

### What Makes Bread Dough Rise?

- 1. Puncture an opening in a metal cover of a glass jar. Insert one end of a length of rubber hose or glass tube through the hole. Place melted wax around the hole to insure an airtight connection. Submerge the other end of the tube in a glass of limewater.
- 2. Combine one cup of flour, one tablespoon of sugar, onefourth package of commercial yeast, and one-half cup of water. Place this mixture into the glass jar. Screw on the top immediately.
- 8. Set this equipment in a warm place. Soon the dough will rise. Remove the lid, punc-Source: Young People's Science Encyclopedia

We shoppers, it's said, want onto slacks outfits for at-home wear. ly the lean cuts of pork since we're busy watching our weight and the bulges of fat that medical science says can harm hubby and offspring.

With the pigs, according to the report from Oklahoma State University, the weight control amounts to getting the animals to spend more calories than usual getting to the trough at mealtime. The trough, in pigland, is equivalent to the dining room table in human

Researchers have found that the pigs adopt an eat less policy when they must approach the trough via a complicated inclined plank.

No Easy Time Once there, the poor pigs don't have an easy time of it. They must stand on an incline while eating. And this stance, say the researchers, helps them to curb

the appetite. As a result of all this elevated approach - included planes and such - the porkers tend to eat a sane amount at mealtime. They don't stuff themselves to the fattie stage, at any rate.

The researchers report that the same approach - work by climbing before eating and eating while inclined - could help overweight humans.

If so, drastic changes are in order in the households of humans wanting to make the greatest practical application of this ex-






