Carrots West Becomes Newest In Vegetables

At this time, the newest in vegetable processing plants for Bailey County is in full operation, after kicking off on September 5.

Bill Jim St. Clair has opened 'Carrots West' about two miles

north on SH214 and one mile east of Muleshoe. The carrot processing operation is operating with a full crew of approximately 50 people at this time.

Mrs. St. Clair said they are busy, washing, sorting and sacking carrots that are being shipped "all over the United States."

She had no estimate of how many carrots are being processed, but said they will be in operation through December.

Over 240 acres of carrots will be processed by the time the operation is ready to shut down sometime the latter part of December, she added.

At this time, the operation is set up to process only carrots, and no other vegetables are expected to be processed through the new operation northeast of Muleshoe.

Kirby Rankin, assistant Bailey County Agent, said vegetables are a 'big cash crop' and commercially grown vegetables may become more and more of a financial venture for Bailey County producers.

Although figures are not known in Bailey County for this year's vegetable production, the 1983 figure shows some 2,000 acres of land were devoted to commercially grown vegetables.

Major vegetables produced commercially in Bailey County include carrots, cucumbers, potatoes, peppers, cabbage, wa-

termelons and tomatoes.

Other vegetables are produced on a smaller scale.

Emergency Ambulance Certifies

Roger Mitchel, program director for Emergency Medical Services for the Texas Department of Health, of Lubbock, was in Muleshoe Wednesday morning to inspect the two county-owned, hospital-operated ambulances.

Mitchell certified one of the ambulances, and said it is fully equipped to act as an "emergency vehicle." The other ambulance, the older one, received only a temporary permit, and can be used to transfer patients only, as it still lacks two critical items of emergency equipment.

The director said the second ambulance would be required to have a portable suction unit and a traction splint aboard, in order to be used as an emergency vehicle.

At this time, the ambulance is operating with one full time paid employee. Nineteen year old Eloy Flores has moved to Muleshoe from Bovina, where he worked with the ambulance services there. He said he had been operating an ambulance for the past eight months.

Due to the lack of enough players, Wilemon was brought up from the seventh grade in 1928, and played for the next six years on the varsity team.

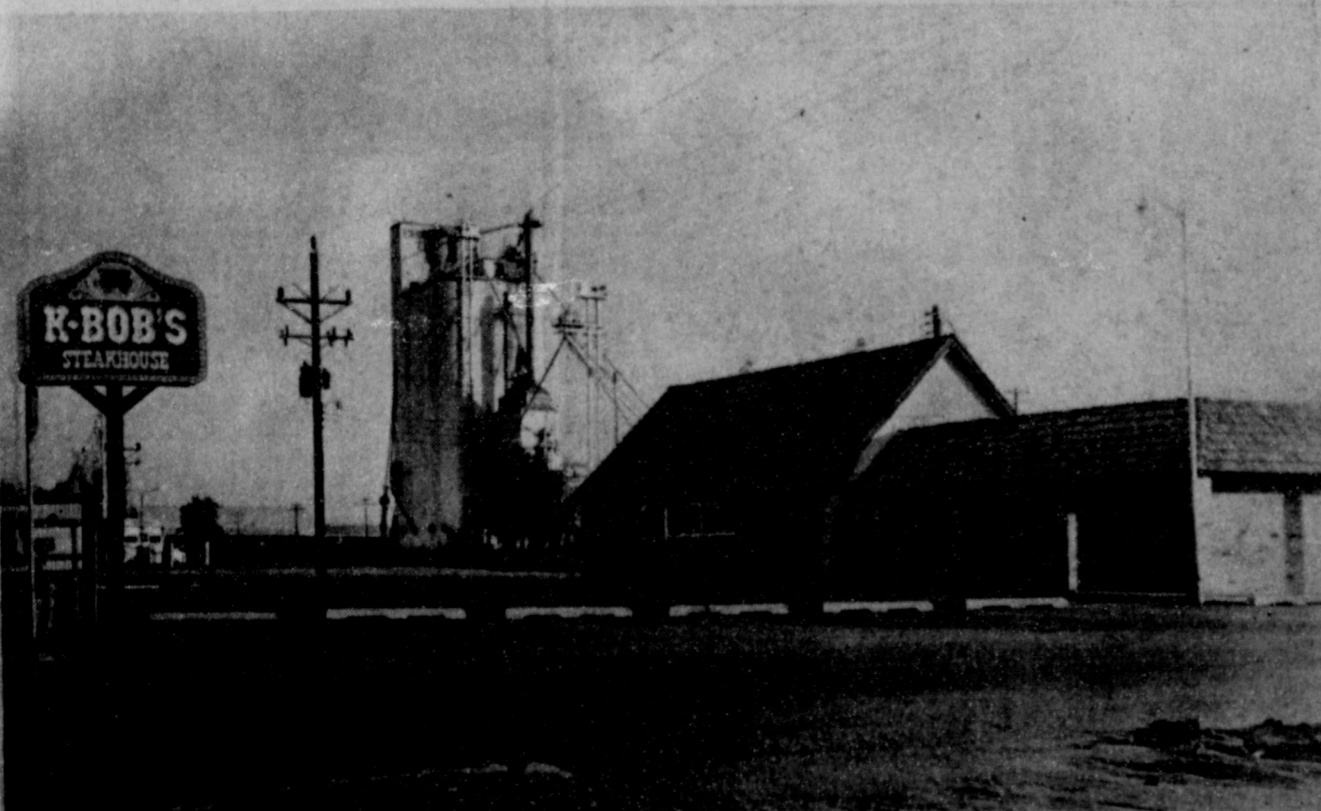

Fried Apple Pie
2 c flour
1 t baking powder
1 t salt
2 T shortening
1 egg yolk
4 T sugar
1/2 c milk

Thick apple sauce, well seasoned with cinnamon and nutmeg

Sift baking powder and salt with flour. Blend in shortening. Combine egg, sugar and milk. Stir into flour mixture. Roll out on a floured board to 1/4 inch thick.

Cut into rounds about 4 to 5 inches in diameter. Spread 1/2 the circles with well seasoned apple sauce.

Fold over the other half of crust, fastening the edges with a fork.

Fry in deep fat heated to 360 degrees. Drain on absorbent paper.

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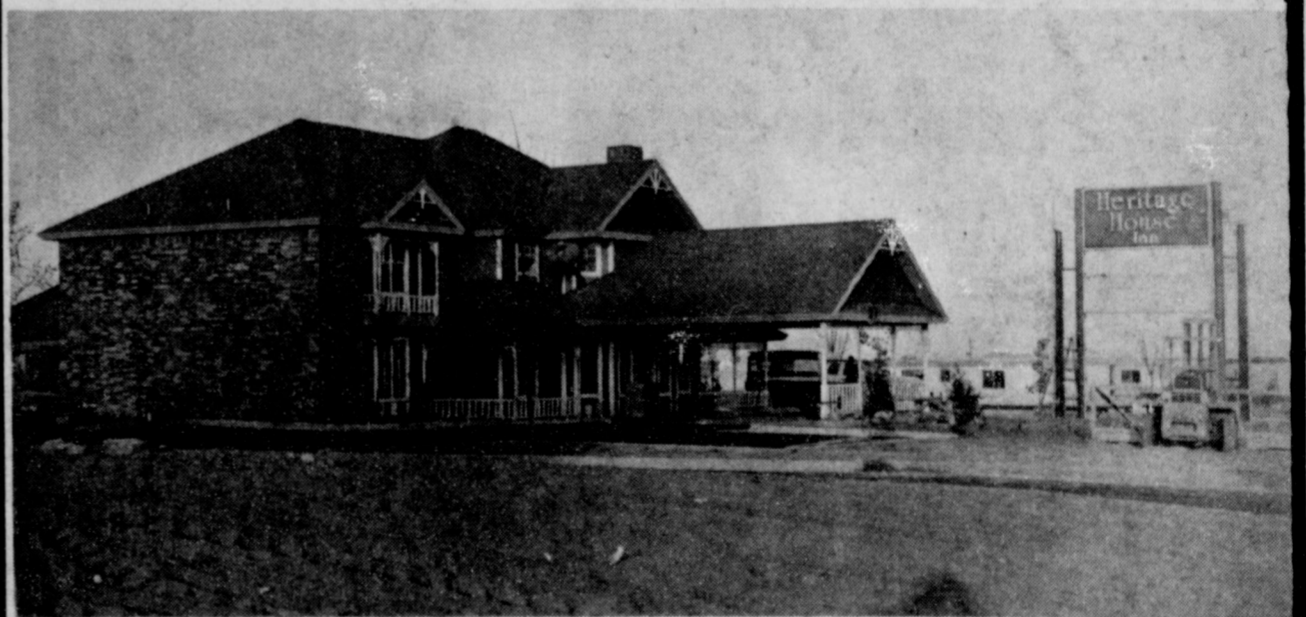

Shredded Sunflowers Provide Doves Food

Early August preparation for dove hunting can pay big dividends in September, Obie Kelley, Soil conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service in Muleshoe said this week.

"Although most farmers consider sunflowers to be a nuisance, they provide excellent food for dove," Kelley said. "Wildlife biologists rate native sunflower seed as one of the best mourning dove foods in Texas. One reason is because sunflowers produce seed earlier in the summer than many plants."

Dove are almost exclusively seed eaters. They have been feeding on weed and grass seed produced last fall or this spring. Sunflowers are a fresh food supply, usually beginning in July. But seed in the seedheads are not available to the birds. Shredding can solve the dove's problem.

Kelley said doves do not have feet adapted for climbing or clinging to standing sunflower plants. They are strong fibers, good walkers, adequate perchers, but poor scratchers. This is why dove feed should not be covered with litter, debris, and thick vegetation, explained

Kelley. The birds should be able to walk about looking for seed with relative ease.

Doves can find plenty of open ground to feed in shredded sunflower fields.

"During the first week of August, shred those areas in your sunflower field where most plants have produced seed, because all the plants in the same field do not always produce seed at the same time," he added. "If seed production is uniform, shred one-half of the field, up to five acres.

"This first shredding will make your field more attractive than unshredded fields. Concentrations of birds will begin using shredded areas. About one week before the opening of dove season, which was September 1, it was suggested that the remainder of the field, should be shredded. Unless you're planning for an unusually large number of hunters, 10 shredded acres is sufficient," concluded the soil conservationist.

SCS personnel at Muleshoe give technical assistance to landowners and operators through the Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District.

Muleshoe Schools are offering courses of basic education for adults 17 years of age or older and who have less than a high school education, according to Elizabeth Watson, of the Muleshoe School System.

Included will be three levels of instruction, Level I-Adult Basic Education prepares a person to increase math and reading skills and helps him to become a more efficient consumer and a more active citizen; Level II - prepares the student to pass the exam and get a GED certificate and Level III -teaches English to the non-English speakers.

Mrs. Watson said the classes are free. Classes will begin on September 25, Tuesday, and will continue through April, 1985. The classes will meet on Tuesday and Thursday from 7-9:30 p.m. in the Watson Junior High School building. If you need further information, please contact Elizabeth Watson at 272-3325.



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PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1984

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 29 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides to state-chartered banks the same rights and privileges that are or may be granted to national banks of the United States domiciled in this state. For example, if national banks become authorized to maintain branch offices, this amendment would extend the same privilege to state banks.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that restructures the Permanent University Fund to provide: (1) for the expansion of the institutions eligible to participate in the bonding capacity of the fund to include the components of The University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems that have been added to those two systems of higher education since the Permanent University Fund was last restructured by constitutional amendment; (2) for the expansion of the purposes for which bond proceeds can be expended from new construction to include major repair and rehabilitation projects and the acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials; (3) for an increase in the bonding capacity from 20% (2% for The University of Texas System and 1% for the Texas A&M University System) to 30% (20% for The University of Texas System and 10% for Texas A&M University System) of the value of the assets (exclusive of real estate) in the Permanent University Fund in order to provide sufficient bond proceeds to care for the addition of 10 new institutions to those authorized to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program and to care for the expanded purposes for which the bond proceeds can be spent; and (4) for the dedication of the dividends, interest, and other income from the Permanent University Fund remaining after payment of principal and interest due on bonds and notes issued, to the provision of support and maintenance (over and above normal legislative appropriations) for Texas A&M University in Brazos County, Prairie View A&M University, and The University of Texas at Austin.

agencies and institutions of higher education which are not included in The University of Texas or Texas A&M University Systems and, therefore, not eligible to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program. The amount of this appropriation could be adjusted every five years by a 2% vote of the Legislature, but could not be adjusted in such a way as to affect outstanding bonding indebtedness. Each institution of higher education (i.e., those institutions of higher education outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M University Systems) would be authorized to expend directly its share (such share to be determined pursuant to an equitable formula) of the \$100 million appropriation for the purposes of acquiring land, constructing and equipping buildings or other permanent improvements, major repair and rehabilitation of other permanent buildings or improvements, and acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials. Additionally, each institution would be authorized to issue bonds backed by a pledge of up to 50% of its share of the \$100 million annual appropriation for the purpose of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

Except in the case of fire or natural disaster and in other extraordinary cases, verified by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature, all institutions of higher education would be precluded from receiving appropriations of general revenue funds for the purposes of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to create from general revenue a special higher education assistance fund for construction and related activities, to restructure the Permanent University Fund, and to increase the number of institutions eligible to benefit from the Permanent University Fund."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 65 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the legislature to provide for the payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of officers, employees and agents of the state or its political subdivisions, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units authorized to make arrests, who die in the course of performing hazardous official duties. Payments to surviving spouses and dependent children of

such officers, employees, and agents are already authorized by the Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of certain public servants killed while on duty."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 20 proposes a constitutional amendment which abolishes the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties if a majority of the voters in each of those counties vote in favor of abolishing the office of county treasurer in a local election to be held on the issue. All the powers, duties, and functions of the office of county treasurer in each of those counties would be transferred to the county clerk.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which provides a new method of filling a vacancy in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The amendment requires the President pro tempore of the Senate to call together the committee of the whole Senate within 30 days after a vacancy occurs in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The committee would be required to elect one of its members to perform the duties of the Lieutenant Governor until the next general election. This individual would continue his duties as Senator at the same time that he performs the Lieutenant Governor's duties. If the Senator who is elected ceases to be a Senator before the next general election, another Senator must be elected according to the above procedure to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties. The President pro tempore would be required to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties pending the election of one of its members by the committee of the whole Senate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that permits the use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on non-assessable life, health, or accident insurance policies and annuity contracts issued by a mutual insurance company authorized to do business in this state. The constitutional prohibition against a grant of public money to an individual, association, or corporation or against becoming a stockholder in a corporation, association, or company has limited life and health group policies of political subdivisions to non-mutual insurance companies. The amendment would permit mutual insurance companies to bid for those policies.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment to permit use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on certain insurance contracts of mutual insurance companies authorized to do business in Texas."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to change the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct to include one Judge of a Municipal Court and one Judge of a County Court at Law, who shall be selected at large and appointed by the Supreme Court with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The amendment also provides additional grounds for removal from office of judges or justices of Texas courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The review tribunal would be composed of seven (7) Justices or Judges of the Courts of Appeals selected by lot by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge the right to discovery of evidence.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem of members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during a calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January 1 of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$30; the maximum deduction is now \$75.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator."
