes statewide, assured by grants from two foundations— Kellogg and Mott—it'll reach even more of Michigan's 64,000 crippled and handicapped youngsters, and still others with mental and emotional disorders.

Therapists say riding helps

kids improve balance, posture and coordination, and it challenges them to compete against themselves in endurance and performance.

Through riding, youngsters twist their trunks, bend laterally, stretch and rotate their arms and legs-all prescribed hospital exercises that become fun for kids atop horses, and motivate youngsters to practice eagerly and effectively. Key to the program's success: Emotional stimulus of children's love for horses, living creatures that respond to their wishes. One girl excitedly rushed to her horse, relying only on her crutches. It was the first time she had ever walked alone.

A program helper explains: "A handicapped child's spirit soars with the new sensation of being 'taller' than others. Then he sees that, for the first time, he's mobile and independent of people or mechanical aids. With the horse his equalizer, he's performing as a 'normal' per-

Volunteers benefit from this program, too, realizing they're helping others by sharing benefits of their "Normal" lives. One 4-H'er, impressed with kids he helped, changed his college major to physical therapy.





WASHINGTON, D.C.— Congressman Omar Burleson announces the approval of a \$2,263,000 REA loan to the Cap Rock Electric Cooperative, Inc. with headquarters at Stanton. The cooperative serves Borden, Howard, Dawson, Martin, Andrews, Ector, Midland, Glasscock, Irion, Reagan, Sterling, Tom Green and Upton Counties.

The purpose of the loan is to finance service for 633 additional consumers; to finance 153 miles of distribution line; to finance 19 miles of transmission line; and to finance system improvements, including substation facilities.


I CAN'T GO BACK
