



A block from the theater they began breaking shop windows and jewelry, watches and other merchandise were stolen. Ostensibly, the juveniles had paid to buy tickets to see a movie. They did not receive a refund when the theater was closed by the police. All of the 1.000 juvenile patrons of the theater were not involved in the fights in the theater. It seems obvious that the police were not able to protect the property of innocent shop owners. The rights of the movie patrons who were not engaged in fighting were not protected by the police.

The same news item mentioned an earlier brawl which involved 11 police officers who battled with 75 party goers for an hour before they were able to restore order. Apparently, the police force in Oakland finds itself unable to cope with riots and subsequent looting. Additionally, the shop owners were unable to protect themselves from looters, operating in broad daylight. They depended upon the government owned and controlled police force. Certainly a municipal police

force can do something about ending rioting and looting by juveniles but don't hold your breath. Everyone of the juveniles should have been taken into custody, even if the police found it necessary to herd them into a public park. The parents of the juveniles involved should have been summoned and appropriate fines should have been assessed. The names of all of the parents should have been made available to the press. The fines should have been assessed on a basis which would make restitution to the shop owners possible - after all they are compelled to pay for protection they obviously did not receive. The cost of the police work should have been included in the fines. Unfortunately, rioting and loot-

ing will continue at an ever quickening pace. The private property concept does not exist in the minds of the majority of the people in this country today. No one who relishes the idea of government stealing for his support has respect for the sanctity of private property.

Later John's parents were released and he was held in the Dresden prison for fourteen months, without accusation or explanation, and late in camp Muchlberg in East Germany and then on to notorious Buchen-

In 1950 Noble was sentenced, without trial or accusation, to fifteen years' imprisonment and was shipped through Poland into the U.S.S.R. For four and a half years he was kept in the infamous arctic slave camp "Vorkuta" working in the coal mines under unspeakable conditions. John Noble dropped to under one hundred pounds in weight and had to endure fifty and more degrees below zero temperatures. He was one of the 100,000 of the 500,000 prisoners at Vorkuta who participated in the first uprising against Communism in the Soviet Union.
