## Tried to hitch ride with Texas Ranger

# Two murder suspects captured

BORGER — Luck ran out for two suspected
murderers this morning when they tried to hitch
a ride with a Texas Ranger searching for the
pair.

Micheal Clyde Jones, 26, of Borger and George Marshall Hall. 23. were arrested by Texas Ranger Jim Gilspey just a few miles from where they reportedly shot and killed night jailer Jack Thompson, 43, with his own gun.

Thompson's body was found by Hutchinson County Sheriff Lon Blackmon at approximately 10:30 Monday night after inmates at the jail alerted citizens that the jailer had been injured.

"Several inmates started yelling after the escape and aroused the attention of people passing by." Lt. Ed Wheeler said after issuing a prepared statement shortly before the suspects were apprehended. "We are not sure of the cause of death but we believe he was killed by a shot fired from a 357 magnum revolver."

Minutes after Wheeler read the statement.
Gilspey radioed the sheriff's office in Borger.
asking for assistance in identifying the pair.

"I'm out at 136. Near the cemetery. I have these guys hitchin' a ride. You want to send someone out that can identify them. I'm not real sure that I can do it." Gilspey said over his radio. District Attorney Investigator Michael Blackmon sped from the sheriff's office.

Jones, with an almost mute voice, told the investigator that he had tossed Thompson's

revolver into a dumpster.
"It's in the trash behind the Del Rancho Inn."
Jones told Blackmon.

Sheriff Blackmon met the officers next to the motel, only a few hundred feet from where the pair were taken into custody, and joined the investigator in the back seat of the DPS cruiser.

The escapees were taken to the Hutchinson County Annex, where they were booked back into the Hutchinson County Jail they had fled only 12 hours before.

Jones was being held on escape and arson charges and Hall was being held on a contempt of court citation when the pair reportedly "tricked" the jailer into opening their cell door.

Wheeler said authorities did not know why the jailer had opened the inmates' cell door.

building, where officers booked the pair on escape and capital murder charges.

Judge Naden Spinks arraigned the pair.

carefully reading their rights and making sure they acknowledged and understood those rights. Sheriff Blackmon personally took the boot laces and belts off the prisoners.

He then ordered that the pair be held in maximum security at the jail Jones has escaped from twice before.

"I want that whole area sealed off. They don't get visitors, they don't get nothing," Blackmon said

A light atmosphere settled onto the officers involved in the manhunt and arrest after it was apparent the men were indeed back in custody.

Sheriff Blackmon gave a thumbs-up sign to his men as he escorted one of the prisoners into the judge's chambers.

"We just got real lucky." Investigator

Blackmon said upon being congratulated for the arrest. "Real lucky."

Spinks did not set bond for the pair and authorities speculated the men would be held without bond until they had talked with their

lawyers.
Sheriff Blackmon refused to talked to reporters after the arrest but told photographers to take all the pictures they wanted while the

suspects were being booked into the jail.

Thompson was born June 10, 1936, in Borger
and was a lifetime resident of the area. He was
formerly a member of the Hutchinson County

Sheriffs' Posse and the Borger Jaycees. He was a

member of the Fellowship Baptist Church.



in the death of Hutchinson County Jailer Jack Thompson



### A department of education? No!

The integrity of higher education was discussed at the Fifty-sixth American Assembly held in March. There were 66 Americans from 20 states and the District of Columbia who gathered to discuss the subject. There was general agreement by the participants on a number of now published statements. It was stated that public confidence in American higher education has been eroded in recent

The published statements concluded with one we would consider of greatest importance: "The integrity of higher education could be threatened by centralized control. For that reason, establishment of a national department of education, at least in the forms recently discussed and currently considered, would not enhance that integrity and could well diminish it.'

Within days after we received the findings of the American Assembly, a Heritage Foundation analyst reported that government's role in education can be expected to increase. "With or without the proposed U.S. Department of Education, the federal government's role in education, already strong, can be expected to increase," Thomas Ascik said. "Establishment of a new federal bureaucracy to centralize these activities, however, will almost certainly speed the process along.

Floor action on legislation establishing a new federal department is expected soon in the Senate. A first-year budget of \$14.5 billion is proposed along with a work force of 15,600. The proposal will face its first test in the House.

The proposed 13th department of the cabinet would be larger than the current departments of Commerce, HUD, Interior, Justice and State," Ascik says. He fears a final federal takeover of American education and says that the feds already have a role in hiring and firing of teachers, admission of students and construction of buildings. The role is pervasive now and can be expected to grow.

The American Assembly noted the declining quality of primary and secondary education and agreed that unionization is frequently destructive of academic standards which are essential to institutional integrity.

We believe that centralization of control of education in government helps to open the door to the most disruptive effects of teacher unionization. And, since the largest union in the nation (the National Education Association) is the prime motivator for a Department of Education in the federal government, we see an unholy alliance which bodes ill for general education.

Although all this could lead to a breakdown in tax-supported schooling and cause a turn of parents to private schools, the total eost would be horrendous. For families to continue to support the failing tax-supported schools through taxation and still pay to have their children educated in private schools, would be a great burden.

The alternative could become more expensive as time goes by and frightening in all its implications. Tax-supported schools are government schools. More and more the thinking of a centralized authority will filter down to mold the minds of children who are supposed to be in the process of being educated.

As centralized control of the tax-supported schools deepen, the children will learn less of the essentials needed for them to form their own good judgment. Instead of being given the opportunities to become educated, they will become victims of statist

Concerned parents may find that they cannot really afford not to place their children in private schools, even though they will be taxed to support the government controlled "education", system. If enough parents made this a top family priority, they might dry up the support for public (government) schools.

### GOP woos white ethnics

For the moment, the GOP seduction effort will be focused primarily on ethnic voters in New Jersey, since that state will be electing members of its state legislature this year and a pickup of 15 seats would give the Republicans control of the state senate

But state party officials in Michigan and Massachusetts are already making overtures to the national GOP organization for help in launching ethnic campaigns of their own, so the idea may spread.

The national party is pouring \$20,000 into an advertising campaign in New Jersey aimed at convincing ethnic voters that Republicans share their values. aspirations and attitudes on a variety of

The first round of ads, which began in February, were almost subliminal - salutes to heroes and holidays important to various nationality groups with "The Republican. Party" identified, ever so discreetly, as the

Phasetwo consists of newspaper, radio and television advertisements stressing GOP identification with social, economic and foreign policy issues thought to be of special interest to white ethnics, and Phase three will include materials geared for specific candidates running in this year's legislative races.

Under the leadership of Chairman Bill Brock, an ardent advocate of outreach programs to broaden the base of the Republican Party, the national GOP is already pouring a small fortune into political programs targeted on blacks and Hispanic - Americans.

With the addition of white ethnics to the list, about the only group omitted from priority treatment is that tiny band which provides most of the Republican support based today - the WASPs, white Anglo Saxon Protestants

### Disqualified for the job

Speaking of targets, Chairman Michael Pertschuk is fast becoming the favorite one of industry groups seeking to combat the regulatory zeal of the Federal Trade Commission

The American Medical Association, taking a cue from industry groups in the children's television advertising case, is trying to disqualify Pertschuk from participation in an FTC move against restrictions on physician advertising.

The grounds? Same as those which convinced a federal judge to knock the chairman off the "kid - vid" case: the AMA claims Pertschuk has made public statements showing he has prejudged the issues to be decided by the FTC

The commission, with Pertschuk abstaining, has rejected the AMA demand that the chairman be disqualified. But an appeal to the courts remains likely.

Pertschuk, his FTC colleagues and other federal regulators are seeking to overturn the federal district court ruling that took him off the children's advertising case. A Court of Appeals panel heard arguments on that controversy last week.

# Religion man's motivating force

By OSCAR COOLEY For sheer durability, I give you the Christian Church. What other institution

has lived intact for 2,000 years? For influence, too, I nominate the church. What other institution has motivated man so strongly, in peace and war, in affluence and poverty? What other institution enrolls the richest, the poorest, the wise and the ignorant, the famous and the obscure?

Economics deals with material things, using reason and logic. Religion has to do with man's relation to God, who is a mystery. Different as religion is from economics, it would be a rash person who would hold it is less a motivating force.

Of the four billion, give or take a few million, people in the world, some three billion are identified with one religion or another. The largest group are the Christians -- 985 million (that includes a

few who are not in church every Sunday.) A fairly close second are the Muslims, of whom Time magazine says there are 750 million and more coming fast. Islam is now enjoying a revival. To what extent the Muslim evangelists are responding to the establishment of the new nation of Isral in their midst, one wonders. In any case, there is now a fervency in the Islamic

countries not evidenced since the Crusades.

Islam is like Christianity in its belief in one God. Indeed, a devout Muslim praysfive times a day. They are also stong for family, as well as bitterly opposed to alcoholic liquor. But unlike Christianity, which draws a sharp line between chruch and state. Islam is political as well as religious. Muhammed and his followers ran the city of Medina as well as his church, and after he died in 632 A. D. Islam became a politico-religious empire and expanded vastly into Asia, Africa and

By 1918, Islam was dismembered, but the Muslims still like to think of themselves as all one nation. Maybe that is why petroleum-rich Saudi Arabia has given some 7 percent of her gross national product to poorer Muslim states.

Ardent and morally strict as the Muslims are, Islam lacks something that Christianity has. Call it divine compassion. Muhammed, though a prophet and a devout man, was not Jesus Christ, the intercessor between God and man. Muslims have wisdom, but Christians have love. The implacable hatred of the Muslim for the Jew (which, incidentally, was not shared by Muhammed) is shown by the present

refusal to make peace with Israel and the

Christianity, too, has been intolerant, but The history of the Christian church, like

that of other human institutions, has pages that many a Christian today would like to tear out. But the church's influence for good, down the years, has been incalculable. It has provided commandments and has stood for a code of right and wrong without which our secular institutions -- schools and libraries, charities and corporations, bodies politic and bodies economic, never could have

For nearly 2,000 years, the church has been a guide and a spur to man's moral and spiritual development. Can it be a mere coincidence that during these same two millenia man has made enormous material progress far more than in any other period of similar length?

Every church is a voluntary association. No one is forced to belong. No one who belongs is forced to give to the church's support, yet, mirabile dictu, most churches stay solvent. If one closes its doors another

Somebody has finally noticed that incongruity and acted upon it, and the initiative comes not from some government agency looking for new regulatory worlds to conquer but rather from a commercial motor carrier Trailways bus company

In a case which has received remarkably little publicity considering its potential ramifications. Trailways has asked the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) to mandate design controls on all interstate trucks and buses that would prevent them from traveling faster than 57 mph.

The rule - making application, which NHTSA has agreed to consider, would affect only commercial vehicles - not private automobiles. But it has sent a shudder through Detroit, which can read the handwriting on the wall.

Trailways already practices what it preaches. After six - to - eight months of testing in late 1977 and early 1978, the company began fitting speed control devices to its entire fleet of 2,200 buses. It expects to complete the job by this time next year.

According to a Trailways spokesman, the company was motivated both by safety considerations and by a desire to save on fuel costs. The speed governors, which cost a mere \$75 apiece, do not affect acceleration or performance at speeds below the legal limit. But the company estimates it can save 3 million gallons of fuel a year by holding its buses to a maximum of 57 mph - a huge dollar savings, especially with fuel prices escalating so rapidly.

But as compliance started to slip, highway deaths began climbing again. Last year, as drivers increasingly ignored the speed limit, fatalities went over 50,000 for the first time since the law was enacted.

Apart from safety factors, fuel consumption is also a source of growing governmental concern in this era of energy shortages and soaring gas prices. The Federal Highway Administration estimates that 5.7 billion gallons of gas could be saved each year if there were 100 percent compliance with the 55 mph limit.

The American love affair with the automobile, and with speed has been a long and ardent one. But for the first time, serious questions have arisen about whether we can afford the romance indefinitely.

**Associated Press Writer** EAGLE PASS, Texas (AP) - Officials waited today for test results to see if an 8-year-old boy would become No. 60 on a list of persons bitten by rabid dogs in the past 90 days on both sides of this city of 21,000, which sits on the Mexican border.

Gerardo Castano was listed Monday night in "serious and guarded condition" in the intensive care unit of San Antonio's Santa Rosa Hospital, according to hospital spokesman Jack Finger.

"It has not been confirmed that he has rabies. He has symptoms of rabies," said Finger, adding that tests on the child have been sent to the National Center for Disease Control in Atlanta.

Mayor Edward Rodrigues said 50 persons have undergone the rabies vaccinations in Eagle Pass. Forty-two of the 50 patients already have

completed the series, said Dr. William Nettles, a Uvalde veterinarian. Eight others still were undergoing

treatments in Piedras Negras, Mexico, just across the Rio Grande from Eagle Pass, according to Dr. Alberto Valdez, a Mexican public health officer

Authorities on both sides of the border were trying to locate a Mexican man bitten 12 days ago by a rabid dog at an Eagle Pass junkyard. Officials said the man returned to Mexico without knowing the seriousness of his wound

'Nobody knows who that gentlemen is or

where he is from," said City Manager Roberto Gonzalez.

A rabies researcher at the National Center for Disease Control in Atlanta said the prognosis is bleak for anyone who contracts the disease.

"It's almost always fatal. There have been three survivors reported in medical history," said Dr. William Winkler, a veerinarian epidemiologist who has worked in rabies research since 1961.

Meanwhile, officials feared another wave of animal infections in the area. Secondary cases of rabies are expected soon, said Nettles.

'The first case in Eagle Pass was Easter Sunday. We've already had our first secondary case, and now dogs that were exposed have gotten through the incubation City officials, in an emergency meeting

Monday, enlisted the aid of area clergymen to warn residents about the danger. "We know you are compassionate, so we are asking you to spread the word (of the

rabies outbreak) to your parishoners." Gonzalez told the clergymen. Gonzalez and Rodrigues distributed State Health Department pamplets written in Spanish and English entitled "Rabies

### Houston police probe to begin

HOUSTON (AP) — The U.S. Commission on Civil Rights will take a long, hard look during the next two days at the Houston police department, a target of bitter criticism during the past two years by minority groups claiming brutality and excessive use of firearms.

Houston, the nation's 5th largest city, was selected, along with Philadelphia, for commission hearings into complaints of police wrongdoings.

A day before the hearings were to begin, Police Lt. C.J. Lofland said Houston is much like Dodge City of the 1880s when shootouts were routine and the man with the fastest draw was the one to live. Lofland said eight to 10

homicides in a weekend "is a common occurance. Last weekend, 12 persons were murdered in Houston,

bringing the homicide total for the year to 248, compared with 177 for the same period in 1978. Lofland added, "Houston is a boomtown, alive, vibrant and growing and the number of law

enforcement officers need to

police a city this size is unavailable.

Mexican-Americans have been the loudest in the protests of Houston police, especially since the death of Joe Campos Torres in May 1978. Torres drowned in the muddy waters of Buffalo Bayou while in police custody. The three officers convicted of violating Torres' civil rights recevied probated sentences from a federal judge.

Since then several other officers have been charged with civil rights violations, involving the use of so-called throw-down guns after suspects were slain by policemen, and, former police chief Carrol Lynn was convicted by a federal court jury on charges of obstruction of justice, perjury and extortion.

At least seven persons have been subpoenaed to appear before the commission.

### 'Dead' airman search continues

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) - Air Force officials have resurrected a missing sergeant they declared officially dead 18 months ago. They would very much like to find him to give him the news, since they also reclassified him as a deserter.

Air Force officials said Monday they are searching for Staff Sgt. Wilmer W. Higgs Jr., who mysteriously disappeared New Year's Eve 1977 from the all-night Exxon gas station where he moonlighted. Police had felt it was a robbery-homicide.

An FBI investigation, however, determined last month that Higgs, 33, was alive and had been working in Southeast Texas since he vanished.

"He is born again," quipped an Air Force official who asked not to be identified. Air Force authorities, who gave Higgs new official life by simply revoking the death declaration, refused

Higgs, a 12-year Air Force veteran who had taught marksmanship at Lackland Air Force Base here, was the object of a statewide search after his disappearance.

Police officers discovered the gas station's cash register empty and found human blood stains in the office. The sergeant's car was later found partially submerged in the San Antonio River south of the city. There were signs of a struggle.

Despite a \$1,000 reard from Exxon, no trace of the missing sergeant was ever found. The Air Force declared him

"officially deceased" Jan 20, 1978 and an undetermined amount of death and insurance benefits was paid to Higgs' "widow," Carolyn. A memorial service was held for him four months later in Vidor.



### Lifestyle change can help

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB — I am

a 73-year-old male who has experienced irregular heart beats (or extrasystoles) for 15 years. I've been having annual physical examinations and each time my doctor assures me that there is nothing that I should be concerned about. Nothing that I do, not even physical exertion, causes the skips. Recently my doctor prescribed a tablet of Inderal each day. I thought Inderal was used for high blood pressure. Mine's on the low side — usually about 110

Is Inderal the kind of medicine that I should be taking? What is it supposed to do? Is do I need any medicine at

DEAR READER — There are many different types of irregular heart beats. They can occur in individuals without any heart disease at all. If you were to take continuous heart tracings on anybody, in the course of a day or two you would see some irregular heart beats, or skipped beats as people sometimes call them.

I observed these in all the astronauts because we had records on them for hours and hours at a time while they were being studied in space chambers and in other conditions. I also saw them in many of the healthy members of the Air Force flying population. They can be

well. To use the other end of the spectrum, the onset of a heart attack may be associated with extra beats.

The only way you can determine the significance of extra beats in a specific individual is through a medical examination. If they occur sporadically in a young, healthy individual, they're not likely to be very important. But if they're noticed for the first time in a person who is having chest pain and other difficulties, they are probably part of that process and can be quite impor-To help you I'm sending

A person with recurrent skipped beats should not smoke or use any coffee or beverages containing any caffeine. He should maintain a regular exercise program if his health permits and avoid any digestive disturbances. Indigestion seems to trigger such attacks.

Inderal is used to calm the electrical activity of the heart muscle - really it neutralizes or decreases a person's sensitivity to adre-

naline. Of course, excess adrenaline formation can be released as a result of emotional stress, even from getting excited while watching your favorite football game on television. It is also used to lower blood pressure. So it's correct to use it in either or both conditions.

There are a number of other medicines that can be used to control irregularities of the heart if they're needed. The choice of the proper medicine depends upon the kind of irregularity, what it shows on the electrocardiogram and whether it is really bothering you or causing symptoms.







### Watson seeks Open title Nicklaus in the first half of the tour.

TOLEDO, Ohio (AP) - Maybe Tom Watson is right. He insists he doesn't belong on the same golf plateau with Jack Nicklaus - at least for

"I need to win more major championships. That's how the press, the fans, young peers judge a player," said Watson, well-rested for a charge to his first United States Open title.

America's most prestigious golf tournament opens at Inverness Club Thursday. Watson and Nicklaus will rank in the forefront as favorites.

"You must win the Open to be considered a great player," said Watson. "With one exception Sam Snead — no one has been a great player without winning the Open."

The year-by-year yardsticks of the game's two greats, at comparable points in their careers, support Watson.

At age 29, Nicklaus had won two Opens, three Masters and one PGA National in eight tour years. That was six major professional titlesamong his 30 tournament victories

Watson is now the same age a decade later. His comparable figures in 81/2 tour seasons: no Open titles, one Masters, two British Opens and three majors among his 14 tour triumphs.

### Bowman gets new job


MONTREAL (AP) - Scotty Bowman did his best to smile through the interviews and say how happy he was to have become the new general manager of the National Hockey League's Buffalo Sabres: He tried to keep inside the frustration he suffered last season, when he guided the Montreal Canadiens to their fourth consecutive Stanley Cup title and their fifth in his eight years as their coach.

But he couldn't. After his formal remarks Monday the anger and resentment began to seep out. They were the result of his year-long power struggle with Irving Grundman, a businessman given the position of managing director and executive vice president of the Canadiens







## Injury not factor to Spectacular Bid

BALTIMORE (AP) - Dr. Robert Vallence, attending veterinarian for Spectacular Bid, said a safety pin injury to the horse before last Saturday's Belmont Stakes probably was not a major factor in Bid's

third-place finish. "I can't see that (the injury) as a major factor in the horse getting beat," said Dr. Vallence. "It's like a splinter taken out of a finger. There is no soreness immediately, but 24 to 48 hours later, dirt may get up in there and it may become sore."

Vallence said. Trainer Grover "Buddy" Delp said that the colt had stepped on a safety pin in his stall before

the race, but that it was decided not to scratch him.

Delp said the pin was dropped on the floor of Bid's stall when a groom was removing protective bandages from the horse's legs early Saturday morning. Delp said the colt began pawing at the ground, and the pin became lodged in his hoof.

Meanwhile, Belmont steward Gerard A. Burke said that

veterinarians approved Spectacular Bid to race in the Belmont, so that action against Delp for allowing the colt to run with a bad foot appeared unlikely

Drs. Manny Gilman and Ted Hill of the New York Racing Association both said that they had examined the horse before the race, and that he appeared







### Favorable weather improve wheat prospects

WASHINGTON (AP) - Favorable weather in key production areas last month helped improve prospects for this year's winter wheat harvest, under way in southern areas.

According to the Agriculture Department, 1979 winter wheat production is estimated at 1.43 billion bushels, 3 percent larger than forecast last month.

Based on field conditions as of June 1, the latest estimate also is up 14 percent from the 1978 winter wheat harvest, the smallest in five

A month ago the crop was estimated at 1.39 billion bushels. The 1978 harvest was less than 1.25 billion bushels.

· Officials said "generally cool temperatures plus adequate moisture contributed to the increased yield prospects in most of the wheat growing area" in May.

Overall, the crop was reported in "fair to mostly good" condition in early May and then was rated "good in most areas" by the end of the month, the department's Crop Reporting Board said. Winter wheat is planted in the fall and harvested the following

spring and summer. It accounts for about three-fourths of total U.S. wheat production.

Production in Kansas, the leading wheat producer, was estimated at 331.7 million bushels, compared to the May forecast of 321 million

bushels and the state's harvest of 306 million in 1978. Farmers will have about 42.9 million acres of winter wheat for harvest this year, compared to 38.9 million acres harvested in 1978.

Nationally, the average wheat yield was estimated at 33.3 bushels an acre, compared to the May forecast of 32.4 bushels and the average of 32.1 harvested in 1978.

### Oil spill could reach Texas coast

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) - An oil slick. which may become the biggest spill in history, could hit the coasts of Texas and Louisiana next month, petroleum experts are warning. A ruptured, burning Mexican offshore well is

unleashing about 1.25 million gallons of oil a day into the Gulf of Mexico off the Yucatan Peninsula, the director of the Center for Short-Lived Phenomena said Monday.

The exploratory well blew out on June 3, and the uncontrolled gush of oil is escaping through a flaming torch of natural gas, said Richard Golob, whose organization provides information to scientists about natural and manmade changes in the environment and produces a newsletter on oil spills.

"If the oil continues to escape at the current rate and if the well is not capped before the estimated time of control, this will become the biggest spill in history," Golob said.
