WHILE PAMPA STREETS weren't quite at flood levels streets. The threat of thundershowers still existed today, but the

Floods swamp Wichita Falls

residents scrambled for higher ground Tuesday as more than five inches of rain sent three creeks spilling over their banks and raised the Wichita River to threatening levels.

Floodwaters inundated about one third of the area devastated by the massive tornado that killed 48 persons when it cut a swath April 10 through the southwest side of this city, which sits near the Texas-Oklahoma line.

But flooding problems were reported in low-lying areas in several other sections of Texas, also. Flood warnings were issued in several other places and at least three funnel clouds were spotted in widely separated locations about Texas.

In Wichita Falls, a fire department spokesman said Tuesday at least 12 persons had to be evacuated from their flooded homes. There were no reports of injuries.

Officials said as many as 200 families may have heeded warnings to seek higher ground.

Red Cross chapter manager Jan Beall said survey teams reported at least 50 to 100 homes had been flooded. She said the teams, which were still checking homes late Tuesday night, found

Floodwaters swirled about four feet deep in some of the houses along the Holliday, Plum and McGrath creeks, said Red Cross worker Pat

The rampaging waters washed out at least three bridges in Wichita County and inundated others, the sheriff's department said.

Assistant City Manager Bob Haley said employees would survey the extent of the damage today Residents living near the banks of the Wichita

River were urged to move to higher ground Tuesday as the river approached flood stage.

Severe thunderstorms dumped torrents of water and twirling funnels snaked out of dark clouds at opposite ends of the state Tuesday.

Other Texas towns and cities reporting flooding from the hard-hitting thunderstorms included Fort Worth and Jacksboro in North

Funnel clouds were sighted by the public in Corpus Christi near the Gulfway Shopping Center; near Earth in Lamb County, northwest of Lubbock; and west of Sabine Pass in Southeast

Grounding of all DC-10 jets ordered by FAA

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Aviation Administration today suspended the design certificate of the DC-10, indefinitely grounding all 138 of the jetliners flown by the nation's airlines.

The FAA acted after new cracks were found in the engine mounts of two of the jumbo jets that had been inspected and safety of the airplane. cleared earlier, an agency spokesman said.

The spokesman, Jerry Doolittle, said the grounding order came in the form of an emergency suspension of the DC-10's design certificate, an apparently unprecedented step involving a commercial jetliner

Doolittle said the design certificate is required before a type of airplane is given an airworthiness certificate. a

"It's too early to tell" exactly what the inspections will entail. said another FAA spokesman. Jerry Lavey. "We're going to

have to satisfy ourselves that engine mounts of the DC-10 the aircraft now in operation conform with the original design we approved. We're going to look at everything.

Doolittle said that while the order covered the design of the entire plane, the engine mounting area was "the only document that attests to the area we're concerned with at the moment

> Lavey said it was not known how long the DC-10 fleet will be out of service. Special inspections of the

came after an American Northwest Orient, said they Airlines DC-10 lost an engine and crashed in Chicago May 25. killing 272 persons aboard the jet and three on the ground. It was

the nation's worst air disaster.

The DC-10, a tri-engine. wide-body transport built by McDonnell Douglas Corp. carries an estimated 33,000 of the nation's air travelers daily. Eight U.S. airlines operate the

At least three of the eight

were cancelling all DC-10 flights immediately. United and Northwest Orient said it hoped to substitute other aircraft for the grounded jets, but Continental said it had no spare

Overseas. Lufthansa German Airlines grounded all its DC-10s on orders of the West German government. In all, 33 foreign air carriers fly the DC-10, and they are not legally bound by the

Lavev said the DC-10s in the air when the certificate was suspended were permitted to continue on to their nearest

McDonnell Douglas' plant in Long Beach, Calif., Doolittle

A McDonnett Douglas spokesman had no immediate

reaction to the FAA's action. The FAA's action early today came only hours before the court here to try to convince a judge that the jumbo jet was safe to fly

Doolittle said the agency

acted after receiving information Tuesday night that two American Airlines DC-10s. previously inspected under recent government directives. were found to have 2-inch cracks in their engine pylon mounting

We obviously haven't found the cause of these cracks." said

Doolittle, who called the situation "disturbing.

On Tuesday, Judge Aubrey E. Robinson Jr. of U.S. District Court here initially issued - but later postponed the execution of a temporary order to ground the DC-10s. In staying his order, he said he wanted to give the FAA a chance to try to show that the jets were safe.

Robinson's action was in response to a request from the Airline Passengers Association.

Arabs enjoying life in Pampa

Pampa News Staff Abdullah, Ali and Mohammed think Pampa is a good place to live. As Abdullah said. "It's quiet and the people are nice." But like other young, single Pampa residents, the three men wish the town had more of a

Abdullah Al-Mutawa. Ali Al-Saad and Mohammed Al-Subaiyel are Saudi Arabian students who arrived here April 13 to begin a six-month training period with Celanese Chemical Co. The men. all in their mid-20s. are seniors at the University of Petroleum and Minerals in Saudi Arabia

Ali is studying purchasing. Abdullah is studying accounting and Mohammed is involved in process engineering at Celanese. Abdullah and Mohammed are roommates at the Lexington Apartments, and Ali is living with the Leonel Ford family at 1612 Evergreen

The three men speak fluent English, which they learned at the university. Their schooling has been paid for by the kingdom of Saudi Arabia.

"Unlike the U.S., the (Saudi) government owns everything - schools, hospitals, everything, Mohammed said. "So everything is free.

Also unlike the U.S., he said, there are no taxes in Saudi Arabia. Revenue from oil production - an average of 8.5 million barrels per day pays the bills. Ali. Abdullah (and Mohammed all come from fairly

large families. Their Arabian houses, made of concrete

or mud, are quite different from houses in the U.S. "We don't use much wood." Ali said. The two-story houses are square, with flat roofs. People often sleep on the rooftops, they said, and for good reason: lack of air conditioning combined with temperatures that can reach up to 120 degrees.

To beat the heat, the Saudis wear their distinctive robes and headgear, known there as thobes and guttra. Abdullah. Ali and Mohammed said they usually wear the native clothing while at home.

"At your home town it's not too good to wear trousers, but you can at school," Mohammed said. The three students brought their thobes and guttra to Pampa, but Abdullah said he has worn them only inside his apartment.

The men dispelled a few American stereotypes about Saudi Arabian geography and culture.

"It's not true that all of Saudi Arabia is a desert." Ali said. Much of the country is sandy, he said, but there

are some oases Saudi Arabia has four distinct seasons, they said Winter is the rainy season, with a minimum temperature of about 40 degrees in the middle and eastern provinces of the country. The south, a mountainous region, receives rain throughout the year. Right now the average temperature in the country is 85-90 degrees.

Because most of their food is imported, the Saudis are big fans of such American cuisine as hamburgers and sandwiches. Mohammed said.

The Arabian peninsula was the birthplace of Islam. and the men acknowledged that theirs is a strictly religious nation. Mecca and Medina, two of the three sacred centers of Islam, are located there.

Ali. Abdullah and Mohammed admitted a lapse in their religious fervor since coming to the U.S. For example, they said, they haven't been praying five times daily as they do at home.

"In Saudi Arabia we are religious because we have to be." Mohammed said.

The three visitors will return to their homeland in October to attend a last semester of school and graduate. They are planning careers in the chemical industry, but will be working for the government since it also controls Saudi Arabian business. For example, Ali said, Celanese and the kingdom will soon enter into a "joint venture" by which the company builds and

operates and plant, to be owned by the government. In the meantime, the students are enjoying their stay in the Panhandle. They have traveled throughout the region and visited Amarillo, Dallas, Houston and

Abdullah said he spends most of his leisure time in his apartment, reading and watching television. Ali enjoys an occasional game of tennis and likes to swim.

'We learn different cultures and habits - see new things." Mohammed said when asked what he enjoys most about the U.S. Smiling, he summed up his American experience with "So far, so good."

Crash releases gas

scene. There was no fire as a result of the The truck is owned by Permian Inspection Company of Pampa. According to company supervisor Lewis Jackson, about six local employees have keys and access to the truck Jackson said he did not know if any employee

had taken the vehicle Tuesday night The gas measuring station is owned by Getty Oil, and is part of a re-pressure project designed to pump natural gas back into the

ground to drive up oil. Easterly said the truck ran a stop sign at the end of Gwendolyn Street, crossed over the embankmenti and struck the metal measuring station building.

Officers reported that the truck, which Jackson said contained an estimated \$20,000

worth of equipment, was virtually destroyed.

There was no indication of injury, Easterly said. But the officer said that an inch of dirt from the pressure of the gas leak covered the truck, making it difficult to detect blood. Easterly estimated that the incident occurred

Denver Allen, Getty natural gas supervisor. said repair of the station began this morning. He said monetary damage to the station would probably be a "small amount."

It is time to control runaway regulation

There is an article in the June issue of the Reader's Digest that tends to throw some light on what degree the lives of American citizens have been regulated.

It is written by Murray L. Weidenbaum, an economist and former assistant secretary of the treasury. It tells how U.S. taxpayers and businesses are being overwhelmed by a federal regulatory system whose "benefits" include soaring prices, sagging productivity, increased taxes and technological eclipse. It is time, says this expert, to regulate the regulators.

The article makes excellent reading but the author will have a hard time selling it to people along the Potomac. They like the way things are going. They thrive on regulation. To have it any other way is to invite them to take a seat at the end of the job-seeking

Last year, inflation tore nearly 10 cents out of every dollar earned by the taxpayer. Experts marched out the usual lineup of culprits: the huge bill for imported oil, massive government spending, the accumulation of vast federal deficits. Usually ignored, however, was a major contributor to this drain on our economic lifeblood: the exorbitant, largely hidden cost of government regulation.

Today, says Weidenbaum, some 55 federal agencies, employing 80,000 bureaucrats, rain down a deluge of specifications governing nearly every aspect of our lives.

"Last year's regulatory tab," wrote the author, "was a staggering \$96 billion -- nearly four times the nation's annual trade deficit, three-quarters the national defense budget, or \$450 for every man, woman and child in the United States. Of the \$96 billion total, the taxpayer foot the bill directly for \$4.5 billion -- the cost of setting up and running the regulatory agencies. Business and industry shelled out the remaining \$91.5 billion for items ranging from paperwork to /'compliance' with financial, environmental, social and health-related federal demands:

"Passed on to the consumer in the form of higher prices, regulation added \$2,000 to the cost of an average home, at least \$22 to the average hospital bill. 7 cents to a pound of hamburger.

General Motors might be able to afford the 22,300 employees detailed to federal paperwork, but the nation's 13 million smaller businesses have neither the staff nor the expertise to cope with the blizzard of government paperwork and regulations.

"Baltimore's Parks Sausage Co., which employs 250 workers," said the article, "spends \$29,000 on federal paperwork each year. Before the firm can even open its doors in the morning, an inspector from the U.S. Department of Agriculture must spend an hour looking around to make sure that nothing has been manufactured since the night before. He's on the premises all day, and his \$14.80-an-hour wage is picked up by the company. If Parks is preparing food for the Army, another USDA agent must be on hand -- at \$22 an hour

"Parks also gets hit by the Interstate Commerce Commission, whose regulations sharply limit what truckers may transport. So, trucks which carry pork products from the Midwest to the Parks plant in Baltimore must return empty -- with the company picking up the tab and passing it along to the consumer. In all, federal regulations add six cents to the price of every pound of Parks

The article says that last September the U.S. Transportation Department held hearings on a proposal to require elevators for every subway stop in the nation. The Chicago Transit Authority estimates its costs of compliance with this and other regulations in Section 504 at \$910 million. In New York, the price tag was put at \$2.5 billion. (Faced with protests over these costs, the department is planning to modify its demands later this year.)

The federal monster has found that there are few things more

delightful than control and regulation. This article does much to focus in on the burgeoning problem.

Uncommon election

WASHINGTON (NEA) - Voters in the nine Common Market countries head to the polls this month for an election that represents a major step forward in the political integration of western Europe

For the first time, members of the European Parliament will be elected directly by the voters in member nations instead of being appointed from their national parliaments as is now the case.

Even though the 410 - member European Paliament will have only limited powers. some of the continent's leading political figures are campaigning for seats. Among them are former Chancellor Willy Brandt in West Germany and former Prime Minister Leo Tindemans in Belgium.

Turnout for the elections, which will be held June 7 - 10, may put voters in America to shame. Advance estimates range from a low of 34 percent in Germany to almost 70

percent in the Netherlands - pretty spectacular considering that barely one third of the eligible voters in the United States bothered to cast ballots in last year's elections for Congress.

The European Parliament is organized by political parties, not national groupings, and the major parties across Europe have linked up for this campaign to present unified platforms. Thus, all Christian Democrats - regardless of nationality - are running on a common platform, and likewise Socialists and Liberal -

A "United States of Europe" still remains a distant dream, but the direct election of a common parliament is likely to bring it one step closer to reality. Europeans, at any rate, seem to be taking the election seriously

Career opportunities for youth

Many a youth graduating from high school is undecided what his lifework should be. Even those wearing the college mortanboard often are not sure.

Luckily we are born optimistic. In early life we assume the world is our oyster and we shall shuck it with no difficulty. But few oysters contain pearls. Most make stew.

The editor of Money magazine advises youth to go into private enterprise. "The army grinds its recruits into obedience; the government wraps its civil servants in red tape and hierarchies; some religious orders strip members of possessions and even their names. But an enlightened corporation wants its people to enjoy themselves, to site responsibility, to think new thoughts. It pays them well and takes care of them in sickness and old age. All in all, a good corporation is a rather civilized

The magazine lists 10 "terrific" companies to work for: IBM, Xerox, Cummins Engine, Procter and Gamble, 3M, DuPont, Eastman Kodak, General

Electric, J. C. Penney and Weyerhauser. I agree government employment is a fate to be avoided. It offers lifelong security to those who will accept lifelong boredom. A public utility is the next most boring; note

there are none listed in Money's best 10. But just to work for a blue chip corporation like those listed is not necessarily utopia, either. These firms are huge; an individual can get lost in any one of them. Happiness depends more on what one is doing than in whom he is doing it for.

For this reason, a person is well avised to follow his bent -- to choose a kind of work he enjoys doing. So big and many-sided is the modern economy that there is a market for just about every kind of work imaginable. Even the fellow who specializes in designing coats of arms can find a sale for

Harry Gale, who with wife, Linda, compiles "The National Career. Directory," says there are more than 20,000 careers available today and about

It is an age of intense specialization. To do one thing and then to do it again is reputed to be monotonous, but not if one does it better each time. As he improves his performance, his service becomes more valuable and he commands a higher wage or price for that service. Duly, he becomes indispensible.

This points up the fallacy in labor unionism, which levels craftsmen at a given skill and crucifies any who are so ambitious as to rise above that level.

It follows that a youth should abjure any unionized occupation, for the union label puts a ceiling on excellence. The union member is not spurred to do better. On the contrary, he is penalized if he does. Dogs may be set on him.

Not so long ago, a college graduate who had no marked vocational preference could always teach school. It was a fairly independent calling. You worked with children or youth, usually a pleasant thing

1,000 more being added yearly. Quite a to do. You inculcated knowledge which increased the wisdom of both pupil and teacher. And the wage, though never munificent, was dependable

Unfortunately, that is not so true today. The teachers have become enamoured of monopoly unionism. The National Education Association is second only to the Teamsters in union power. School boards are not allowed to reward an outstanding teacher fittingly, nor are they permitted to fire an incompetent one.

Indications are the local school boards themselves will be dis-employed soon and the schools taken over by state if not national bureaucrats. That will make the teacher still less independent, more of an automaton.

One need not feel he must choose one vocation and stay with it until retirement. Many make changes, usually to find work that is more satisfying even if less

A common pattern is to work for an employer for a matter of years, then set up a business of one's own, either alone or with others in a partnership or corporation. The change from wage-earning to entrepreneurship may be taxing, but is also

A mature person looking back on his career is likely to see it as irrational, perhaps a little insane. Why did he do what he did? Could he live life better a second time?

One will think so. Another will stoutly defend what he did. The latter is a philosopher. His old age is blessed with gratification, and it is just as well, for he cannot live his life over again even if he

Notes from here and there on progress

toward a world society In Geneva, the World Health Organization is still intact. The Arab countries have been voted down in their latest effort to evict Israel from the United Nation's specialized agency for alleged mistreatment of the Arab population of the

Which development is not to be taken as an end to the matter. A committee has been instructed once more to look into health conditions in the Israeli - occupied territories and report back to WHO next year. At which time the Arabs can be relied upon to submit a new resolution inviting Israel out.

Meanwhile, back at glass - walled headquarters on New York City's East River. South Africa briefly returned to the United Nations General Assembly.

To repeat, briefly. South African delegates slipped into seats at the start of a debate on the future of Namibia, previously known as South - West Africa.

The South African presence was quickly spotted and caused an uproar. Very shortly thereafter the nine - member Credentials Committee, the United States and Denmark in opposition, voted to suspend South Africa's Assembly privileges for yet

This has been going on since 1974, when a move to expel South Africa from the United Nations was blocked in the Security

Council by the Western powers. Black African nations and supporters then turned to the Assembly, where they have a numerical majority and there is no veto. South Africa has since been excluded annually from Assembly sessions, the only member to be so treated in the organization's 34 - year history.

Both incidents are evidences of a politicization of United Nations activities that as much or more than any other aevelopment in recent years has contributed to the organization's declining effectiveness

Politics, of course has been the basic U.N. game since the organization was established by the victors of World War II. But until fairly recently it has been a politics of genuine power, as lossessed and exercised by the major countries and of maneuver within the organization. Narrowly nationalistic politics traditionally has been downplayed in the specialized agencies, such as WHO, where matters of world wide technical and humanitarian concern are the order of

The United States warned this year in Geneva that it might well withdraw from WHO if the Arabs succeeded in excluding Israel. It already has done so under very similar circumstances from the International Labor Organization.

It is difficult to comprehend what is to b gained from the politics of exclusion, other than the scoring of a few questionable

Laboring for support

As ''draft Kennedy'' movements continue to spring up around the countryside, White House political operatives are working hard to nail down support for Carter among key Democratic constituencies - including, most notably, organized labor

Although AFL - CIO President George Meany has frequently excoriated Carter's economic policies, the White House remains confident that most unions will recognize and reward administration efforts on behalf of programs dear to the hearts of labor

While Congress has rejected many of his initiatives, the president has fought for a long series of legislative proposals cherished by the unions - minimum wage boosts, common site picketing, cargo preference, labor law reform - and has promised to veto others, such as modifications of the Davis - Bacon law, which are anothema to labor.

Vice President Mondale and White House aide Landon Butler recently met with key leaders from the building trades unions to remind them of past administration help and to seek their loyalty in return. Heads of other major unions are being systematically wooed as well. So far, only the chiefs of the Machinists

Union and the Retail Clerks have openly jumped to Kennedy. The big question mark remains the intentions of Doug Fraser, head of the huge United Auto Workers and a longtime Kennedy ally on national health insurance, whose defection from the Carter ranks could be devastating. So far, Fraser has remained mum and is likely to stay that way until he finishes the big auto industry contract negotiations this fall.

Last year, a record 557 public officials from all levels of government were indicted on federal corruption charges - more than double the 244 charged just five years earlier and a huge jump

Judging from the number of convictions obtained, Pennsylvania leads the corruption sweepstakes, followed by Illinois, Maryland, New Jersey and the District of Columbia. It was Pennsylvania's third year in a row at the top of the list.

Showers and thundershowers reached from the southern half of the Plains through the lower Mississippi Valley as well as across the Ohio Valley and north Atlantic coast states.


Widely scattered showers were also reported across Arizona, New Mexico and Florida and over portions of the Northern Rockies.

Temperatures around the nation at 3 a.m. (EDT) ranged from 39 degrees in Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., to 86 in Blythe, Calif.

Scattered showers and thundershowers were forecast for today from North Dakota through south-central Texas, across the Mississippi and Lower Ohio Valleys, and the southern half of the Appalachians and the Gulf Coast states. Showers were also expected to reach along the Pacific Northwest coast, as well as through much of the Upper Missouri Valley.





I have removed everything, such as flour, that they live in and have used various insecticides but nothing helps. A long time ago you printed a remedy and I do wish you would repeat it. — MERRIA

DEAR MERRIA — I am repeating the best

remedy I know - this is the season when others may be plagued with the same problem. It is very simple and I learned it in Florida (where I notice you live) many years ago. When containers are clean and free of the bugs, drop a bay leaf or two in each of them. I also put them in any opened boxes of cereal, corn meal, etc. where I think bugs may appear. To first rid yourself of them it may be necessary to have an exterminator. Then start out clean. - POLLY

DEAR POLLY - I would like to share my recipe for making almond paste with Ellen and any other interested readers. Grind one and a half cups of whole blanched almonds (a portion at a time) in the electric blender or food chopper using the fine blade. Combine with one and a half cups sifted powdered sugar, one egg white, one teaspoon almond extract and one-fourth teaspoon salt. Work into a stiff paste and refrigerate in an airtight container or disposable plastic bag. This makes one and a third cups of almond paste. — MRS. H.H.C.



DEAR DR. LAMB have been taking mineral oil most of my life. I am 72. I have piles for which I had surgery a few years ago. This left me with a tight muscle in the rectum and makes elimination difficult. However, the mineral oil doesn't seem to do what it used to and my stool is too soft and sometimes shredd-

Lately I've been introduced to Metamucil which

seems to work fine and gives me a natural stool. I also drink fruit juices. What I would like to know is, is it safe to take Metamucil every day? I'm told that it is a physic and should not be relied on. It does seem to work nicely though.

DEAR READER - Many doctors used to recommend mineral oil but most of us don't recommend it anymore. Originally it was not thought to be absorbed and

The problem is small amounts of it can be absorbed and act as an irritant to the organs in which the mineral oil is deposited. It also can interfere with the absorption of important vitamins and minerals. Thenthere's a little social problem of it leaking through.

I don't recommend chemical laxatives either. I'm sending you The Health Letter number 12-8, Laxatives, Enemas and Suppositories, to give you some basic information on which of these products you should avoid. 



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

Q. I read with interest your column about the dangers of the drug Phenacetin, which is found in many pain relievers. My doctor prescribed Fiorinal (containing Phenacetin) to be taken whenever needed for pain. Would one on two tablets be considered excessive or

A. We have received quite a few letters from people who were concerned about the safety of their pain relievers after reading our People's Pharmacy Alert for Pehacetin. We emphasized in that column that the danger of kidney damage has only been associated with long term use of the drug at high doses. One or two tablets a day should not pose any problem.

The FDA has only expressed concern about the presence of Phenacetin in over - the counter drugs. Presumably, the regulators feel that if a medication requires a doctor's prescription the patient will be less likely to abuse the compound and will rarely suffer an adverse reaction. Unfortunately, this assumption may not always be

Some doctors are too casual when it comes to prescribing pain remedies. The following letter demonstrates the kind of problem some people can experience when they receive unlimited and unsupervised prescriptions.

Q. A friend of mine showed me your column on Phenacetin pain relievers - what a SCARE! But I sure need it because I am an intense abuser of the drug "Soma Compound." Six months ago a doctor gave me a "standing order" (any amount I want anytime) after I complained to him of a tense neck due to nerves.

Since then I've taken 500 - 600 of these pills (just bought another 100 today). Soma Compound makes me feel relaxed, confident and "high" after a certain point. At first three or four did the job... then six at a time - then eight: Twice I've taken 12 within two hours.

Time flies on this drug. Errands and such that I despise fly by with ease. By now I feel I can't face a somewhat difficult day without a bunch.

I am psychologically addicted - feel as though I couldn't live without Soma Compound; nor do I want to. How dangerous is the Phenacetin in this medicaton? What is "long term" usage - six months? - Five years? God... I pray I can get myself off this.

A. You need help and plenty of it! You are indeed abusing this drug and if you're not careful it will abuse you. While it's very difficult to say how long it will take for the Phenacetin component in this medication to have an adverse effect, if you keep taking it at your present dosage levels it probably won't take too long.

Soma Compound is no more addictive or dangerous than many similar medications. Some people are just more susceptible to drug dependence than others. Since you are clearly vulnerable we suggest that you seek professional help. Not only do you need counseling that can assit you in breaking the "addiction" but you need support that can enable you to deal with the problems that make this type of drug induced "escape" so attractive.

We also recommend that you find another doctor. Any physician who would give an open - ended prescription for this kind of drug without careful supervision is acting irresponsibly.

Q. Please tell me about the side effects of Naprosyn (Naproxen). Ever since I started taking this drug for my arthritis I have had a rash and unpleasant itching. My doctor says this is not caused by the medicine, but I am so sure. What can you tell me?

A. According to the drug company that makes Naprosyn, about one out of 20 patients will experience the kind of skin reactions you have reported. Itching, hives or a rash are a signal that a person may be allergic to the medication. Continued use could get you into trouble.

Naprosyn more commonly affects the digestive tract. Side effects to be alert for include indigestion, nausea, vomiting, constipation (or diarrhea), heartburn and abdominal pain. Any of these signs should send a patient to the doctor because they could be an early warning of

We suggest that you discuss this drug with your physician another time. There are alternate medications available for arthritis that may not cause the kind of discomfort you have reported with

Baseball holds annual draft

NEW YORK (AP) - Major league baseball gave retiring University of Michigan Coach Moby Benedicta little going-away present Tuesday, selecting three of his players in the first round of the annual free agent draft.

The Detroit Tigers made Michigan outfielder Rick Leach the first Wolverine selection. Then the Los Angeles Dodgers chose two of Benedict's pitchers, left-hander Steve Howe and right-hander Steve Perry.

Leach was the 13th player chosen. Howe was No.16 and Perry

No. 25 as Coach Benedict's team dominated the early selections. Leach, of course, also is a highly-ratedsquaback and must decide between foottball and baseball. He was picked by the Denver Broncos in the fifth round of last month's National Football League draft, the 132nd player selected in that lottery.

One player who already has made up his mind about the football-baseball dilemma is Al "Choo Choo" Chambers. Chambers is a slugging outfielder from Harrisburg, Pa. who was the first player selected in the draft, chosen by the Seattle

Chambers, who batted 484 in 22 games this season, had signed a letter of intent to play football at Arizona State. But after the draft's first round, the Mariners announced that they had signed the 6-foot-4, 210-pound youngster, who graduates from high school today

Chambers said that being the nation's No.1 choice was something he'd always dreamed about.

"I didn't think it would happen," he said. "But I thought if I worked hard and was determined, I might go early. Then, when Seattle's scout came around, and I knew they had the No.1 pick, I figured I could be No.1 in the nation.

Atlanta, which came up with the National League's rookie of thed year when they picked Bob Horner No.1 in last June's draft, had the fourth pick in the regular phase this time and chose outfielder-first baseman Brad Komminsk from Shawnee High School in Lima, Ohio

Among the players chosen were first baseman Joe Lansford. brother of California's Carney Lansford, by San Diego; infielder Todd Demeter, son of ex-major leaguer Don Demeter, by the New York Yankees: catcher Marc Sullivan, son of Boston Red Sox executive vice president Haywood Sullivan, by Boston; pitcher Jeff Stottlemyre, brother of ex-major leaguer Mel Stottlemyre, by Seattle and pitcher Terry Sutcliffe, brother of Los Angeles pitcher Rick Sutcliffe, by Los Angeles.
