By PHIL NEWSOM UPI Foreign News Analyst A political storm is blowing over West Berlin.

It arises from opposition party suspicions that Mayor Willy Brandt's Social Democratic administration is softening its stand against Communist East Ger-

The dispute could well spread beyond the confines of West Berlin and become a major issue in the 1965 parliamentary elections in which Brandt again will be his party's candidate for

At the storm center is Brandt's crown prince, Deputy Mayor Heinrich Albertz, but politicians agree that the real target is Brandt himself.

The start of it was a speech by Albertz criticizing the "proincial anxiety" shown by the government of Chancellor Konrad Adenauer in delaying signing of the Moscow partial test bar agreement. He also expressed regret that the smallest Ameri can step to find a way ou' of the East-West impasse wa: greeted by "timidity and dis ist" in West Germany. -

Democrats Demand Vote

The local branch of Adenauer' hristian Democratic Party promptly demanded a no-confi dence vote against Albertz who further aroused their ire by a slighting reference to the West German Federal Republic as a "Rhine State."

The issue will be debated next month but has no chance of passage because of the Socialists having a large majority in the city government.

It will, however, put new emphasis on charges which have been levelled before against the Adenauer regime by its political

Chiefly they are that the aged chancellor has been too rigid in his approach to reunification of Germany with his all-or-nothing demands for free elections.

Brandt's press chief stirred wide attention with a speech in which he said the Russians were not simply going to stand aside in East Germany and that the Adenauer policy "is not only hopelessly antiquated and unreal but meaningless in a strategy of

Brandt Clearly Discontented For the most part Brandt has kept to the background and permitted his aides to do the talking. They have not spelled out a new program but they have made it clear they are not contented with the old one.

This in turn has aroused fears among the Christian Democrats and other political opponents that the Socialists are hinting at an increased measure of recognition of the East German regime.

It led the West Berlin independent newspaper Morgenpost to demand that the city government say clearly just what its policy is toward the Communist regime.

The rigidity of the Adenauer regime has been attacked not only by the Socialists but also Free Democrats who participate in his coalition government. The Free Democrats, without spelling out the details, have demanded fresh initiative on the part of the Bonn government which they say has depended too much upon the Western Allies for an all- German settle-

Adenauer is scheduled to retire this fall, although against his

His chief fear has been that his retirement will lead to German weakness against the Communist.





Magnetize a darning needle by stroking the length of it about thirty times with the north end of a bar magnet. By stroking from the eye to the point the latter will become the south pole.

- The magnetic needle must be put into a situation now where it can freely turn until it lines up with the magnetic poles of the earth.
- 3. It may be inserted through a cork and floated in a glass dish partly filled with water. Or the needle may be fastened to: a cardboard suspended by a silk thread in a pint jar.
- 4. Be sure no other magnet or iron object is near. They will prevent the compass from functioning properly.
- 5. The point of the needle will point south-the south-seeking pole. The eye of the needle will be the north-seeking pole.

Adds Molasses At first Mc Kinley and a hired hand would drive along fences and pick up tumbleweeds which had been ledged by the wind along the fences. Then he would grind up the tumbleweed in a hammer mill, add a little molasses, and feed his cattle. The animals thrived.

Since then Mc Kinley has used the tumbleweed- molasses mixture whenever supplemental feeding was required. He experimented with various ways to handle the prickly weed and now uses a trac-

When she was born at a Midland hospital there was a block in one point of her esophagus and another portion was missing.

Surgeons at Children's Medical Center in Dallas opened her storn ach and here 'a tube through which the child could be fed. They created a hole in her esophagus at the neck, which would take care of salivary problems. This saved the child's life.

When Regina is about a year old, surgeons can use a portion of Regina's colon to create a new





The Mexican-American, according to Fuentes, is not segregated. He can go anywhere, and everywhere he finds himself tolerated but not accepted.

Tolerance, but not acceptance, rushes the spirit as mi right segregation, Fuentes feels. Fuentes, 33, is state executive secretary of the Political Association of Spanish-Speaking Organizations (PASO).

PASO is growing rapidly. Fuenles said it is organized in more than 50 Texas counties, part of which have more Mexican-Americans of voting age than Americans of other extraction.

The battle cry of PASO is political and economic equality. But its leaders, already successful men, appear to be driven as well by a burning desire for more than tolerance.

Win One Election Crystal City is Paso's show piece. Last April a slate of five Mexican-Americans took over the city government from a city council that other Americans al ways had dominated.

Crystal City has 9,500 residentes - 85 per cent of whom are Mexican-American, 14-5 per cent of whom are not Mexican and .5 per cent of whom are Ne. gro. The 14.5 per cent white non-Mexicans pay 65 per cent of the taxes.

Those whose heritage is not Mexican (called "Anglos") in Crystal City do not like this new government. They are trying to do something about it.

M. Dale Barker, editor and publisher of the weekly Zavala County Sentinel, summed up the Anglo attitude as follows: "We have no objection to officeholders of Spanish extraction, but we do object to outside interests coming in, directing things and putting puppets in office." By "outside interests," Barker meant PASO and a local of



Acquires Texas Gulf Producing

NEW YORK (UPI)—Sinclair Oil
Corp. will acquire Texas Gulf
Producing Co. for an estimated
\$252 million, chief executives of
both companies announced this
week.

Specific terms were not disclosed but Gordon W. Reed, chairman of Texas Gulf, said stockholders would receive distributions of approximately \$62 per share from the liquidation after directors and stockholders approve terms of the proposed sale.

On the basis of the 4,079,279 shares of Texas Gulf outstanding at June 30, this would work out to \$252,481,298.

Purchase of Texas Gulf would give Sinclair a large reserve of soil and natural gas, estimated at 132 million barrels of crude, 48 million barrels of natural gas liquids, and 635 billion cubic feet of natural gas in the United States. Texas Gulf also has production operations in Libya and Peru.

Sale of the company to Sinclair also offers a solution to one problem that has been facing Texas Gulf, namely its future. Reed told shareholders at the annual meeting in April that liquidation of the company and sale of assets were in their interest. Oil is becoming harder to find and the cost of finding and producing it is constantly increasing, he said.

Citrus Crop Lowest In Ten Years

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Agriculture Department report on the 1962-63 pack of Florida frozen concentrated orange juice shows how a natural disaster can cut down a crop.

The Florida orange crop for 1962-63 apparently was headed for a record, according to crop reports last fall. This would be bothfor fresh fruit consumption and for processing. Then, in December, a sharp freeze struck the citarus groves of the Florida peninsula. Here is how the department described the effects of the freeze:

"The 1962-63 pack of Florida frozen concentrated orange juice, completed about July 1, was approximately 51.6 million gallons, 55.5 per cent below the record 1961-62 pack of 116.1 million gallons and the smallest pack in 10 years. The relatively light 1962 -63 pack resulted from freeze damage to the orange crop, reducing not only the number of boxes produced but also the yield of juice per box."

The department said the large, reduction in the 1962-63 pack was partly offset by a substantial increase in carryover stocks held by packers last fall.







Not so with the moaners and groaners of the socialist confidence game.

My socialist correspondent tells fusal to be a sucker even one more time and when he does that he's acting like any other cheap con man who accuses me of being a quitter or a bum sport when I refuse to toss his loaded dice.

He tells me I must vote for candidates who are opposed to socialism if I don't like socialism, knowing there are no candidates honestly opposed to socialism in all its varying shades and hues, He knows that men and women possessed of no urge for power will not run for public office and he insists that I must vote and give my consent to some power, hungry man or woman, regard-The very fact that socialists in-

sist that I go to the polls and vote proves that I'd better stay away if I know what's good for me. The very fact that elections are held in all countries ruled by members of the socialist conglomerate, proves that socialism and fascism and communism must obtain the tacit sanction of the people. I made these suggestions to my socialist correspondent and he blew his last fuse, I hope on a regular, day by day basis, I hope to encourage men and women who will be free to go into the market place and provide private enterprise schools to compete



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


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
