

Revolt Again Hits Dominican Republic

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (UPI) — The armed forces deposed and arrested President Juan Bosch today in a military coup proclaimed as a blow against the rise of Communism in the Dominican Republic. The revolt leaders dissolved parliament, set up a provisional government, outlawed the new constitution which Bosch rammed through the congress last Feb.

and outlawed the Communist party. Bosch and his entire cabinet were held prisoners in the presidential palace. A manifesto signed by 28 ranking officers of the army, navy, air force and police pledged continued Dominican adherence to international commitments. The coup leaders included generals Antonio Imbert and Luis Amiana, only survivors of the

group of rebels who assassinated ex-dictator Rafael L. Trujillo to start the Dominican Republic on its march to democracy after more than three decades of dictatorship. Following up the manifesto's outlawing of the Communist party, police immediately threw a cordon around the headquarters of the pro-Castro 14th of June party. The coup was pulled off at 3

a.m. First reports indicated it was carried out without gunfire or bloodshed. Radio Santo Domingo, the government transmitter, told people of the coup in a pre-dawn announcement, saying "the corrupt and pro-Communist government of Juan Bosch has been deposed by a coup d'etat." The city remained calm on the surface, however.

Shortly before the coup, a high government official had reported that unidentified persons had fired several bursts of machine-gun fire on the Dominican border town of Dajabon from the Haitian town of Ouanaminthe. The firing lasted from 8 p.m. to about 12:30 a.m. today, and caused some damage to a church and a school at Dajabon. The Dajabon-Ouanaminthe border area has been the scene of

intermittent shooting since Sunday, when Haitian forces fired at rebels led by former Gen. Leon Captave as they fled into the Dominican Republic. The 54-year-old president was reported held under arrest in the presidential palace in Santo Domingo. He was inaugurated last Feb. 27, and his ouster came just two days short of seven months in office.

Developments in recent weeks had indicated to observers that his days were numbered. Bosch, the first freely-elected president of the Dominican Republic since the assassination of strongman Trujillo, had been on the point of war with neighboring Haiti on several occasions while his country's governmental administration and economy continued to slip badly.

Kennedy Taking Whirlwind Tour

GRAND FORKS, N. D. (UPI) — President Kennedy sped into the Northern Plains states today with a call for "parity of opportunity" to help rural people come closer to the standards of urban living. His "nonpolitical" tour picked up definite partisan tinges as it moved along. On the second day of his fast-moving tour devoted to the subject of conservation and development of natural resources, Kennedy flew from Duluth, Minn., to Grand Forks to accept an honorary degree from the University of North Dakota and address himself to rural electrification problems of the vast farmlands of this area. From Grand Forks, the President's itinerary took him to Cheyenne, Wyo.; an afternoon speech at the University of Wyoming in Laramie; another speech date at Billings, Mont.; and an overnight stop at the famed Wyoming resort and hunting area, Jackson hole.

In his prepared speech at the University of North Dakota, Kennedy said there was a great and continuing need for narrowing the differences in living standards of American city and rural populations, particularly in the cost of electric power which becomes increasingly needed in mechanized farming. "We are seeking, in short, true parity of opportunity, but it will not come overnight," he said. "To achieve it will require a new impetus in electrification development, new starts in our multipurpose dam programs, and new and greater use of our land, water, timber and wildlife resources."

The "non-political" label applied by the White House to Kennedy's 10,000-mile swing to the West was becoming somewhat academic. The President in a speaking appearance at Duluth Tuesday night threw away much of his prepared text which had dealt with conservation programs. He hammered instead at the need for public support of his \$11 billion tax cut bill which is expected to come up for a vote in the House of Representatives today. "We need your help," he said to a capacity crowd of more than 3,000 persons gathered in the fieldhouse of the University of Minnesota branch in Duluth. He said a large part of his audience was made up of Democrats, and he suggested that they put their shoulders to the wheel of pressure for his legislative recommendations designed to attack unemployment, which is high in the Duluth section. KENNEDY SAID Valachi's disclosures were "significant" because "for the first time an insider—a knowledgeable member of the racketeering hierarchy—has broken the underworld's code of silence." In 'Cosa Nostra' Hearings

Bobby Is Lead-Off Witness

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy called on Congress today to approve two new weapons against crime—immunity for witnesses in racketeering investigations and a broader federal wire-tap law. The attorney general was the lead-off witness in the Senate investigations subcommittee's long-awaited hearings on the so-called "Cosa Nostra" underworld crime empire. The star witness at the hearings, expected to last about three weeks, will be Joseph Valachi, the underworld's most celebrated stool pigeon. Valachi is said to have called the turn on about 30 gangland slayings and to have been marked for murder himself by the "Cosa Nostra." Kennedy told the subcommittee there existed in the United States "a private government of organized crime, a government with an annual income of billions, resting on a base of human suffering and moral corrosion." He said that it was particularly difficult to expose these operations because witnesses were intimidated and corrupt public officials protect the racketeer kingpins.

Industrial Development Topic of C of C Luncheon

Industrial development is not only smoke stacks of factories but all activities that provide job opportunities," R. J. Bradley, director of the recently conducted industrial development workshop, told 135 people attending the September membership luncheon meeting of the Chamber of Commerce yesterday in the Coronado Inn. Administration Is Confident of Tax Cut Bill Passage

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Confident of victory, administration forces pressed for House passage today of an \$11 billion tax cut, biggest in history. As the showdown votes approached, the tide was running against Republican leaders in their attempt to attach an anti-spending amendment to the tax-cutting bill or defeat it on final passage. Republican forces charged that it would be fiscally irresponsible for Congress to approve President Kennedy's plea for tax cuts without imposing specific spending curbs on him. Replying to this argument, Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., told the House Tuesday in almost so many words that enactment of the tax cut would make it harder for Kennedy to win congressional approval of new spending programs. Appeals to Conservatives Mills, who heads the tax-writing House Ways & Means Committee, called for conservative support of the bill on the ground that it represented "a step away from big central government." Unless high taxes are reduced to let private enterprise solve unemployment problems, Mills said, "others will find an answer for it by increasing spending." House GOP Leader Charles A. Halleck, said that if administration forces succeeded in defeating the Republican amendment, the bill's chances of final passage "will be in very serious jeopardy." But few members took that seriously. Rep. Thomas B. Curtis, R-Mo., told the House he could find no fault with Mills' argument that

the nation must choose between the road of increased spending and the road of reduced taxes. Curtis said, however, that the President and his advisers want to "travel both roads at the same time." The GOP amendment would prohibit the tax cut unless the President in his budget message next January showed spending estimates of no more than \$97 billion for the current fiscal year and \$98 billion for the next year.

400 Hear Philbrick Speak on Communism

"So many of the American people have done so little..." this was one of the many statements Herbert A. Philbrick made, that the 400 persons attending the first Knife & Fork Club dinner of the new season at the Robert E. Lee Junior High Cafeteria, heard last evening. Philbrick, author and lecturer, told those attending the dinner that the "Communist underground is at this time very active in the United States and the threat to the freedom of everyone is in danger." "I can tell you this," Philbrick stated, "there are those at this very minute that are not leading ordinary lives." Philbrick was speaking of the persons that are now doing the same type of work that he carried on for nine years, that of a citizen, Communist and counterparty. "Some have asked the question, 'How great is the danger?'" Philbrick said. "The only answer that can be given is a two-part one, first to quote J. Edgar Hoover, 'There are 10,000 hard core Communists in the United States at

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the present time!" Second — "There would be no threat if there were no Communist International, however for every 'hard core' communist in the United States today there are 10 fellow travelers." A fellow traveler, Philbrick explained, is one that is ready and willing to do the bidding of the 'Communists at every opportunity. In addition to these there are the "victims" of the Communist party, and this number no one knows for sure. Here is a sample of one of the questions asked me, Philbrick said: Question: What is a Communist like? Answer: On the outside just like anyone else, but on the inside it "defies description." "The idea that the Communists are strong in the poor people and the uneducated is pure bunk," Philbrick said. Speaking on the Test Ban Treaty, Philbrick stated that "I wonder if our negotiators were aware of the fact that according to the Communists' Code of Morals a Communist can do nothing against Communism." Naval Authorities Seeking Answer In Jet Crash

LILLIAN, Tex. (UPI) — Naval authorities yesterday tried to determine why two Navy Fury jet fighter planes collided in the air in almost perfect flying weather. One pilot was killed. The other parachuted to safety.

The dead pilot was Lt. Robert Leo Schunder of Fort Worth, a sales engineer for Texas Electric Service Co. The pilot of the other jet was Lt. Jerry M. Hendricks of Fort Worth. He received only an abrasion on his right hand.

The crash occurred Sunday 20 miles southwest of Dallas on what Naval officials said was a "normal weekend training maneuver."

Both officers were members of Navy Reserve Fighter Squadron 702. They were from Dallas Naval Air Station.

Lt. Hendricks said he did not see the other plane, "until he was right on top of me."

Both planes exploded and burned, setting grass fires. One plane fell to earth across a county road intersection. The other crashed about 100 yards away.

Schunder, a Navy pilot for eight years, was found trapped in his aircraft seat. He apparently had ejected too close to the ground to allow time for his parachute to open.

Political Viewers See Bigger Split

PARIS (UPI) — French differences with the United States and the Western alliance may become more evident in the near future, political observers said yesterday.

They drew their conclusions from the final visit here this weekend of Konrad Adenauer as West German chancellor and a bitter attack by implication, on the United States from Premier Georges Pompidou.

Adenauer will retire next month and turn the Bonn government over to Vice Chancellor Ludwig Erhard. With the 87-year-old chancellor will go his strong pro-De Gaulle policies, observers predicted.

Erhard was expected to shift the West German policy more closely in line with Washington's thinking on how the Western alliance should be operated to gain maximum strength.

Adenauer returned to Bonn Sunday as Pompidou was telling a meeting of the deputies of the Gaullist Union for the New Republic (UNR) party that foreign powers were trying "to make France a satellite."

He did not accuse the United States by name when he defended De Gaulle's independent nuclear policy. But observers said there was no mistaking his target when he hit at those "who want us to give up our deterrent, claiming it a useless toy."

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union implied yesterday that Communist China seeks nuclear weapons for purposes of power politics and intimidation.

Pravda, the Soviet Communist party newspaper, said China's leadership was "striving to turn its country, cost what it may, into a nuclear power."

The editorial repeated charges made Saturday in a 15,000-word Soviet attack on Peking. They included accusations that Chinese party chief Mao Tse-tung was willing to write off one-third or one-half of the world's population in a nuclear war because "the other half would still remain but imperialism would be destroyed entirely."

Such aims, Pravda said, cannot be supported by "the military power of the socialist camp."

This was seen as another reminder to the Chinese that Moscow no longer feels obligated by the terms of its 1950 military alliance with Peking.

There Are Five Million Alcoholics in the U. S.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — There are about five million alcoholics in the United States. Contrary to common belief, only three percent of them are found lying in the gutters of big cities.

There are alcoholics in all echelons of the economy and all categories of society. You may be unaware of it, but there can be two or three persons living on your block who are fighting a silent, desperate battle against alcohol.

Women are less inclined to become alcoholics than men. For every woman alcoholic there are 5 1/2 men. But scientists are becoming increasingly concerned about women who spend their days in solitary drinking. As comedienne Phyllis Diller says: "Around 3 o'clock every afternoon they put a dab of O' Cedar wax polish behind their ears so they will smell busy when the husband comes home." The rest of their day is devoted to drinking.

Takes 8 1/2 Years

Some persons are born alcoholics, meaning they are doomed from the time they take their first drink. They never stop drinking. But such people are in the small minority, and the alcoholic Rehabilitation Center says it takes an average of eight and one-half years for a drinker to step up his consumption to the point where he can be medically classified as an alcoholic.

The National Council on Alcoholism says there are 13 steps down the ladder to trouble: the social drink, and here is where most people stop and remain for the rest of their lives. The blackout: you can't remember what happened the night before. You drink more than your friends do and the liquor means more to you.

You continue to drink more than you mean to: the intended two drinks after work turns into six. You begin inventing excuses for drinking (a cold, fatigue etc.). You start taking eye openers before breakfast. You begin to drink alone. You become anti-social when you drink (pick fights with strangers). You start going on benders or prolonged drinking bouts.

You are tortured by remorse in your sober moments but only briefly and then resume drinking behavior than ever. You develop anxiety over your ability to obtain liquor and begin hiding bottles around the house. You finally realize you are an alcoholic,

perhaps because of a traffic accident or a bad fall on the stairs. You decide whether to fight it or succumb: either you turn yourself over to a doctor for treatment or give up and drink yourself to death.

"Alibi Stage" Crucial
The Alcoholic Information Center here believes the "alibi stage" may be the most crucial sign post on the road to alcoholism, and describes it this way:
"Mr. X refuses to admit it, but he begins shaping his entire life

toward the maximum amount of drinking. To do this he erects a system of alibis and lives behind it. He tells his wife he is not interested in playing bridge with the neighbors any more. (He feels they have him under surveillance and he can't drink as

much as he wants to).
"He joins a weekly poker game where drinking is unlimited. He invents crises in his business and tells his wife he needs four drinks before dinner to help him forget them. He says he has developed a tendency to hay fever and quits playing week-end golf so he can stay home and drink.
Saving a man who has become an alcoholic is discouraging work. The Washington Rehabilitation Clinic says almost half of the

persons who seek assistance never return after the first visit. The following results are obtained from those who do return for a minimum of 25 visits:
Marked improvement (they stay sober for six months, 24 percent; Moderate improvement (not totally sober, 61.5; Unimproved 14.5.

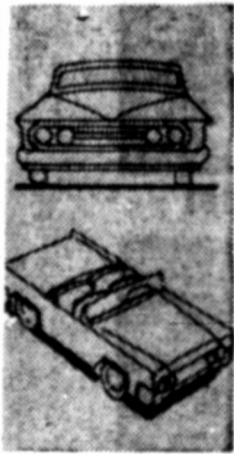

The wells were either found to be in fields where a deviated well was located or operators failed to comply with commission orders to prepare wells for survey.

The Commission also set a survey Monday for a well on the H. M. Harrington Jr. Skipper-Garner "B" lease in Gregg County to determine if it is illegally slanted.

The wells ordered plugged included: Nortex Oil & Gas Corp. 8 wells on its Butts lease, Gregg County. H. F. Richardson, one well on J. T. Miller Field, Upshur County. E. J. Hunter, C. N. Dickerson lease, Rusk County, 3 wells.

Notes From Wall Street

NEW YORK (UPI)—The two things that bother investment adviser James Dines about the current state of the market are the old age of the boom and the failure of the public to return to the market after the new high was made.

Dines wonders who the professionals will sell to if the public does not return. Nevertheless, he feels the public will return near the top, "and that will be one of our prime sell signals." Dines predicts no 1962-type of decline for the rest of the year.

Spear & Staff, Inc. remains "moderately bullish" on the intermediate course of the market. However, it notes that the recent churning action may be signaling a minor reaction — not a bad one but enough to make investors more cautious until the trend once again is firmly established.

Reynolds & Co. says the major factors now affecting the stock market are a strong economy; continued inflation; the possibility of a tax cut, and an easing of international tensions. "Combined with a strong technical situation, they provide a healthy background for the present bull market," Reynolds says.

The Florida-based Stock Profit Trends says "the general tone of the market remains strong and we expect a higher and broader market over the next thirty days."

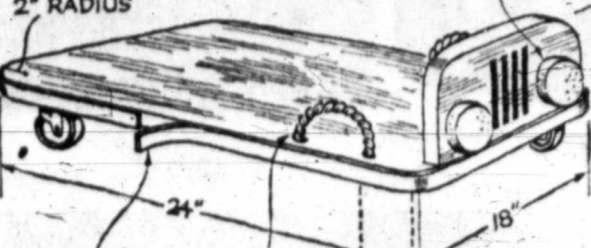

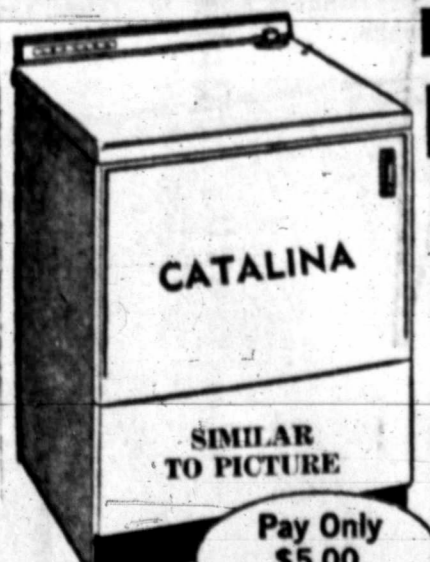

'Burn Center' Saves Lives of The Hopeless

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (UPI) — Horribly burned people from all over the world come to the Surgical Research Unit at Brooke Army Medical Center looking for a miracle. Sometimes they find one.

The miracle is that the Surgical Research Unit — better known as the Burn Center — saves the lives of people who, according to statistics, have no chance.

Twenty years ago, a burn over one-third of the body's surface was considered fatal. But patients burned over 70 per cent of their bodies have walked out of the Center after intensive treatment.

Recoveries such as these are rare, but they give the Burn Center's doctors, nurses and technicians hope that they can one day save a significant percentage of the patients they treat for critically severe burns.

Lt. Col. John A. Moncrief is commanding officer of the Surgical Research Unit. Lt. Col. Walter E. Switzer is chief of the clinical division.

Burn victims are treated in a ward of Brooke Army Medical Center reserved for the unit.

Any member of the armed forces burned badly enough is eligible for treatment. Dependents of military personnel, retired soldiers, sailors and marines and civilian employees of the Department of Defense, burned on the job, also are eligible. Occasionally, the Center treats a civilian with no military connection.

About the time of the Korean War, the Center's researchers reached three conclusions:

—The deaths of most severely burned patients come within the first 72 hours.

—The ratio of percentage of total body surface burned to age can lead to a fair prediction of survival chances.

—Patients can be transported safely right after they are burned if treatment is adequate and continuous.

Despite the occasional miracle, so far the percentage of mortality of the severely burned has not been really lowered, according to Burn Center researchers. Critically burned patients live longer, but the same percentage dies.

The unit pioneered the exposure method of treating burns and still uses it. Doctors do not necessarily wait for burned tissue to slough off naturally, or to be helped by enzymes and chemicals.

They sometimes removed the tissue surgically, within three or four days of the burn, to eliminate a breeding ground for bacteria.

Then they cover a patient's burn with skin grafts: his skin where possible and the skin of another person where not. The patient will not permanently accept the skin of another person, unless it is an identical twin, but the skin of another person will help keep down infection.

Eventually, the patient's burned area has to be covered with his own skin.

Col. Switzer defines a first degree burn as one that makes the skin red, like a mild sunburn. A second degree burn is a blister type burn. It could be superficial or nearly all the way through the skin. A third degree burn goes through the skin and may involve deep tissue and even bone.

Switzer notices an increase in burns by gasoline fires and by the gas in aerosol cans, even when the cans do not contain an inflammable substance.

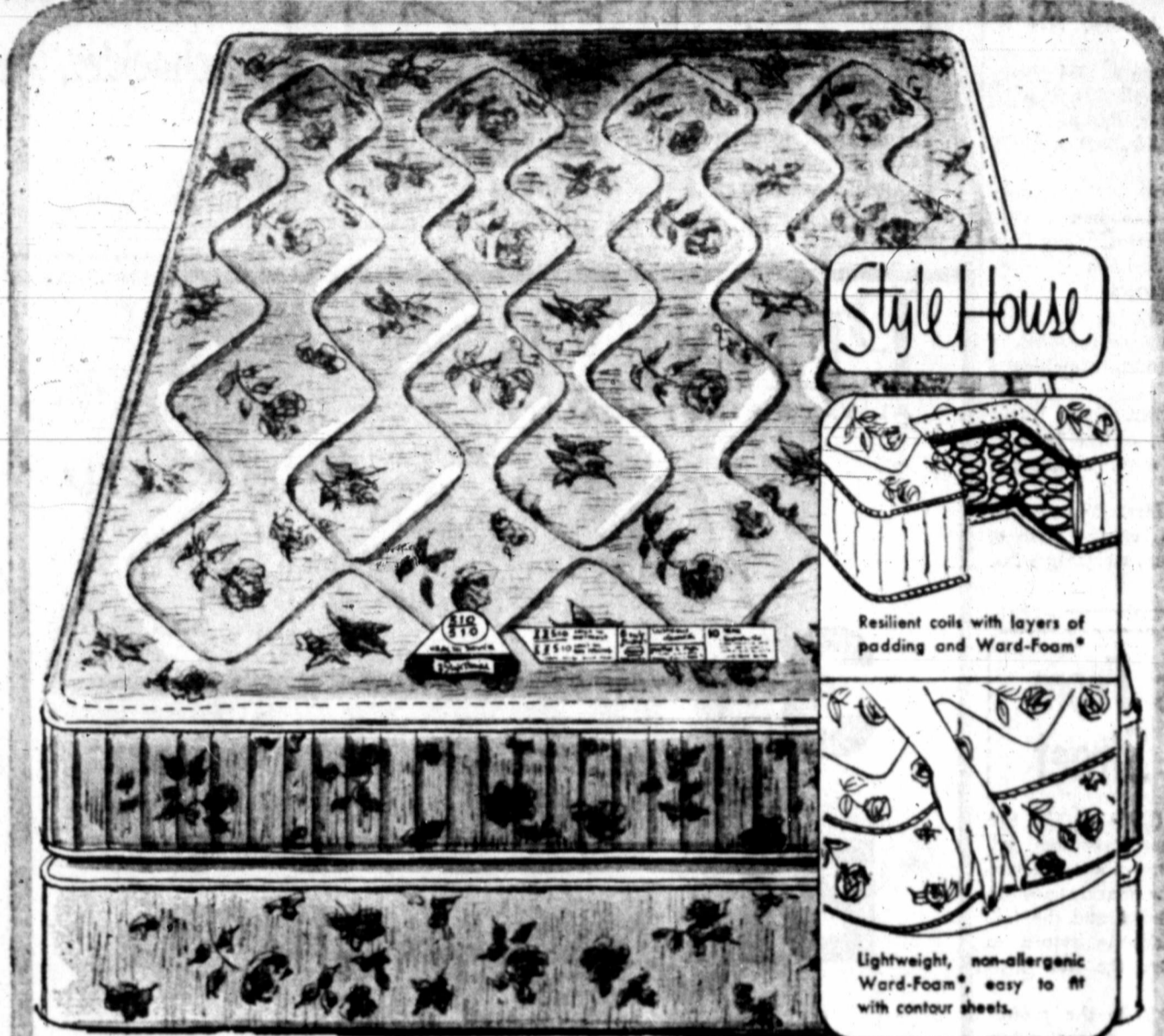
"Everybody has a can of gasoline in his garage now," Switzer said. "It sits there like a loaded gun. People in general have no respect for gasoline."

"Aerosol cans also are a potential danger. When they contain lacquer and that sort of stuff it is worse, but even if they do not contain inflammable contents, they are still dangerous."

"Put them in an incinerator and they will blow up like a bomb."

Japanese Don't Follow Line Of Lease Resistance

By ROBERT METCALFE United Press International TOKYO (UPI) — The Japanese have borrowed a North American idea that will let them keep up with the Suzukis without actually buying anything.

The Suzukis (the Joneses) suddenly sprout, say, a lush new car, furniture, power boat, swimming pool and a merry-go-round for the kids.

The Satos (the Smiths) now can bounce right back with the same—and more if they wish.

They can rent it—from Japan's first leasing firm that suddenly has emerged with a familiar slogan: "Lease it—don't buy it."

The Japan Lease International is the brainchild of Kiyoshi Ichimura, president of Ricoh Company Ltd.

He has the Suzukis and Satos in mind—but his main targets are the Japanese businessman, manufacturer and contractor.

He hopefully looks to the day when the Japanese executive will rise from a rented bed to a blast from a rented alarm, down a breakfast off rented dishes, off a rented kimono to get into a rented suit, kiss his unleased wife goodbye, leave his rented house in a rented car driven by a rented chauffeur, light a morning cigar by a rented lighter.

And, then enter his rented office, settle into a rented chair, lean on a rented desk and pick up a rented pen to perform his job as an executive who himself may be on lease.

Far-fetched? Not in Ichimura's scheme of things.

An idea of the scope of his plans can be had by a look at these items for rent:

Living room furniture, stoves, refrigerators, room coolers, cash registers, electronic computers, cars, trucks, a helicopter, concrete mixers, cultivators, dredge boats, typewriters, bulldozers, elevators and escalators, yachts, water skis, boats, trolleys for children and jet coasters, and the complete facilities for manufacturing plants, supermarkets and bowling alleys.

He already has equipped the International Youth Center here with a bowling alley, a swimming pool, a movie theatre, a planetarium and billing facilities for overseas travelers it will care for.

What got Ichimura into the leasing business?

A few years ago his Ricoh firm changed its administrative set-up, which meant employees had to be moved to new locations.

"We had to spend a lot of money to move their furniture," Ichimura said.

In his book, it would have been much simpler for an employee to move out of one rented house and into another rented house and its rented furniture.

He financed his new leasing business with help from 41 Japanese business firms—auto makers, electrical and tool machine manufacturers, insurance companies—and a large leasing company in the United States.

Talent for hire will be main items on his rental lists, said Ichimura. Engineers, draftsmen, architects—even company presidents—will be available to small corporations.

A total of eight pounds had been lost by members during the last week.

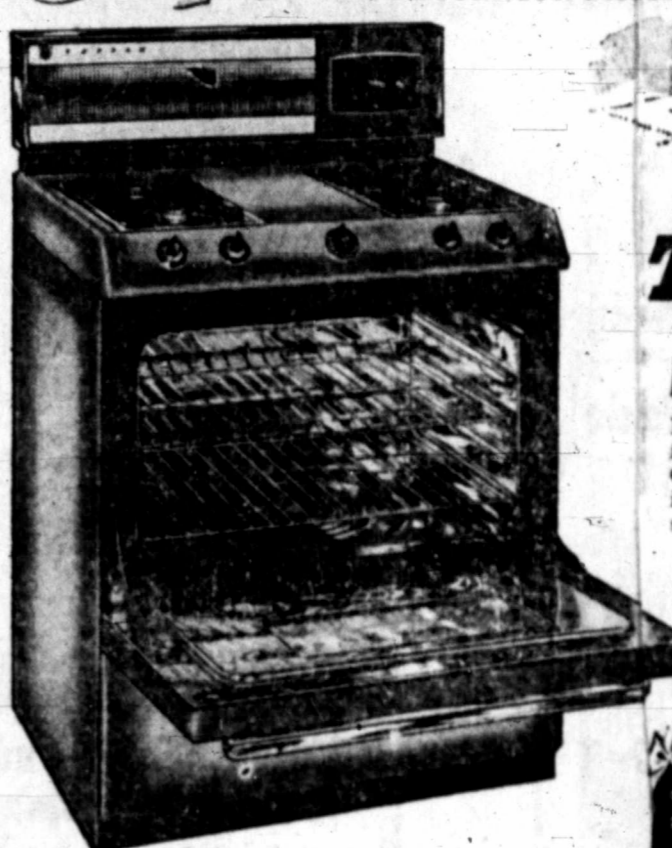

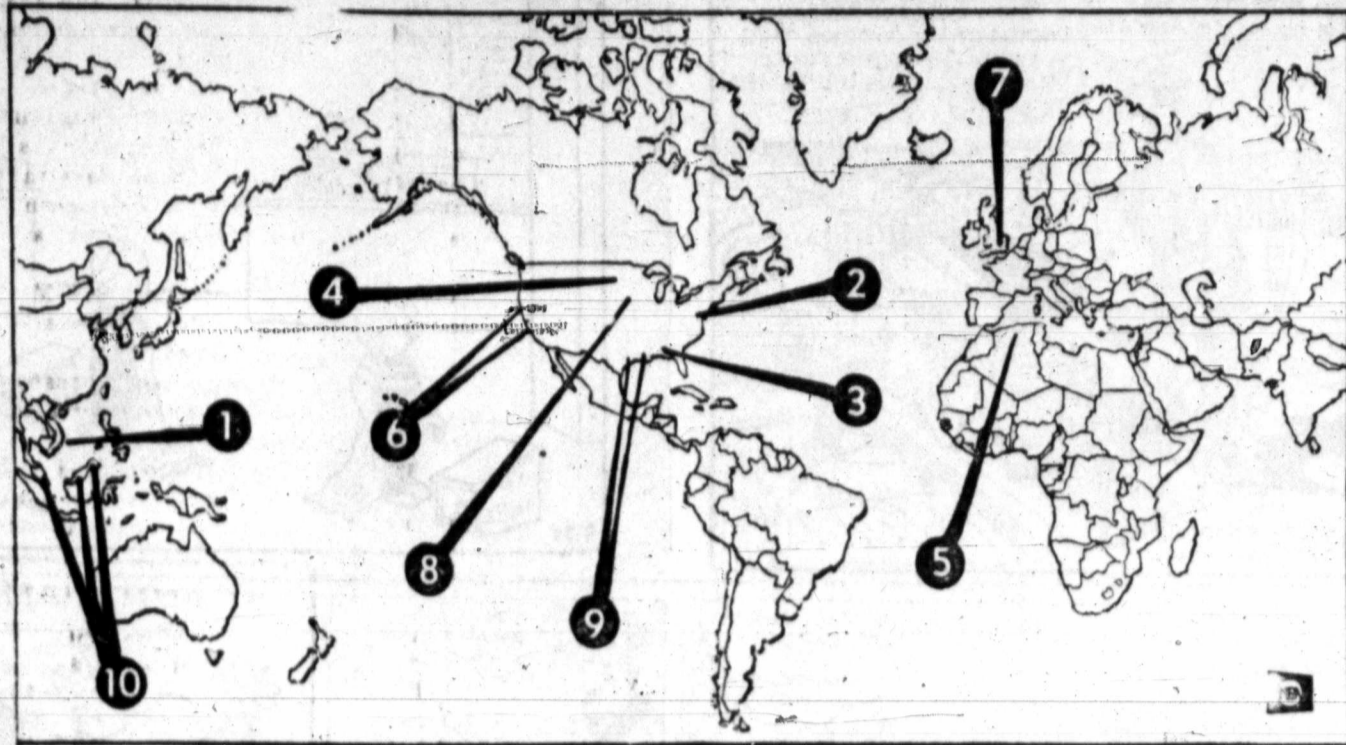

Increased Status Offered to Spain

NEW YORK (UPI) — The United States yesterday was expected to offer Spain increased status as an ally and replacement of some out-dated military equipment in return for renewal of air and naval base rights in that country, which are due to expire Thursday.

Officials said that Secretary of State Dean Rusk, holding a morning conference with Spanish Foreign Minister Fernando Maria Castiella y Maiz, undoubtedly would offer some concessions to extend the 10-year pact. These are expected to include a greater voice for Spain in Western strategy — short of NATO membership, which Madrid realizes is impossible at this time.

The ticklish meeting was the first in an intensive 10-day round of talks Rusk has scheduled with foreign leaders here to attend the annual United Nations General Assembly session.

This afternoon Rusk meets with officials from the Central American republics to discuss progress in blocking Cuban Premier Fidel Castro's avowed campaign to subvert and convert his neighbors to Communism.

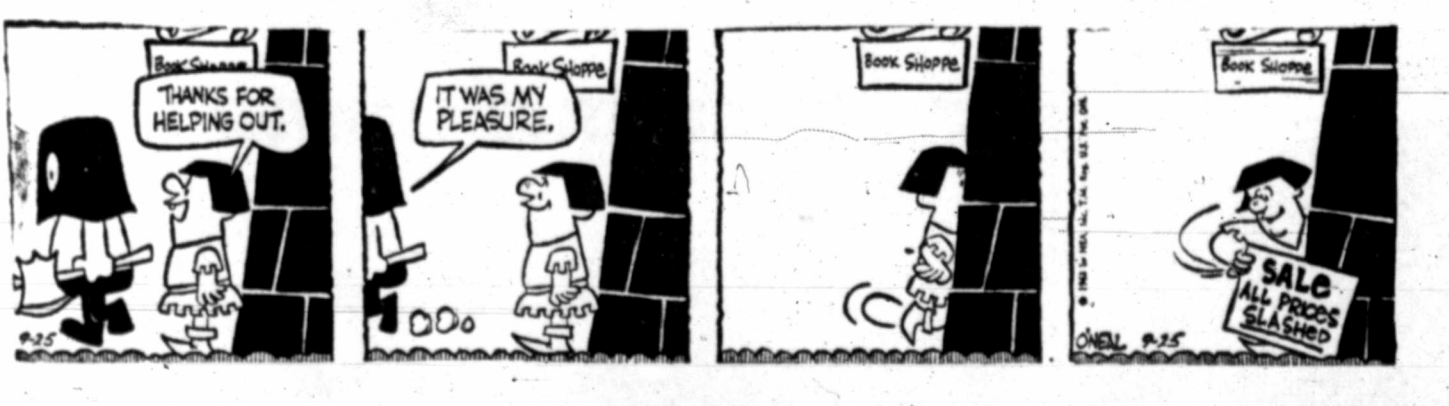

Foreign Commentary

One hundred years and more ago when European powers busily were carving up Imperial China,

Czarist Russia was taking its share.
Maps published by the Red Chinese since they took over the mainland in 1949 show that they

do not recognize these conquests and intend to get them back.
And so to India has been added the Soviet Union as a nation having a border dispute with Communist China, and to the ideological quarrel between the two Communist giants has been added a new and, potentially, even more explosive issue.
For outsiders attempting to assess the depth, probable duration and cause of the quarrel, he lat-

est turn taking up space in Moscow and Peking newspapers and in the propaganda airwaves has given new food for thought.
Last week end the Soviet government charged the Chinese with 5,000 border violations in 1962. The Soviets said the Chinese had attempted to reclaim isolated parts of Soviet territory "without preliminary permission."

Specifically, it cited the case of a fisherman on the Amur River which separates Siberia from Manchuria. It said documents taken from the fisherman demanded that fishermen tell Soviet border guards that river islands belong to China.
It said that Russian attempts to negotiate border disputes had been ignored by Red China, and from this India's Jawaharlal Nehru could draw a wry smile.

Two weeks earlier, the Red Chinese had accused Russia of luring tens of thousands of Mongol nomads across the border of Sinkiang Province into the Soviet Union and of trying to engineer an anti-Chinese coup in the region.
Both areas, Sinkiang and the Amur and Ussuri River borders with Siberia, are historic scenes of conflict between the Russians and the Chinese.

Province Ancient Route
Sinkiang, China's largest province, far back beyond the days of Marco Polo, has been a highway of civilization. An ancient silk route linked it with India. It is marked by extremes of hot and cold, ferocious winds, mountains, green forests and pastures and rivers that end in salt marshes and arid deserts. And while it belongs to China, it borders on the Soviet Union and its communica-

tions and trade traditionally look toward the U.S.S.R.
In recent years, the Chinese have poured hundreds of thousands of soldier-farmers into the area, in a counter move to Khrushchev's haste to open up the Soviet Union's western virgin lands.
