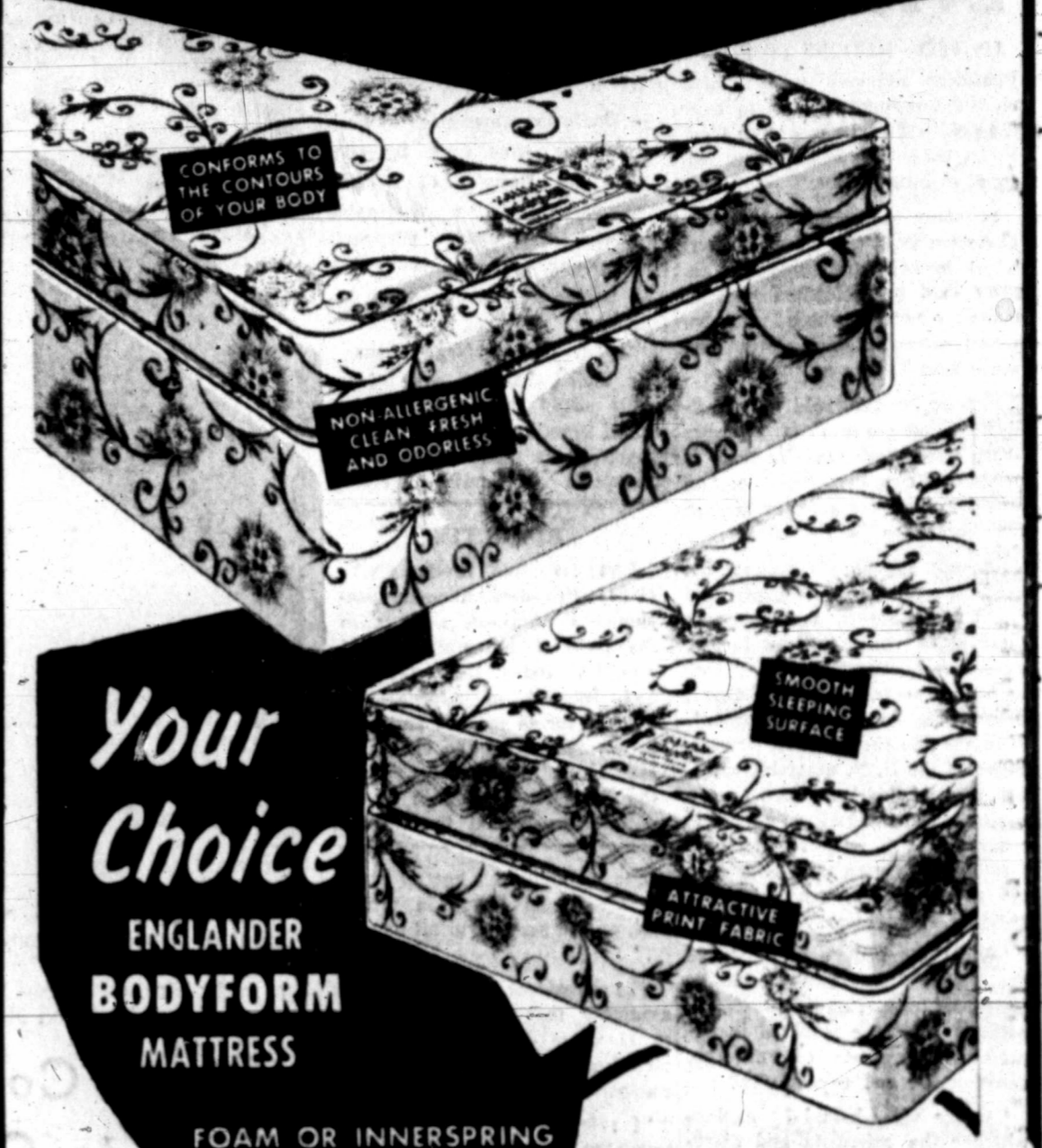

### Trumpeter Swans Fight for Survival

**MARTIN, S.D. (UPI)** — The trumpeter swan — once threatened with extinction by old-fashioned feather-bedders — is fighting for survival in the lonely rushes of a South Dakota wildlife refuge.  
 The trumpeters' battle took a turn for the better this spring when five cygnets (baby swans) were born to two couples in the Lacreek National Wildlife Refuge near Martin.  
 They were the first trumpeters to be bred east of the Rocky Mountains in 80 years.  
 Naturalists' elation turned to bitter disappointment when three of the baby swans died.  
 But James Monnie, refuge manager at Lacreek, said "actually the hatch was very encouraging because now we do know they will nest here."  
 "Of course, it was quite a disappointment when three of the five young didn't survive, but it is not too alarming," he said. "This happens often in all forms of wildlife."  
 The actual causes of death of the cygnets is not known because refuge officials cannot find the bodies. They are theorizing that either a hailstorm or a predator killed them. A third possibility, which Monnie gives less credence, is disease.  
 Once the trumpeter—largest of the water-fowl — was abundant in North America. They ranged as far north as the Arctic and as far south as Missouri. They appeared as far east as Wisconsin and Indiana and fur traders carried on a traffic in swan skins which had been plucked for feather bedding.  
 The majestic bird, which has a wing span of seven to eight feet, was threatened with extinction in the late 19th century. He made a final stand in the high mountain country of Yellowstone National Park in the mid-30's.  
 The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service established the Red Rock Lakes Refuge in Montana in 1935 to protect the dwindling flock. All the 13 captive birds and seven wild birds who have set up house-

keeping on muskrat houses in the refuge at Lacreek from Red Rock. Thirteen more of the swans have left the refuge and have been reported in the Kadoka-Wall area about 60 miles away. The birds are kept captive for a year before they are released to the wild.  
 With the success at Red Rock, attempts were made to breed these swans in other parts of the continent. The first to be bred in captivity are now nesting at the Delta Waterfowl Research Station in Manitoba, Canada. The two surviving cygnets at Lacreek are the only living trumpeters born east of the Rockies.  
 Monnie said: "We are very optimistic now that the swans are wintering here and ranging out into the surrounding countryside. We like to see the birds ranging away from the refuge, even though they have been returning here for the winter."  
 The success at Lacreek brings the trumpeter back again to the permanent water area of the prairies, hereditary breeding grounds of these great white birds.  
 There are only an estimated 800 of the birds in the continental United States, with about 1,500 more in Canada and Alaska. The bird averages about four feet tall and weighs from 20 to 30 pounds.  
 Monnie is cautiously optimistic about the future. "We hope to build up a large, strong flock in this area where the bird is native, but there are so many unknowns," he said. "For instance, we don't know how success in future hatchings will be."

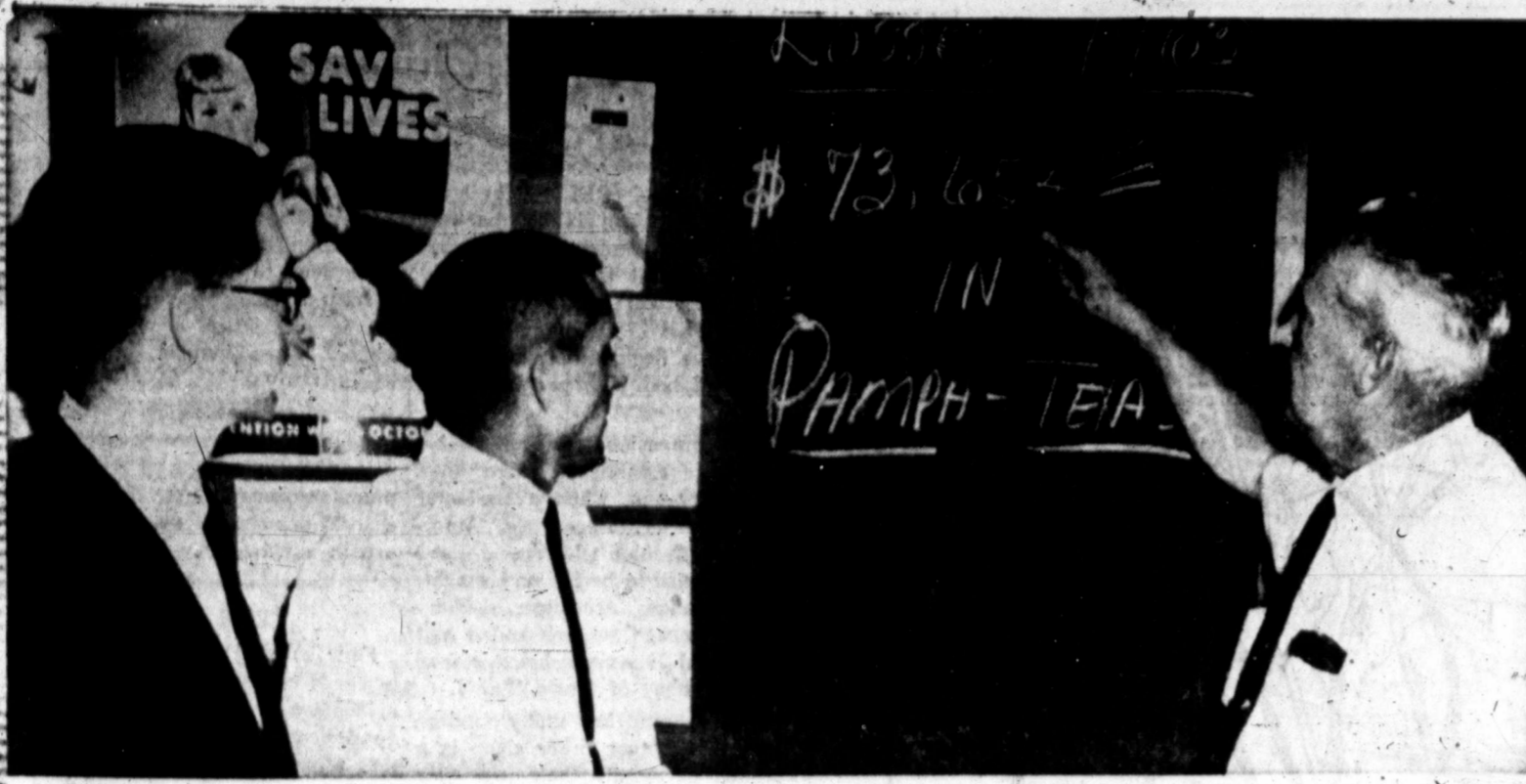

## Turkish Baths Picking Up Steam With Health Angle

 NEW YORK (UPI) — More and more hurried executives are enjoying being beaten with suction cups, swatted with oak leaves, sprayed with ice-cold water and roasted in 130-degree heat.

They pay money for it.

Purveyor of these physical "joys" is the traditional Turkish bath — on the decline in recent years but showing signs lately of picking up steam with some airport jet-age innovations.

Many tenured business men are learning they can shed their quiet jangling nerves and get clean as a whistle to boot by enjoying the penetrating ministrations of dry heat, wet heat, pine-scented steam or just plain steam — all mixed with ice-cold showers and dips in a frigid pool.

This "therapy" costs less than \$4 a most baths. For a little more, the tired executive can go whole hog and take the oak leaves and suction cup treatment or a plain massage.

Years ago, when inside plumbing was rare, thousands fled to the Turkish baths — more to keep clean than for any therapeutic benefits.

But now the Turkish baths are stressing the health angle — "have your tensions and worries 'relaxed' away" — and the customers are knocking at the door once more.

"We now get up to 300 patrons a day," said Fred Epstein, treasurer of New York's Luxor Baths, which bills itself as the biggest in the country.

"They're mostly businessmen who get tied up in knots with their executive problems and want to unwind. They come in as tense as violin strings. But the baths and treatments make new men of them; they leave as relaxed as facial tissue, their nerves quieted and worries washed away."

The first step is to scumple the dry heat room, where the temperature is kept at a minimum 130 degrees. You have to cover the seat with a sheet or towel lest you singe some anatomy. An attendant feeds you ice water and puts ice packs on your head.

Then a dip in the frigid pool. If you can stand that, you're ready for the next step — a visit to the sauna or Finnish room, which actually is the old Russian bath treatment cloaked with a more exciting "alias" to attract more people.

The sauna is wet heat, a lot of it, generated by lukewarm water poured over heated slabs and stones. You can make it as hot as you like by climbing a grandstand-type bleacher—the top rung being the hottest.

The oak leaf treatment awaits the courageous few who reach the summit.

At that elevated stage, where the temperature is reported to be at least 150 degrees, it is said that the only touch-bearable to the skin is that of soap-coated oak leaves. The special soap prevents burning. Attendants "flog" you with the leaves — and the sensation is invigorating.

The next step — another frigid shower and dip in the pool. Then the pine-scented steam room, which makes you feel like you are lost in a forest of Christmas trees.

Finally, the pounding of an iron-muscle masseur, who knows how to "revitalize" tired nerves.

For the more adventurous there is the "bankas" treatment, glass suction cups pounded on the skin to stimulate circulation.

The full treatment makes the tired executive feel like a new man and strengthens him for the biggest ordeal ahead—going home to face all those domestic problems.

Homecoming Date Set at Mobeetie

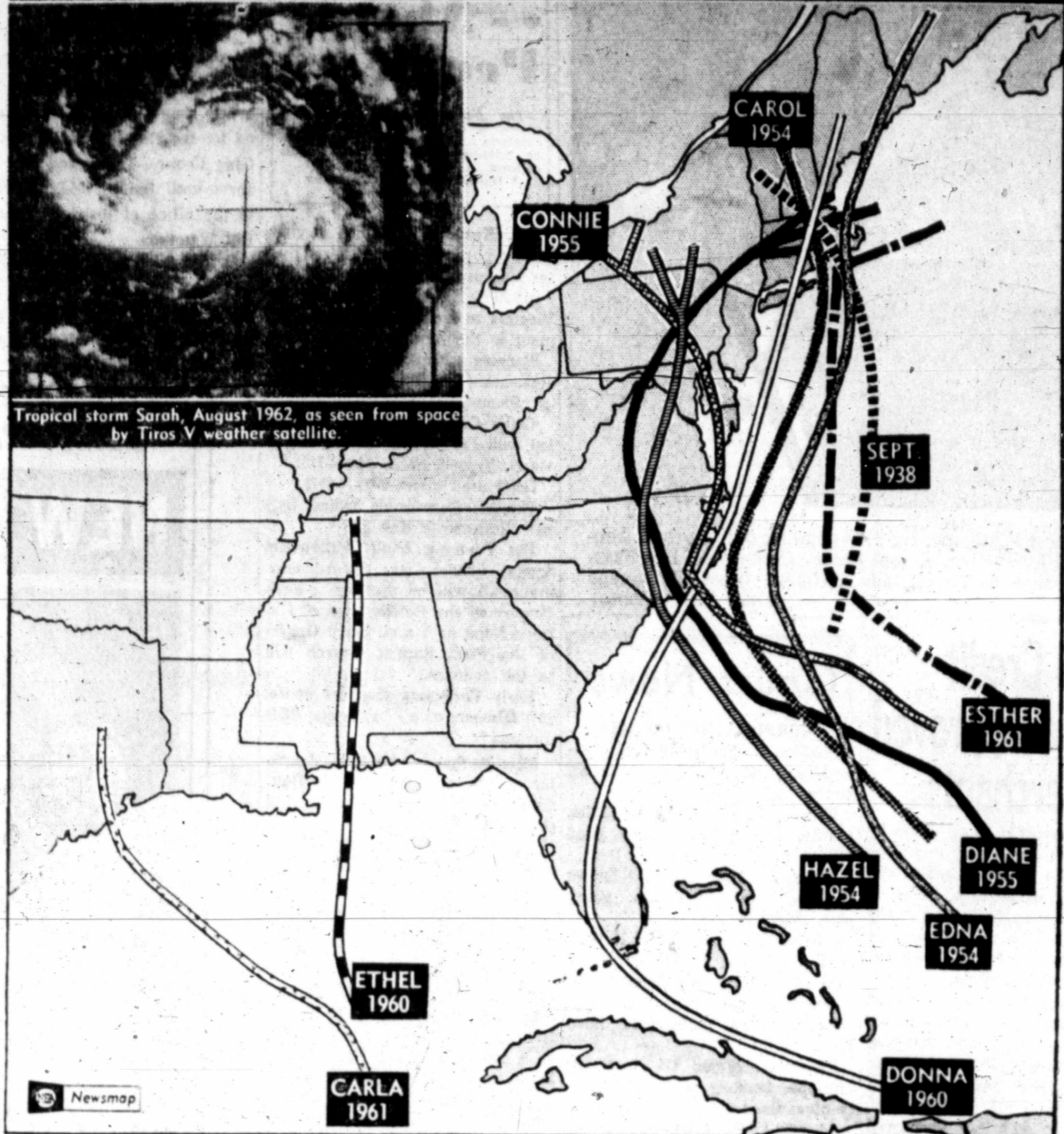

## THE KILLER HURRICANES, SOWERS OF DESTRUCTION



Paths of the major hurricanes of the past decade—and one from 25 years ago—are tracked on Newsmap above. Despite growing knowledge about hurricanes, they remain among the most terrifying and costly of all of nature's violent outbursts.

## Americans Outgrowing Standard Double Bed

NEW YORK (UPI) — The standard double bed is on the way out because Americans are growing bigger all the time. But together with the mattress manufacturers, who have decided to replace the standard bed with people-sized beds.

The dimensions of the double bed were established more than 100 years ago, when a six-footer was a rarity. Since then, Americans, both male and female, have shot upward in height and weight. For instance, American soldiers today average an inch and a half taller and 78 pounds heavier than the doughboy of World War I.

This means that many modern Americans must either sleep in a crouch or dangle their feet over the foot board.

Two major obstacles prevented bedding manufacturers from increasing the size of beds when public demand for bigger beds first became apparent. First, available accessories such as sheets, blankets and bedspreads were too small for bigger beds, and second, the average housewife dreaded the thought of wrestling with a bigger, heavier mattress.

Linens and blankets for larger beds are now stocked in most department stores. The second problem has been solved by use of latex-foam rubber mattresses that don't need turning, and a wide variety of special devices, such as hinged mattresses or twin mattresses placed under one headboard.

Customer acceptance of super-sized bedding is growing steadily. The nation's largest mattress manufacturer reports that more than 25 per cent of sales this year are in extra sizes.

Card Suits  
 Four suits of the familiar pack of cards represent the four orders of society in the Middle Ages. Spades, an adaptation of the scepter, represented the nobility; hearts, modification of a chalice, depicted the clergy; diamonds, the merchant class; and clubs, an adaptation of an acorn or a staff, represented the peasantry.

## Consecs and Simults Are Top Translators

 ROME (UPI) — Most people would no doubt prefer to become a "consec," for a consec is tops in his profession, but it's much more difficult than becoming a "simult."

Of course, the aspiration of all is to be a consec and simult at the same time, but let's face it—it takes real talent and application.

A good consec these days can make an average of \$50 a day, plus all expenses paid, and if he or she has really got the qualifications, then work is assured for no less than 200 days per year.

"Consecs" and "simults" are the products of the get-together mood of most of western European countries. As Europe laboriously draws closer together, the need for more and better consecs and simults is growing apace. More international congresses, meetings and parleys mean more language barriers to be broken down.

Consecs and simults are the new professions. A simult is one of those "vacant" faces, all lined up with earphones, that are seen behind glass from any international assembly floor, steadily pouring into mouthpieces the running, simultaneous translation in several languages of what a delegate is saying.

A consec is the translator who gets up after someone has made a 20-minute speech, or a long-winded statement, and repeats, consecutively, the whole thing in another language. Their primary merit is that most of the time they make the meaning of a speech much clearer and grammatically better than when originally spoken.

With European integration in mind, many Italian cities have set up interpreters' schools. These are the factories that produce the consecs and the simults. It has become fashionable to join these schools. Girls who in the past used to take art courses or other refinements are now flocking to them by the thousands.

Only a few really make the final grade after what is generally a gruelling three years of study of at least three languages. An additional five or six years "in the field" may finally produce a good consec or simult in more than one version, such as for example English into French or German into Italian.

Oldest capital city in North America is Mexico City, traditionally dating from 1325.

 What's more, the average woman knows more about cars and is smarter about having repairs done than men, said Hal Cohen, manager of the Los Angeles center of the chain, Nationwide Saffi-brake.  
 "When a woman sees something is serious or wrong, she wants it repaired right now," Cohen said. "But a man is more apt to put it off. Men figure they know it all."  
 Cohen said the number of women who take the family car in for repair and maintenance has multiplied so rapidly that the chain is paying special attention to pleasing the fairer sex.  
 The chain's vice president, Harry W. Rice, estimated that in 1955 women accounted for less than 10 per cent of a garage's customers. Today, he said, 40 to 50 per cent of Nationwide's total are women

and the number is increasing.  
 Cohen said he has discovered that woman price repairs for the best buys and a man rarely does.  
 Women are often more safety conscious than men, he said. His chain offers a free safety check, and he said that the number of women bringing cars in for the check jumped markedly after a well publicized accident in which faulty equipment was blamed.

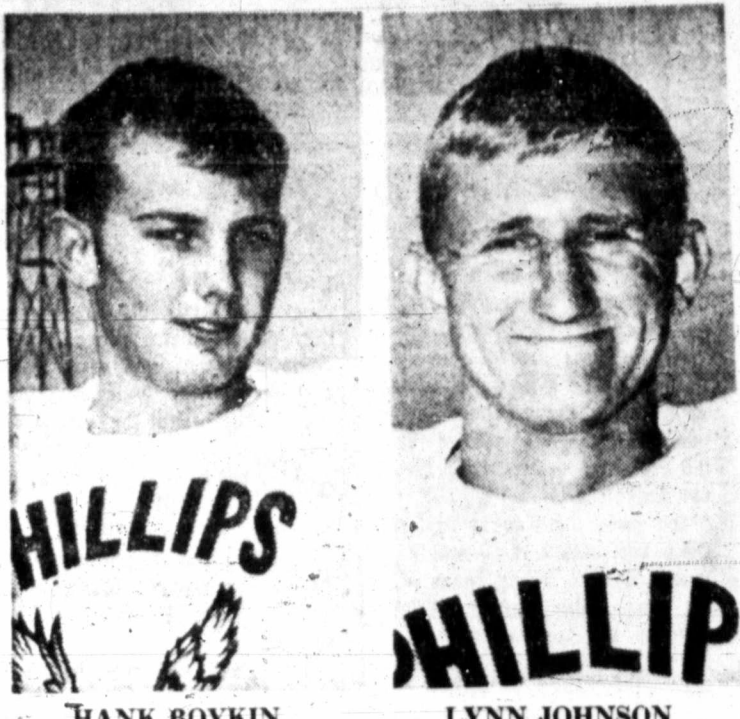
