FBI Arrests Two on Soviet Spy Charges

Burglar Confesses He Killed Midland Woman

Man Says He Beat Her With Fists

MIDLAND, Tex. (UPI) — A muscular young man sat somberly in his jail cell today facing murder charges in the bludgeoning of the socialite wife of a Texas millionaire oilman-sportsman.

Police said James Lee Marion, 22, a Negro, confessed he dragged Mrs. Fred Turner Jr., screaming from a balcony into her bedroom and beat her to death with his fists and pistols she had wielded.

Marion, a shortorder cook, said Mrs. Turner, 66, surprised him while he was burglarizing her \$500,000 home. He quoted her as saying, "I'm going to kill you," and said he attacked her after she fired a .38 automatic pistol wildly.

"I was looking for money," Marion said. The 5-foot-4, 150-pound man said he had been drinking heavily. Two officers said he waved a pistol at them menacingly when he fled the victim's home.

Turner, whose horse Tomy Lee won the 1959 Kentucky Derby, learned of the slaying when he returned home from a trip to his Las Vegas, N. M. ranch.

The couple's daughter, Mrs. Clarence Scharbauer, Jr., was knocked unconscious by the attacker when he fled the mansion. Marion was arrested Tuesday. (See BURG-LAR, Page 3)

So People May Know:

Congress Urged To Okay Freedom Of Information

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Three press representatives urged Congress Tuesday to approve the "freedom of information" bill as a means to curtail what they said were government attempts to withhold information.

The group testified at a Senate subcommittee hearing on a bill that would give the public and press greater access to government reports and provide for court appeals in cases where records were denied.

Endorsing the legislation were Eugene S. Pulliam, assistant publisher of the Indianapolis Star who spoke for the American Newspaper Publishers Association; Creed C. Black, vice president and executive editor of the Wilmington, Del., Morning News and Evening Journal, on behalf of the American Society of Newspaper Editors, and Henry T. Simmons of Newsweek Magazine.

Pulliam objected to current procedures which he said allow a government agency to keep information secret for such reasons as "good cause found" or "in the public interest." He said agencies also arbitrarily decide to make matters available only to "persons properly and directly concerned."

Liver Transplant Patient Succumbs

DENVER (UPI)—Mrs. Jeanne Marie Goodfellow, 29, died yesterday after surviving a record 23 days with a new liver.

Walter Noakes, assistant director of Colorado General Hospital, said Mrs. Goodfellow's body apparently "rejected" her transplanted liver as foreign.

All previous liver transplant recipients also died, but from blood clotting or blood malfunctions.

House Action on Civil Rights Bill Month Off

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The civil rights bill that President Kennedy wants was on the track today but House passage of the bipartisan measure still was a month or more away.

The Senate may not get to act on the bill until next year. The bill approved, 23-11, by the House Judiciary Committee Tuesday would seek to end racial discrimination in voting, education, employment and private business offering the necessities of life to the public. It also would give broad new powers to the government to combat discrimination.

Kennedy, who took a personal hand in the delicate negotiations which produced the bipartisan bill, said in a statement that the measure "will provide the basis for men of good will in every city in our land to work together to resolve their racial problems within a framework of law and justice."

However, it was unlikely that the President expected the bill—the most sweeping civil rights proposal of the century—to whistle through the House even with leadership backing.

Other racial developments: Jackson, Miss.: Testimony continues in a state court today on a petition by city officials for a permanent injunction against racial demonstrations. Police officials said Tuesday that demonstrations which resulted in the arrest of more

than 1,000 Negroes last summer threatened to spark widespread violence in the Mississippi capital.

Omaha, Neb.: More than 2,000 Negroes marched on city hall Tuesday to protest the city council's failure to pass open housing legislation. Police kept the crowd under control.

Philadelphia, Pa.: White policeman John Tourigian was "relieved of duty" Tuesday pending an official investigation into his fatal shooting of a Negro theft suspect. A meeting protesting the slaying led to a riot by several hundred Negroes Monday night.

Postal Pay Hike Nears Approval

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Post Office and Civil Service Committee was reported ready today to approve a \$650 million pay increase for 1.8 million federal employees, including a \$10,000 salary boost for members of Congress.

Congressional informants said the new proposal would provide a 6 per cent increase to rank and file federal classified and postal workers. Members of Congress, the President's cabinet and federal judges would be given a \$10,000 annual increase.

Pampa Jaycees and JayCee-Ettes will sponsor and chaperone a teenage Halloween dance from 7:30 to 10 p.m. tomorrow night in the Pampa Youth and Community Center.

Music for the sock-hop hootenanny will be provided by the Blue Ridge Mountaineers, a five-man combo that plays Blue Grass music and will entertain with comedy skits between numbers.

Band members are Glen Foster, fiddle; Pat Lee, of Lefors, guitar; Jody Grubb, banjo; Bill Hoover, bass fiddle and M. E. Gifford, singer and guitar player. All except Lee are of Pampa.

They specialize in mountain folk songs, love songs, comedy and religious folk music.

"This is the second Jaycee sponsored Halloween dance," George Kilcrease Jr., dance chairman, said. "We had about 300 teenagers last year and expect about 400 this year. We have a rule that once a teenager leaves the dance he can't come back in because we find that following this rule helps to keep the dance orderly."

Funeral Rites Held in Marlin For Tom Connally

MARLIN, Tex. (UPI)—A funeral service in an old-fashioned church was held today for former U.S. Sen. Tom Connally, who considered the world his community.

Connally left Marlin 46 years ago as a country politician and became one of the nation's most colorful and powerful statesmen.

The funeral was set for 2 p.m. in First Methodist Church, which Connally used to attend. The church's pastor, the Rev. Asbury Lenox, was to conduct the service.

Connally's grave was dug in Cavalry Cemetery, beside the grave of his first wife, who died in 1935.

Connally died of pneumonia Monday in Washington at the age of 86. His second wife, the widow of the late Tex. Sen. Morris Sheppard, was with him when he expired.

Colorful Speaker
A Democrat, Connally was noted for his sharp tongue, his florid oratory, his wing collar and his long, white hair, flowing from beneath the broad brim of a black hat.

In death, Connally was a shadow of the figure he presented as a senator. Most of his hair was gone; he was wan and thin. The body was dressed in a gray suit with a conventional collar and a black bow tie.

His gray stevedore's coffin was flown from Washington to Houston Tuesday. A hearse from the Barnes Adams Funeral Home brought the body from Houston to Marlin.

A constant stream of old friends, many with tears trickling down their cheeks, viewed the body of "Old Tawm." Adams said "there's no way to tell" how many paid their respects while the body was lying in state.

The red brick, steeped church will seat 600. An overflowing crowd was expected by Adams who said Connally "had lots of friends."

Father of Judge
Connally had a son by his first wife. The son is U.S. Dist. Judge Ben Connally of Houston. The former senator also is survived by a sister, Mrs. Sparks McKay of Tyler, Tex. Active pallbearers are his nephews.

Honorary pallbearers, all lifelong friends, include U.S. Dist. Judge Ben H. Rice Jr. of Waco; J. Percy Rice, a Dallas lawyer; Luther A. Johnson of Corsicana, a former Texas congressman and U.S. tax court judge; Sparks McKay, a brother-in-law; cotton man Burris Jackson of Hillsboro and five residents of Marlin.

The Marlin residents are Walton Taylor, Roy Edins, Terry Dickens, Raymond Barnett and F. M. Burkhead.

New Quiz Opened By Sen. Williams

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. John J. Williams, R-Del., the Senate's tireless one-man investigation bureau, was launched on a new probe today even before an earlier inquiry had quite got under way.

Williams appeared before a closed-door session of the Senate Rules Committee Tuesday to give its members a rundown on the "outside activities" of former Senate Democratic Secretary Robert G. (Bobby) Baker, who resigned his \$19,600-a-year job Oct. 8. It is the target of a conflict of interest investigation.

Soon after his committee appearance Williams spoke on the Senate floor and accused the administration of hushing up the tax difficulties of a State Department official who was allowed to "submit a quiet investigation."

Williams cited the resignation Aug. 14 of Herbert K. May, deputy assistant secretary for inter-American affairs. He said May failed to file any federal income tax returns for eight years, and was delinquent on returns for five other years.

Texas Voters to Decide on Four Amendments at Nov. 9 Election

All voters in Texas, including those in Gray County, who have their poll tax or poll tax exemption, will be eligible to vote for or against four amendments to the state constitution during the special amendment election Saturday, Nov. 9.

Absentee voting started Oct. 21 and ends Nov. 5. Charlie Thut, county clerk, said, "Voters have to come to the county clerk's office in the Court House to vote absentee and should bring their poll tax or exemption."

According to Thut, under the new state election law, absentee ballots cannot be cast after the county clerk's office hours,

ENGLEWOOD, N. J. (UPI) — FBI agents arrested an American engineer and a Russian chauffeur Tuesday night on charges of passing classified data to members of the Soviet delegation to the United Nations.

The American, John William Butenko, 38, and the Russian, Igor A. Ivanov, 33, today were ordered held under \$10,000 bail each on espionage charges. Both men pleaded innocent at their pre-dawn arraignment.

Two members of the Soviet delegation to the United Nations also were detained, but released because they had diplomatic immunity.

The four men were seized at the Englewood railroad station together with a brief case full of Air Force contract secrets.

The FBI said their meeting at the parking lot of the railroad station was the last in a series that went at least as far back as April 21, 1963. All were observed by FBI agents.

Top Secret Clearance
Butenko, of Russian parentage, had top secret clearance giving him access to highly-classified information about an Air Force contract with his employer, the International Electric Corp. of Paramus, N.J. His \$14,700-a-year job was to maintain a master schedule concerning the contract.

The bespectacled electrical engineer complained at his arraignment before U.S. Commissioner Theodore Piscaras in Rutherford about photographers snapping his picture.

"They took enough, haven't they?" he said to federal officials. "If they keep on taking pictures they're going to ruin my life."

But Ivanov, showing an initial tattoo on his left hand, posed willingly.

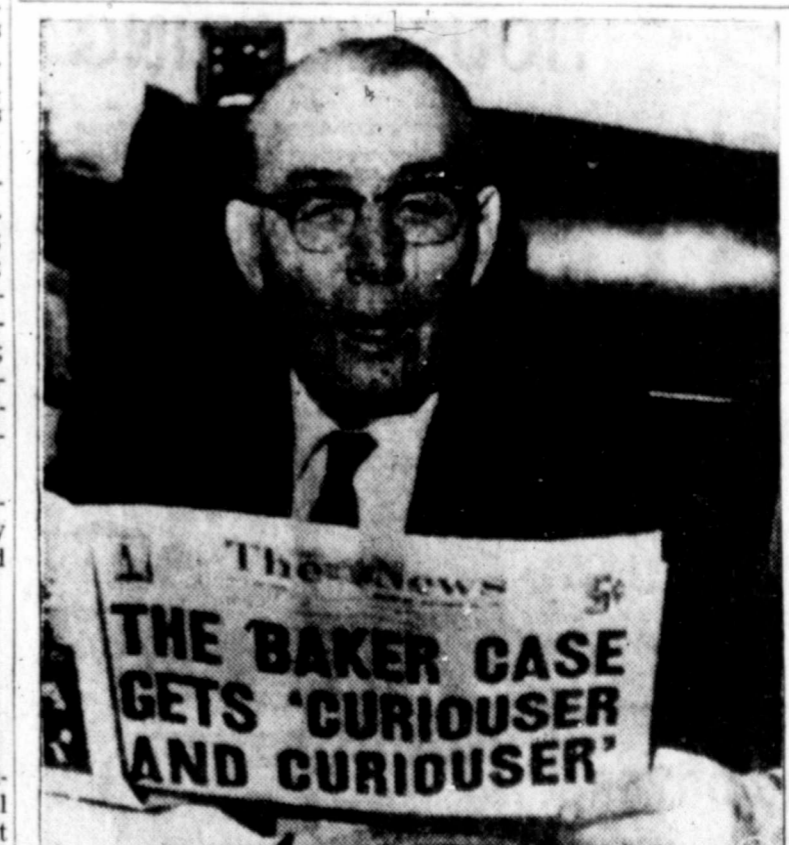
When FBI men seized the Russian's car after his rendezvous with the engineer had ended, they found Butenko's briefcase in the rear seat. They also found a camera equipped to operate from the car's cigarette lighter.

Detained Briefly
Yuri A. Romashin, 30, the third secretary of the Soviet U.N. mission, and Gleb A. Pavlov, 39, an attaché at the mission, were detained briefly after they joined the engineer and the chauffeur at the railroad station. Romashin had failed in his role as a lookout.

The FBI told of four previous meetings, all in Bergen County, suburbs. During each, it said, Butenko's brief case passed from his car to the Russian's.

The first occurred on April 21 in Butenko's car in the parking lot of a food store in Closter, the second of May 26, a Sunday, in a Closter restaurant, the third the following day at a restaurant in Fort Lee, just across the George Washington Bridge from Manhattan, and the fourth on Sept. 24 behind a hamburger stand in Paramus.

Another Russian mentioned by the FBI as taking part in the earlier meetings was Vladimir I. Olenev, who lives at the Russian mission in New York.

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Execution Stay Again Extended

AUSTIN (UPI)—The State Board of Pardons and Paroles and Gov. John Connally today extended the stay of execution of convicted murderers Leslie Ashley and Carolyn Lima until Dec. 28.

The Houston pair was sentenced to die in the electric chair for the 1961 murder of Houston real estate man Fred Tones during a sex party at Tones' office.

Last May the U.S. 5th Circuit Court reversed the convictions and ordered a new trial, but Harris County Dist. Atty. Frank Brisco appealed that ruling to the U.S. Supreme Court.

The Board of Pardons and Paroles said it extended the stay of execution to give the supreme court time to rule. The original stay expired today.

Maritime Allies Hit U.S. Stand On Wheat Deal

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States' insistence that American ships be given priority to carry any U.S. wheat to Russia is drawing fire not only from the Russians but from America's maritime allies as well.

Diplomatic sources say that Japan, Norway, Denmark, Sweden and Britain have all—formally or informally, and through various diplomatic channels—complained to the United States over the "American bottoms" requirement.

At the same time, the rule has snagged Soviet wheat-buying negotiations with at least one major U.S. wheat trading firm. A Russian delegation, headed by Leonid Matveyev, met with officials of this firm. One of the Americans described the meeting later as an "impasse."

The Russians wanted to purchase wheat but said they would not pay what they saw as "extra charges" for American shipping. U.S. shipping rates are about \$10 a ton higher than foreign rates for delivery to Black Sea or Baltic ports.

Gas Producers Get Warning on Price Regulation

DALLAS (UPI)—Ed Parkes, president of the American Gas Association, warned natural gas producers yesterday that the production segment of the industry "may be forced to live with regulation" prices by the government.

Parkes, of Shreveport, La., president of United Gas Corp., spoke at the final business session of the Independent Petroleum Association of America (IPAA).

By regulation, Parkes meant attempts by the Federal Power Commission to find a formula for setting well head prices on natural gas.

The FPC now uses an area pricing formula. The IPAA fights well head price setting on the grounds it cannot be done fairly.

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Space Adviser Thinks Russia Was 'Spoofing'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A national he commented on leading space adviser to President Kennedy believes Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's recent space statement was an attempt to slow down the U.S. lunar project, rather than a Soviet withdrawal from the space race.

Dr. Edward C. Welsh said Tuesday that the Russians have a "strong space program and are concentrating on it. There is nothing in this (Khrushchev's remarks) to indicate otherwise and no reason to believe they are slackening."

Welsh is executive secretary of the National Aeronautics and Space Council which advises President Kennedy on U.S. space programs. In an interview with United Press Inter-

Space Chief Asked For Realignment Of U.S. Program

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A Republican member of the House Space Committee said yesterday that U.S. security will be in danger if the United States continues to race to the moon while the Russians concentrate on military space objectives.

Rep. James D. Weaver, R-Pa., said in a House speech that a "space gap" like this already has developed. He said Russia, which has announced its withdrawal from the moon race, chalked up 375 hours of manned space flight compared with America's 53 1/2 hours.

"While the administration was dazzling the public by moon glow, Soviet subterfuge has been concentrating on the potential military values of space domination of the near-earth area," Weaver declared.

He said U.S. space chief James E. Webb "has a responsibility to present to this Congress and the nation a realignment of our space program with national security as its prime objective."

"If he cannot do this effectively, I shall call for his resignation," Weaver told the House.

Encourage U.S. Reduction
Welsh said Khrushchev's comments were an attempt to encourage a reduction in U.S. space efforts so that Russia might maintain any competitive edge it believes it may have. "He would maintain this advantage on the basis of a slowdown on our part rather than a speedup on his."

He added that Khrushchev's remarks were made when Congress was considering the appropriation bill for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).

Rep. Olin E. Teague, second ranking Democrat on the House Space Committee, said that Khrushchev's remarks ought to be ignored, and that the U.S. space program should not be changed.

The Texas congressman added, "I wouldn't trust Khrushchev, even if he swore on a stack of Bibles as high as the Kremlin."

Points Out Keys

After a close review of Khrushchev's statement, Welsh said there were two key sentences: "At the present time we are not planning flights of cosmonauts to the moon."

"We do not wish to compete in sending people to the moon without thorough preparation."

To Welsh, the Soviet leader's statement "did not say Russia would not compete with us on going to the moon." What he did say was that Russia would not dispatch men to the moon without careful advance planning, Welsh said.

"The inference he apparently wished to leave," Welsh said, "was that the United States may be willing to risk lives by going ahead hastily but that the Russians won't go until they're ready."

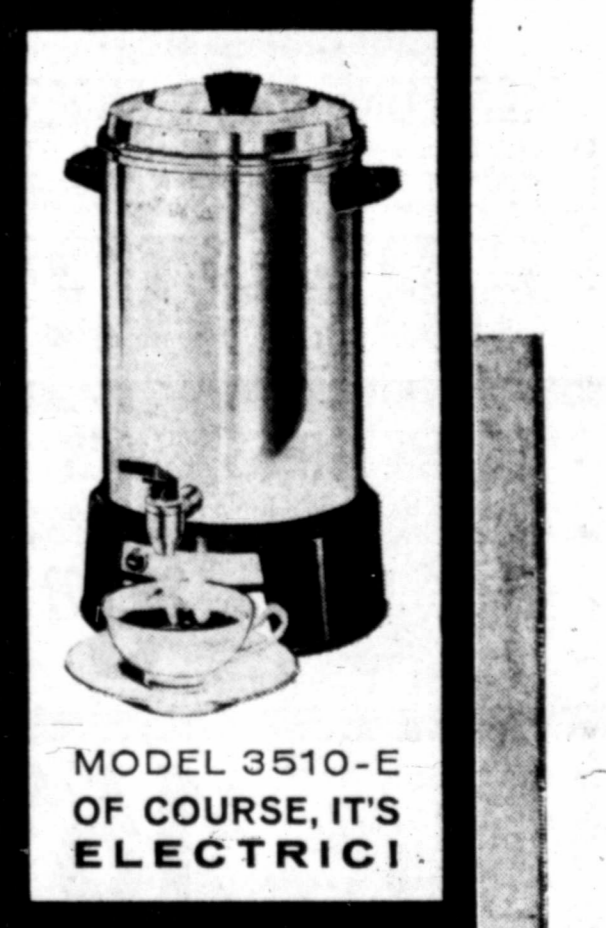

day covering in the attic of a nearby garage.

Sheriff's officers said today Marion, held in absence of \$10,000 bond, was glum in his cell and "hasn't said anything to any of us." He confessed to investigators and talked briefly with newsmen.

Back Door Smashed
Sheriff Ed Darnell said the Turners' cook found the back door of the home smashed and called Scharbauer, who called the West Texas sheriff, and a deputy. The daughter and son-in-law found the body.

"They both came running down the stairs to tell me she was dead," Darnell said. "Mrs. Scharbauer went into the library to sit down."

The sheriff said the suspect was hiding in the room at the time and "hit her over the right eye with his pistol." Darnell said the stocky Negro held the two officers at bay with the pistol and fled.

Forty officers, including Texas Rangers, began a city-wide search. Russ Craddock, a neighbor, discovered Marion in his attic, which was converted into a chemical laboratory, and called officers.

Pistol in Belt
Marion, with a .38 automatic pistol stuck in his belt, surrendered meekly to policeman B. G. Graham about noon Tuesday. The slaying apparently occurred about 4 a.m. and the body was found at 8 a.m. Marion, in his confession, said he entered the house at 11:30 p.m. Monday.

Peace Justice David M. Ellis said Mrs. Turner died of massive head injuries. She had not been shot, he ruled. The body was found sprawled across a bed covered with an expensive bedspread.

The Turners, prominent in West Texas, raced horses throughout the nation. Their Tomy Lee nosed out Sword Dancer in the 1959 Kentucky Derby and another thoroughbred, Sir Ribot, placed fourth in the 1962 derby.

Texas Congressman Says Colleague 'Slugged' Him

Foreman said he was not hurt and that he did not retaliate. Instead he told reporters he admonished Gonzales as follows: "Henry, I believe you have lost your mind. I can't imagine an intelligent adult and a member of Congress doing a thing like that."

Foreman said he then stepped back into the House chamber and Gonzalez left.

Foreman said he replied, "well, Henry, why don't you get started."

Rep. Miller, R-N. Y., told Tarrant County Republicans at a \$25-a-plate fund raising dinner that the party has been strong in broad areas of the country, but has failed to win out because of Democratic-controlled political machines in the larger cities.

Miller said a survey showed that in some 10,000 voting precincts from Virginia to Maine, only 10 per cent had Republican officials. But he said the situation was being "corrected."

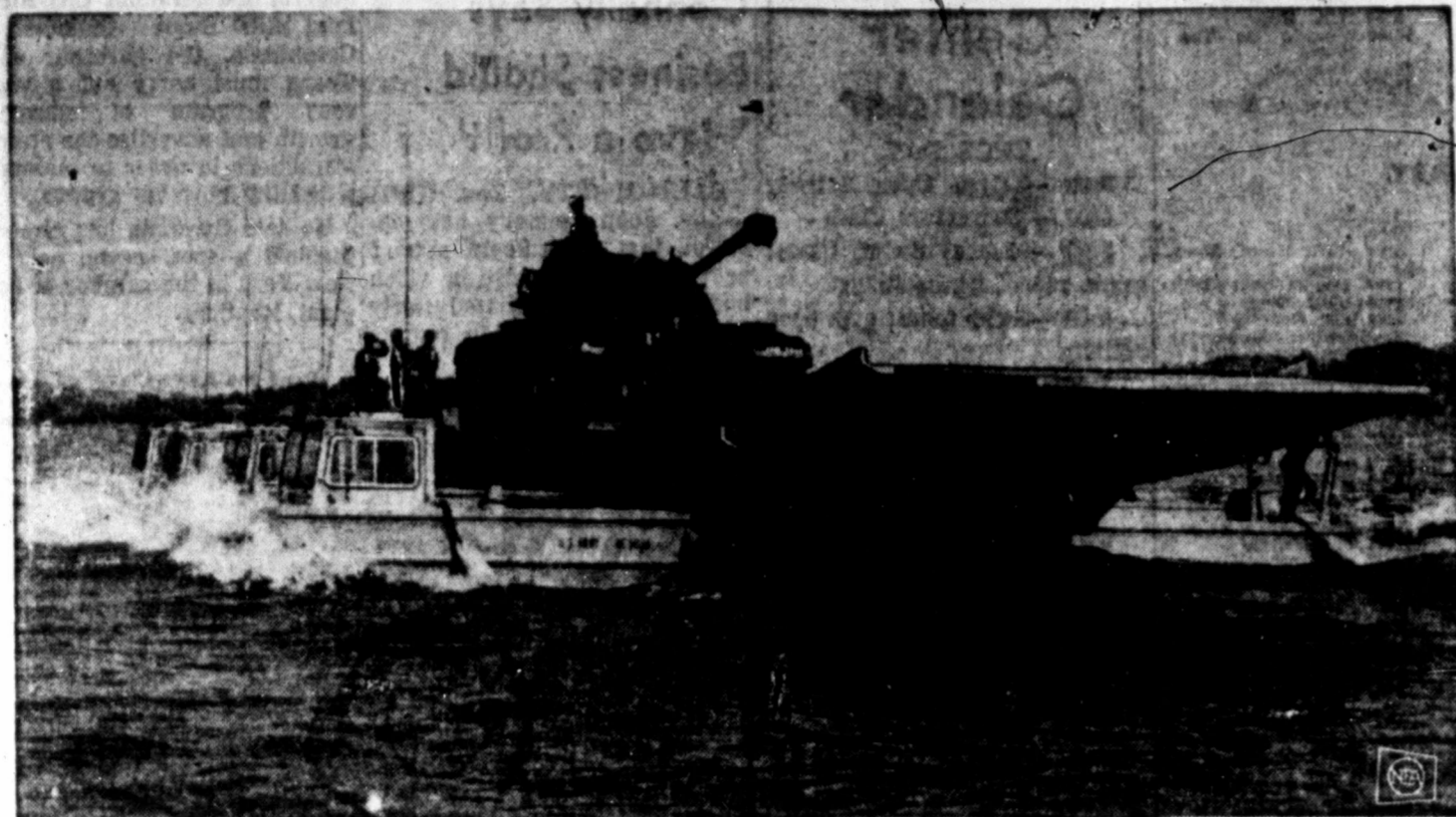

U.S. Planning to Bring Back More Overseas Troops

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Defense Department hopes to bring some U.S. forces home from Europe, but they won't be the six divisions now in Germany about which there has been so much uproar.

Authoritative sources said today they would come instead from Air Force units presently based in Britain, France and Spain.

Officials said the development of longer-range tactical aircraft plus the lessons of "Operation Big Lift," in which supporting air units as well as troops were whisked to Germany for maneuvers, opened up new concepts for air defense of Europe.

Cites 'Rotation'
U.S. air bases in Europe, and probably in other parts of the world, can be maintained by greatly reduced staffs, officials said. Combat air units can be rushed in when necessary or can be "rotated" between home and abroad on duty tours of several months' duration.

Liberal Dems To Carry Fight On Districting

HOUSTON (UPI)—Five liberal Democrats who think cities are getting the short end of representation in the state legislature will go to court Nov. 8 for preliminaries in their federal court redistricting suit.

The same three-judge special federal district court that heard a recent Republican suit successfully challenging Texas congressional districts will hear the legislative suit. The Nov. 8 court session will be a pre-trial hearing, to be followed later by the full hearing.

The judges are U.S. Dist. Judge Joe Ingraham, U.S. Circuit Judge John R. Brown and U.S. Dist. Judge James Noel. Plaintiffs in the legislative suit are Harris County Democratic chairman Bill Kilgarlin, Houston state Rep. Bob Eckhardt, Fort Worth state Sen. Don Kennard, and state Sen. Franklin Spears and Rep. Jake Johnson, both of San Antonio.

They challenge the parts of the Texas constitution and laws that limit a county to one senator and provide that when a county grows over 700,000, it is entitled to only one extra representative per 100,000 persons over 700,000.

They contend that system discriminates against populous areas.

Defendants in the suit are Gov. John Connally and other state officials.

The suit asks that they be enjoined from holding any more legislative elections until the state is redistricted legislatively.

Newspaper Fund Offers Grants For Journalism

NEW YORK (UPI)—The Newspaper Fund has announced that it again was offering fellowships to high school and junior college teachers who want to study professional and scholastic journalism.

The fellowships, for summer study in 1964, will go to teachers who have journalistic responsibilities in public, private or parochial schools.

Since the program was begun in 1959, more than 1,700 persons have studied under it. The Wall Street Journal finances the program with grants.

Information and application forms for the fellowships may be obtained from Paul S. Swenson, executive director, the newspaper fund, 44 Broad St., New York, N.Y. Applications must be submitted before Feb. 10, 1964.

The aim of the program is to encourage better teaching of journalism, to improve the quality of school newspapers and to point out career opportunities that are available in journalism for young people.

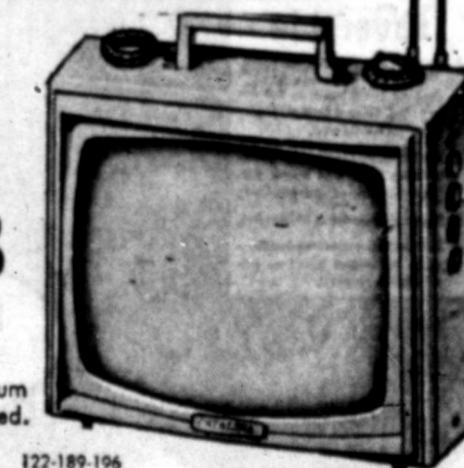

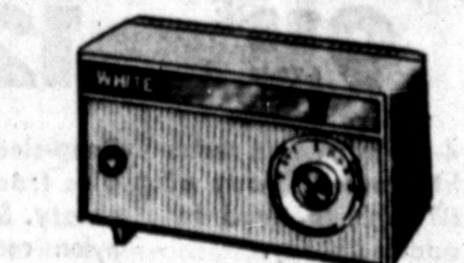

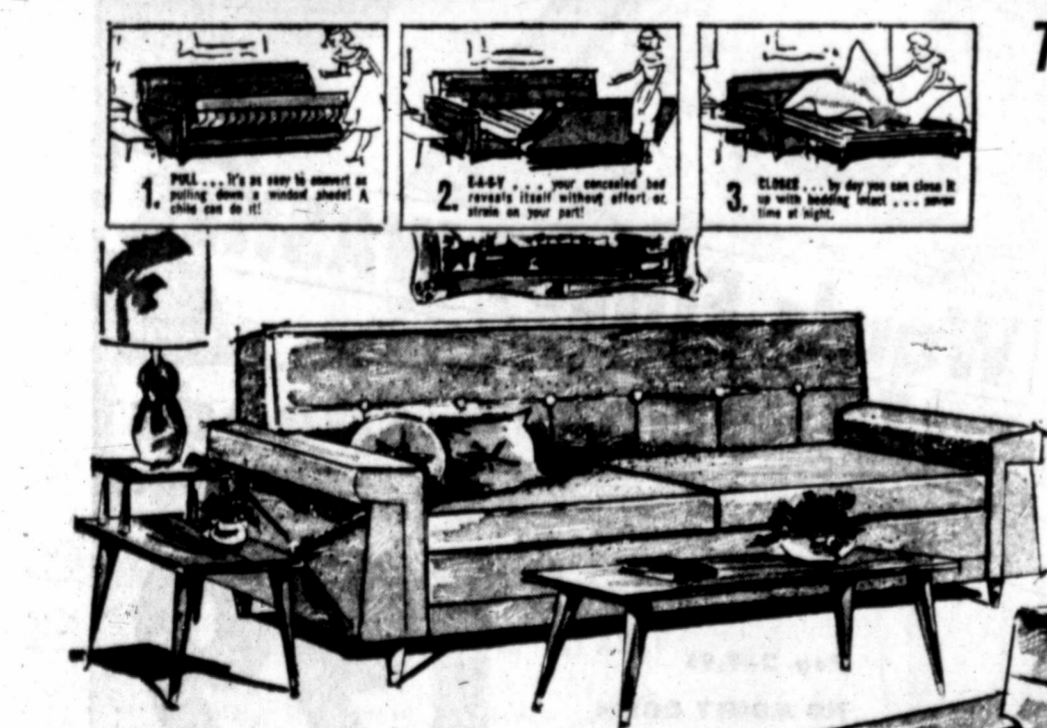

Christine Must Stand Trial On Charge of Lying

LONDON (UPI) — Christine Keeler, whose favors cost War Minister John Profumo his job and nearly brought down the British government, was ordered today to stand trial in Old Bailey on charges that her lies sent a discarded lover to jail.

The 21-year-old redhaired call girl and three co-defendants all pleaded innocent to conspiracy and perjury counts after a five-day pre-trial hearing and were admitted to bail pending their

criminal court trial.

No trial date was set. Its earliest start could be Nov. 12 when the next session at the Old Bailey begins.

Bail for Miss Keeler—whose lawyer said the entire story told against her was "false" was set at \$8,400, and lesser amounts were asked for the others. Her roommate Paula Hamilton-Marshall, 23, was freed under \$4,200; her housekeeper Mrs. Olive Brooker, 56, \$2,100, and the same amount was set for Rudolph Fenton, 39, West Indian chauffeur and friend of Miss Keeler.

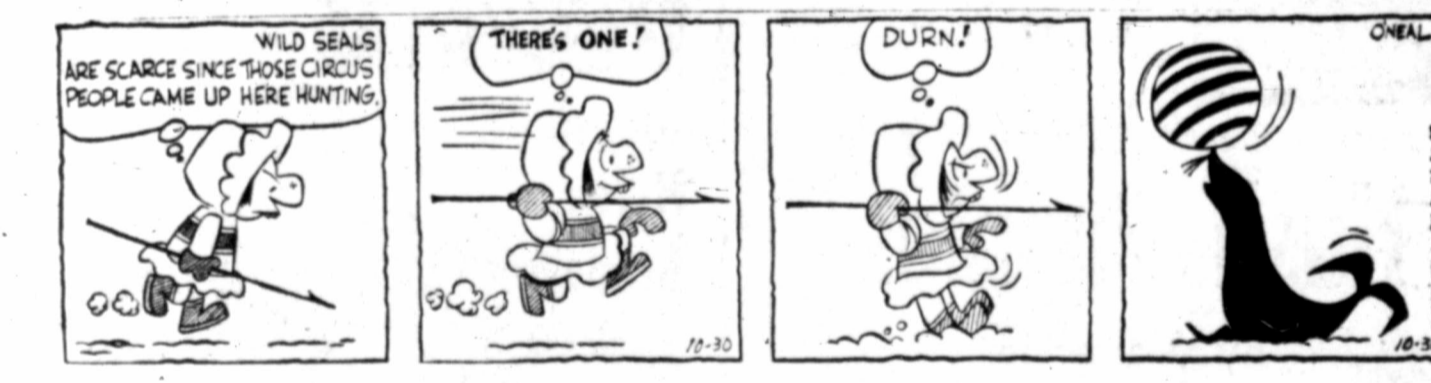

McLaughlin, a professor of
orthopedic surgery at the Pres-
byterian Medical Center in New
York, discussed shoulder ail-
ments at a press briefing at the
49th annual clinical congress of

the American College of Sur-
geons. About 11,000 fellows of
the college—surgeons from the
United States and 79 foreign
countries—are in San Francisco
this week for the congress, the
world's largest of its type.

McLaughlin said the ailment
commonly known as bursitis
can be caused by many things
—injury to tendons, infection,
gout, rheumatoid arthritis, tu-
mor or the mysterious spontan-

eous stiffening known as frozen
shoulder.

But usually, he said, it is
caused by painfully inflamed
calcium deposits on the tendons
between the shoulder socket and
the top of the arm. This ail-
ment is exceedingly common
among those over 60.

It doesn't really matter how
it's treated, McLaughlin said,
because it will go away by it-
self eventually, much like a

"Let's not kid ourselves that
some palliative treatment is
curing something," he said.
"The most you can do is treat
the symptoms, maybe reduce
the pain. There are many ways
of doing this—but they're all
just high-powered applications
of aspirin and hot water
bottle."

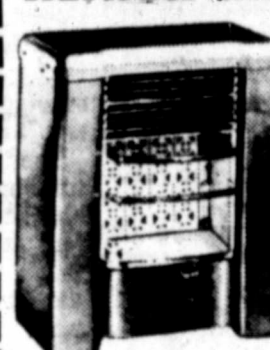

Lott vs. Hebert Friday Feature

The two most talented backs in the Panhandle clash at Lubbock Friday night when Greg Lott and his Lubbock Westerners take on Kenny Hebert and the Pampa Harvesters.

Although there is no such thing as a "one-man" team... for every runner, there is a blocker, for every passer a receiver, the pair rank one-two in the minds of most football fans and sportswriters throughout the state, because each of them can do more things well with a football than anyone else around.

The pair are among the leaders in every offensive statistical department in the loop, each man running one-two in four different departments, and each being a leader in another department by himself.

The rivalry stems back to last year, when Hebert finished up as the district's leader in total offense, with 675 total yards. Third was Lott, with 599. The Flying Frenchman was fourth in rushing with 462 yards, the Lubbock leather-lugger had 372.

Lott took the edge in passing, 227 yards to 213, but Hebert took the punting title with a fabulous 44.3 average as Steve Peace did Lubbock's booting, but Lott won out in total scoring with 30 points.

Although both players' teams have been disappointing, the pair have again been genuine triple-threats, and, in Hebert's case, a "quadruple-threat."

In total offense, Lott is second in the district, with 546 total yards, only four ahead of the Flying Frenchman. In rushing, Hebert moves ahead, with 313

yards in 46 carries, good for third in the loop, while Lott is fourth with 289 in 49.

Lott takes the edge in passing, having played the entire season at quarterback except for a rare play at halfback, from which he can still throw, while Hebert has split duties between quarterback and end. The Great Greg has hit 19 of 48 for 260 yards, while Kenny has 16 of 43 for 229.

Hebert makes up for the pass handicap by being second in the district in pass receiving, pulling in 168 yards in the air, a statistic Lott does not qualify under. Lott, however, again matches the Harvester by being fourth in district scoring with 32 points.

In punting, the pair are again one-two, Kenny defending his loop lead with a 38.6 average and Lott booting for a 35.4 average. Hebert, however, has done all the team's punting, kicking 18 times for 695 yards, while Lott has bootied only seven for 248 yards.

The pair are also probably the district's best in one other department in which statistics are not kept, punt returns, both of them having set up several scores by long kick runbacks. Defensively the pair also excel in the same spot, against pass defense.

No coach or spectator is divided in his opinion. Every Lott admirer says flatly: "he's the best back in Texas." Every Hebert admirer says exactly the same. The surest way to find out is to see them head-and-head Friday night in Lubbock.

Ohio State's Woody Hayes Named As Coach of Week

COLUMBUS, Ohio (UPI) — He is known for winning the big ones around the rugged Big Ten but when his back is to the wall—look out.

He's the dean of Big Ten football coaches, and his teams have dominated the league for 13 seasons. He has an edge over every opposing team in the conference except Minnesota, which Ohio State has not met during the "Woody years."

His Wayne Woodrow Hayes, the outspoken, hard-losing coach at Ohio State, who was named "Coach of the Week" for the Buckeyes' rousing 13-10 upset over second-ranked Wisconsin last Saturday.

The victory was a complete turnaround for Ohio State, which had been crushed the week before at Southern California. But that's when Hayes is the most dangerous—with his back to the wall.

Players Count Most
"There have been only two or three times in the last years we've lost two in a row," Hayes said. "But the important statistic is if the kids can fight their way back after a humiliating defeat. It's the boys that come back to win that make a fine team."

His pride battered after the humiliating 32-3 defeat, his worst as a coach, Hayes asked each of his players to write a critique of what would do the most good in getting ready for Wisconsin.

He also did a little thinking on his own and came up with a trump card—Tom Barrington, a 205-pound quarterback who nearly lost his life last summer in an industrial accident.

Hayes closed the doors to the practice field and drilled Barrington long and hard. He had been idle since last spring from the shattered jaw that forbade any contact work whatsoever.

"We felt it would be a good advantage to us if the opposition didn't know about Barrington," Hayes said.

Barrington was kept off the field at Wisconsin until the squad came back to the traveling roster.

Prepares for SMU
Coach Darrell Royal said Phillip would work out only lightly so he can be ready for the Southern Methodist game Saturday.

Defense against the artistic passing of Baylor's Don Trull got the most attention in a Texas Christian workout in which coach Abe Martin praised the spirit and hustle of the Horned Frogs.

The Frogs tangle with Baylor this weekend at Waco.

Baylor, meanwhile, sharpened up on its passing attack and worked on kicking, running and defense.

Bear coach John Bridgers said the record his squad set for the number of pass attempts in one game last week against Texas A&M "may be the shortest-lived record in our football history."

Rice coach Jess Neely announced the promotion of Wayne Bertsch to first team left guard and ran the Owls through a hard scrimmage.

Tackle John Mims, on the injury list for the past three weeks, worked out briefly, but still was not expected to start against Texas Tech this weekend.

Cool weather also pepped up the Texas Tech squad in a workout stressing goal line defense and kicking. Coach J. T. King said halfback Roger Gill would be out at least two more weeks.

Coach Hayden Fry of the Southern Methodist Mustangs readied his squad for the Texas Longhorns in an offensive and defensive drill.

WITH NO FURTHER ADO, here is the story, as seen by Mr. Hart, with grammatical errors, misspellings and incorrect facts thrown in:

TWO OF THE FINEST quarterbacks in this part of the country, Kenny Hebert of Pampa and Greg Lott of Lubbock High, will face each other here Friday night and there may be a lot of college scouts on hand.

Both are fine runners, good passers, good kickers and have better than average speed. Both have been the offensive sparks for their teams for the past two years.

Hebert started his fine play as a sophomore when he ran a kickoff back some 90 yards for a touchdown in the final minute of play to lead his team past the Amarillo Sandies and he's been feared since.

Lott didn't play just a whole lot of football as a sophomore since Lubbock High had a quarterback named Tommy Middleton who was doing a great job.

Hebert has split time at quarterback and at lonesome end for he's quite a pass receiver, too. He started out at that spot Saturday night, but the Harvesters didn't start moving until he took over the quarterback role.

After watching Pampa play Saturday, it's hard to see why the Harvesters haven't beaten anyone but Caprock and Plainview. Coach Otis Holliday has several gifted runners besides Hebert who also have pretty good speed.

HEBERT HAS BEEN A good track man at Pampa and has run the 100-yard dash in 9.8, but mostly has been used as a low hurdler. He has been clocked several times under 20 seconds for 180 yards.

He weighs 175 pounds, but has the frame to carry more weight and not slow him down.

But if Pampa sports writer, Jeff Cohane, knows what he is talking about, Hebert is headed for the University of Houston. In fact, Cohane says its pretty definite. Cohane is a Houston ex and "recruits" for the Cougars in the Pampa area. You can be assured that the Southwest Conference coaches will be working on Hebert, though.

COACH HOLLIDAY uncorked wild strategy moves in the first quarter that kept the press box on the run trying to find out who was carrying the ball.

The Harvesters didn't huddle for about six or seven plays. Instead, after each play, Holliday would send in a fresh starting eleven, calling the play from the bench.

It didn't seem to phase Plainview, for the Bulldogs held the Harvesters without a first down until Hebert took over at quarterback and ran 57 yards for a touchdown the first time he carried the ball.

It's the first time this corner has ever seen a unit substituted after each play.

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Texas 12-Point Pick Over SMU Mustangs

NEW YORK (UPI) — If past performances are any indication, top-ranked Texas may have quite a battle on its hands when the Longhorns clash with Southern Methodist Saturday in a Southwest Conference game.

Texas, which boasts a 6-0 record, has been rated a 12-point favorite by football odds-makers over a Mustang team which feasts on heavy favorites. SMU already has started Air Force and Navy on successive week-ends this season, and has played its best ball in the underdog's role.

Teams from the top 10 are involved in seven other inter-league contests, the closest of which figures to be the Big Ten battle between sixth-rated Wisconsin and Michigan State, an even-money toss-up. Illinois, No. 2 nationally, is only a 3-point favorite over Purdue in another Big Ten match.

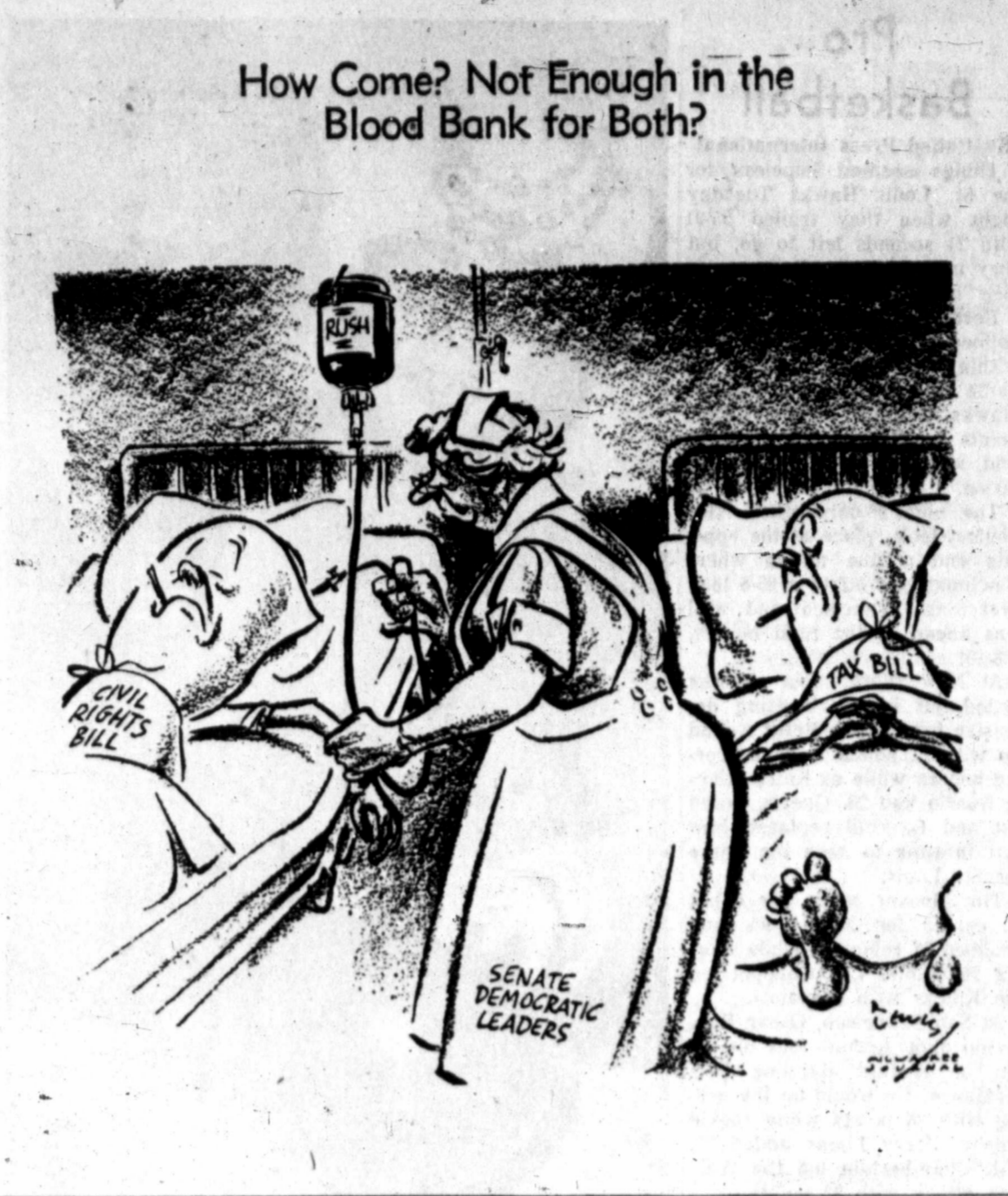

Allen-Scott Report Our No. 2 Man in Vietnam Calling Shots on U.S. Policy



The Doctor Says Early Ambulation Curbs Possible Lung Collapse By DR. WAYNE BRANDSTADT

WASHINGTON—Congressional probers looking into the explosive situation in South Vietnam have returned with some serious doubts about who is running the U.S. embassy in Saigon.

While Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge is supposed to be in charge of operations there, members of a House Foreign Affairs Subcommittee headed by Representative Clement Zablocki, D-Wis., discovered in their on-the-spot investigation that U.S. Minister-Counsel William C. Trueheart appears to be calling the shots.

The legislators unexpectedly caught Trueheart, the No. 2 State Department official in Saigon for the past two years, frantically signaling Lodge not to discuss sensitive questions raised by the committee members during their briefing in the U.S. embassy.

While sitting strategically behind the legislators, Trueheart was sighted several times waving his hands furiously or shaking his head "no" when Lodge began discussing differences between his staff, the military, and the Central Intelligence Agency.

A number of times when Ambassador Lodge began to tell us something important he either stopped or changed the subject when Trueheart began waving his hands," Representative William Murphy, D-Ill., reported to members of the full House Committee on Foreign Affairs.

Edson In Washington Allies Drag Feet on Atom Force to Guard Europe By PEYER EDSON

WASHINGTON (NEA)—The gag in Washington now is that the United States may have to work out a nonaggression pact with the Russians because it's impossible to get agreement with America's North Atlantic Treaty allies on the defense of Europe against Russian attack.

But the Kennedy administration is making still another try at getting NATO to accept the multilateral force — MLF — concept for the nuclear defense of western Europe.

Most notable thing about talks on this just resumed in Washington and Paris is that the French are not taking part. British, German, Dutch, Greek and Turkish representatives are sitting in. President De Gaulle wants none of it.

The Paris talks are political and financial, between permanent mission representatives to the NATO council. Ambassador Thomas K. Finletter is U.S. spokesman. The Washington talks are technical and strategic, among military experts at the Pentagon.

French absence is highlighted by announcement from Paris that France now has its own nuclear striking force. It is small compared to the British force and infinitesimal compared to the American. The French have only plutonium — not hydrogen bombs. And no one is sure just how operational are the six Mirage IV bombers supposed to deliver them.

This new French nuclear "force de frappe" is therefore characterized as being able to start a war but not finish it. That is its danger to the peace of the world.

It is a sop to De Gaulle's ambitions for an independent atomic capability. It gives him a further excuse to stay out of a European MLF under NATO.

De Gaulle's possession of this force is not expected to change the U.S. bargaining position on MLF. But it might influence the thinking of other NATO allies.

As a result of the nuclear test ban treaty with Russia there is said to be a general atmosphere of relaxation in Europe. Also, MLF is going to cost a lot of money which some countries don't have and none wants to spend. And there is considerable political instability in the air.

Nassau agreement to accept U.S. Polaris missiles for the defense of Britain. The present Italian government favors the MLF idea and wants in. But if a more leftist coalition takes over government, this policy might be changed. Greece and Turkey want in for prestige but could not pay their way.

The Kennedy administration wants to push the MLF plan for its own prestige reasons. Whether anything concrete will be ready for presentation to the NATO Council of Ministers in Paris first week in December is doubtful.

MLF was originally conceived by the Eisenhower administration, not only to strengthen Europe's defenses but also to improve the U.S. balance of payments position.

Secretary of State Christian A. Herter at the December 1960 NATO council meeting offered to sell Europe five nuclear submarines with Polaris missiles.

At the Oslo council meeting in May 1961 Secretary of State Dean Rusk announced the Kennedy administration would follow through. He asked the European countries to prepare their own plan. They were never able to agree.

Subsequently the Pentagon revised the plan to put Polaris missiles on surface vessels manned by multinational crews. This is still the favored plan.

The hope is that if it can ever be submitted to the NATO council, France will not veto it under the unanimous approval requirement but will abstain from voting. This would allow other European countries to go ahead with it.

Democrat Voters Wavering One of the genuine puzzles for 1964 is the extent to which President Kennedy and the Democratic party may suffer defections from among the minority groups which have helped provide smashing big city Democratic victories for 30 years.

At this stage, short of a ny election test, the threat of some defection seems real. Reports multiply that considerable elements of the white urban — and occasionally suburban — population are angry over the Negroes' big civil rights push in 1963.

Up to now this has been most often heard with respect to Polish descendants in such cities as Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland and Pittsburgh. In Philadelphia, Irish and Italian elements — checked in surveys — are said to be complaining bitterly.

Generally speaking, the resentment is found to be sharpest among those people who are closest to Negroes in the economic scale. The competition for jobs, and job preference, is recognized as growing keener as efforts are made to advance the Negroes' lot.

The Irish, of course, have been with the Democratic party for long decades. The big new increment to the party in the 1930s came from the Poles and other Slavic peoples. Second generation families, coming of age as voting citizens for the first time, formed a key part of the fabled "Roosevelt coalition" of that era.

Locking Is The Key This has been not only a bumper year for automobile production, it's been a bumper year for automobile thefts.

No less than 249,368 cars — worth more than \$225 million — have been stolen in the first nine months of 1963, reports the National Automobile Theft Bureau. This is a 13 per cent increase over the same period in 1962.

The bureau cites two factors contributing to the spread of car theft — population explosion in both automobiles and teen-agers, who take eight out of every 10 cars stolen.

Because teen-age theft is usually spur of the moment, the bureau says auto owners could drastically cut the theft rate by simply removing their ignition keys and locking their cars every time they park.

**'District' Fight
Now Rests With
Highest Court**

AUSTIN (Sp) — A Houston federal court's order wiping out present State congressional district lines and directing all Texas congressmen to run at-large until the legislature redistricts on the basis of population alone is on appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr's request for a stay of the Houston judges' decision pending final disposition of the appeal was granted by Supreme Court Justice Hugo Black.

Gov. John Connally conceded that the present line-up is unfair, with districts ranging from 213,000 to 960,000 population. But he argued that it's the responsibility of the legislature, not the federal courts. He felt that the action by the Republican majority on the court was politically planned.

GOP members filed the lawsuit attacking the population imbalance among districts.

The Governor pledged to fight the order to the last legal ditch. He termed it "ridiculous" and unprecedented. Connally stated he would call no special session on redistricting "until all other avenues of action are closed." He felt it would be a waste of their time and \$400,000 in tax money.

His belief was that such a complicated measure could not be worked out in 30 days, especially since there have been no decisions of the U.S. Supreme Court to show what, if any, rules will be placed on Congressional redistricting.

A Georgia case will be argued in November. This may provide guidelines.

Connally believes that once the filing deadline has passed in February the Supreme Court will not interfere with the 1964 elections.

Top ranking Republicans found the Governor's tough words "shocking."

State AFL-CIO President Hank Brown said "complete and total anarchy" is going to be the result of failure to redistrict before the February 3 filing deadline.

The Governor drew blasts of criticism from major cities, which are under-represented in Congress. But there was approval from rural areas. They will lose strength in Congress when the districts are re-adjusted to be more equal in size, population-wise.

THE COURTS SPEAK—Aside from congressional redistricting, the courts had plenty to say last week. State Supreme Court held that the City of Haskell can spend municipal tax money to fight building of a dam by the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority. Its decision upheld a Court of Civil Appeals finding but overruled the trial court verdict for the Authority.

The city considered the proposed dam on Miller Creek would be detrimental to its water supply. Cities in the Authority's territory are Seymour, Knox City, Munday, Goree, Haskell, Rule and Rochester.

Third Court of Civil Appeals agreed with Travis County District Court that the State's 1961 dedicated reserve natural gas tax is unconstitutional and prohibited by the U.S. Constitution's "commerce clause." Tennessee Gas Transmission Company and Panhandle Eastern Pipe Line Company contested the tax.

FEEL RICHER? — Texans' incomes were at an all-time high in 1962 at \$20,360,000,000, reports the U.S. Department of Commerce. This was 4.4 per cent above 1961. It means that 4.6 per cent of the dollars earned by all Americans belonged to Texans.

But when the massive figures are put into averages, Texans fall back. Texas ranks third in population, but sixth in total personal income. New York's \$50,990,000,000 and California's \$49,180,000,000 mean that people in those states have higher average incomes than Texans.

However, back in 1929 the total personal income of Texans was \$2,700,000,000. Now it's nearly 10 times as much. SLANT-HOLE OIL WELLS — Roy D. Payne, field supervisor for the Railroad Commission, now reports that there are 900 oil wells shut down in the giant East Texas Field, and about 300 of them have been found to be deviated.

Payne estimated that thousands of barrels of oil from deviated wells is in storage. He said operators are being given the choice of putting it back into the reservoir, or giving it free to the county from which it came for use on roads.

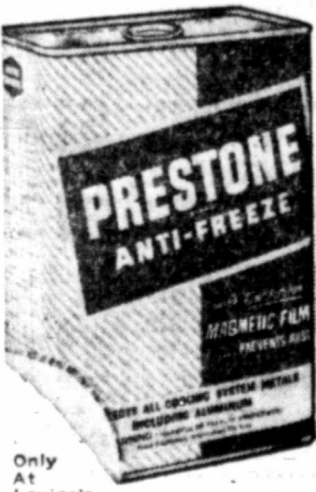
