Rusk in Germany to Quiet Fear Of Large-Scale Troop Cutbacks

Secretary Explains U.S. **Meeting Commitments**

BONN, Germany (UPI) - Secretary of State Dean Rusk arrived today for a series of talks with West German officials expected to center on their concern that U.S. troop strength here will be cut because of the success of a divisionsize air-lift.

Rusk appeared exasperated when asked about the possibility that troop withdrawals would follow Operation Big Lift, which Thursday completed the movement of more than 15,000 troops from Texas to bases in Germany. "With Big Lift, there is more

"With the amendments of 1961 many people who were pre-viously ineligible, became eligible under the reduced work requirement," he said. "And since benefits can be payed retroactively for only 12 months, each month's delay may cost one monthly benefit check."

According to Geldon, even those who are earning more than \$1,200 should inquire at age 65, because under the more flexible "retirement test," some benefits may be payable even if earnings are greater than \$1,200.

Geldon also reminded all persons receiving social security benefits to notify the social. security administration if their benefits will be affected by one of five events.

According to Geldon, these five events to be reported are all types of work if the beneficiary is under 72 and expects to earn more than \$1,200 during the year; death of a beneficiary; changes in address, marital status and custody of children or other persons for whom benefits are received.

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Why Education Is Weakening





It so happened that press photographers, newsreel cameramen, TV film makers and hundreds of individual picture takers pressed him into arm's length of me a couple times during the hour or so that we chanced to be in the same buildings. The constant clickclick of camera shutters and what seemed to be endless flashing of photographer's lights, appeared not to be disconcerting to the man with the ruddy, round face, silver hair and genial smile who was attracting all that attention. President Kennedy could not have created more commotion in the crowds than this man who, more than any other, is responsible for the thriving automotive industry in West Germany. In brief remarks at the official

opening of the exposition the president of the automotive association said that it was Economic Minister Erhard's advocacy of the free enterprise system, with occasional government subsidy, that pointed the way to prosperity and progress for West Germany's industries. Perhaps the next greatest attrac-

tion at the show was the new Mercedes-Benz passenger automobile with a price tag of 50,000 German marks (roughly \$12,500). Very few of the viewers had any thought of buying such an expensive piece of transportation. But it is an indication of the increasingly high standard of living toward which Europe is climbing, that such a car has been built.
