ELK CITY, Okla., April 4 (P)— At least 23 white persons, in ad-dition to 14 Indians in a lowland camp and seven other Indian families from the Red Moon reserva-tion, were missing today and grave fears were held for their safety as a result of the disastrous flood the Washita river north of here.







VII. SITTING AND TALKING By Laura Townsend Davies If you are sitting and talking with

No, you would be more apt to place the bookcase on one side of the room and the plano on the other to have a balanced room.

The same principle applies to the person. If you were to sit, say, with the right foot in front of the left, would the picture be balanced if you placed your right arm on the arm of the chair? No, the graceful pose would be with the left arm on the chair, right hand and arm re-laxed in your lap. Then the picture would balance.


