B.H.S. Speech Squad Takes Team Trophy

Bond & Pinkerton bring home individual medals

Senior Michele Bond and junior Kyle Pinkerton led members of the Borden High School U.I.L. Speech Team to a 1A Championship this past Saturday at the Jim Ned High School "War of the Words" Speech & Debate Tournament.

Bond placed third in Extemporaneous Informative Speaking following consecutive first place rankings in her preliminary and semifinal rounds. She also participated

in Lincoln-Douglas Debate.

Pinkerton medaled in his second consecutive practice meet, placing second in Extemporaneous Persuasive Speaking. Pinkerton was second in his preliminary round, then won his semifinal round to advance to the finals.

Also participating in the meet and earning points were sophomores Adam Carter and Tyler Wallace.

Carter advanced to the semifinals in Poetry Interpretation with a third place finish in the prelims. He then barely missed advancing to the finals with a third place finish in the semifinals. The top two from each round advanced to the finals.

Wallace, competing in Prose Interpretation, finished second in his preliminary round to advance to the semifinals, but then failed to advance to the finals.

These students finished first overall in the 1A division of the meet while competing against several 2A schools. Stamford High School won the 2A division.

The Jim Ned meet closes out the U.I.L. practice meets this year in preparation for the District 9-A U.I.L. Academic Meet set for March 22nd, 2003, at Western Texas College in Snyder.

Columbia Shuttle material confirmed boundaries remain Littlefield, Texas to West and Fort Polk, Louisiana to East

LUFKIN, Texas - The Western and eastern most boundaries of confirmed Columbia Shuttle debris continue to be in an area from near Littlefield, Texas to the west and Fort Polk, Louisiana to the east, said Federal Emergency Management agency (FEMA) Coordinating Officer Scott Wells.

"There are 155 20-person crews looking through the primary search area that includes a 10 mile wide by 240 mile long area that begins in Ellis county, south of Dallas and continues to Hemphill, Texas near Toledo Bend Reservoir. The extremely dedicated individuals who are walking in cold, wet weather conditions are important keys to the continued recovery of shuttle

debris. These people are experts, the best of the best and have the confidence of everyone involved in the Shuttle recovery effort," said Wells.

National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) officials, indicated last week that a number of Shuttle tiles, and what appeared to be panel from the lower portion of the right wing and a piece of the lower forward fuselage of Columbia had been recovered.

The western boundary of debris, so far, is marked by a heat resistant tile recovered near Littlefield, Texas approximately 40 miles northwest of Lubbock.

Anyone who suspects that they may have discovered what may be Shuttle debris, along a line from San Francisco, California to Alexandria, Louisiana can call the toll-free material report line at 866-446-6603. Once this call has been initiated, environmental

After graduation she joined the Army. She was recruited by the Secret Service three months ago and is currently stationed in South Korea as a government liason.

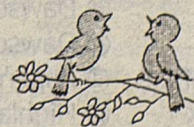

Protection Agency (EPD) officials will make arrangements to inspect the debris and take appropriate action. Operators are available between 7 a.m. and 10 p.m. (CST), seven days a week. To take debris reports. Residents are reminded not to handle debris because it could be hazardous.

"Citizens who continue to call us with information about the location of possible debris are playing a critical part of helping NASA piece together evidence that enable us to understand what caused the break-up of Columbia. We appreciate all the help we have received and continue to ask farmers, ranchers and forest industry personnel to be watchful for possible debris," said Jerry Ross, NASA Astronaut. He encouraged them to continue work operations.

Coyotes to be reunited

Kempf, Hensley to play in six-man all-star hoop tilt

Borden County hoop standouts Bobbie Kempf and Micah Hensley will be reunited as teammates once again this summer in the Texas Six-Man Coaches' all-star girls basketball game at Lubbock.

The two Coyote standouts, along with Celeigh Sterling of Ira, have been selected to represent District 7-1A in next summer's all-star girls hoop contest.

"We're very excited about them getting the chance to not only play together, but also to represent Borden County one more time," Borden County girls coach Kevin James said. "And, we feel like they will represent us very well."

"This also proves how much respect the other coaches in our district had for them this season."

After helping Borden County's girls to a 27-7 season, which included going three rounds deep in the 1A playoffs, Kempf and Hensley also earned top billing on the all-District 7-1A Girls Basketball team.

Kempf is 7-1A's MVP.

Hensley is that league's defensive player of the year.

Borden County's girls were ranked seventh in the latest Texas Association of Basketball Coaches' Class 1A state poll.

Also representing the 7-1A champs on that league's honor roll are Borden County seniors Pati Rodriguez and Kyla Culp.

Klondike freshman sensation MacKenzie Gregory is 7-1A's newcomer of the year.

Three other players who also represented the 7-1A runners-up Cougars on the 7-1A Dream Team are seniors Taryn Southall and Sara Cozart, as well as sophomore Kara Southall.

Two other area standouts on that elite squad are Dawson sophomore Deanna Morales and Sands senior Deisi Porras.

Kempf averaged 18 points and 10 rebounds per game for the 7-1A champion Coyotes this past season.

"We had a number of different girls who contributed for us in different ways, but she led us in a lot of different ways," James said.

"One of the biggest things going for Bobbie was her ability to create things out on the basketball court."

Hensley averaged 14 points and eight rebounds per game for the Coyotes.

"Micah's aggressiveness on the boards is what helped her the most. A lot of the coaches in our district bragged about the good job she did on the boards for us," James said.

"Like Bobbie, Micah also had great work ethics. As hard as they both worked, it helped push our other players, which was a big plus."

Rodriguez averaged 10 points per game while also being the floor general for the Coyotes.

"She's real quick and she was also a good floor leader for us from

“the point position,” James said.

"It seemed like anytime we needed to pick up the tempo, Pati was able to help us do it," James said. "Plus, her quickness gave people fits on the defensive end."

Culp tossed in 10 points per game for the league champion Coyotes.

"She had good outside shooting ability. She didn't have a lot of games where she just flat lit it up out there, but whenever she was on she really did," James said.

Gregory averaged over 14 points and eight rebounds per game for the 7-1A runners-up Cougars.

"One of MacKenzie's biggest strengths is her great work ethics," Klondike Coach Deborah Ramon said.

"She shoots the ball well. She does a good job of posting people up. She also does a good job on the offensive boards. Plus, she also handles the ball well."

While Taryn Southall and Sara Cozart finished their high school careers by leading the Cougars back to the playoffs, Kara Southall should be another player to watch in the years to come at Klondike.

Taryn Southall averaged nine points and over 10 rebounds per game.

"Taryn gave us a good inside presence mainly because of the way she plays so aggressive," Ramon said. "She's also a good defensive player."

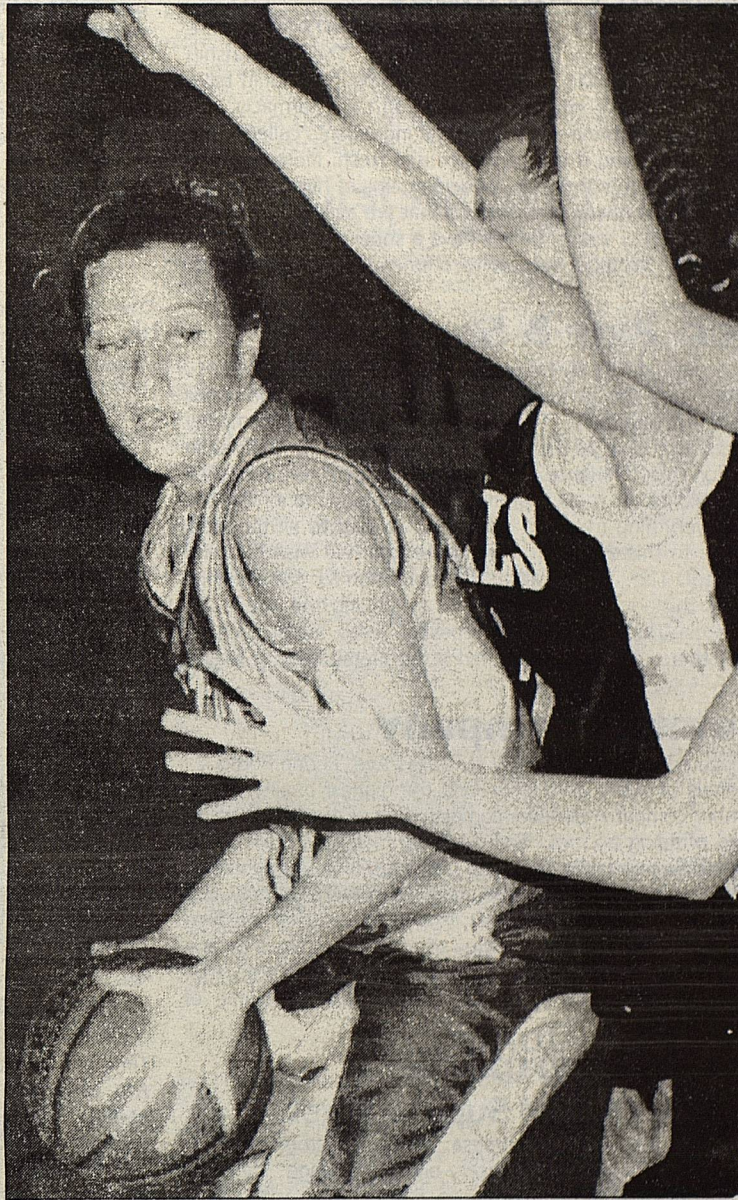
"She also did a good job on the boards for us this season."

TABA'NA YUAN'E

At sunrise each year on March 22, residents of Post, Texas, and visitors gather around a circular ceremonial ring to watch a dancer clad in traditional beaded buckskins and feathered headdress perform an Indian version of an extended weather forecast.

Taba'na Yuan'e translated means Sunrise Wind. The ceremony is an authentic dance used by Plains Indians in which the wind's direction at the exact moment of sunrise was to determine their success during the coming year. According to legend the wind must be checked at sunrise on the day after the sun reaches the halfway point in its journey from south to north (which would be the day after spring begins). It is said that if the wind is out of the east or northeast it would mean a "very good year." If it is from the north or northwest it translates into an "average year"; if from west or southwest a "poor year", and from either south or southeast it predicts a "very bad year".

The ceremony, which begins before sunrise, calls for the building of a small fire. Only natural materials are to be used. Small sticks of wood are arranged in the form of a tepee and filled with dry prairie grass. The fire is lighted with friction by rubbing two sticks together.

Following the singing of a tribal prayer of thanks for the fire, the Chief performs a four Winds dance in which a pipe of peace is presented to the four directions. The pipe is then presented to Mother Earth and to Wakantanka the Great spirit Above, to seek their blessings.

A wad of grass is placed on the coals and as the smoke indicates the wind direction, a smoke Dance is begun. The ritual is ended as the dancer kneels and points a ceremonial feather in the direction of the wind.

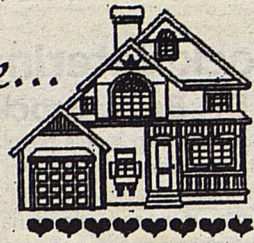

- 6) Host a father-child fashion show.

These were just samples of many activities that fathers can do in the school system. It is important for both fathers and schools to think of the many things that men can do for the schools. This may include many activities that have been traditionally done by women.

Children need the involvement of both of their parents. Fathers, whether living in the home with their children or not, have a great opportunity to influence their children's growth and development. In today's world men are free to be caring and nurturing with their children. The roles are not as confining as to what men should do and what women should do. Fathers can take advantage of that freedom to have a wonderful relationship with their children. Fathers and children both win.

Pioneers in Garza County, just turning ranch land under with plow, began the ceremony in 1906 when they recalled the legend as told by Indians years before. Records kept since that time show the predictions to be 92 percent accurate.

The Indians, undoubtedly, had applied the forecast to their food prospects and to the success of their activities during the coming year.

Today, as the farmer may apply the forecast to crops, the rancher may interpret it in grass prospects, while the

merchant will likely think of it in terms of business.

Since 1973, the sunrise ceremony has been conducted by "Chief" Frank Runkles, a longtime student of Indian lore.


