PUBLICITY FOR EDGAR ALLAN POE

Those enthusiasts who see in Poe the greatest American literary genius and who spell it "POEtry" are evidently not at all angered by Lucky Strike reference to "And O'er His Heart a Shadow Fall."

Despite the dubious connection between the quotation and the advertising—which is designed to sell cigarettes rather than reduce the caloric denominator—the Poe fans seem rather pleased. The Edgar Allan Poe Society writes The News that so many inquiries have resulted from the advertising that it is deemed desirable to state that the quotation is from the poem "Eldorado".

The Poe society points out that the inquiries concerning the poet seem apart from the advertising itself, indicating an interest in the literary man. Thus advertising of the Lucky Strike type is claimed to be turning attention of Americans into literary channels.

DRUDGERY RULED

The growing use of machinery in the modern world has drawn a good many protests from men who fear that we shall get mechanized out of all likeness to normal humanity; yet it is worth noticing, perhaps, that none of these protests come from the men whose lives are actually made over by the machine.

Very likely it is true that the machine has many sins to answer for; but the critics ought never to lose sight of the one great fact in its favor—the way in which it has taken plain, age-old drudgery, of the sort that turned men into beasts of burden and made them old at forty, and pitched it forever into the discard.

That, of course, is not to say that nobody works harder than is good for him any more. But there has been a tremendous change; and perhaps the best way to understand it is to take a good look at an industrial undertaking of the old type, as it existed before this much-hated machine had come on the scene.

In the province of Szechuan, in China, there is the world's oldest oil field—a field that has been in operation for more than 2000 years.

This oil field, as described in the current Industrial Bulletin published by Arthur D. Little, Inc., is operated today precisely as it was 20 centuries ago.

Its most important product is not oil but brine, from which salt is made. Fully a million men are employed in this vast field, at wages ranging from 15 to 25 cents a day. All of the work is done by hand. All of the machinery is made of bamboo, from pipe lines, casings and bits to the drilling cable. A big bamboo plantation is maintained to supply the material.

The wells vary in depth from a few feet to more than a mile. All of them are drilled by hand, and it takes decades to complete the drilling of the deepest ones.

Think all of that over and you get a rather unpleasant picture—a picture of thousands upon thousands of men slaving away at backbreaking toil for a hopelessly inadequate pittance—slaving today precisely as their remote ancestors slaved 2,000 years ago.

What chance has a laborer for a decent life under conditions like those? How can he ever be anything but a drudge?

Then picture the change that would come if modern machinery were installed. Steel drills, gasoline and steam engines, modern pumps—the drudgery would vanish. A Chinese coolie from this oil field would think that the lowliest worker in an Oklahoma oil field was on a perpetual vacation.

Two Big Issues Are Dodged by W. T. C. C. Today

ABIENE, May 30. (AP)—Highway bond and oil conservation resolutions which have been expected to provoke debate at today's session of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention here were withdrawn before the session opened.

W. B. Hamilton, president of the organization, in announcing that the resolutions would not come up, said that the West Texas Chamber of Commerce already had spoken on both issues. There are so many res-

solutions to be considered that there is no use spending time in rehearsing our views," the president said.

Members of the Chamber pointed out that the organization was not a political body. The commercial body has endorsed the road bond proposal twice. The other resolution withdrawn would have requested the state permitting operators in a pool to enter into an agreement concerning when to drill and how far apart to place their wells. Certain independent oil operators opposed it.

A resolution declaring that the West Texas Chamber of Commerce was unalterably opposed to any division of the Lone Star state was reported favorably by the work committee.

A breakfast for West Texas legislators was held this morning. A-

mong those attending were Senator C. C. Small of Wellington, candidate for governor; Senator Edgar Witt of Waco, candidate for lieutenant governor; Representative Cecil Storey of Vernon, candidate for attorney general; Representative A. F. King of Throckmorton, candidate for commissioner of agriculture; Senator Walter C. Woodward of Coleman; Senator Oliver Cunningham of Abilene; Representative Penrose Metcalf of San Angelo; Representative J. C. Duvall of Fort Worth; Representative Frank Patterson of El Paso; Representative Bailey Hardy of Breckenridge; Representative Lawrence Westbrook of Waco, and Representative Henry Webb of Odessa.

Joe Wheat of Seymour presided. He praised the legislature for enactment of the Small land law and

urged a statute to cause a venue in land cases where the state aids for recovery of title to lie in the home county of the party sued rather than in Austin.

Farrin's chute became entangled with the struts of the plane. He was seen to fight valiantly to untangle the ropes, but was dragged to the ground with the falling plane.

Dallas Man Robbed

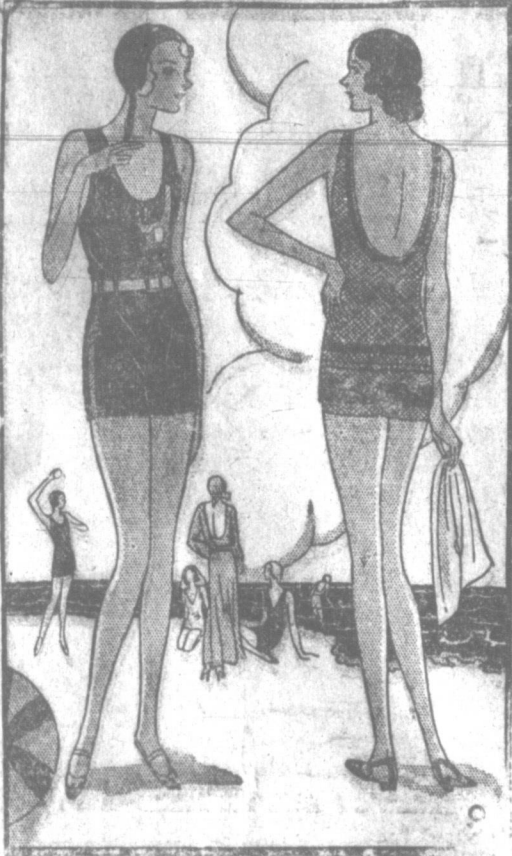

JONES, VOIGT IN SEMI-FINAL GOLF ROUND

ST. ANDREWS, May 30. (P)—Bobby Jones of Atlanta and George Voigt of New York survived play in the quarter-finals of the British amateur golf championship this evening along with two Englishmen, Roger Wethered of London and Lister Hartley of Chislehurst.

Voigt and Jones both won their quarter matches in comparatively easy fashion. Jones gained a four hole lead on Eric Fiddian of Stourbridge on the first nine holes and maintained it to end the match on the 18th green, 4 and 3.

Voigt eliminated William Sutton, West Cheshire artisan, 5 and 4, holding a lead of two up at the turn and then taking advantage of a collapse in the Britons' game to end the match at the fourteenth.

Hartley came from behind to beat Douglas "Oren" of New York and London, one up at the 19th hole.

Wethered, former holder of the title, eliminated Henry Howell of Wales, four and three in the quarter-finals.

Fiddian, holder of the English boys' championship in 1927, failed to live up to British expectations in his match with Jones. He failed to control the ball in the cross wind, failed to find the greens with his irons, and his wooden putter didn't seem to be quite the right job on the grassed greens.

Jones, on the other hand, played his irons as well as Great Britain has seen him. He snicked the ball from the hard turf perfectly and left himself little to do on the greens. What he had to do there he did well.

Fiddian took a brace after the 18th, where he was four down, and in the moment the gallery who saw his last native hope fading saw Jones' progress to the final. He played a rally like Harrison R. Jones yesterday.

Hornsby Is Hurt Sliding to Base

CHICAGO, May 30. (P)—Rogers Hornsby, star second baseman of the Chicago Cubs, was injured during the first game of today's doubleheader with the St. Louis Cardinals, and it was feared his left ankle was fractured. He was rushed to a hospital for an x-ray examination.

Hornsby's injury came in the third inning when he was forced between second and third bases. He attempted to slide into the bag and was blocked in such a manner his leg was twisted.

NEW SHOT RECORD
HARVARD STADIUM, Cambridge, Mass., May 30. (P)—Harlow Rothert, Stanford's shotput ace, opened the Intercollegiate A. A. A. track and field championships today by smashing the American, as well as the meet, shotput record with a great heave of 52 feet 1/4 inch. It was nearly two feet beyond Rothert's own T. C. A. A. A. mark of 50 feet, 3 inches, made last year, and surpassed the national record of 51 feet, 11 inches, set by Herman Britz at Fresno, Calif., in April 1929.

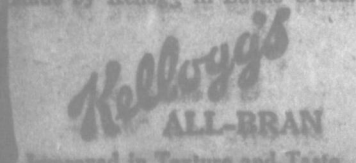

Moody May Not Oppose Sterling for Governor

AUSTIN, May 30. (P)—Although declaring he "would not like" to run against his "staunch political friend," E. S. Sterling of Houston, Governor Moody in a telegram from Teague, where he has a speaking engagement today, still left his attitude toward his candidacy for third term in doubt.

"It had been my plan" to announce for governor in Sunday's papers and file with the executive committee Monday for a place on the ticket, his telegram, addressed to the capitol, correspondents said. "I had stated to friends that I intended to announce my candidacy. I had a number of speaking engagements, and I had been invited to make these speeches as governor of Texas. This caused me to feel that I should not announce until I had filled the last of these engagements tonight at Lancaster because I had been invited as governor and I did not want to appear in the character of a candidate.

"In addition to this, I did not prefer long campaigns and did not intend to publicly announce as a candidate until the time for filing on the ticket. Mr. Sterling has been a staunch political friend of mine and I would not like to run against him. My concern is to see a continuation of present well ordered, efficient and honest administration of the state government."

He reiterated his opposition to former Governor James E. Ferguson and former United States Senator Earl B. Mayfield. Announcement of Sterling, chairman of the state highway commission under appointment of Governor Moody, came as a surprise to capitol followers of Texas politics. It had been taken for granted that Sterling, close to the Moody administration throughout and one of the governor's strongest partisans four years ago when he defeated Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, Texas' first woman governor, had no intention of aspiring to the nomination.

While the governor had not made a position clear, it was believed he would not oppose Sterling.

CLAUDE HOLT DEFEATS ROB ROY IN ROUGH AFFAIR WHEN CLINGMAN LOSES FLU MATCH

While Otis Clingman lay ill of influenza at his home here, Rob Roy, substituting for Clingman, slugged Claude Holt with many a blow last night at the Pla-Mor but lost the two falls and the match. Rob won the first fall in 21 minutes with an exceedingly clumsy Japanese double crab hold.

As soon as the first fall began, Rob saw defeat staring him in the face if he restricted his actions to legitimate wrestling and he did his best to knock out the New Orleans man. But Holt was not susceptible to rabbit punches, rights to the jaw and lefts to the stomach. He displayed an amazing indifference to the most powerful punches. He said he'd wrestled all over and that he'd never wrestled at any place where a man was allowed to slug as Roy did last night.

Holt did no slugging but he used his knees to knock Rob rolling by bombarding his stomach. Claude was also good at kicking. Holt won the second fall in 11 minutes with a double arm lock and the third fall in 17 minutes with a series of head locks and body slams. The four head locks applied just before the end of the third fall were the only ones of the match. Holt executed some beautiful arm and toe holds, also several spills.

In all of the three falls it was highly apparent that Holt is a much better wrestler than Rob Roy. Although he probably weighs 10 pounds less than Clingman, he would have given Otis a tough fight. Holt slipped out of Rob's holds as fast as they were applied.

Dutch Betke, the "Borger Booger Man," knocked out his opponent, Tuffy Barnet of San Angelo, in 13 minutes, or at any rate Tuffy lay flat on the floor and acted as if he were totally out. Tuffy was a young one and the few holds he got were awkwardly applied.

MID SEASON FINDS RACES HOT IN LOOPS

The first big holiday of the baseball season, Memorial Day, is in many ways the first milepost of the pennant race. Coming in the middle of the second month of play, it marks the turn into that part of the campaign known as "mid season."

By this time, the teams have had time to straighten out the tangled affairs of the start, even to play off a good many of the games postponed because of the early season weather, the slow starters have had an opportunity to hit their real stride, and they all start down the long back stretch of the pennant race track in the part of the struggle which counts the most.

The standings today bring promise of two fine races in the major circuits with the National league's contenders probably more closely matched. The Brooklyn Robins and the St. Louis Cardinals come up to the mile post tied for the lead as the result of yesterday's one game. The Robins overcame a half game deficit by beating the New York Giants, 4 to 1, while St. Louis was idle.

Behind them, Pittsburgh, Chicago, New York, and Boston are in a close group, the Pirates just three games to the lead, while the other two, Cincinnati and Philadelphia are not out of touch with the leaders. A chance for one of them to improve its position was lost yesterday as the Phillies and Boston

met more rain when they attempted to play off a game postponed earlier in the week.

Brooklyn found a two man combination effective in beating the Giants for the sixth time in eight meetings. Babe Herman produced the Robin runs, driving in three with two homers, while Bill Clark prevented Giant scoring by allowing only six hits.

Washington has a clear margin of leadership in the American league, but the champion Philadelphia Athletics are pressing the Senators hard while seven of the eight club have averages of .400 or better. The distance between the Senators and the Athletics was cut down by a full

game by the results of yesterday's clashes.

Philadelphia sent the Boston Red Sox deeper into the cellar with a 2 to 1 victory in a pitching duel between Leroy Mahaffey and Milton Gaston, while the Senators again found George Pipgras of the Yankees a bit too tough for them and went down to a 4 to 1 defeat.

Mahaffey and Gaston each yielded five hits in their battle, but the Red Sox could get only one man past second base while Regan gave the Athletics an extra counter on a bad error that was followed by Cochrane's double in the seventh inning. Pipgras, the only Yankee pitcher to beat the Senators this

season, repeated his previous triumphs by keeping nine hits thoroughly scattered while his teammates made the most of five blows at opportune moments. Only one of the Yankee hits did not figure in the scoring.

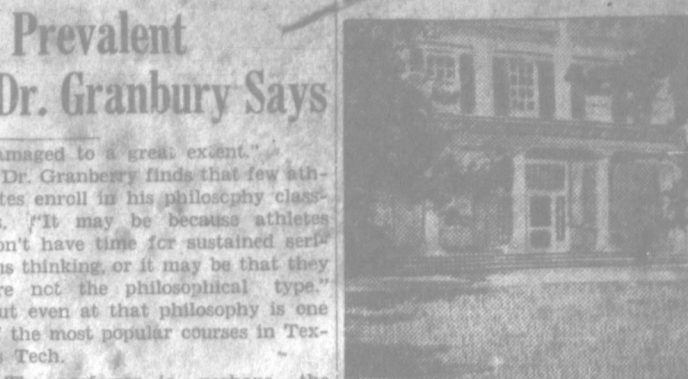

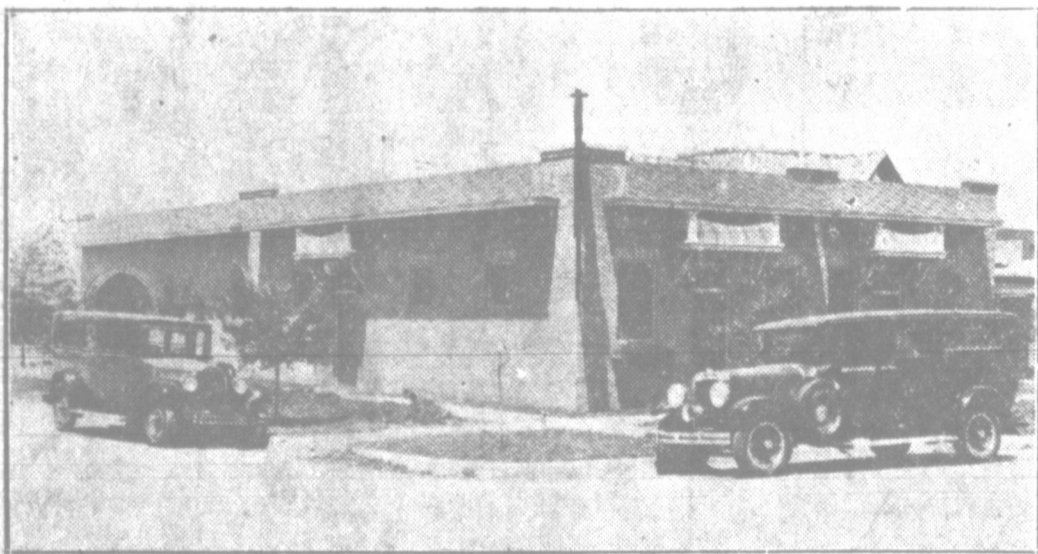

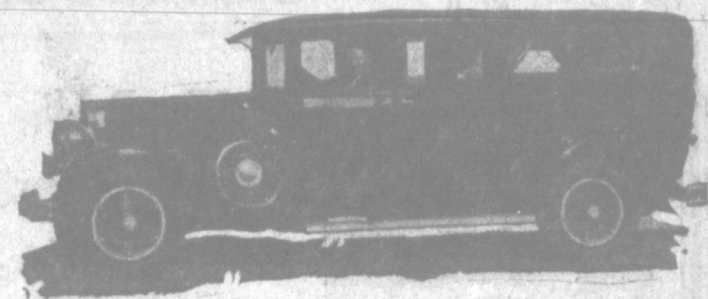

STEPHENSON HAS ERECTED FINE BUILDING

Formal opening of the new Stephenson Mortuary which was recently constructed at a cost of \$15,000 at the northeast corner of Francis and Ballard will be held Saturday from 9 a. m. to 9 p. m. The place will be open to visitors from 1 p. m. to 8 p. m. Sunday.

The public is invited to attend the opening. The men will be given cigars and the ladies flowers. The new mortuary, a one-story structure, 40 feet wide and 80 feet long, is built of light-colored brick in the Spanish style of architecture. It has a red tile roof. It contains an office, waiting room, funeral chapel which measures 20 feet wide and 30 feet long, casket room, embalming room, slumber room, and living apartments for the ambulance drivers and morticians.

The funeral chapel is finished in a "battleship" linoleum, a footfall absorbing material. A feature of the chapel is a family room curving off by portieres. This room is connected with the street by an outside door in order that the mourning family can enter unobserved and remain unobserved during the funeral service. The interior of the chapel is designed to resemble the interior of a Gothic church. Small windows on the west side are placed near the eaves. The casket room adjoins the chapel on the north.

The large garage is located at the rear and access to the embalming room is easily made. The mortuary owns one ambulance used exclusively for emergency calls and patients. Another ambulance is used as a funeral coach.

The slumber room is located next to the embalming room on the east side of the building which is separated from the west side by a long hall running the length of the structure. E. B. Sorrells and family occupies an apartment on the east side. Mr. Sorrells is a graduate of the Dallas school of embalming, class of 1928.

E. B. Stephenson established the Stephenson funeral home on South Cuyler last August in conjunction with his furniture store.

What appears to be a cross at the corner of the new home is a sign bearing the words, "Stephenson Mortuary." The establishment is equipped to render ambulance and burial service to residents of LeFors, White Deer, Mobeetie, and other nearby towns. A lady assistant has been employed to care for and embalm bodies of ladies. The mortuary telephone, No. 191.

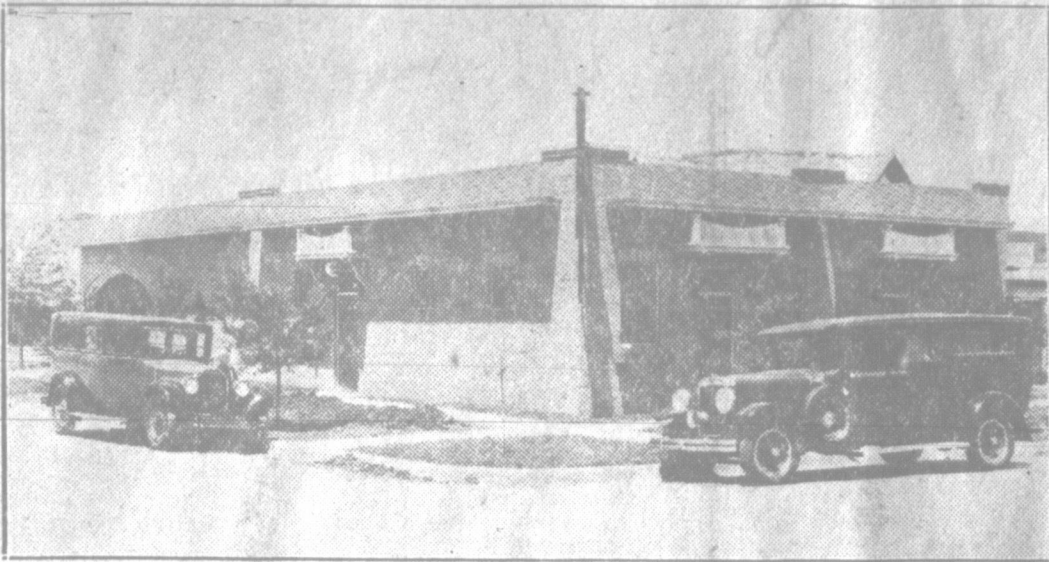

Old Coin Counter Found

In cleaning out a store from employees of the Pampa National bank discovered an old-fashioned coin counter, that has according to employees, been in the bank for as long as they can remember. The coin counter is trade marked in a style of the '90s, bearing the words, "Johnson Coin Counting Machine Company, New York-Chicago. The machine is operated by scooping the coins from a large front pan into a disc, which is manipulated by a crank, the coins are caught in slots of the disc and carried thru an opening at the rear of the machine, for wrapping. A meter, similar to the old cyclometer used on bicycles, registers the coins as they are moved from the disc. Equipped with interchangeable plates, any denomination of coins may be counted.

The words of the master's reply are particularly significant, for in them is conveyed the central truth of this parable: "Well done, good and faithful servant; thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will set thee over many things; enter thou into the joy of thy lord." He spoke precisely the same words to both. What matter if one had made five talents while the other had made only two? Both had doubled the money entrusted to them. Both had been faithful. Both were worthy, therefore, of the same high commendation. For the principle upon which the rewards of the kingdom of heaven are apportioned is faithfulness. Our Master does not care about quantity, but about quality and motive. Christ rewards not actions, but the graces that are made visible in action; and these can be as well seen in the tiniest as in the largest deeds. The light that streams through a pin-prick is the same that pours through the widest window. —Maclaren.

"The lord said unto him, 'Well done, good and faithful servant.' There is a homely proverb that an ounce of praise is worth a ton of blame.
