 ense of the Depild Welfare Board has approved Support Unit in helping to locate missing parents who may be liable for child support payments for childrenunder temporary foster care The Amarillo based unit works throughout the Panhandle, and has immediate access to Social Security records. military records, and other files which make it more equipped to trace missing parents,
Child Support Unit caseworker Susan Coleman told the Child Support Unit caseworke
board at Tuesday's meeting.
The Amarillo unit would aid local DHR caseworkers in cases where missing parents could not be located to
help with child support help with child support Under present law. county welfare receives no state aid or chiliren who do not qualify for Aid to Families
with Dependent Children (AFDC) money. Board Chairman Bob Carmichael said the cost of maintaining
foster care for children who have been placed foster care for children who have been placed
temporarily in foster homes could stretch the county's

The cost of using the support unit to olocate one parent is $\$ 18$, or $\$ 20$. legal action is required. Coleman said. The county presently pays 8550 a day for the foster The county presently pays $\$ 5.50$ a day for the foster care of each child under 12 and $\$ 5.50$ a day for the care feach child 12 and over. Grainger McIlhaney were present to make recommendations to the board on the program. "The lobby was bold. They moved in with the
tanks," said Rep. Bob Bush.D.Shermah.. Lobby bills often were chewed up by legisative process, Bush said, but "they kept us
in a defensive posture rather than go ford with constructive things we might have dorene.
