GSA Builds Character

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the third in a series of six articles written to explain the various organizations aided by the United Fund.

The aim of Girl Scouts of U.S.A. is to build responsible citizens and to inspire girls with the highest ideals of character, conduct, patriotism and service.

Girl Scouts are associated often with hiking, camping and wearing green uniforms, but what else do they do?

A Girl Scout may tell you: "I've been working for a Homemaker's badge and I've found housework isn't drudgery as I've always thought. Cooking isn't just putting something in a pan and lighting a fire under it. It's an art, and I'm learning to cook with imagination. Then, there is the budgeting and marketing. I did the marketing for a week and spent less than mother usually does."

Another Girl Scout may answer the question this way: "I've been working on a community project. We've visited the City Hall, learned about the council meetings and talked about some of the things decided there. Several of us are going to talk to the police chief and fire chief. We're going to find out what the sanitation department does and how the water department operates. I had no idea city government was so important in our daily lives."

Even before they are old enough to vote, Girl Scouts realize how important a role they play as informed citizens and are constantly widening the horizons of their world.

Through the Pampa-Lefors United Fund community citizens invest in these "women of the future." Girl Scouting develops in youngsters the integrity, self-reliance, ingenuity and capacity for leadership that assures their own and their country's well-being.

Camping is one way the girls widen their horizons and develop self-reliance and ingenuity. This year the Quivara Council's camping program included eight day camps, attended by 737 girls, a patrol camp encampment of six days at Camp Kiowa attended by 62 girls and an established camp of 10 days at Camp Kiowa, attended by 44 girls.

Bobby Baker Has Resigned

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The resignation of Senate Democratic Secretary Robert G. (Bobby) Baker eased political pressures and potential senatorial embarrassment today.

But there was no certainty that the political fire his outside business deals built in the senate cloakroom had been entirely smothered.

Sen. John J. Williams, R-Del., who had launched a one-man inquiry into Baker's financial interests in a food vending firm serving government contractors, would not say whether he would drop his investigation.

The FBI also is investigating the vending firm with which Baker had ties. Sources said the inquiry had been expanded.

Gave Up Job

Baker gave up a \$19,000 job, but his wife Dorothy who is on the Senate internal security subcommittee staff at \$11,800 a year, apparently was remaining. Both are listed as principals in the controversial vending firm.

Commission Continues Hearing On Proposed Gas Rate Increase

After a hearing from the Pioneer Natural Gas Co., on increased gas rates for the city, the city commission today postponed a decision until after a discussion session among commissioners, either at an executive session open to the press or at a regular city commission meeting.

Commissioner approved the salary schedule announced in the city budget for the fiscal year 1963-64 and authorized City Manager Harold Schmitzer to advertise for bids on police uniforms and for uniforms for the fire chief, assistant fire chief and fire marshal.

They also authorized the city manager to advertise for bids on five Dempster Dumpster boxes for the sanitation department. These boxes are to be located at the Burger Chef, Wards Minit Mart, two at the Gibson Discount Center and one spare to be used when repair of existing boxes is necessary.

Parents Approve Teenage Court

Parents of Pampa teenagers seem to approve the new system of punishment for teenage traffic offenders initiated in Corporation Court last Saturday by City Judge John Warner.

"Under the new punishment, any student receiving a traffic citation will be required to appear at 9 a.m. Saturday with one or both parents," Judge Warner said. "At that time, if we continue to follow the procedure set last Saturday, there will be a short lecture on traffic safety by a city patrolman. We hope later to use traffic safety films of the Highway Patrol and present a good program on traffic safety."

If the student is a "first offender," he will be given an "opportunity" to pay his fine under the regular fine schedule like an adult or write a 1,000 word theme on traffic safety, according to the judge.

Warner emphasized he is not "picking on teenagers" but is trying to stress the importance of traffic safety. In August, about 78 per cent of the traffic accidents involved teenage drivers.

"That month, we had 39 accidents involving one or more teenagers. That's better than one a day. The estimated damage is..."

Parents Approve Teenage Court

The commissioners approved the plan of the State Highway Department in channeling traffic through the intersection at Hobart, Perryton Parkway and 21st Ave.

Police Chief Jim Conner submitted a letter to the commission stating: "In the afternoon of Monday, Sept. 30, I instructed Buster Collins, pound master, to concentrate his efforts in the south side of the city in an attempt to find dogs running at large at locations where we had received several complaints recently."

Following discussion of items scheduled on the agenda, Commissioner L. P. Fort told the commission it had been called to his attention that the commission had agreed, himself included, that it would consider only those items on the agenda. He said he "had forgotten that was the agreement" and would from here on, include on the agenda items he thought should be discussed and would refrain from discussing items not on the agenda.

Boulders Cause Adventurers To End Expedition

CHIHUAHUA, Mexico (UPI) — The leader of an abortive expedition into the wild Barranca de Cobre country said today boulders "as large as houses" in a treacherous 120 mile river (rio Urrique) forced his party of American adventurers to turn back.

Dr. John L. Cross, 45, of Orem, Utah, who organized the expedition to gain scientific information, said his party of fifteen Americans made it only 10 miles up the river before food ran low.

"I am definitely contemplating another try at the Rio Urrique," he said. "However, if I make another try it will be up another section of the river."

Cross and 13 other persons in his party, including two women, traveled by train during the night from Creel, Mexico, and arrived at Chihuahua early today. James C. Dean of Salt Lake City had staggered to civilization Saturday and said, the expedition might be lost and without food.

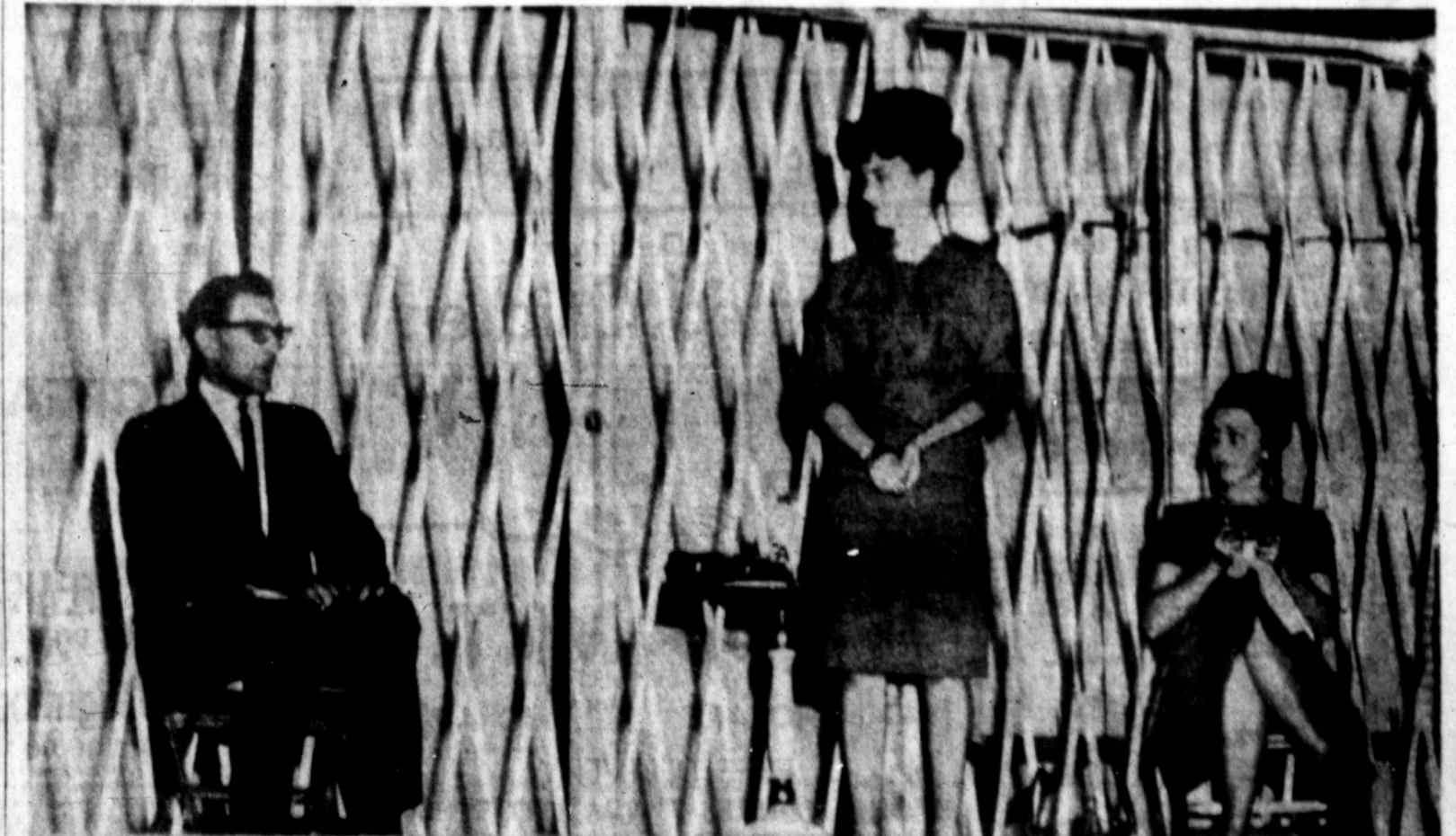

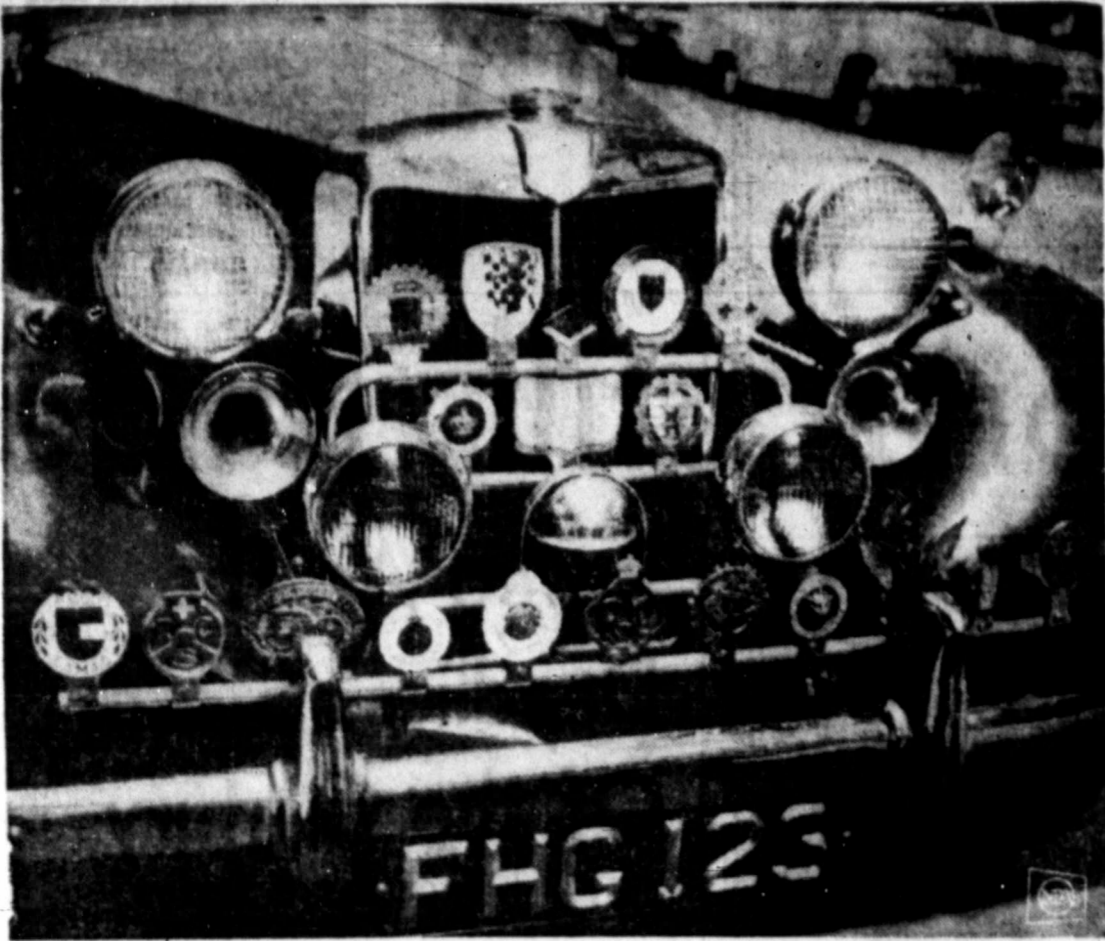

PLACES BLAME

DUBLIN, Ireland (UPI) — The 1961 crash of a U. S. airliner at Shannon Airport which killed 83 persons probably was due to mechanical defects, an official report said Saturday.

The report, by the Irish inspector of accidents, said an inquiry had shown the plane might have had a defective artificial horizon and a fault in the right hand aileron. It said contributory factors could have been unsuitable weather and possibly crew fatigue.

Involving teenage drivers is about \$10,000 a month," he said.
Judge Warner said he believed that parents have paid the majority of student fines and that this method of punishment will be "more effective" in making student drivers realize the importance of safe driving.
Each writer must make a passing grade of 70, or else he will have to re-write the theme and a penalty of 200 words will be added. The themes will be graded on the basis of originality, neatness, content, grammatical construction and spelling.

"I told the students I have a college degree in journalism and am tougher than any English teacher they've ever had," Warner said. "The highest grade ever made was 79. Out of five who have taken the test, three flunked."
He stressed that this is a "research theme, not something they can spend 10 or 15 minutes on and get by."

"The success of this experiment will depend on the parents, and they have indicated they would rather have their students pay their fines this way rather than to shell out the money themselves," Warner said.
According to Warner, about half of the teenagers offenders approached last Saturday, the first day of the new punishment, would rather be "themed" than "fined."
If the experiments works and cuts down on the number of teenage repeaters and accidents, it will continue. If it doesn't work the court will revert to the old system of having teenagers pay fines for traffic offenses, according to Warner.

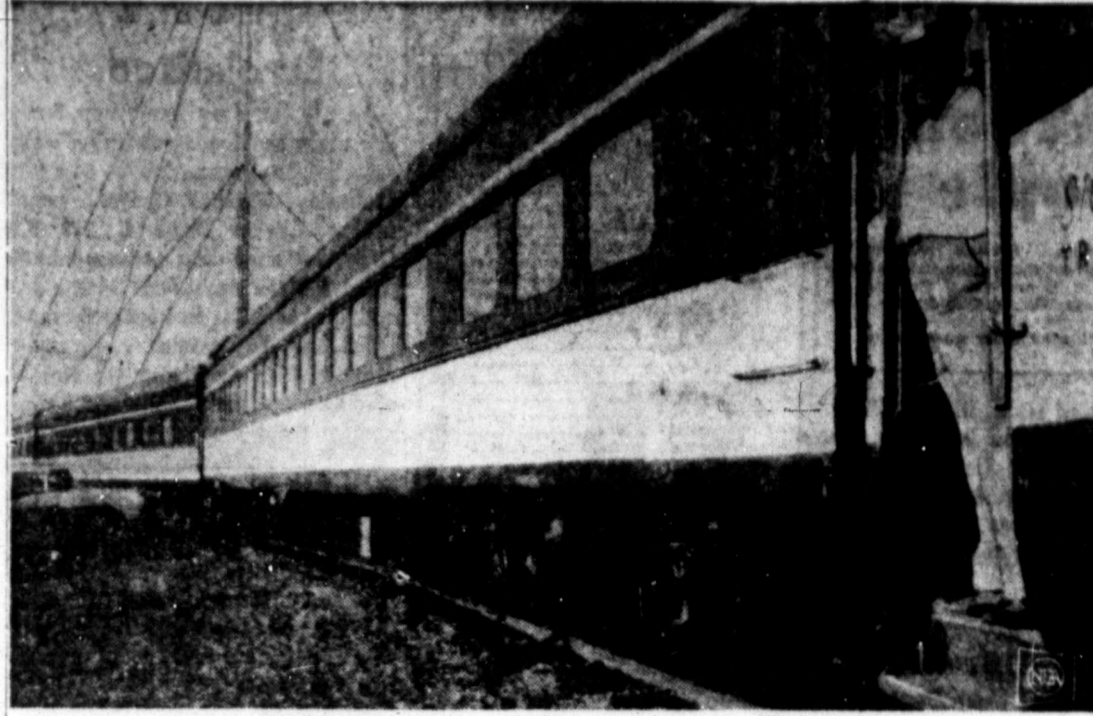

'Police Brutality' Given Statewide Investigation

Editor's note: There has been a flurry of charges recently about "police brutality" in Texas. Two state representatives have asked the House General Investigating Committee to hold an inquiry. Is "police brutality" a problem in Texas and is it getting to be a bigger problem? Here is a statewide look at the situation.

DALLAS (UPI) — "Police brutality?" A former chief criminal sheriff's deputy in McLennan County bristled and his eyes snapped. "I'll tell you about police brutality," he said. "I was a deputy sheriff for eight years and every time we had to subdue a drunk by slapping him, it was brutality. It didn't make any difference how many times he kicked us in

the shins. That was all right. That wasn't brutality. He was protecting himself."
Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Department of Public Safety and the state's highest law enforcement officer, puts it a little more formally: "Far too often the public image of the police is torn down by irresponsible and untrue allegations which are later proved false, but when the deck is cleared it fails to make as big a story as the original charge and may be overlooked entirely."
"There would seem to be little need to tear down the police officer's image in these times when crime is outstripping the population increase 4-1 across the nation."
Ector County Sheriff A. M. (Slim) Gabrel makes about the same point in nine words: "Everybody has civil rights except me and my men."
For the most part, law enforcement officials investigate their own complaints of brutality. They claim that the majority of brutality complaints are made to gain sympathy from the public or a jury.
Draw Conclusions
UPI talked to police chiefs and sheriffs in Texas about charges of police "brutality" and on the basis of the talks can draw these conclusions:
—Every law enforcement body has complaints about "brutality," some as small as "the handcuffs are too tight." Criminal brutality is police, however, far, outweighs police brutality to criminals.
—All sheriffs and police chiefs, if for no other reason than the FBI is always looking over their shoulders, investigate complaints.
—Few brutality complaints hold enough water to get before a grand jury. Grand juries on their own periodically look into brutality charges. A grand jury in Jefferson county reported this week that it had investigated brutality reports and found nothing.
—Police chiefs and sheriffs say they will not tolerate a policeman or deputy who brutalizes prisoners for the sheer joy of it. Occasionally such a man will get a law enforcement job and work a few months before he is found out.
—Most police chiefs and sheriffs in Texas do not want a legislative investigation. They feel they and grand juries can take care of the problem.
Demand Investigation
Two state representatives—Don Brown of Hitchcock and Don Gladden of Fort Worth telegraphed Byron Tunnell, speaker of the House, on Sept. 24 and demanded a general investigating committee report of police brutality in Texas.
Brown charged that "Texas Rangers and Texas city police officers failed to expedite the bringing of prisoners before a magistrate because they took them out and abused them first." He cited the shooting of Henry Nix in Texas City Sept. 28.
Mrs. Lilli Nix accused policemen Joe Stanley and Thomas Mansky of entering her home with out a search warrant last July and beating her. She hired Brown as her lawyer and filed charges. While the grand jury was investigating the matter, Nix was killed with a 22-caliber pistol. Nix had said the grand jury did not believe his testimony.
A justice of the peace ruled that Nix committed suicide.
In Fort Worth Sept. 24, Carswell Smith, 42, a private detective was arrested as a suspect in an interstate theft ring.
A Texas Ranger and two investigators for the district attorney's office questioned Smith and booked him into jail 22 hours after his arrest. The following day he was hospitalized for three broken ribs and various other injuries.
Dist. Atty. Doug Crouch suspended the investigators. Crouch and Police Chief Cato Hightower discussed the case Friday and Hightower said: "It appears that Smith was abused."
The day Smith went to the hospital, Roy Ratley appeared in court for extradition proceedings on a theft charge in Dodge City, Kan. He had a gash on his forehead closed with eight stitches. He charged that the district attorney's chief investigator hit him with a shotgun butt.
Garrison says such charges as this make headlines, but if they are proved false—as often is the case—little attention is paid by the press, radio and television.

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — It has been a difficult few days on television for two of our most prominent organizations, the "Cosa Nostra" and the New York Yankees.

Only their concurrent bad luck on the home screen would cause these two firms to even be mentioned in the same sentence, because so far as I know the only thing they have had in common over the years is effective slugging and good defense.

Nevertheless, even the most impartial television viewer must admit that songbird Joseph Valachi's informing over CBS-TV about his underworld "Cosa Nostra" associates is a better show than the Yankees are offering on NBC-TV in the World Series.

The Yankees were doomed in the first game not when Sandy Koufax of the Los Angeles Dodgers took the mound, but even before — when they had Guy Lombardo and his band play "The Star-Spangled Banner." Lombardo hasn't swung with distinction for years, and his effect on the Yankees was predictable. They stopped, too. The Dodgers get their musical inspiration from Nat (King) Cole and Doris Day.

Likewise, the New York fans are about as exciting as a convention of college economics professors. Anyone who ever frequented the late Ebbets Field in Brooklyn can recall the thrilling anticipation when the National Anthem was delivered by an organ and a lady vocalist who sounded like they were giving the preamble to a free-for-all political ward party.

Yet, the current World Series, which resumes Saturday in Los Angeles, has its benefits. For one thing, it finally gives New York fans a chance to see two major league baseball teams on the field at the same time. For another, the fact that the Yankees have been humbled thus far in two games has meant that Mel Allen, the voice of the team, has been forced to be restrained in his video announcing. His broadcast partner, Vin Scully of the Dodgers, has long since practiced two rules given him by his mentor, Red Barber: Shut up and slow up.

The coast-to-coast playing sites have been difficult on viewers. In the New York games, those in the Far West watch the start of the contests at 10 a.m. When the games emanate from Los Angeles, those in the East will watch starting at 4 p.m., which interferes with cocktail hour.

Still, who would miss any of it? The other day, the wonderful newspaper cartoonist, Interlandi put it "his way with a contented husband sitting before a video set and saying: "I'm no critic, mind you, but the new television season looks promising — the World Series, football, basketball. TV gets better every year."

Needless to say, the Yankees are no more completely washed up than, say, the Cosa Nostra. Nevertheless, television exposure has its effect on public images. The new saying in our neighborhood is: "Break up the Cosa Nostra!"

The Channel Swim: "Ben Casey," which lost to "The Beverly Hillbillies" in the spot ratings last week, beat them this time around. Gene Kelly guests with CBS-TV's Danny Kaye Oct. 23. Lena Horne visits the same network's Judy Garland Oct. 13. Without fanfare, Steve Allen recently toured Russia with his family, and will discuss the trip on his syndicated nightly show starting Oct. 15.

David Susskind, who had headaches getting his English-produced "Hedda Gabler" on CBS-TV, is now hoping to bring a two-hour version of the Russian play "Uncle Vanya" to American "some screens next fall. Among the principal players are Sir Laurence Olivier and Rosemary Harris.

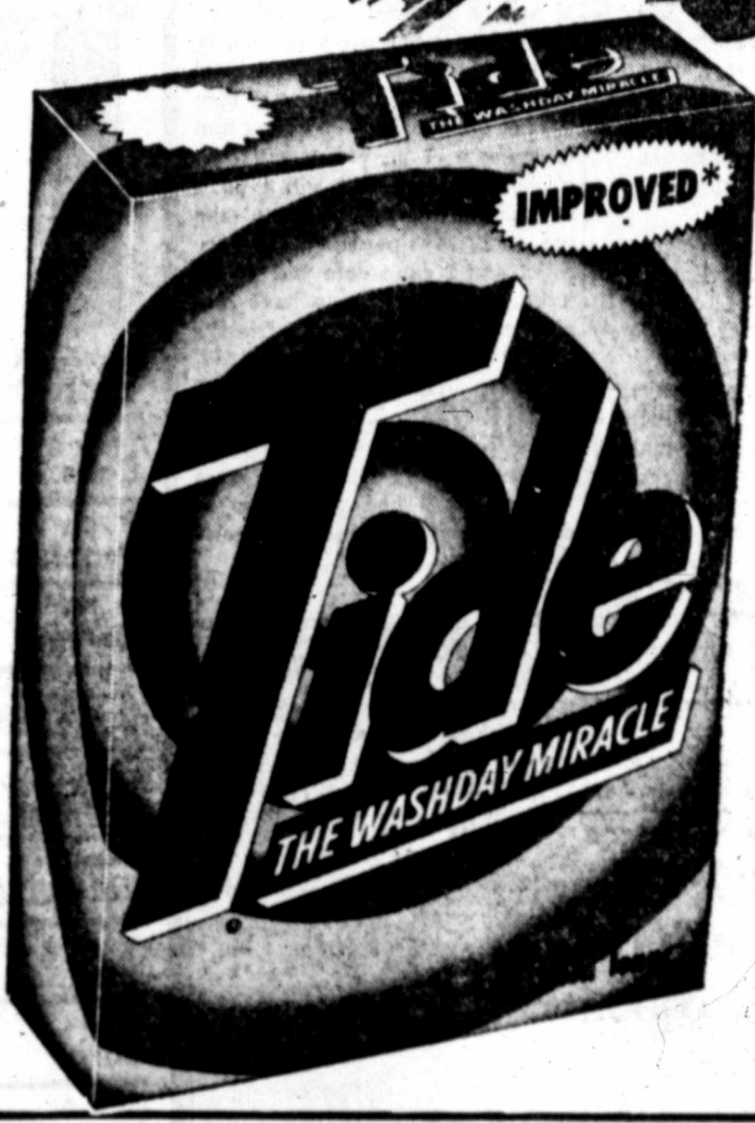

Let Ingenuity Blossom for You When Garden Inconveniently Quits

Sometimes the garden thins out at the most inconvenient times—no flowers for the bridge luncheon is a predicament we face from time to time. Even in a lush growing area such as I live in now, trouble strikes if you've failed to plan ahead. When the roses faded, I had forgotten to plant asters in time to supply flowers for cutting.
A pretty substitute when real flowers fail is a paper topiary tree. A topiary tree may be the familiar ball of foliage atop a slender trunk, or it may be in cone, spiral or layered shape.

A sphere, mounted on a dowel stick and planted in a pot, may be surrounded by real or artificial leaves. Or ring a cone shape with horizontal bands of fluffy flowers in different colors.

Welsh rabbit (often called "rare-bit") is always popular. But let's try another kind of rabbit. This, of course, is made with cheese, too. But also with vegetables and chives. Cheese combines well with a variety of foods. Yes, even with cranberry sauce.

RABBIT OF VEGETABLES (6 Servings)

2 medium onions, sliced thin
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1-3 cup finely chopped green pepper
3 cups diced tomatoes
2 teaspoons salt
1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
1 tablespoon sugar
1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
2 tablespoons white vinegar
2 teaspoons chopped chives
2 teaspoons chopped parsley
1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese
6 eggs, well beaten
6 slices buttered toast
Parsley or paprika for garnish
Sauté onions in butter or margarine. Add green pepper, tomatoes, seasonings and vinegar. Cook until tender, stirring occasionally. Blend in chives, parsley and cheese, cook 2 minutes. Stir in beaten eggs. Cook, slowly, until done (2 or 3 minutes), stirring constantly.
Serve on buttered toast. Garnish with parsley or paprika.

CHEESE-CRANBERRY SANDWICHES (6 Sandwiches)

2 (5-ounce) jars Old English cheese spread
2-3 cup whole berry cranberry sauce
3 tablespoons chopped walnuts
Spread each bread slice with 4 teaspoons cheese spread, making sure that it completely covers the bread. Combine cranberry sauce and nuts; place about 2 tablespoons of cranberry mixture on top of the cheese on half the bread slices. Top with remaining bread slices, cheese side down.

Foreign News Commentary

Among those assigned to watch the twists and turns of Communist foreign policy there is at present a wonder whether Red China is making some attempt to change her image as the great advocate of war.

The speculation arises from a statement last Sept. 18 by Liu Shao-chi, president of Communist China and Mao Tse-tung's chosen successor. Visiting North Korea, he said: "It is impermissible for any socialist country to be the first to use nuclear weapons under any circumstances."

The speculation received further impetus on Oct. 1 from a speech delivered by Peking Mayor Peng Chen at a parade marking the 14th anniversary of the founding of the Chinese Communist Republic.

He said world war could be prevented through united effort and "concerted struggle" by the peoples of the world, including those of the United States...
Cast Different Light

Both statements seemed designed to cast a different light on Chinese foreign policy which has held that force is the only means of settling differences with the Western world and that in the event of nuclear war it would be the Communists who would inherit the earth.

Since previous attempts over the last 20 years to forecast day-to-day turns of Communist policy have been markedly unsuccessful, it would be a mistake now to take statements by even two such high officials to mean that Red China is changing its coat.

But as items of temporary expediency they may have some meaning. This stems from what is known of Red China's own internal situation.

Heavy Industry Failure
Red China's "great leap forward" in 1958, with its emphasis on heavy industry was a known failure.

Official statements, reports in Chinese newspapers and the accounts of travellers coming out of Red China all indicate that the present darlings of the Chinese bosses are agriculture and light industry in that order.

Since heavy industry is recognized as the key to any nation's ability to wage all-out war, this would mean that Red China is moving away from the possibility of any immediate threat to world peace.
