Roll Call Vote Well Above The Majority Needed

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Senate today ratified the U.S.-British-Russian treaty to ban all but underground nu-

Approval of the historic pact, signed last month by the three powers in Moscow, came on a roll call by a margin well above the required two-thirds majority.

The vote was 80-19, or 14 more than required. President Kennedy hailed it as a single but "substantial" step toward world peace.

President Kennedy, whose plea for approval of the treaty had. support from both Republican and Democratic leaders. Significantly, the treaty outlawing tests in the atmosphere, outer space and under water carried no. porters warned against any quick U.S. reservations or "understandment field. ings" which might jeopardize its ratification by other countries. All

such proposals were rejected. The only addition made by the Senate was a procedural one, adding a preamble to the ratification resolution restating the Senate's constitutional right to ap-

And it brought out of hiding millions of dollars which thrifty Frenchmen had been hiding under

It was the beginning of a new era for France which had known years of trade deficits and a rate of in lation higher than that of any Western power.

Within a year, France, the former sick man of Europe, was on its way to becoming the most healthy, with money in the bank. By May of this year France's currency and gold reserves amounted to more than \$4 billion.

Increases of more than seven per cent went to workers in the state-owned railroad and gas and electricity industries.

A clue to government thinking may come from Premier Georges Pompidou, by trade a banker. The difference between a Frenchman and an American, he said, is that the American pretends to be rich and the Frenchman pretends to be poor.

In plainer words he could have said that only about half the Frenchmen who should pay taxes,

actually do pay them. Tax evasion is a game enjoyed by all Frenchmen. But recent government action suggests the rules are about to be changed.

Quake Hits Sparsely

Populated Area

PASADENA, Calif (UPI)- A sharp earthquake, strong enough to have caused damage had it been centered in a populatedarea, shook a wide area of Southern California yesterday.

Seisomologist Dr. Charles F. Richter of Caltech said he recorded the quake starting at 5:41 a.m. CST. He saidi t had a magnitude of 4.5 on the Richter scale and was centered 70 miles southeast of here. Richter said this magnitude could cause damage.

The center would have been located in the rugged mountains near the joining of Riverside and San Diego counties.

At downtown Los Angeles, the quake was felt as a sharp jolt, especially by persons in tall

No damage was reported from the tremblor.





Since training season sometimes starts in hot weather, precautions must be taken against heat stroke. Practice should not be undertaken

in the hottest hours of the day. In any kind of weather, the training sessions should not bring your son to the point of exhaustion. A physician should be available at all practice sessions as well as all games.

Proper equipment is important. This includes a personally fitted helmet, mouth guard, shoulder pads, arm guards, hand protector, knee and shin guards and ankle

No field house is properly equipped that does not provide your son a comfortable place to rest at half time, and no field is safe unless the goal posts are well pad-

The ground should be smooth and free from loose stones or glass. If the field is dusty, it should be sprinkled before the game to minimize the amount of dust your boy must inhale.

No boy should be allowed to play football if he has not had tetanus toxoid, because any injury that breaks the skin on a football field is likely to be contaminated with tetanus spores.

Not only must you and the coach place your son's welfare above all other considerations - the referees must do this, too.

Question Box

Question: "When a new President takes office, how many men are personally appointed by him in any or all state, federal or international governmental positions? How many of these have to be reviewed, ratified, or voted on by anyone at all?

"In view of the 'Impeach Warren' and 'investigate the State Department' talk that has been going around, we have been rather curious about all the heads of the multitude of departments, foreign offices, ambassadorships, etc. We realize many are appointed for political or financial favors and must retain their jobs from previous administrations because they are doing an efficient piece of work, but could be replaced if the President chooses for any reason to do so?"

Answer: The exact number of office holders appointed by the President would be difficult to state. The President appoints his cabinet members, and a wide 22 Femole Help World 22 number of other positions in the executive branch, with many of them subject to approval of the Senate. Some agencies are created by legislation, others by executive order and others by custom, as the cabinet.

Supreme Court and other federal judges are appointed for life by the President, subject to Senate approval. Some others are appointed to positions which are subject to civil service protections. As we understand the criticisms of the State Department, many of the sub-officials of the department, who are in policy - making posts, are blanketed in under civil service and cannot be discharged even with a change in administration. The United States Government Organizational Manual requires nearly nine pages of small type to list officialdom of the Department of State, nearly all of them appointive, and not including ambassadorships, also appointive.




