GOP Presents Case In Only Five Minutes

HOUSTON (UPI) — Texas Republicans took only five minutes yesterday to present their federal court case demand congressional redistricting to give big city voters fair representation in Washington.

The GOP asked a three-judge federal court to grant a third congressional district in Harris County (Houston), a second district in Dallas County and equalize the population in other districts.

Complete congressional redistricting also would abolish the congressman-at-large seat now held by Rep. Joe Pool, a Dallas Democrat.

The GOP criticized the 58th Texas Legislature for its failure to reapportion the states' 23 congressional districts.

Houston attorney Sidney Buchanan rested the Republican case after presenting five minutes of testimony and exhibits.

Chairman Murray Called Rep. Menton Murray, chairman of the Texas House Committee on Congressional and Legislative Districts, was called as the witness for the defendants.

The reapportionment suit was brought against state officials. Previously, the GOP demanded that Gov. John Connally call a special session of the legislature to redistrict.

Houston Democrats also have filed a congressional redistricting suit, which has not been set for hearing.

Five congressional redistricting bills were introduced during the past legislative session. After committee consideration, a token bill was sent to the floor. This passed the house but was later killed in the senate after lawmakers weakened it with changes.

The population in Texas' congressional districts varies greatly. Dallas County, with almost

one million residents, has one representative and is the largest district in the nation. The district formerly represented by the late Sam Rayburn has around 250,000 population and is now one of the smallest in the land. Rep. Ray Roberts of McKinney currently represents the district. The Republican party handed the court exhibits detailing the redistricting bills offered in the past session, U.S. census reports and population distribution maps of the state. Murray described the detailed legislative process needed to produce a redistricting bill that would please every area of the state. The Republican suit was filed by Harris County GOP chairman George H. W. Bush, who has announced as a GOP candidate for nomination for the U.S. Senate next year. It said that the legislature twice failed to redistrict and urged the court to accomplish reapportionment.

Washington Window

President Kennedy's promise to balance the federal budget with revenue generated by tax reduction would arouse more enthusiasm among the taxpayers if similar solemn promises had not so often been made and broken in the past 30 years.

Franklin D. Roosevelt's promise to balance the federal budget was an annual affair until it became an embarrassment to him and to his party. He was elected in 1932 on a budget balancing promise that also was a phony. The 1932 Democratic platform not only promised a balanced budget but pledged a 25 per cent reduction in government spending. Bet lieve it or not!

FDR quickly abandoned his platform just as President Kennedy has turned away from the fiscal pledges of his 1960 presidential platform. Kennedy and the platform promised a balanced budget and laid out a program to achieve it. One important part of that program was higher taxes if necessary.

The Roosevelt years spanned from March, 1933, to April, 1945. Every one was a deficit year in which FDR borrowed billions to pay government bills. Four of those were war years in which deficit spending was wholly defensible.

Racks Up Four
Kennedy will rack up four consecutive federal deficits in his first term and at least two more in his second, if he is re-elected. Administration economists concede Treasury deficits until fiscal year 1967.

On the record of comparatively recent experience, a politician's promise to balance the federal budget isn't worth much. Kennedy refuses to consider reduced spending while speaking only in the generalities of budget balancing. Small wonder that many conservative-minded citizens doubt Kennedy's performance will match his good intentions.

The conservative-minded citizens contemplate the steadily shrinking value of the U.S. dollar and the rotting effect of endless budget deficits on the dollar's purchasing power. The Bureau of Labor Statistics has reported that since 1959 the U.S. dollar has lost 6.4 cents of its purchasing power. Compared with the dollar of 1949, the July, 1963, dollar had shrunk by 23.9 cents. Compared with the 1939 dollar the shrinkage now is 54.8 cents, the purchasing power being calculated at 45.2 cents.

Living Cost Doubles
A 45-cent dollar means that it costs more than twice as much to live today than it did 24 years ago. This dollar rotting process has slowed considerably since the lushly loose Truman years, but the shrinkage continues. The first line of U.S. defense is a stable, strong dollar. It follows, therefore, that the first line of U.S. defense is crumbly and is likely to continue so until government spending is held within revenue and a beginning is made on public debt retirement.

The alternative to that budget balancing program would be continued borrowing until the public debt became unmanageable and unbearable. At that point there would be no alternative to a tremendous devaluation of the U. S. dollar of dissolve the debt.

Such dollar devaluation would collapse the first line of U.S. defense. The American way of life would end. Too bad we can't believe the politicians when they promise to balance the budget.

New AF Communications Setup Aids War On Vietnamese Reds

SAIGON, Viet Nam (UPI) — If they gave medals to machines, Tropro Scatter would rate the Navy Cross, the Congressional Medal of Honor and just about every commendation for fighting the enemy.

Tropro Scatter is the new communications system installed by the U.S. Air Force in Vietnam and now managed by the Army. It has been credited with saving more lives and killing more Communist guerrillas than any other single weapon introduced in the Vietnamese fighting.

One senior officer claimed the French would never have been driven from Vietnam if Tropro Scatter had been available to them in the early 1950s. Through the use of the more than \$18 million system, it has been possible to link every military district in South Vietnam together on instantaneous phone circuits.

Major Tarlton A. Guyote (New Iberia, La.) explained that even the remotest Vietnamese army outpost is in constant touch with rear areas which can supply help as soon as the Viet Cong launch an attack.

"Before we had Tropro Scatter," the Air Force Major said, "it sometimes took hours to make contact with the outposts under attack, and most of the time the help sent them arrived too late. Hundreds of lives were lost because of inadequate communications."

"Today, the daily communiques tell of Communist attacks that were beaten off by the timely arrival of flare planes and bombers which came to the aid of the besieged Vietnamese. They got there in time because of the Tropro Scatter system which relayed the calls for help."

The principle behind the civilian installed system is the huge grids resembling outdoor movie screens. These grids bounce the radioed signals off the Troposphere and back to the receivers.

"It's just a case of where brute force is used in shotgun effect to push out the signals," said Guyote. "And the receivers are designed to pick up the strongest signal that comes in. The result is a foolproof, completely secure communications system that terrain has no effect upon, and which no troops are needed to protect."

Guyote said ionospheric conditions gave little trouble, and that the system was effective about 96 to 97 percent of the time.

"Each of Vietnam's military districts," he said, "is linked to the main communications center by Tropro Scatter. All the outposts in the district have direct short-wave contact with the districts. Once an attack starts—or there is reason to believe one is coming—the outpost radios the district command post who relays the information by Tropro Scatter to the closest airfield or communications center. It is then only a matter of minutes until planes have been either diverted or sent out to the target area."

The Air Force major said it took one month to "get the bugs out of the system" and in the first month about 2,900 messages were handled by the Tropro Scatter installation. Last month we moved more than 12,000 messages, and many of them were calls for help which might have gone unanswered if it had not been for Tropro Scatter," he said.

Foreign News Commentary

When Gen. Charles de Gaulle devalued the French franc shortly after coming to power five years ago, the action had two main results:

It enabled French exports to become competitive on foreign markets.

And it brought out of hiding millions of dollars which thrifty Frenchmen had been hiding under the mattress.

It was the beginning of a new era for France which had known years of trade deficits and a rate of inflation higher than that of any Western power.

Within a year, France, the former sick man of Europe, was on its way to becoming the most healthy, with money in the bank. By May of this year France's currency and gold reserves amounted to more than \$4 billion.

Signs Of Trouble

But in the midst of plenty there also were mounting signs of trouble.

In the last year the cost of living had jumped roughly 8 per cent.

French manufactured goods once more were pricing themselves out of the market.

Even in the nationalized industries the government had not been able to carry out its own announced intention of limiting wage boosts to the 4.5 per cent which would correspond more closely to the national rate of economic growth.

A nationwide coal miners' strike in March led to wage increases which in a year would total more than 12 per cent.

Increases of more than seven per cent went to workers in the state-owned railroad and gas and electricity industries.

Farmers Battle Police

Farmers producing more than the market could absorb fought with police and renewed demands for subsidies.

Government warnings that the country faced a "last chance" to pursue economic expansion with financial stability largely went unheeded.

In mid-month the government acted on its own.

There were some bitter pills and it seemed likely more would follow.

On Sept. 12, the government administered the first of these.

Down payments on automobiles and television sets now would be 35 per cent instead of 20. Prices of manufactured goods would be held to the level of Aug. 31. Credit would be restricted.

This week the French National Assembly takes up the new budget. It is for \$18.5 billion, up three billion from the year before. It is supposed to serve the dual purpose of aiding an expanding economy while also serving as a brake on inflation by sopping up excess money.

But to finance the heavy burden of its independent nuclear policy, the French government needs money in ever-increasing sums.

A clue to government thinking may come from Premier Georges Pompidou, by trade a banker. The difference between a Frenchman and an American, he said, is that the American pretends to be rich and the Frenchman pretends to be poor.

In plainer words he could have said that only about half the Frenchmen who should pay taxes, actually do pay them.

Tax evasion is a game enjoyed by all Frenchmen. But recent government action suggests the rules are about to be changed.

Quake Hits Sparsely Populated Area

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI) — A sharp earthquake, strong enough to have caused damage had it been centered in a populated area, shook a wide area of Southern California yesterday.

Seismologist Dr. Charles F. Richter of Caltech said he recorded the quake starting at 5:41 a.m. CST. He said it had a magnitude of 4.5 on the Richter scale and was centered 70 miles south-east of here. Richter said this magnitude could cause damage.

The center would have been located in the rugged mountains near the joining of Riverside and San Diego counties.

At downtown Los Angeles, the quake was felt as a sharp jolt, especially by persons in tall buildings.

No damage was reported from the tremor.

The majority of U.S. hurricanes occur in late August, September and October.
