
Seems like a long time ago, doesn't it? That was also the last time Texans could deduct their state and local sales taxes on federal income tax forms.



only one type of state treatment. There is no logical reason to discriminate against states that have the wisdom to avoid a state income tax. As your Senator, I have fought against this disparity for years and sponsored legislation to correct it since I came to the U.S. Senate.

The Coyotes scored next-PAT was blocked by Rodriguez and the score was 28-28.





Adult Immunizations

for the first day of school? The new clothes. The new supplies. The SHOTS! Maybe immunizations weren't the highlight of your back-toschool experience but they were necessary. Try to remember the last time you were immunized - it has probably been a while. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services along with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) have some tips for adult immunizations.

Pneumonia and influenza together represent the fifth nearly one out of every 10 leading cause of death in people who get diphtheria older adults. These two conditions may be prevented by receiving an influenza vaccination and pneu-

Remember getting ready mococcal vaccination. The pneumococcal vaccination requires a one time injection. The influenza vaccine requires an injection once per year due to the changing nature of the influenza virus. Medicare Part "B" provides for you to receive these two vaccinations: once for pneumococcal and annually for influenza.

> Fifty or fewer cases of tetanus occur each year, but result in five deaths annually in the U.S. Most of these deaths occur in adults over the age of 60. In addition, will die from it. For these reasons, the CDC recommends that adults receive a Tetanus/Diphtheria booster

once every 10 years.

Another common vaccination is for measles, mumps and rubella (MMR). MMR is normally administered once and offers protection for life. Unimmunized persons of any age can get measles, mumps or rubella, but those born after 1956 that do not have proof of immunity are particularly at risk and should be immunized.

There are certain immunizations that may benefit you if your lifestyle or job put you at risk. Vaccinations for Hepatitis "A" and "B," Varicella (Chicken Pox) and Meningitis may benefit certain individuals. High risk individuals for these conditions include health workers, immunosuppressed persons and those who live with or have close contact with infected persons. Frequent travelers may need specific immunizations. These persons should check the CDC website for vaccination and medication recommendations for various travel destinations. That information may be accessed at http://www.cdc.gov/travel.

It is estimated that each year in the U.S. about 50,000 adults die from vaccinepreventable diseases or their complications. Talk with your health provider about updating your immunization record.

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



The Goat Lady of McCullouch County

Suzanne Gasporotto raises goats near Brady. She has developed a strong voice for calling goats.I was standing next to her on the front porch of her home when she yelled to some goats at lease 300 yards away. The piercing sound shot across the meadow like a lightning bolt. The goats heard her and stated walking toward the house.

Suzanne got her first goat in 1990 at an antique auction.

"They had a novelty item for sale. It was a box with a live goat in it. I bought the little white goat which was about two months old. I didn't know if it was a boy or girl and really wasn't sure how to tell the difference. Turned out it was a little female. Because I don't like the terms Billys and Nannies, I named her Billie."

She got another goat and named him Bob. They had a

kid, Bonnie Bell. Now Suzanne has lots of goats.

"I have about 600 adults and about a hundred eleven kids on the ground." She raises meat goats.

"The demand far exceeds the supply. If every goat in this country, meat, milk or hair of every breed were slaughtered, it could not meet the demand."

Five years ago, some store in San Antonio put out a call for goats.

"The HEB stores in San Antonio alone were looking for 700 goats a week and they couldn't find anyone to provide them." She says goat meat is

healthy.

"It has less cholesterol and lower calories. It rates better in every category than even chicken or turkey."

Suzanne has a goat camp in

October which attracts people from all over the country. The week ends with a goat barbecue.

"It's about educating people. I'm interested in seeing an American meat goat industry develop. We import hundreds of thousands of tons a year of frozen goat meat from New Zealand and Australia. We can't begin to supply what we need. We're not yet on the ground floor of the industry. We're in the basement."

Suzanne did real estate leaseing in Houston for 27 years. Now she loves the country. You couldn't get her back to the city.

"I lived in a; town house. Never had a pet in my life until 1988."

She says there's nothing cuter than a baby goat.



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
