OUR EVIDENCES OF PERMANENCE

James Record, managing editor of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, called at the News-office while in the city yesterday for a short period. Mr. Record has been in the field for nearly three months and has visited more than forty counties of West Texas. His immediate reaction to Pampa and Gray county was that this is the brightest spot from a business standpoint in West Texas. The Fort Worth newspaperman was impressed by "different" appearance of the New Pampa. It was his first trip since the oil development, and he was unprepared to see the kind of city he entered. He will carry the news of Pampa to the readers of the Star-Telegram, and his handling of future stories concerning Pampa will be little short of enthusiastic. "That census story was a fine thing; everyone is wishing to see a city which showed 959 per cent growth in a decade," he said. He remarked about the widespread opinion that Pampa has no "crime problem" in the usual oil territory sense. He suggested that the nucleus of law-abiding citizens here before oil development doubtless had a profound influence as the city grew. The greatest crime problems, he pointed out, have occurred in cities where no traditions, churches, schools, and other civic assets existed before discovery of oil. Mr. Record's observations are gratifying, and citizens of Pampa should not relax in their efforts to continue to merit the approval of visitors.

Big Springs gloats over the fact she has a population of 13,731, although her Chamber of Commerce never claimed more than 12,000. That may be proof of the credibility of the census, but it isn't very complimentary to the Chamber.

We have never been accused of being too conservative. In fact, no less an authority than Marvin Jones claim that we gauge our statements in harmony with the B.C.D. so closely that we all agree, which is unusual indeed. But if one is going to claim just a little too strongly in order to make allowance for current growth, why not cooperate in exaggeration?

A growing city is one that has taken a recount since the last census in order to claim all the growth taking place. We ought to take one ourselves pretty soon.

FIRST JAPANESE STYLE WRESTLING TONIGHT

KIMONOS ARE TO BE WORN THIS EVENING

Iota Shima, foremost exponent of Jiu Jitsu, arrived in town today to demonstrate the art of kimono-choking tonight at the Pla-Mor, where he meets Otsu Chingman, Pampa favorite.

Shima, often referred to as the successor of the late Masaki Matsuda, lost to Chingman in a catch-as-catch-can match here a month ago, but the first opportunity and skill that he displayed won the admiration of the fans.

That Chingman will not go into the ring tonight totally ignorant of kimono-choking was revealed this morning when he described four matches in which he participated on the Pacific coast several years ago. He won two of these. Otsu said there are several ways to win a Jiu Jitsu match—several ways to choke. Most of these consist in taking the opponent by the lapels of the kimono and drawing them together around the throat. Then one can choke an opponent by using the thumbs.

Shima's favorite stunt is to spin his man above his head, holding him by the kimono, before hurling him to the floor or outside the ring. Shima won a fall from Joe Kopecky by choking him and a second fall when he hurled the cotton picker out of the ring against a post.

The two wrestlers will wear gaily canvas coats which resemble the coat of ordinary pyjamas. A rope cord is tied around the waist. According to Jiu Jitsu rules a man loses only when he puts the mat. It does not matter which one's

shoulder's are square on the floor. Shima is a highly educated Japanese of noble lineage. He is a graduate of the University of Tokyo and of Whittier college in California. Preceding the Jiu Jitsu match, Johnnie Hillard and Dan Goffino will engage in a mixed bout for 30 minutes. Hillard has a grudge against all wrestlers and he will attempt to break his vengeance on Goffino. He reported this morning that he was in good condition. Goffino said that he knows exactly what to do as he has appeared in many mixed bouts. Goffino is exceedingly fast and he expects to mix things at once with Hillard. Johnnie is planning on a knockout in the first few minutes.
