# Wallace Closes Four Huntsville Schools

## Negroes, Whites Turned Away

HUNTSVILLE, Ala. (UPI) — Gov. George C. Wallace's roving state troopers today closed four white schools scheduled to admit Negroes in this city where the government is designing rockets to put Americans on the moon.

Wallace ringed three elementary schools with armed troopers who turned away at least two Negroes and hundreds of white students.

Angry parents shouted to the troopers "go home where you belong."

One group of students scrambled past a line of officers into one elementary school.

### Governor Delays Opening

Wallace issued an early morning executive order postponing the opening of the four schools until Monday. He cited the violence that erupted Wednesday night in Birmingham and "racial tensions" existing in the state in closing the schools.

It was the second time in five days Wallace had closed schools in the state to head off racial integration.

Huntsville is the home of the Marshall Space Flight Center and the Redstone Arsenal and thousands of government employees send their children to the city's schools.

### Hear Broadcasts

They awoke today to hear radio broadcasts announcing that Wal-

lace had ordered the four schools closed until Monday.

S. W. Herford IV, 6, a Negro, arrived at the 10th Avenue Elementary School to enroll, accompanied by his father, Dr. S. W. Herford III.

They were turned away by the troopers and told: "The school is closed."

The exchange was polite and brief and Herford and his son walked away.

At East Clinton Elementary School one woman with a child in tow skirted the line of troopers and dashed into the building.

### Teachers Look on

Four small boys also ran around the line and into the building where teachers stood at the windows looking out.

Dozens of state troopers converged on the four schools shortly after dawn to seal them off.

Fourteen state police cars were parked on the lawn at Rison Junior High School.

Terry Heights Elementary School, the fourth school ordered to admit Negroes this fall, also was cordoned off by the troopers moved into the city Thursday night by the governor.

Huntsville Mayor R. B. Searcy said the city would open its schools in defiance of the governor's order but he acknowledged that Wallace had the power to close them.

Miss District of Columbia—Rosanne Tueller, 20, won the talent contest based on her rendition of "I Love Paris," in French. Since Miss Tueller lives in nearby Virginia and is a native of Florida it was a clean sweep for the southern belles.

It was the second straight night that beauties from below the Mason-Dixon Line have romped off with competition honors.

Wednesday night Miss Alabama, Judith Short, won the trophy in the bathing suit category and Miss Virginia, Dorcas Campbell, took top honors in the talent competition.

The third round in the various categories are scheduled for tonight, with the semifinals and finals Saturday night.

## Vietnamese Demand Release of Priests

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI) — The Vietnamese government demanded today that the United States hand over three Buddhist priests who took refuge in the American Embassy here last Sunday, diplomatic sources said.

The three priests included Thich Tri Quang, who is reported to have masterminded the Buddhist protest movement against the government of President Ngo Dinh Diem.

The sources said the demand was made in a formal aide-memoire from the Vietnamese Foreign Office. U.S. Embassy representative William Truehart was summoned to the Foreign Office and handed the demand.

## 'Squeals' On Pop

LONDON (UPI) — Nine-month-old Steven Carroll "squealed" on his father, Albert Carroll, and Thursday it cost the 28-year-old professional boxer a year in jail for receiving a stolen driver's license.

Police called at Carroll's apartment to investigate the theft of a truck and were asked to be quiet because the baby was asleep. Just then the child began to cry. Police found a stolen license and the license plates of the stolen truck under his crib mattress.

## Keeler Booked For Perjury, Conspiracy

LONDON (UPI) — Playgirl Christine Keeler, reduced from a starring role in Britain's "scandal of the century" to a prisoner in a London magistrate's court, was formally charged today with perjury and conspiracy to obstruct justice.

She and three alleged fellow-conspirators were released on bail following a 10-minute hearing on the charges in Marlborough Street court. They were ordered to appear in court again Sept. 13.

All four had spent the night in jail — a new experience for Miss Keeler, the 21-year-old red-haired beauty whose affections brought the downfall of War Minister John Profumo three months ago and set off a scandal that almost toppled the government of Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

Miss Keeler was arrested at her swank London apartment Thursday night.

Detectives also arrested Christine's friend, Paula Hamilton-Marshall, 21, and Miss Hamilton-Marshall's maid, Mrs. Olive Brooker, on the same charges. Randolph Fenton, a Jamaican, was arrested for conspiracy.

The four had played a part in the arrest, conviction and three-year prison sentence of Jamaican jazz singer Aloysius (Lucky) Gordon on charges of beating and kicking the 22-year-old Miss Keeler.

Gordon was sentenced June 7 but the Court of Criminal Appeals quashed the sentence July 30, because of secret new evidence in the case.

Prime Minister Macmillan nearly was forced to resign three months ago when Profumo admitted illicit relations with Miss Keeler and resigned in disgrace. Scotland Yard refused to explain the charges against Miss Keeler and the other persons.

## Johnson Arrives In Helsinki On European Visit

HELSINKI, Finland (UPI) — Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson arrived in Helsinki today for his second stop on a 15,000-mile, five-nation tour of Northern Europe.

Johnson, his wife Lady Bird and their 19-year-old daughter Lynda Bird, arrived here by jetliner from Stockholm, where they opened the tour with a three-day visit to Sweden. They were to spend four days here.

On hand to greet Johnson were President Urho Kekkonen and Mrs. Kekkonen, Ahti Karjalainen, caretaker, prime minister of a government that fell last week in a dispute over farm prices, and other top Finnish officials.

A light rain was falling when the Boeing 707 jet carrying Johnson and his party landed.

President Offers Greeting "Welcome to Finland," President Kekkonen said as he greeted Johnson.

"I am glad to be here," Johnson replied.

Recently-appointed U. S. Ambassador Carl Rowan, one of America's few Negro diplomats, led the American delegation at the airport.

A full-scale military reception was accorded by the Helsinki garrison.

The visit is seen here as a goodwill gesture by the United States, and as a reply to the U. S. visit made by Kekkonen in 1961.

As President Kennedy's personal representative to Finland's "America Days," Johnson will receive the first ticker-tape welcome in Finnish history Saturday when he drives along Helsinki's main business street and dedicates its name-change from Aleksanterinkatu to American Street.

His four-day visit to Finland is the second stop on the 15,000 mile goodwill tour of Sweden, Finland, Norway, Denmark, Iceland and Danish-owned Greenland.

## Internal Revenue Using Electronic Bloodhounds

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Internal Revenue Service has put an electronic bloodhound on the trail of 7 million taxpayers but thus far has failed to sniff out any serious wrongdoing.

At least that was the impression resulting from the first use of the new IRS computers, to check individual income tax returns from seven Southeastern states.

The pilot processing operation was set up in the Atlanta, Ga., IRS district. The computers have scanned more than 7 million returns from the district's seven states. So far only one case of fraud serious enough to prosecute has been found.

## Frontier Trouble Possible in China

TOKYO (UPI) — Communist China, in a harsh new attack divulging innermost secrets of the Sino-Soviet quarrel, charged today that Russia in effect kidnaped thousands of Chinese in an apparent plot to overthrow a regional regime near the Soviet border.

The Chinese said the border trouble occurred in April and May of 1962.

## No Amendment, No Vote From Sen. Goldwater

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., disclosed today that he probably would vote against the nuclear test ban treaty if his Cuban missile reservation is rejected by the Senate.

Goldwater's reservation is given virtually no chance of adoption. It calls for postponing the treaty's effectiveness until Russia removes its military base from Cuba. The proposal ran into bipartisan criticism on the Senate floor Thursday.

Goldwater indicated his opposition course was now marked out, after weeks of apparent indecision. Asked if he would vote against the treaty if the reservation is turned down, the GOP presidential contender told United Press International:

"I have just about reached that conclusion. I'd hope something would happen to change my mind. But I have so many reservations about military disadvantages and our failure to get something out of the treaty, that it's a fair assumption I'll be opposed."

The treaty picked up support today when Sen. Gordon Allott, R-Colo., announced in a prepared Senate speech that he would "vote reluctantly" to ratify the pact unless some new facts show it to be contrary to national safety.

Allott said he felt to a degree that "this nation has been black-jacked into a ratification of this treaty" but that failure to approve it "could destroy our already fast diminishing claim to the moral leadership of the world."

Like Goldwater, Allott said Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev should keep his pledge to withdraw Soviet forces from Cuba and take other steps toward peace in Laos and Berlin.

The treaty comes up for formal Senate consideration Monday.

The Peking attack said Soviet actions have forced relations between Red China and Russia to "the brink of a split" and carried differences in the international Communist movement "to a

The Chinese accused the Russians of "lying" in their ideological and political dispute, and said it was time to set the record straight. They contended that Peking had made concession after concession to Moscow in hopes of keeping the rift from widening.

Peking inferred that the "last straw" in Moscow's anti-Chinese campaign were the Kremlin's signing of the partial nuclear test ban treaty with the United States and Britain, and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's recent visit to President Tito of Yugoslavia.

The attack, as broadcast in English by the New China News Agency, said Peking was not yielding for leading of the Communist movement, and it accused Khrushchev of being "patriarchal, arbitrary and tyrannical."

The Peking regime presented the detailed account of its side of the quarrel in a massive article in the Chinese Communist party newspaper, People's Daily, and its theoretical journal, Red Flag.

## Primaries Show Rockefeller Is Getting Stronger

ALBANY, N.Y. (UPI) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's drive for a White House bid on the Republican ticket in 1964 appeared stronger today based on the outcome of key primary races at opposite ends of New York State.

Although the governor was not directly involved, his political prestige was challenged. It was put to the test in Erie County where a failure could have hurt his chances of bringing a solid state delegation to the national convention.

A close primary contest in New York's Greenwich Village section may have ended a political career that at one time ranged high in city, state and national Democratic circles.

Final but unofficial figures showed Carmine G. de Sapio failed in his political comeback try by 41 votes. He lost his grip on Tammany Hall two years ago as the result of a reform move headed by former Gov. Herbert Lehman and the late Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt.

De Sapio's successful opponent was Edward I. Koch, a reform Democrat.

In Erie County, two men appointed to judicial posts by the governor scored impressive victories over opponents backed by the county GOP chairman, Robert W. Grimm.

# Vacation Church School Praised By Leaders In Churches As Supplement To Sunday School

Religion in America By LOUIS CASSELS. United Press International. You can't expect a child to learn much about the Christian faith in a class which meets for half an hour a week. This hard truth is slowly impressing itself on the millions of families who rely on Sunday school to provide all or most of the religious training which their children receive.

The traditional Sunday school session is one hour long. But at least half of the time is taken up with a worship assembly, shuffling through hallways to classrooms, taking the roll, making announcements and other things that have little to do with systematic instruction. What this means is stated succinctly by the Rev. Robert F. Parker of Philadelphia, a Christian education specialist of the Lutheran Church in America. "A young person spends more time in one year studying arithmetic than he spends in five years of Sunday school classes," says the Rev. Mr. Parker.

Not Important Enough Under these circumstances, he finds it hardly surprising that "Christian training and experience gradually retire to a dusty corner of the child's thinking." A variety of efforts are underway in major Protestant denominations to provide more time for religious education. One possibility is to lengthen the Sunday morning session. The Episcopal Church has recommended a minimum of 90 minutes, and the United Presbyterian Church is urging all of its congregations to allocate at least 75 minutes for Sunday school. But religious educators see little hope for a major breakthrough in this direction. Pastors find it difficult to fit a long Sunday school session into a morning schedule which is already complicated, in many cases, by the necessity of holding two adult worship services. And parents—especially those who regard Sunday school as an intrusion on their "morning to sleep"—are often unenthusiastic about longer sessions.

More Promising Trend A more promising trend, which has been developing in recent years, is to supplement Sunday school with one or two hours of "church school" on a weekday. Sometimes this is done through an arrangement with public schools whereby children are released early at their parents' request. This is called "released time" and the Supreme Court has ruled that there is nothing unconstitutional about public schools cooperating with churches in this way.

No one has any reliable statistics on the number of children now attending weekday religious classes. The National Council of Churches guesses that of the 30 million school age children enrolled in Protestant Sunday schools, perhaps 4 million receive some weekday religious instruction. The Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, which provides religious classes for Catholic children attending public schools, estimates that about 3.5 million are under instruction in its classes, which usually meet either on a weekday or on Saturday morning.

Additional Summer Training Still another way to supplement the inadequate time span of Sunday school is to provide intensive religious educational experiences during the summer. This year more than 100,000 Protestant churches conducted "vacation church schools" or "vacation Bible schools." These summer schools usually are in session for three hours a day, five days a week, for two to four weeks. They provide more time for systematic religious training than is available during a whole year of Sunday school classes. The Confraternity of Christian Doctrine also conducts "summer schools of religion" for Catholic children. The consensus of Protestant and Catholic officials who are working with the problem is that adequate time for religious education of public school children can be found—if their parents really want it enough to give it at least as high a priority as music and dancing lessons, dental appointments and their own Saturday morning golf games.

## DOWN-TO-EARTH RELIGION

We hear, "Give us a sensible religion that is reasonable and doesn't require so much sacrifice." So many — too many — give God only what is left over and complain when their minister points out that God must have first place.

This is no new problem. The prophet Malachi, speaking to a blackslidden Israel, reminded them that God was not pleased with their unsacrificing religion. He reminded them that sin brings its own penalties. He told them that they could not escape punishment if they refused God's way.

He appeared for a down-to-earth examination of their spiritual condition and explained to them that God would not expect any less than any earthly ruler in loyalty and allegiance. He said, "... if ye offer the blind for sacrifice, is it not evil? and if ye offer the lame and sick, is it not evil? offer it now unto thy governor; will he be pleased with thee, or accept thy person? saith the Lord of Hosts." (Malachi 1:8)

This call for an examination of our sacrifice for God is surely relevant today. How about treating your boss as you treat your church? Go to work tomorrow about thirty minutes late. Refuse to cooperate with what his organization is trying to do. Complain every time he asks you to do some little extra thing. How long would you last at your present job?

And if you should have company come in for an overnight visit, just don't show up the next day for work. Your boss will understand. He knows that you can't very well leave them and go out to make money.

Or if you happen to dislike your supervisor of your foreman where you work, just stay away a day or so until the boss comes out to see you, and pets you along and begs you to come back to work.

Or, if the boss doesn't run the place to suit you and doesn't follow your suggestions, just quit!

"Offer it to the governor!" Would you curse the president of the United States to his face? Would you "damn" him with every other breath as you talked to him? That is the way many are doing God . . . and face to face, too!

Would you cheat the government of the United States out of half or three-fourths of all its income taxes? Or instead of sending in your federal income tax return and check on April 15, would you just slip a couple of dollars into an envelope and scribble a note and say that you "hope" you can have more next time, but you still owe on your television set and golf clubs? Or would you just throw the tax forms into the fire and tell yourself that you never promised to pay taxes and are not going to start paying now? Or would you pledge a dollar a month on your income taxes, "and more if I have any left over"?

You say, "Preacher, quit kidding."  
But I say I am just preaching the same message that Malachi was preaching to the blackslidden Israelites. And God thought it was good enough to include in Holy Writ.

Conduct that down-to-earth examination of your measure of devotion and sacrifice. Would any earthly boss or ruler be satisfied with the same kind you give God?

Big man on the team is expected to be 185-pound guard Gerald Pratt. Pratt, who saw limited action as an underclassman, is slated to be the bulk of the defense this season.

Class AA Denver City tries to continue its record of not having lost a game at home since 1956 and plays host to Class AAA Seminole.

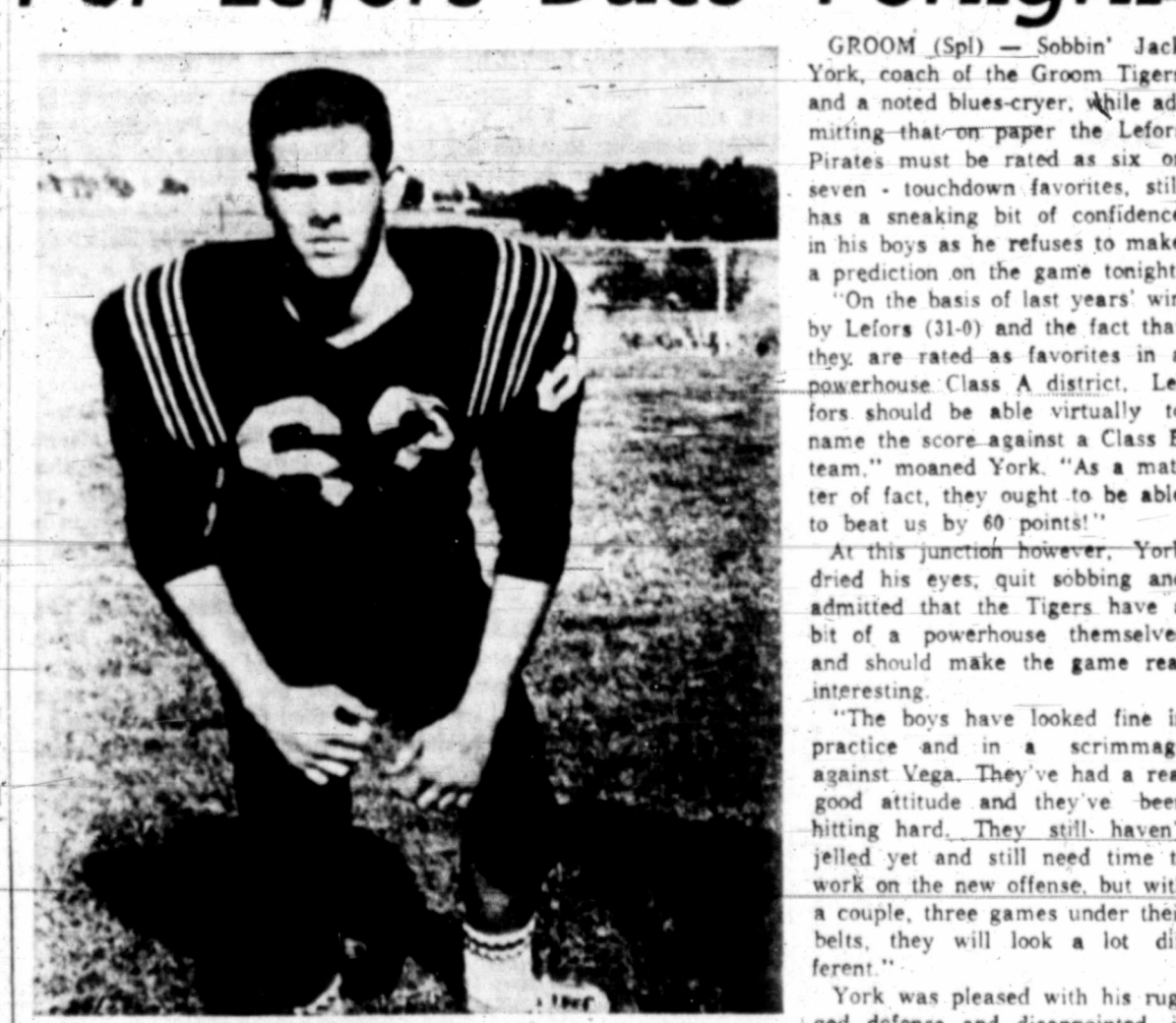

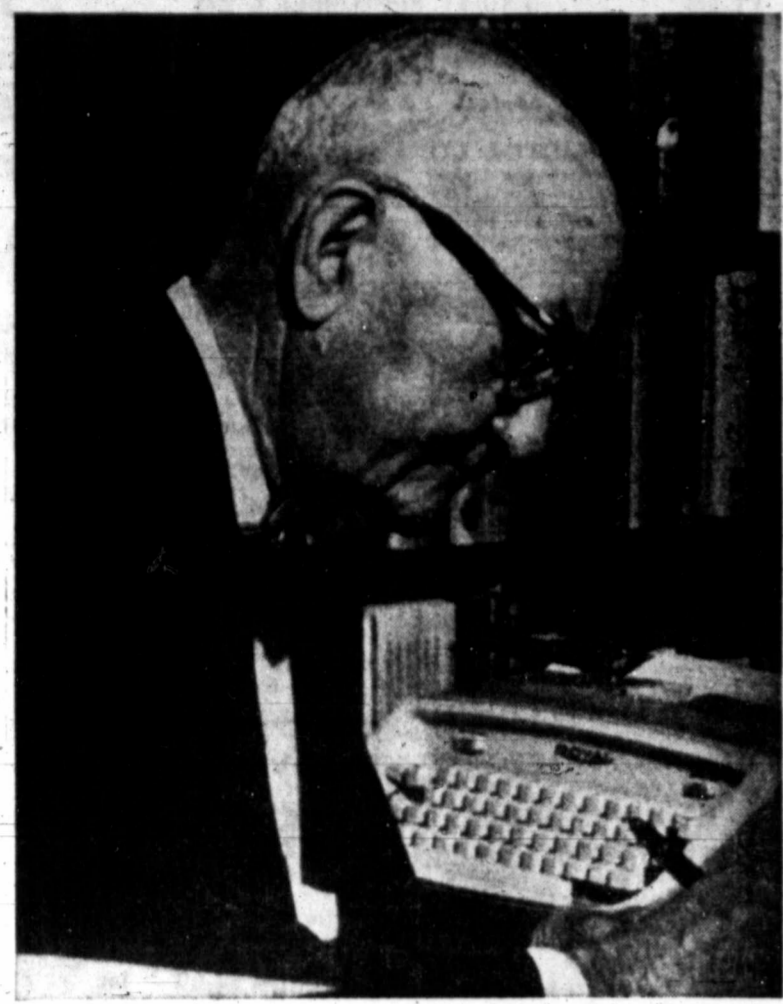

### Monday Afternoon Book Review, Autograph Party Set For Starlightroom

Dr. Lester Fields Sheffy, author of "The Francklyn Land and Cattle Company: A Panhandle Enterprise, 1882-1957," will be honored at a reception and autographing party in the Starlight Room of the Coronado Inn from 4 to 6 p.m. Monday.

The public is invited to attend and hear Travis Lively Sr. review the book, which is the third in the M. K. Brown Range Life series.

Dr. Sheffy of Canyon is a retired history professor and headed the history department of West Texas State College from 1918 to 1957.

M. K. Brown of Pampa edited and financed the book, which was published by the University of Texas Press at Austin.

"In addition to Lively, Dr. Sheffy, Frank H. Wardlaw, of Austin, director of the publishing company, and Brown will attend the reception.

Third in a series of five books, the book is not a story, but a history of The Francklyn Land and Cattle Company, the Panhandle enterprise from 1882-1957 that developed into the White Deer Lands, one of the largest and earliest cattle ranches in West Texas, according to Brown.

The first two books in the series were "6,000 Miles of Fence," the story of the XIT Ranch, by Professor Joe Erantz, and "Twilight on the Range," by William Timmons.

"When the White Deer Corporation dissolved, all records from the New York office were shipped to the White Deer Land Office in Pampa and turned over to the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum in Canyon with the understanding that Dr. Sheffy was to have free access to them to write this history," Brown said.

The book was written in two years. It is dedicated to "the pioneer cattlemen and settlers of the Texas Panhandle, who, by their hard work and patient efforts, added much to the value of the Texas plains. It is dedicated also to the farmers on White Deer Lands who, by their energy and excellent techniques, advanced the remaining unsold farming lands to much greater prices. Finally, it is dedicated to a substantial Polish colony in the vicinity of

"I'm erratic," says Koch. "Some days good, some days bad."

McKinley has been limping along at about half his normal stroke speed since injuring his back in the first round but he says he'll be ready when the time comes.

Unless he's ready for Koch, U.S. chances of winning its home since 1955 will be slim.

### Gary Peters Top Rookie

It'll be Gary Peters by acclamation when it's time to pick the 1953 rookie of the year in the American League.

A 6-foot, 2-inch, 200-pound left-hander who failed in three previous brief major-league trials, the Chicago White Sox ace seems likely to accomplish two feats that haven't been achieved in more than a decade.

Following his 4-1 victory Thursday over the Kansas City Athletics, Peters needs only three wins to become the first rookie left-hander to win 20 games since Alex Kellner in 1949. And if he maintains his current earned run average leadership (his E.R.A. is now 1.84), the 26-year-old left-baller will be the first rookie to take that title since Saul Rogovin in 1951.

Peters' seven strikeouts also boosted his league-leading figure to 175 and placed him in a position to be the first rookie strike-out king in the AL since Herb Score in 1955.

All of which will be of some compensation for the White Sox dreary season now drawing to a close with Al Lopez' crew 13 games behind the runaway New York Yankees.

The Yankees maintained their huge lead Thursday when they beat the Washington Senators, 3-2, in 12 innings.

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
