### St. Mark Church Starts Work On \$27,000 Building

A new \$27,000 church is under construction for the 100-member congregation of St. Mark's C. M. E. Church at 406 Elm St. Work has been under way for two weeks, according to James Morgan, chairman of the church building committee. Other committee members are Alex Holt, Leslie Morgan and Jerome Henry. Morgan said the church financing is expected to be completed by the time the building is finished in November. "We still need about \$1,000 to complete the financing of the building," Morgan said, "and we will need about \$3,500 additional for pews and furniture." The building will be a one-story structure of brick and tile construction with a church office, choir room, classrooms and sanctuary. The old church building used by the St. Mark's congregation will serve as an annex to be joined to the new building and will be used as an educational center with Sunday School classrooms.

committee and the police was the memory of Thursday's disturbance. Wear Beatnik Clothes The hecklers, many of them in beatnik clothes, were strongly opposed to the committee's investigation. The violence was sparked by the testimony of Levi Laub, 24, of New York City. Willis adjourned the hearing after Laub said the Cuban trip was aimed "at the same kind of racists who are sitting up here in front of me now." The committee identified Laub as a former Columbia University student who organized the visit of 59 U.S. students to Cuba this summer in defiance of a State Department ban. Laub said he was "damn proud" of his membership in the Progressive Labor Movement, which the committee called a Communist splinter group. The leadoff witness, Barry Hoffman, 26, of Brookline, Mass., was a voluntary "undercover agent" in the Cuban tour, who gave the committee the names of many of the students and the roles they played. He also said that some of the students cheered when shown films of a U.S. plane being shot down in South Viet Nam. Laub later called Hoffman a "rat" and the trouble began.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Kenneth Ward of Hayden, Stone & Co. feels failure of the Dow-Jones rail average to participate in the more actively current upswing probably will act as a corrective or at least retarding factor. Meanwhile, Ward says, the main point to keep in mind is that present indications point to higher levels before the year end and there still is room for price appreciation in stocks which have not participated in the advance very aggressively.

Martin Gilbert of Van Alstyne, Noel & Co. believes there will be intermediate setbacks and fluctuations but the main trend is still upward. Gilbert says, that in view of the strong background, it seems probable that a major reversal is in the offering over the immediate period ahead.

Moody's Stock Survey feels it is wise for investors to maintain some buying power for selective opportunities which may arise in coming months.

Richard T. Leahy of J. W. Sparks & Co. anticipates a modest corrective phase over the near term which could carry the Dow-Jones industrial average back to the 715-720 level.

## Family Takes Orphans To Save From Death

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The McBrides are visiting in Pampa in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Jacques of 1040 Varner Drive. They are the parents of two children, Judy, 17 and John 19. The McBrides will return to their home in New Mexico later today.)

It was cold and blustery that day in January when a Navajo mother knocked at the temporary home of Nelson and Margaret McBride, 36 miles east of Gallup, N.M., near Thoreau, at the site of the Crosslands Mission.

She had come to tell the missionaries that her baby, Bertha, just a few weeks old would surely die if she was taken back to the cold, cramped Hogan that was her home. The tiny Indian girl had been hospitalized five times in her short life. Once with pneumonia, then double-pneumonia, and again and again with various serious bouts with infection. The missionaries said of course the mite would be taken into their home, to be nursed to health and happiness. When the long trip to the distant Hogan was made, they were met with a new challenge. Seven month old Fannie, a cousin of little Bertha's, had a mother who "just didn't care". Fannie and Bertha were with Nelson and Margaret when they arrived back home that day.

Just ten days later, six weeks old Timothy, a tiny boy that was "all arms, legs, feet and mouth," the Nelsons recall, was brought to their door clad only in a diaper by his 18 year old mother in the biting cold. The girl, in tears, told the family she had no way to care for the tyke, who was so ill he couldn't cry, and wanted to give him up to a home of warmth, love, and the teachings of Jesus. Timothy was listless and weak and it was days before the family really could tell he was responding to the large doses of love and prayer, along with medication and good food. By the time Timmie was beginning to get better and the family had settled into a routine of caring for two school-age children of their own, and three tiny Navajos, the Indian Hospital notified them that it had a little three week old girl, Elsie, whose mother had died, and because of circumstances, her father couldn't take her. The hospital was crowded — would they come get her? It was snowing that March day, Nelson went the 75 miles to get Elsie. On the way home over the rutted, slick roads, they ended up in a ditch. A tiny baby in a cold car and miles from home, Nelson says, "I wasn't just real worried. We were used to babies by then! Anything can happen." A car came along and took the cold pair home. Elsie, now four says, "I came in yellow." True enough, she was all fixed up in a pretty yellow blanket and bonnet, for the nurses at the hospital loved little Elsie; but, there were so many...

Next, Mark, one month old, hospitalized with malnutrition, in tragic condition and unwanted, came to live in the ever growing "family" that they are. All the

Indians were thriving, and then the heartbreak of little Clara. Clara came to the Nelsons when she was 3 months old. The little, drawn child, her eyes filled with suffering, weighed 6½ pounds. She had weighed seven pounds at birth. The doctors at the hospital where she had been for five days told the McBrides that in all of the thousands of medical records kept at the reservation, little Clara was the most pitiful and seriously ill. She was filthy and crusted with sores and thrown in neglect. Her tiny face was drawn and she just couldn't even cry. Margaret says, "I prayed every drop of milk down her for days". Clara took six long weeks to begin to gain back her weight and will. A few months later, propped on a snow white pillow, warm, fed and safe, she flashed a big toothless grin at the camera of her new daddy. Clara is a live-wire, alert and winsome at four. She loves and loves to be loved, as they all do, due perhaps, to the great abundance of love with which they are surrounded. Finally, in April of 1960, Fannie's mother, once again, proved to be unable to take care of a child, and Sue, now three, came to the McBride home to live. Seven little Indians, five under one year old, all with histories of desperate illnesses and only a fireplace for heat. The McBrides say, "God has been good. We never knew where the strength and help would come—but it always did and will".

Today, with five of the children four years old, one five, and little Sue three, they can recite passages of scripture, sing songs they have learned in the home and the Indian Church, and win the coldest heart with one tiny, shy smile, sparkling eyes and tucked chin. Margaret and Nelson have since been joined by another family at the mission. They also have custody of seven Navajo children. A well has been drilled for the Mission's use and for the Indians that come from a fifteen mile radius to get the "sweet water" that was found at 784 feet after much prayer and effort.

Margaret and Nelson McBride get no assistance other than that which people donate to their work. They are sponsored by no organization or faith. They teach the love of God, hygiene, and care for the sick. The Indians come to the Mission to register births; or, sometimes they don't. Other times, they come into the Mission to ask aid in burying their dead. Fearing their deeply instilled teachings of the Navajo medicine men, they are plagued with their "demons," malnutrition, neglect, cold and illness. At the Mission,

they find teachings of salvation, love and learn that "someone" cares. They are proud in their poverty. The used clothes offered at the Missions free of charge met with a cold response from the Navajo. When a five-cent charge was placed on each garment, they came in droves to "shop." The nickels are put into a fund to pay for gas and oil for Mission vehicles that make many trips in the cold, hungry winters of the Indians, to the hospital 36 miles away.

Their work is advancing. They need help in the form of pencils, paper, clothes, shoes, bedding, food — all the necessities of life in a land of cold winters, and hot summers. Nelson and Margaret ask, not for these things; but, prayer for their work. Through prayer, they feel these things will come.

Various individuals and organizations periodically send gifts of clothing and food to the Mission. The situation is almost desperate, the family relates, for the Navajo. Tradition and religiously bound to the "old way," they have been thrown into a world of strange cultures on one side, and the centuries old way of their people on the other. The proud Indian nation is plagued by drunkenness, sin, poverty and disease; elements that are at work to deprive many little Navajos of the opportunity of even life itself.

lands Mission were opened, it was quickly filled to capacity with little ones, most of whom were holding only a tiny thread of life. The sparkle that shows in their big beautiful black eyes shows that "visiting the fatherless" (James 1:27) is not only a reward of God but is rewarded of the child also, according to the family.

Meanwhile, Bertha, Fannie, Timothy, Elsie, Mark, Clara and Sue are growing up in a normal home atmosphere. They have colors to identify their towels, wash rags, cups and tooth-brushes. Instead of a pretty pink dress, the children say, "That dress is 'Sue's' color." They love and are loved in return. By reciting one Bible verse at each meal for a week, the three-to-five-year olds progress to passages in rapid order. They can, from the smallest, repeat the Twenty-third Psalm without hesitation. On occasion, Mark and Timothy have conducted singing and performed solos, uninhibited and lovable, before large congregations of people. Then, like any other little mischievous tots, they refuse to sing recite or talk — but that smile never leaves the little faces that were once marked by hunger, fear and utter pain.

The family invites anyone who happens to be traveling Highway 66 to stop by Crosslands Mission, five miles north of Thoreau, N.M. and visit with the children and attend the Mission Church services.

**Petitions Calling For New Vote Prepared**

CANADIAN (Spl) — Petitions calling for another vote on a proposed bond issue for remodeling of the 55-year-old Hemphill County Courthouse are in the process of preparation and will be circulated among voters probably this week-end, according to County Judge Sanford Cole.

The petitions will be aimed at calling another special election, this time to coincide with the special state-wide general election on Constitutional Amendments which is already scheduled for November so that there will be no extra election expense to the county. The narrow margin of opposition to the bond issue in last Saturday's election, coupled with the extremely light voter turn-out at that time, prompted proponents of the Courthouse remodeling project to try again without delay.

Saturday's special election was ordered by the Commissioners Court on a split vote... with two Commissioners, Paul Ramsey of Precinct 3 and Edward Detrixhe of Precinct 2 refusing to concur in the election order after County Judge Sanford Cole had cast the tie-breaking vote in favor of submitting the issue to the people.

If petitions signed by a sufficient number of qualified voters are submitted to the court, asking that a special bond election be called, the "split decision" would be averted since the Commissioners Court is required by law to submit an issue to election in response to a petition.
