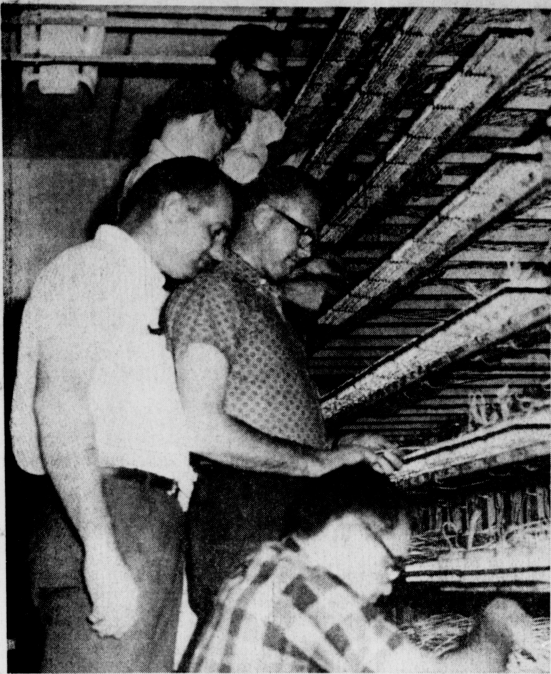

Programs Set For American School Week

Area schools are hanging out the welcome sign this week as the state and nation mark American Education week in Bailey county, Muleshoe, Lazbuddie and Bula plan ceremonies, but Three Way held its parents' night two weeks ago when a three-day homecoming ceremony was held.

Muleshoe schools will have open house all week, special assembly programs and a special P-TA program, according to Superintendent Marian J. McDaniel.

Harold Holder, superintendent at Three Way, says that school "put the big pot in the little one Oct. 23-24 when displays were set up in the various classrooms and John Q. Public was invited to pay visits to the schools to see the remodeled plant.

Barnes said the building program at Lazbuddie will virtually prevent the usual open house, so that event will be staged next March when Texas Public School Week is observed. Lazbuddie is building a new cafeteria, new science lab, new three elementary schools — De Shazo, Richland Hills and Hilltop — at the same time the following night.

The event here has been officially proclaimed by Mayor W. B. LeVeque who urged "all citizens to enter fully into American Education weeks observance in order to demonstrate their appreciation of work of

our teachers, and to show their active support for every program designed to improve our schools and colleges, and to think of education not only in terms of its cost, but also as the means to develop the greatest abilities of all our citizens."

He also pointed out that "settling aside of a special education week each year provides a fitting opportunity for the public generally to visit schools, colleges and other educational institutions, to express their appreciation of the work of our teachers and school officials, and to exchange views upon educational problems and progress."

A proclamation also has been

issued by President Johnson. In Bula's observance, the theme of the week will be "Investing in Learning." Superintendent McDaniel explained, adding that this idea will be carried out each day in bulletin board displays and programs. Open house will be held all week. On Thursday, a special program will be held, on the theme, "To Develop Good Citizenship." The assembly will be held at 8:20 a.m., and the public is invited to attend. The Tuesday night P-TA program also will feature American Education Week with Mrs. Terry Black, the president in charge. The week also is being observed by — See PROGRAMS, Page 4 —

Muleshoe will pay honor to its distributive education pupils and their employers this week while schools also will be observing American Education week, according to Fred Mar-

di, DE instructor here. Twenty-eight students will be honored and their employers recognized during the week. The pupils participating in the DE program attend school part time and then work part time for pay for Muleshoe businesses and professional men.

In his proclamation setting aside the week, Governor John Connally said: "The young people of this state who constitute the membership of the Texas Association of Distributive Edu-

cation clubs of America, are striving to prepare for useful careers of service in the field of distribution. These members hold as their primary aim the development of a high degree of leadership and citizenship consistent with American ideals of private enterprise and competition. These students are dedicated to high standards of efficiency in real time, wholesale and service occupations.

"Student members of this association, through the exercise of judgment and foresight, are holding their 20th annual leadership conference for the purpose of furthering and enriching the program of work carried out by member chapters.

"Therefore, I, as governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of Nov. 7-13 as Distributive Education Week in Texas, and ask that it be fittingly observed by our young people and by all other citizens."

Distributive education is relatively new in Muleshoe schools. First program was held in 1962.

Muleshoe Mules dropped their third district game at Hereford Friday night 44-20. Both teams were outstanding on offense.

Hereford received the kick-off on their 27-yard line and moved to the Muleshoe 40 before having to punt. The Mules took over on their 19-yard line but failed to move and had to punt to the Whiteface 47.

With the aid of three five-yard penalties and a completed pass, Steve Hodges ran over for the touchdown from the 4-yard line. Roger Owen threw a pass to Gene Drummond for two points.

On the kick-off, Joe Adams received the ball on the 20-yard line and ran 60 yards for a touchdown. A 15-yard penalty forced Adams to kick the extra point from about the 25-yard line.

Hereford took the ball on their 4-yard line and, with two long runs, moved to the Muleshoe 7-yard line where Gary Tucker ran over for a touch-

down. The try for extra point was no good.

The Mules received the ball on their 25 and, staying on the ground, pushed to the Hereford 3 where Ronnie Sajat moved over for a touchdown. Try for extra point was no good.

The Whitefaces took the ball on their 22-yard line and with the aid of a 27-yard run, Drummond ran over for another touchdown from the 3-yard line. Owen threw to Hodges for two more points.

Muleshoe received on their 3 and moved to the 24 where they punted to the Hereford 20. Hereford with the aid of two penalties and one long pass moved to the five yard line

where Greg Richards ran over to score. Richard's kick was good.

But producer-director Stanley Donen solved the problem. Stars Sophia Loren and Gregory Peck dined off a plate of larks concocted from marripan by London pastry cooks.

Meantime the Loft is open informally by the originators of the gallery. They are Inez Bobo, Vere Fox, Marie Lenau, Arline Phelps and Matilda Slemmons. Daily hours Tuesday through Saturdays are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. with one of the artists on duty and at work.

Inspired by a visit to an artistic retreat, a shack in Clovis rented for a place to paint, the idea grew not only to include a work studio but a gallery to show their own as well as other artists paintings. Added with time and thoughts included gift items to be sold to visitors of the gallery.

As you enter the Art Loft you will pass over refinished stairs on your way up that are done in hot pink, violet and chartreuse. As you ascend from the courtyard you will view a small cactus and various other plants.

You will then enter the gold room where you will register your name on a table bearing newspaper flowers and various other antiques. As one looks around the room your eye will meet with an antique chair cushioned in royal coral pink velvet. Also in the room one will notice a gold china cabinet with antique gold tea sets and dishes. While you are looking around the room, you will notice you are walking up on a floor that is hard stenciled with

floral designs to pick up the gold and royal maroon coloring throughout the room.

You leave the gold room to enter into the galerie which is used mostly for painting exhibits. Although you will observe several interesting things about the room such as a papermache mule stuffed with flowers. You will also see a bronze antique cash register which was one of the first furnishings for the gallery.

On into the main gallery which is named the wicker room, is done in Spanish green, with it's antique wicker furniture and carries out colors of blue with an olive antique accent. Paintings of the five artists are seen hanging around the room as well as paintings by Elizabeth Black, Peggy Pendergrass, Ethel Spring, Velma Davis, Jim Ward, Dr. Caballero and other area artists. The room has beads and bangles hanging from the windows.

As we go on through the gallery we view the different rooms which the artists use as their studios. Marie Lenau does her painting in the kitchen which is done in coral and chartreuse also featured are sink, refrigerator, and a work table for the artist.

Vere Fox and Inez Bobo occupy a room which features a black dribble abstract floor with red shutters and green walls.

The powder room is done with hot pink and rose with a red velvet curtain with hidden secrets of artists.

Matilda Slemmons and Arline Phelps have their room done with fish nets hanging from the windows along with shelves for paints.

The five artists have made an atmospheric and artistic place of the upstairs development and will be adding to the gallery as time goes on.

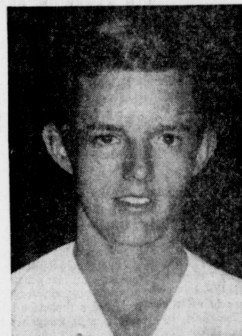

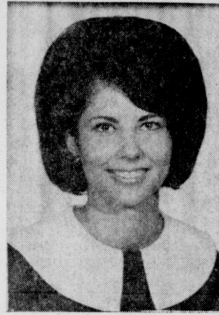

Numbers here now have a 272 prefix which must be used in long distance calling, but for in-town calls, it will be necessary to dial only the final "2", followed by the four station digits.

Here's an example: 272-4774 within Muleshoe can be reached by dialing only 2-4774.
