A white-haired, fragile-appearing country doctor has taken over the job of proving that Argentina can exist as a practicing democracy.

Illia, under whom Argentina returned last week to constitutional government. His chances for success will depend in large part upon the control he is able to exercise over Argentina's military factions on the one hand and the followers of former dictator Juan D. Peron on the other.

For the more than 10 years since Peron's fall, the two groups have kept the nation in

an unceasing state of turmoil. From the vantage point of a recent visit to Argentina, it is possible to predict that President Illia is in for some lumps at home and at least occasional clashes with the United States. For one thing, he has been accused of being a rabid Argentine nationalist. He already has announced plans to annul the foreign oil contracts which helped to make Argentina self-

supporting in oil. These will be taken over by the state-owned Y.P.F. Oil Company. He also has been accused of being pro-Communist. This he denies, but he believes Communists should have the right to organize and express their views. The Venezuelan regime of President Romulo Betancourt

held similar views in its earlier days and learned the hard way that Communist expression of views comes in violence and in unceasing conspiracy against existing order. The view is certain to bring him into conflict with Argentina's military and suggests a leniency toward Castro's Cuba which will not endear him to the United States. The enormity of his task at

home is illustrated by the fact that Argentina's deficit this year will run to around \$200 million, that economic development is at a standstill and that unemployment in a country of around 21 million now is estimated at around the million mark. The two sorest spots in the Argentine economy are the state-owned railroads and the Y.P.F. Oil Company.

Among other things, Illia has promised "efficient administration" of the railroads, a task no Argentine leader before him has been able to accomplish. Like the Y.P.F. company, the railroads are heavily feather-bedded. The railroad deficit this year will just about equal the national deficit of around \$200 million.

Open House Is Set At Abilene School

ABILENE (Sp.) — The new \$850,000 hospital and seven new air conditioned dormitories under construction at the Abilene State School for mentally retarded will be open for inspection Friday, according to L. W. Cain, superintendent. Open house tours will be conducted throughout the day with school personnel and volunteers available to answer questions. The school is one of six special schools in Texas operated under the authority of the state of Texas that provides residential care and training for over 2,000 mentally retarded persons, including 45 persons from Gray County. The school serves over 115 counties of West Texas, employs over 600 people and has an annual operating budget of more than \$2,800,000. The Abilene State School has 42 dormitories for its residents, who range in age from six to 86 and are grouped according to age as well as physical and mental ability. About 263 houseparents, working on three eight-hour shifts a day, are employed to care for the students. The school operates an academic program within the institutional community and employs 17 special teachers in addition to recreational workers and arts and crafts instructors. About 400 children between the ages of six and 18 are in the school, which follows procedures similar to any other independent school district. provided monthly through the local Catholic organization. Volunteer workers supplementing the work of employees give about 2,000 hours each month and have opened this year an additional recreational facility, the Enchanted Barn. The Abilene State School is an old facility with a new purpose. An act of the legislature of 1901 established a "Branch Asylum" to be known as the "Epileptic Colony" on 640 acres of land donated by Abilene. The name was changed to the Abilene State Hospital in 1925. In 1957, the institution was changed by the legislature to a school for the training and care of the mentally retarded.

John, a graduate of Pampa High School, is enrolled in the cosmetology department and in nine months will be eligible to take the Colorado State Board Examinations to become a licensed beauty operator and cosmetologist.

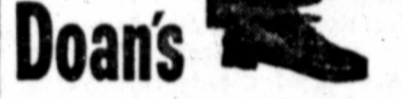

The cities are San Francisco, Boston, Pittsburgh, Baltimore and Cleveland, and the taped production was seen in these locales over the stations of the enterprising Westinghouse Broadcasting organization, that put up about \$60,000 of the show's \$100,000 cost. The play was "The Advocate," the story of the change in a blueblood lawyer who tries to appeal the famous 1920s case of Sacco and Vanzetti, two poor Italian anarchists who eventually were executed for murder in a Massachusetts payroll robbery though many felt the convictions were the result of anti-radical feeling. Since the play was telecast in only five cities — "only" in this case meaning a potential audience of 7,500,000 persons — the main interest to the country-at-large was in how it was done. To begin with, the production, complete with intermissions for informative material, lasted about two-and-a-half hours. Here in San Francisco, it was shown in the prime hours of 7:30-10, pre-empting a valuable list of popular programs. The three acts were presented without interruptions between scenes. The commercials — there were sponsors — came only at the start and during intermissions. Henry Fonda, sitting in an empty theater, was the host, acting as a combination theatre program (with bits about the play and players) and also shilling it up a bit, which could easily have been done without. He might also have avoided the gee-whiz remarks about opening night atmosphere.

The video version of the "The Advocate" was taped recently so it could be adapted to the needs of the home medium, but it was said there were no changes in action or dialogue. Westinghouse hopes to make up its costs by syndicating the play to other cities. The experiment was, of course, precedent-shattering; never before had a television audience seen, for free, a play during its Broadway run. Last year, Paddy Chayefsky's "Gideon" was shown in Rochester, N.Y., in a pay-TV venture. And a closed-circuit firm, Sportsvision Inc., is reported planning for later this season a live telecast of a Broadway comedy, "Fetch Me a Figleaf," for paying audiences in about 200 theatres across the nation. As for Monday night's play itself, on television it was not until the last act, when the attorney who had lived quietly by the law suddenly burst with anger at what he felt was injustice, that "The Advocate" struck home emotionally. Since the outcome of the Sacco-Vanzetti case is well-known, plot suspense was absent from the start, and soaring character portrayals were therefore the chief need. But for a good part of the time, the video version appeared to be a victim of its own coolly legalistic, pamphlet-documentary approach as embodied in James Daly, who portrayed the lawyer. One had the impression that the missing theatricality on television was perhaps more in evidence in the theatre production, and perhaps more impressive there. However, more important than the various merits of the show is the unquestionable merit of the Westinghouse experiment, which was worthy in the highest sense, and deserves encouragement and thanks.

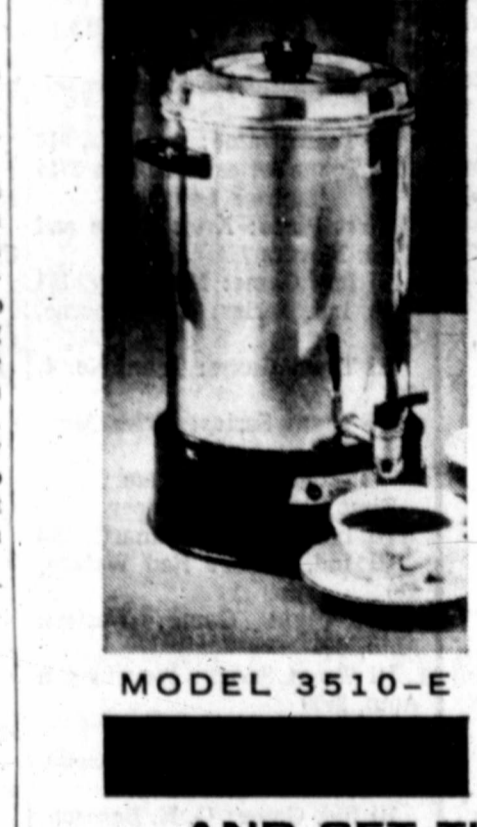

Memphis State Stonewall Defense Invades Canyon

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (Sp)—High scoring West Texas State is the next hurdle for Memphis State's undefeated football team.

The once-tied Tigers journey to Canyon this weekend to meet the once-beaten Buffaloes. Gametime is 2:30 p.m. Saturday.

The first meeting of these two teams should provide some interesting contrasts. A week ago West Texas was the No. one rushing team and No. four scoring team in the U.S.

Memphis State, although not ranked by NCAA statistics, has kept its goal line relatively clean. Tigers regulars have yielded only one touchdown from scrimmage.

MSU has allowed four opponents an average of 5.5 points and 94.5 yards rushing. Against this defense, West Texas will throw an offense that has averaged 28 points and 300 yards rushing.

Obviously, something will have to give.

The West Texas attack will suffer some if Pistol Pete Pedro is not ready for Saturday action. The top rusher in the nation, Pedro may miss the game with an injured knee.

Memphis State, on the other hand, hopes to have its forces 100 percent ready. That would mean tailback Don McClard, who missed the North Texas game, will be available.

North Texas has been a common opponent, and if comparative scores mean anything, Saturday's game will be close. MSU whipped the Eagles 21-0, and West Texas beat them by an almost identical margin, 38-16.

The victory over North Texas was the Tigers' second shutout of the year, and coach Billy (Spook) Murphy thought his defense did a good job containing the Eagles' fleet backs.

North Texas penetrated MSU territory only once, and had a field goal blocked on that occasion.

"Overall, it was a pretty good effort by our boys," reflected Murphy. "We pretty well dominated the game and didn't give North Texas too much room to operate."

"But we're not satisfied. We know we'll have to play better at Canyon Saturday to beat West Texas. They have a dangerous football team and we'll have our hands full."

Shockers Choice Over Plainview B

Despite coach Don Myers' insistence that the Plainview Red Dogs are a real tough crew, the Pampa Shockers will be heavily favored to continue undefeated in B team play tomorrow at 4 p.m. when they host the Plainview B at Harvester Stadium.

Plainview has failed to score a point this season in district play, while three loop opponents have rolled up an even 100 points against them; Monterey 46-0, Lubbock 32-0, C A Brock 22-0.

I think he's a fine boy and a great athlete. If OU had won the Texas game, Joe Don would still have been on the football team." Oklahoma lost 28-7 to Texas.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Bache & Co. says the economy remains at a high level and "despite the age of the current period of expansion, there are few if any signs of deterioration."
 "While we don't anticipate any run-away boom or expansion, taking into consideration the fact that 1964 is an election year and the administration will make every effort to keep the economy moving, we feel it is reasonable to assume the economy will show moderate growth in 1964," Bache said.
 Investors Research Co. says despite the warning signals that have been flashing in the past few weeks, "there has been little serious price weakness in the industrial average or the market's leading groups. Even the speculative high-flyers have recovered rather well. Under these conditions investment accounts may continue to hold a fully invested position."
 Shearson, Hammill & Co. believes there are strong reasons for expecting new highs in a great many stocks in coming months. "There is every indication that the economy will continue to expand and that corporate profits will reach new peaks in the months ahead. The prospective tax cut rising business capital expenditures and rising wholesale prices should make for a favorable investment environment," it said.
