## Irish women win Nobel peace prizes

OSLO, Norway (AP) - Nobel peace prizes were awarded today to Amnesty International and two Northern Irish

The 1977 prize was won by Amnesty International, the London-based organization that works in behalf of political prisoners.

Mrs. Betty Williams and Miss Mairead Corrigan were given the 1976 prize for their movement seeking to bring peace between feuding Roman Catholics and Protestants in their homeland. The prize had not been

awarded last year. There was widespread sentiment last year for giving the Nobel prize to Miss Corrigan, 24. and Mrs. Williams, 33. But the campaign for them was launched late, and their nominations were received after the

Instead, 22 Ngrwegian newspapers raised \$325,000 and awarded it to them last year as a "People's Peace Prize." They used the money to set up a trust fund to provide care for orphans, create jobs and begin other community projects to ease the devast stion of the Ulster fighting.

The two Roman Catholic women began their movement after Mrs. Williams saw three children killed by a runaway car whose guerrilla driver had been shot by British soldiers in Belfast. Miss Corrigan

Braving threats on their lives by extremists, they organized peaceful marches by thousands of Protestants and Catholics in Northern Ireland, the Irish Republic and England.

Today's announcement said they were given the Nobel award for "their initiative to end the violence which has marked the unfortunate disintegration in Northern Ireland, and which has cost so many lives."

The prize to Amnesty International is worth \$145,000 and the 1976 prize to Mrs. Williams and Miss Corrigan about \$141,600. The women's campaign, which began in

August 1976, has not stopped or noticeably diminished the fighting between Protestant extremists and the Roman Catholic Irish Republican Army. The IRA launched the fighting eight years ago to end British and Protestant control over Northern Ireland and unite it with the Irish Republic in the

But the Nobel committee said the initiative Mrs. Williams and Miss Corrigan took in Ulster released strong antipathy against violence.

'Alfred Nobel's wish was that the peace prize should be awarded to those who most actively worked for peace and fraternization." the committee said.

"Mairead Corrigan and Betty Williams acted out of a deep conviction that individual people can do meaningful efforts for peace through conciliatory work."

Besides their efforts in their own country. the two women traveled to the United States last year and made an appeal to Americans to stop sending money to the two sides to buy guns and bombs.

In awarding the 1977 prize to Amnesty International, the committee said:

"Since the human rights declaration was adopted by the United Nations almost 30 years ago, positive forces have fought in many countries to evoke its ideals.

But the world has during those years also witnessed an increasing brutalization, an internationalization of violence. terrorism and torture. In this situation amnesty international has worked with all its strength to protect human values.

"Amnesty international has first of all given practical, humanitarian and unpartial support to people imprisoned because of their racial, religious or political beliefs.

Founded in 1961 by attorney Peter Benenson. Amnesty International now claims to be the largest human rights organization in the world, with more than 15,000 cases in the last 16 years.

#### Officials back Lance

ATLANTA (AP) - Former Budget Director Bert Lance says he had nothing to do with the deposit of more than \$1 million in federal funds in the National Bank of Georgia, in which he is a major stockholder. A federal official backs him up

"I know nothing about it." Lance said Sunday. "I didn't have anything to do with the placement of any federal funds whatsoever. That was not in my purview.

The former director of the Office of Management and Budget was reacting to a story published in Newsday, a Long Island, N.Y., newspaper, which said that as of March 31 the bank held \$1,366,000 in federal funds in "savings accounts." much of it deposited after Lance became OMB director in

The newspaper also said all

other national banks in Georgia had a total of \$39,000 in federal funds in similar accounts.

On Sunday, the clerk of the U.S. District Court in northern Georgia. Ben Carter, said most of the \$1 million in Lance's bank was deposited by individual trustees appointed in federal bankruptcy cases.

He said the NBG was one of "20 or 30 banks in the state" approved to receive such deposits and that the choice of which of those banks to use was "at the discretion of the trustees.

Carter also said all but about \$43,000 of the federal money in the NBG was in the form of federal certificates of deposit and checking accounts, not in savings accounts

Carter said he did not know if the approximately \$1 million in bankruptcy funds was an unusually large amount for deposit in one Georgia bank.

A dispatch from Washington, congressional investigators found that National Highway Traffic Safety Administration officials withdrew the test results Aug. 26, shortly after they had been placed on the public docket

The test results were returned to the docket a week later after reported arm-twisting by Michigan Rep. John Dingell - a vigorous foe of mandatory

An NHTSA staff evaluation of the test results was withheld on resolutions to overturn a the crash impacts.

"The Calspan tests clearly show that air bags are not as effective as safety belts." Dingell was quoted as saying. "Without having that information readily available. Congress now may be tempted to approve mandatory air bags. which would amount to ripping off American consumers since they cost an estimated \$200 to install and \$600 to replace once they deploy.

Officials for NHTSA have maintained that mandatory air because only about 20 per cent of the nation's 131 million motorists regularly buckle their

## 11th graders must pass 'The Test' for diploma

- Thousands of 11th graders across Florida are nervously facing the ominous prospect of what has become known as "The Test." It's the first time a state is requiring students to demonstrate such basic skills as reading a map and balancing a checkbook before winning

a high school diploma. Beginning today and stretching over the next two weeks, 120,000 11th graders will take the top-secret Functional

Literacy Test. The exam was mandated by the 1976 state legislature in response to complaints that kids were griduating without being able to read road signs or do simple math problems. This

year's seniors were exempted. The 117-question exam will require students to demonstrate ability to read and do math on a seventh-grade level. If they can't score at least 70 on both the math and communication sections, they won't get a high school diploma regardless of their classroom grades. Instead, they will get only a cer-. tificate of attendance.

Based on pilot testing, education officials predict that up to 30 per cent of 11th graders will fail the first time they take the test. But they'll get two more chances before June 1979, and educators predict by then the failure rate will be cut to 5 per

Some schools started crash programs at the beginning of the fall term to get students ready for the test. At Northwestern, a pre-

dominantly black high school in Miami, signs posted in classrooms promised that the school would "beat the test." Students have been spending the first 15 minutes of each day with a "vocabulary booster" drill to increase word comprehension. But a Miramar, Fla., princi-

pal said, "I don't think a crash course would work with students in trouble. These are things they are supposed to learn over 11 years."

"I tell 11th graders that they are lucky. For the first time, they will be able to show a prospective employer a diploma that is proof they can read and do arithmetic." he said. What is included in the test are things we all need to be able to do in our everyday

The test ranges from questions on reading a map, balancing a checkbook and comparison shopping to questions requiring students to read charts and tables and distinguish between fact and opin-

Officials say Florida is the

statewide test that all students must pass to graduate. Some states. like New York, give standardized tests in specific subjects that students must take to pass a course. Oregon began in 1974 phasing in proficiency requirements in various

courses that seniors must meet

to graduate.

A few other states have requirements similar to Florida's but haven't put them into effect yet. Florida officials say a growing number of states are interested in the idea.

In addition to the Functional Literacy Test, the 11th graders will take a basic skills test along with 345,000 other students in grades three, five and



### Newspapers from TV

TELEVISION: Japanese researchers have combined a TV set with a facsimile device that creates this fascinating possibility: You're watching a cooking demonstration and when it's over, the announcer tells you to switch to a special channel for just two minutes to get a surprise, which you are all too happy to do. Once you switch, an ink-jet printing system starts operating and delivers, through a slot at the bottom of the set, a letter-size page that contains the recipes as well as a color photo of the dish. This same channel could be used to deliver market quotes; theater schedules-even your newspaper.



TRANSPORT: No question about it, low-priced mopedslightweight, motorized bicycles that get up to 150 miles per gallon-are catching on in the U.S. (They've long been popular in Europe). Sales have risen from 25,000 in 1975 to 100,000 last year. They're expected to double that in 1977, So, if there's a moped in your future, keep this in mind: While no state requires a moped operator to wear a helmet. Holland nearly halved the number of moped deaths when it insisted on that kind of protection.

MUSIC: If you've always wanted a player piano, you're in luck. All you'll need is an ordinary piano and a \$1,250 attachment which will be available next year. Developed by an electronics firm, the "Pianocorder" will come with 100 cassettes (45 minutes each) that will cause the piano to bang away in the style of the top pianists who made the tapes.

RESEARCH: An ion, in case you were wondering, is an isolated electron or an atom or molecule which by loss or gain of one or more electrons has acquired a net electric charge. Navy researchers have found that if you take some ions, put them in a vacuum chamber, increase the energy and then let the ions fly into some other material, interesting changes occur. Example: ramming helium ions into copper increased its corrosion resistance. Stainless steel, bombarded with nitrogen ions, developed 30 times more sliding wear resistance. The possibilities are fascinating. The reason, of course, is that common materials are acquiring new and unsuspected behavior

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RUBBER: Not too long ago, a proposal was put before Congress to spend \$60 million developing rubber production from the guayule (wy-oo-lee) plant. Another zany idea? Far from it. Chemistry, published by the American Chemical Society, thinks rubber output from this shrub, which does well in arid and semi-arid climes, is entirely feasible. The guayule can survive on less than 10 inches of rainfall a year and there's lots of desert land available. Interestingly, rubber production dips while the plant is growing, but stress-cool weather or drought-increases it. About 70 years ago, half of U. S. rubber supplies came from the guayule.

RAILROADS: If you live anywhere near railroad tracks, you've seen flatcars go by carrying highway trailers. One of these days, you may well be seeing the trailers directly on the tracks. A trailer with normal axles and tires and also a rail axle and steel wheels is under development. It's estimated that inter-city transportation costs could be cut more than 40 per cent using these dual-purpose trailers.

FOOD: Are you ready for the idea of a shrimp factory? An entrepreneur in Florida is building one after discovering that the giant (up to 7 inches long) Malaysian prawn, under the proper conditions, can spawn every six weeks instead of once a year. By placing the shrimp into a specially designed "environmental system," it's possible to get a survival rate of 80 per cent of the 50,000 eggs each female shrimp lays in the fresh water tanks. In natural surroundings, a Malaysian shrimp will lay about 70,000 eggs, but only a few reach marketable size. The developer of the foregoing idea thinks shrimp breeding is now at the same stage that chicken was 25 years ago.

#### Zale battle begins today

DALLAS (AP) - Pre-trial motions and jury selection were scheduled today in the second round of a battle between Zale Corp. and a former firm treasurer who faces extortion charges leveled by company officials.

Shearn Rovinsky is charged with attempting to extort \$200,000 from the Zale

The trial will mark the second time Rovinsky will be tried on charges brought by top Zale executives. The former treasurer was acquitted last November on charges of misappropriating \$600,000 in Zale funds.

Rovinsky was then arrested in December after meeting at a Dallas hotel with Zale Board Chairman Ben Lipshy. He allegedly received \$200,000 at that meeting.

Authorities claim Rovinsky took that money as partial payment of \$3 million he demanded in return for a promise to "fix things for the company with the Internal Revenue Service." Rovinsky has denied charges.

The recordings were made by a former business associate of Yarbrough, Bill Rothkopf, who was rigged with the recording device by Harris County law

enforcement officers. Yarbrough's attorneys contend this constituted entrap-

The defense has previously been furnished copies of the recordings, but it insisted on comparing those with the original recordings.

## Soviet Cosmonauts fail

MOSCOW (AP) - Two Soviet cosmonauts failed to link up with an orbiting space laboratory today in a major disappointment for the Russians at the start of their third decade of space exploration.

The Soviet news agency Tass said flight commander Lt. Col. Vladimir Kovalenok and flight engineer Valery Ryumin were unable to dock with the Salyut-6 space station and were preparing to return to earth in the Soyuz-25 spacecraft after little more than one day in orbit.

Tass gave no indication what caused the docking failure. "Because of some deviations from the planned docking regime, the linkup operation was cancelled." Tass said.

The failure was the latest in a series that have dogged the

Russians' second generation of manned spacecraft. The Soyuz-23 mission a year

ago was aborted after the spacecraft failed to complete a docking maneuver. In the interim. Soyuz-24 successfully completed a 19-day mission after linking up with the Salyut-5 space lab.

Soyuz-25 was launched Sunday from the same pad at the Baikonur space center from which Sputnik, the world's first m a n-made space satellite. opened the space age on Oct. 4. "It's the beginning of the

third decade of the space age and it's going to be a working decade," Kovalenok said as he climbed aboard the spacecraft. "There's a lot of work to be

#### Money to be hospital topic





DEAR DR. LAMB - I have this newspaper, P.O. Box been unable to find the proper value for triglycerides York, NY 10019. anywhere. What is the normal

amount? DEAR READER - It depends upon the method and the state of the patient when studied. In general if the patient is in the fasting state - not having eaten for at least 12 hours — the level should be below 150 milligrams in 100

milliliters of blood. Remember that trigly-cerides are simply fats. The amount of fat in the blood varies greatly with what you have eaten recently. Fat is slowly absorbed and slowly cleared from the blood stream compared to sugar. It is much more affected by a recent meal than your cholesterol level. One reason you are having trouble finding normal values is because of its

variability. The triglyceride level will also fall if you exercise vigorously. The amount of exercise in the preceding 48 hours may affect your triglyceride level.

The triglyceride level alone has not been found to be as useful as the cholesterol level in predicting the risk of heart attacks. When the size of the particles formed by the triglyceride-cholesterol combination is considered, the risk calculation for people over 50 can be improved. In that age group the amounts of particles of different sizes become more important than the cholesterol level alone. reactions. No, no, no, fingering your navel will not cause cancer. Cancer is simply cell growth that has gone berserk allowing uncontrolled abnormal growth. For example, liver cancer is a rapid disorganized growth of liver cells. Many factors can stimulate the wild

Why don't you ask your doctor to have you see a psychiatrist for some professional counseling. If you can get at the root of your real anxiety then its manifestation, excessive fear of cancer. may be controlled.

## New method saves hand stitching

By Joanne Schreiber

The shorter jacket is the big fashion news for fall, made of such soft fabrics as velvet, pinwale corduroy, flannel and gentle wools. If you are making such a jacket, give it an attractive lining, made from one of the silky printed polyesters.

There's an easier way to put in a lining, which will save you a good hour of hand-stitching. This technique comes from 'Success in Sewing," a 72page, soft-cover sewing manual available exclusively to readers of this newspaper. Here's how:

Assemble your jacket as usual, add interfacing, make bound buttonholes, and insert sleeves. Join the collar to the front facing. Lay right side of collar and facing against right side of jacket. Pin, and stitch along outer seamline as shown, to hemline of jacket. At hemline (about one and one-half inches from raw edge), pivot and stitch across bottom of facing to fiveeighths of an inch from raw edge of facing. Trim off corner. (Fig. 1)

Grade seam allowances. Clip collar corners. Turn facing and collar to inside. Push out corners, smooth seams and press. Put in jacket and sleeve hems. Press hems.

Now assemble jacket lining, complete with sleeves. Place lining as shown, with right side of lining against right sides of facings and collar, raw edges matching. Pin in place, clipping lining to fit


curves of facings and collar. Stitch lining to facings and collar, backstitching at lower edges of facings three-fourths of an inch from jacket hemline. (Fig. 2) Flip lining right side out, and push sleeve

lining through sleeve. (Fig. 3) Then tack jacket and lining together along seam allowances. Turn sleeve right side out and make sleeve lining hem. Make jacket lining hem. Turn jacket right side out and give it a final pressing. Your lining is finished, in far less time than if you had hand-stitched it in place. (Fig.

#### Conservation group wins top priority

Announcement was made during a recent meeting in McLean that the North Rolling Plains Resource Conservation and Development has been recommended as Texas' Number one priority for funding

## Jury forewoman was interpreter in war trials

OAKHURST. Calif. (AP) —
Ursula Uphold brings a unique courtroom experience to her task of grand jury forewoman in Madera County. As a girl of 15. she was an interpreter at the Nuremberg war crime trials after World War II.

That experience was traumatic. Mrs. Uphold says, but it did not keep her from accepting an appointment in July to head the grand jury, which returns criminal indictments and investigates county offices.

On the grand jury, you can work creatively and imaginatively and give opinions." she said. But to sit at the (war crimes) trials and judge people was a tremendous responsibility. I hope I never have to do it again.

Mrs. Uphold said she had been unable to talk about the trial of leaders of Nazi Germany until recently and still cannot recall all her experiences

I don't know how I could possibly tell you how it was to be confronted with those responsibilities, especially at that age. she said in an interview. To hear about those atrocities and wrongdoings you neverheard before was just devastating.

Mrs. Uphold said she put the trials, which ended in 1946, out of her mind once her duties there ended.

You know I haven't seen any films about Nuremberg since I left. I've never read a book on it. ... It was such a painful experience. she said.

Born Ursula Gilich, daughter of a French countess and a German count, she was unconscious for five weeks after their Berlin home was bombed in 1945. But, she said, her translating stint was worse.

The interpreters had to translate testimony for up to an hour at a time in any of four languages — English. French, German or Russian.


The pressure was so great." she said. "You couldn't take that for any length of time. Nobody could. The Americans knew that and would relieve us by sending us to do investigative work or transfer us to other jobs."

And other Germans resented the interpreters working for Allied intelligence, often throwing rocks and yelling at them as they entered an internment camp, she said.

"We even went so far as to change our names — not officially, but to avoid harassment." Mrs. Uphold said. "I just had to get out."

said. Should I trust her?
Maybe I didn't choose the
perfect therapist for me.

DEAR READER — Maybe your need to have a perfect therapist surfaced so quickly (assuming your therapist didn't develop a severe memory impairment overnight), because you had started talking about something painful. It sounds as if you "used" your preoccupation with perfection to put distance between yourself and your therapist.

If you really cannot trust anyone who is not perfect, why write to me and perhaps accept my view of your situation? You don't know me. On what basis did you decide I could be trusted?

could be trusted? Is it possible that your desire to be "perfect" and wanting others to be perfect could be camouflaging another and perhaps more basic problem? It would be a worthwhile exercise for you to look back at those relationships or projects you began and then dropped because you (or others) failed to live up to some particular yardstick of perfection. What else was happening at about the same time that might have touched off your anxieties about such imperfections? Were you getting a little closer to someone else, or enjoying some project? Maybe you are trying to avoid

Because no human being is perfect, a commitment to perfection is a sure-fire path to failure. To demand perfection is to be self-destructive. This might be something to talk about when you go back to see that very human therapist of yours. P.S. Even for those not obsessed by such an extreme drive for perfection it is a good idea to make a regular practice of trying something that you know you cannot do well. Do it just to personally acknowledge that success and pleasure need not always be synonymous.

#### Carter considers new department

WASHINGTON (AP) —
Pressed to develop a comprehensive strategy for dealing with urban ills. President Carter's advisers are considering the possibility of creating a Cabinet-level Department of Economic Development.

Administration sources said consideration of a new department is included in a reorganization study of federal programs that are aimed at promoting local economic development.

That study now is being speeded up as part of an over-all White House push to quickly devise an extensive urban strategy.

Although there was no indication Carter directly ordered that consideration be given to creating a Cabinet department, it was learned he has been informed about the study's proposal.

According to several sources, a Cabinet department could assume a variety of economic development tasks that currently are spread among existing agencies, such as the Department of Housing and Urban Development and the Commerce, Agriculture and Labor departments.


The major economic development tasks currently are carried out in the Commerce Department, under its Economic Development Administration, and at the Agriculture Department, which operates a rural development program.

The latest department to be created was the Department of Energy, which took form only this year. During his campaign for president, Carter had also mentioned the possibility of forming a Cabinet education department. That idea is now under study.

But a Vancouver cardiologist, Dr. James Woolery, said he would be "very skeptical" of such a testing method without the aid of a trained professional, calling it "almost a gimmick.

"Do it yourself medicine is not good." he said. "I think it's the wrong direction to go."

He said the only possible value the machine may have is in alerting someone to high blood pressure. On the other hand, he said, an inaccurate reading may be harmful by convincing a person his pressure is normal

Dr. Ronald Champaign, di-

rector of the Southwest Washington Health District, said "it's better to have someone there to explain what the pressure means."

A chart on the machine explains what the two numbers the machine gives are and helps determine whether the pressure is normal or too high but also cautions "as with any electronic equipment, a rare malfunction may cause error to occur in your reading."

The readout has two numbers. The first, the systolic, gives pressure in the blood vessel while the heart is pumping blood. The second, the diastolic. reflects the pressure while the heart is momentarily at rest.

## Gay teachers ousted in Dallas

DALLAS (AP) - A homosexual has no place in the Dallas Independent School District either as a teacher or as an administrator, according to a policy announced by school officials

'Anyone that is a known homosexual and is so identified would be asked to resign by me," said Supt. Nolan Estes. 'It's an unwritten part of our district policy.

Estes aded: "The moral val-

ues that we're attempting to teach, our whole process of character education is inconsistent with this type of activity (homosexuality). Anytime a teacher's outside activities infringe upon his or her effectiveness in the classroom it is a matter of concern. Estes said the policy will be

changed only on orders from the school board. School board president Bill Hunter said:

"I don't buy the bit that anything goes as far as a teacher's lifestyle. The schools have a responsibility to deal with certain things with the students and that is one of them. It's my personal opinion that homosexuality does have a bearing upon whether he or she was in a proper position of being a model to teach young people.

Estes said: "I don't know of any parent who wants his child taught by a homosexual.

Steve Wilkins, president of the Dallas Gay Political Caucus said Estes' and Hunter's remarks were appointing

He said such opinion could lead to a "witchhunt.

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## Uranium suit in Virginia

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) - Another two hours of depositions were scheduled for today as the windup to the Long Island Lighting Co.'s part in a uranium contract suit against the Westinghouse Electric Corp. in

U.S. District Court. Testimony introduced during an unsual Sunday session concerned the views held by various Westinghouse employes toward the company's contract obligations to the New York

"That's enough," Judge Robert R. Merhige Jr. said at 6:20 p. m. Sunday after hearing nine witnesses, all but one from Westinghouse. Merhige had scheduled the Sunday session in a bid to keep the case on sched-

While Lilco does not have a signed contract with Westinghouse, it has taken the position it committed itself to buy approximately 9.3 million pounds of uranium in mid-1973. The Westinghouse regional

sales manager considered agreements and letters of intent between corporations to be commitments, according to a deposition by Carl A. Larson. In some cases, contract sign-

ings were formalities, said Larson. He noted construction usually began on nuclear steam supply systems when letters of intent were received instead of a delay while a formal agreement was signed.

By early 1974. James G. Downey, Westinghouse manager of contract analysis, said he did not believe there were any substantive issues in the Lilco contract that had not

Downey said that through the end of 1973 he never heard any Westinghouse employe argue the company was not obligated to supply uranium to Lilco.

The agreement provided for uranium in the \$11-a-pound range, substantially less than the existing \$40-per-pound market price.

D.R. Smith, Westinghouse's manager of uranium management, wrote a memorandum in December 1973 on sales publicity that was introduced Sunday while portions of his deposition were read. Smith said:

"Due to the large quantities of uranium sold by Westinghouse in the last six months, we find ourselves with a shortage of uranium that needs to be

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




