Atlas Giant Blows up in Space Test

United Press International CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI)— Ocean - spanning rockets have been flying for seven years, but they still occasionally run afoul of accidents-some of them bor-

dering on the unforgettable. An advanced - model Atlas missile that started off on a rather "routine" flight suddenly went haywire at the edge of space Monday night, and ruined a multi-million-dollar test for a new nose cone and packages of scientific experiments.

In the process, the silvery giant treated observers to a space show spectacular in widescreen proportions. This one probably will be remembered alongside a Saturn "super booster" that dumped 95 sparkling tons of water in space and a Polaris missile that landed in a river near Cape Canaveral.

The 82-foot Atlas, an "F-model" generating 389,000 pounds of fine style toward a target 5,000 measure by a vote of 19-15. miles away - until its "outboard" booster engines dropped

Connally Rites Set Tomorrow

MARLIN, Tex. (UPI) - The Texas senator whose oratory stirred the nation, returned today to this dusty area of his origin for burial.

Connally, 86, served 24 years in the U.S. Senate where his flowing white hair, vest and black-brimmed hat earned him a "senator's senator" reputation, and 12 years in the House. He died Monday in Washing-

ton of pneumonia. Funeral services were set for 2 p.m. Wednesday at the First Methodist church, a red brick, steepled church that has the largest congregation in this town of 7,000.

Known as an astute politician and able legislative strategist, Connally was chairman of the powerful Foreign Relations Committee following World War II.

Connally Cites Need For Oil Imports Formula

By PRESTON MCGRAW United Press International DALLAS (UPI) - Gov. John Connally said yesterday that the petroleum industry needs a new formula to solve the i m ports problem.

Connally was the first speaker at the 34th annual meeting of the Independent Petroleum Association of America (IPAA).

'We need a formula with no leaky seams," Connally said. "One where we know that the domestic industry will get its fair share of the 3 per cent annual increase in domestic demand. One that will no longer consider the Rocky Mountains as a greater barrier than the Pacific Ocean. One that will avoid shaky theories based upon too much guesswork."

.... like something out of Beau Geste," wrote UPI man Carolos Mendo.

"In Hassi Beida, I counted eight date palm trees. No town. No vegetation except for those pitiful palms clustered around one well ..."

Indeed, it scarcely seemed worth a man's life.

But around the small Hassi Beida oasis men were dying, even as leaders of both Africa and the Arab world maneuvered for peace.

There were compelling reasons for settling the quarrel quickly. But there also were reasons why peace would not come easily and why, if it did come, it might prove as illusory as Arab or African unity.

Fighting May Spread A compelling reason for peace was a fear that, if continued for long, the fighting could not be confined to a single border.
In Paris, with intimate know-

jedge of both, there was a belief that militarily the Moroc-cans were better trained and equipped for this kind of fighting and would win out over Algeria.

But there was also the belief that United Arab Republic President Gamal Abdel Nasser and the Communist bloc would intervene to save Algerian President Ahmed Ben Bella from disaster.

Eventually, such a war would engulf the whole of North Africa.

There were plenty of wouldbe peace-makers, including virtually every head of every state bordering on the Sahara. The belligerents also spoke of a desire for peace but continued military maneuvers to negotiate from positions of strength. But these were moves viewed

from the short term. la of Algeria and King Hassan of Morocco had become the personifications of a struggle convulsing both the Arab and the

African worlds. Admirer of Castro

Ben Bella is a dedicated socialist, an admirer both of Nasser and Fidel Castro of Cuba. And Moroccans ask Western

'Have you forgotten Cuba?" In Moroccan eyes, Morocco stands between Nasser and a socialist federation of North Africa wherein private enterprise would be subject to nationalization, political opposition crushed and free enterprise discouraged.

There also is bitterness in Morocco growing out of a belief that the Western world is more interested in the oil of the Algerian Sahara than in the rights

or wrongs of Morocco's case. But in the long run, whether by evolution or revolution, the struggle must go beyond the boundaries of either Algeria or Morocco. For this is a struggle of opposing ideologies. The revolutionary socialism of a Nasser or a Ben Bella cannot for long tolerate peaceful co-existence with a frankly pro-Western Tunisia or the monarchies of Libya, Morocco, Ethiopia, Saudi Arabia and Jordan.

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







rises to the highest level and there is no outlet. Feel the door. If it is hot, there may be a killing dose of gas waiting for the unsuspecting victim to open the door. Look for another wayout or stay at a window until help arrives.

"A cool door means that it is safe to leave, but once out stay close to the floor and the stairs to avoid the rising gases. Crouch down and keep your face about three feet from the floor. If possible, apply a wet cloth to your face to block the fumes.

The family whose members know two routes to safety double their chances of escaping a fire. This is especially important when children or elderly people are present. Most children killed by fire are under five years old and nearly half of all victims are over 65.

If you wake up to find your welling is on fire, you at least have a fighting chance. Many victims never realize what is happening until it's too late. A home fire alarm will warn you but virtually no one gives him-

self that protection. Even if a fire does break out, here is a chance you can do mething about it. A home fire




