Haig barely escapes as bomb rips bridge

CASTEAU, Belgium (AP) — Gen. Alexander M. Haig escaped an apparent assassination attempt unharmed today when a powerful explosion injured three of his guards and damaged his car as he rode from his home to his office, authorities reported

A spokesman for Haig, who is due to retire Friday, said a black Mercedes Benz trailing Haig's car and carrying two Belgian policemen and one U.S. security guard was completely wrecked by the explosion, which apparently was touched off by a land mine detonated by remote control.

He said the guards, who were not identified, were only slightly injured and had already left the hospital. He said Haig went to his office after the explosion and was working as usual.

The attack occurred at a bridge along the

road between Haig's home in Obourg and his office in Casteau.

It was reported that two motorcyclists were seen earlier driving near the scene and one was taken into custody nearby. But police later said they were not involved.

Police said the explosives went off behind Haig's car, ripping up concrete blocks and stones from a narrow bridge over a ravine The following car was blown to one side. averting a hole left by the blast, but its roof was crushed by flying concrete blocks. police said. Haig's spokesman earlier said the guard's car had been blown over onto

The exhaust and trunk of Haig's car was damaged but it was operable. Haig's car was in front of the guards' car and police said there appeared to be a second escort car preceding Haig.

Two men had been seen riding motorcycles at the site of the explosion earlier in the day, and the Belgian news agency Belga said one of them was arrested in Ath, about 12 miles away.

However, NATO officials said they had no idea so far of who was behind the explosion, and no group claimed responsibility immediately

The incident took place at about 8:30 a.m. near the village of Obourg where Haig lives, as he was being driven to his nearby office. Obourg and Casteau are a few miles


Casteau. site of Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe, is 31 miles south of Brussels, near the expressway to Paris.

Crash investigation under way

Investigators from the National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) were at the scene this morning of a plane crash which took the lives of Pampa businessman C.L. Roberts and his wife Marion Saturday afternoon.

Investigators are attempting to determine the exact cause of the crash, which is believed to have been preceded by engine trouble in the small Beachcomber

The plane crashed into the north wall of a 20-foot gulley in a field six miles south of Pampa. The craft exploded on impact, according to witnesses who said

they saw the plane make several passes over the area before the crash.

A spokesman for the FAA said the investigation would be handled by the National Transportation Safety Board, as required by law in accidents resulting in fatalities. The NTSB investigator will be assisted by an investigator for the FAA, although the former agency is responsible for a final report on the accident.

T.W. Finch, chief of the NTSB Field Office in Fort Worth, said examination of the plane's engine could be done on site, at a local facility, or in Fort Worth, Indications of an engine malfunction. Finch said.

'Conformance' song expected in mail

Conformity is a building block in the structure of socialism.

This is not, however, to say that when one takes abode in one of the all-look-alike houses on Shady Lane Street, U.S.A. one has flowered pink. Moving into a cottage that looks like the ones on both sides of it and the others all the way up and down the street may be only what one can afford.

Nor is it to say, either, that switching to one of those tad-pole sized cars like millions of other Americans are doing puts one in the total-togetherness crowd. It just may suit one's economy better.

However, all the sameness we see throughout the land is not the inconsequential kind. One sees much of that sameness being forced upon us, and the trend of force seems to be growing. It is a governmentaltrend

Most Americans are alert to the government's gradual seizure of the educational processes which traditionally were local and home-flavored with individualism and parental guidance.

Most Americans are alert to the government's herding us to the federal coffers on April 15th each year to "coff" up what we have left, what we can scrape up, and what we can sign to give on the

Most Americans are alert to the government's many regulations that, along with taxes, serve to disincentivate us, corraling us like cattle to do as it tells us and discouraging individual creativity.

Most Americans can look around - we in West Texas, they in the Northeast, in the Northwest, in the Midwest and in the South and in all directions — and see the sameness that is being forced upon us in many ways

Conformity is a most effective tool for Big Brother.

He smiles upon you and pulls the string which makes you dance supporter, that fanatic's fanatic,

Now he plays another tune. On July 15, this year, it will be No. 1

on Big Brother's Juke Box It will be the "New Mail Song."

It goes like this: You conform, Little Brother, to the New Mail Dimensional Size Standards or you pay more or your mail won't go

It is another verse of the old, old song we've been hearing so much of late, that things must fit the computer or the machine, both of which have been programmed to disregard anything square that is directed to the round hole.

A piece of mail can't be over-size or under-size, but must conform to certain bounds or it will have a surcharge slapped on it be because a "people" will have to handle it instead of a machine.

Big Brother's Postal Service has adopted the standards in the name of economy and points out that handling "non-standard" pieces costs more. Smaller pieces are being banned because they can be trapped in other mail, damage the machinery and generally

Your mail cannot be too thin, for the machine can't digest filmy stuff. It can't be too thick, either. It cannot be too long, nor too short, nor too wide. What it amounts to is if you mail it, you'd better

The "new mail" is not something new — nor is it a "sleeper" Big Brother is pulling on us. It has been in the works a long time and has had much publicity. But its time is now at hand. In July it will

The new size standards were proposed in 1973 by the Postal Service, and debated in the Postal Rate Commission. In 1976 the governors of the Postal Service approved the commission's recommendation to adopt the new size standards with the understanding that customers would be given until at least April 15, 1978, to exhaust supplies of current stock.

Now comes July and the time to conform. Is everybody happy and ready? Big Brother wants to know, probably, but not because he cares

Senator uses both sides of his mouth

LEGISLATORS serving the supposedly economy-minded 96tt Congress continue to talk out of both sides of their mouths. promising to cut taxes and the federal budget while simultaneously bragging about the expensive federal programs they have attracted to their states and districts.

The most recent example involves Sen. Richard S. Schweiker, R-Pa., who introduced legislation to limit the growth of federal spending on the grounds that Congress must be "truly serious about fighting inflation, cutting back federal spending and balancing the budget.'

Explained Schweiker: "There has been no clearer mandate from the American people in recent years than their desire to balance month's advance written notice of the the budget, limit government spending and cut taxes."

But the Coalition of American Public Employees discovered that only one month earlier the senator distributed to his constituents a newsletter "proudly citing his raids on pork barrel."

Economizer Schweiker boasted of his role in securing for Pennsylvania federal funds to finance a \$10 million highway bypass, a \$7.8 million lock and dam project and \$5 million for river and beach anti-erosion projects.

Plato and ballot proposals

I recently had to listen to someone going on about the virtues of Plato. The speaker was a decent enough man, not a philosopher, and with a very simple outlook. He had been totally captivated by Plato's talk of justice and morality and the search for eternal values, that it never occured to him to look at all critically at the substance.

In my list of the top twenty most harmful human beings who ever lived. Plato is in there, fighting hard for his place. Plato features in that select group of mine not because he was especially evil, but because his harm was very influential.

Plato was the man who started the idea that the problem of politics is to get us the most virtuous and just rulers. He asked the question about which system would put the

good guys at the top. His own answer was particularly offensive: he thought that in the ideal state the governing class would be a self-perpetuating elite which had been taught justice, and that the other poor mugs would never think of interfering because they had been taught since birth that they were inferior.

People have been fooled ever since; especially arrogant people who think they know more about justice and would therefore be in among the "Guardians" rather than down there with the dumb peasants

Surely, though, we all want to be ruled with virtue and justice by the "best" people? Not me. I can think of three objections straight away. In the first place I do not want anyone who rules me thinking

he or she knows what is right and just. I want someone more humble and hesitant, rather than a Cromwell. Secondly, I think we should do it ourselves, even if we make a worse job of it. It teaches us, improves us and gives us the moral growth which comes with responsibility. If we are treated as

he put it, "Only power checks power.

children all our lives, that is all we will ever My third objection is the big one. Count me with Montesquieu, Lord Acton and Malcolm Muggeridge. Wherever there is power it will be abused. The most just and virtuous soul in the world starts to deteriorate the moment that he or she takes over the reins. Montesquieu was the man who pointed out how wrong we are to suppose that morality can check power. As

In other words, instead of worrying about how we can get virtuous and just rulers, we should be concerned about how we can control them. Constitutional democracy does not give us the best rulers; far from it. What it does do is more important. By means of regular elections, separation of powers, and similar institutions it enables us to tame our rulers. This is one reason why I personally favor the continued existence of devices like recall petitions: they keep us in control. All of which brings us to ballot proposals.

Plato would not have liked them at all Indeed, he was scornful over the equivalent in his own city. They give the unjust and unvirtuous masses (you and me) the chance to limit the doings of those just and virtuous rulers. I note with some interest how legislators squeal in outrage at ballot proposals. What an affront it is that citizens should have the presumption to meddle in things like government.

One thing can be said of a ballot proposal. It is not corrupted by power and it never becomes part of a governing class. No ballot proposal, once elected, ever started wearing a Brooks Brothers suit and talking about the complexity of modern government

No ballot proposal was ever suborned by the bureaucrats and led to identify with them and their interests rather than with the people who voted for it. The rise of the ballot proposal is probably the most significant fact about American politics in the last decade. By finding ourselves a bypass route, we have found another way to tame legislators. Excellent

The only point we have to watch now that we have found a way of taking power unto ourselves occasionally is that we are not corrupted by it. How easy it would be to use ballot proposals to exercise power over the way our fellow citizens behave. How easy to use every election as a battleground on which to fight for control of behavior. The biggest lesson we might learn from ballot proposals is how many questions are best settled outside of the political arena.

Not one of a kind

The ousted Ugandan tyrant may be in Libya under the protection amounting to virtual house arrest of his most notable Muammar el-Qaddafi.

Or he may be in Baghdad, shopping around among the more radical Islamic regimes for arms and men to stage a military comeback

Or he may have gone underground in his native bush country of northern Uganda to carry on a guerrilla campaign with the remnants of his army against the Tanzanian-supported liberators in

Take your pick. The whereabouts of one of the most repellent figures to play a walk-on part on the world stage in recent years is a subject of considerable speculative interest these days. Less so, possibly, in Uganda itself, where the dominant sentiment is simply thankfulness that he is at last gone although still far

And even should he be, already black Africa seems to have found a replacement in Bokassa I of the Central African Empire. That individual has been little heard from since his grandiose self-coronation some three years back as ruler of the backwater former French colony of Ubangi-Shari.

He has more than made up for that, however, with the now confirmed killings of students objecting, among other things, to regulations requiring them to wear government uniforms. According to Amnesty International, which blew the first whistle on the incident, the dead children between ages 8 and 16 may number in the hundreds.

Bokassa himself has acknowledged deaths, but minimized the number. And in his version, they were not children but 'grown-ups, youths. There have been suspicions of rottenness

in this particular chunk of African real estate for some time, but hertofore little clear evidence other than the public

Whistle-blowers, beware!

By Martha Angle and Robert Walters WASHINGTON (NEA) - The Carter administration once again is attempting to throttle "whistle-blowers," the conscience-stricken government employees who risk their careers by exposing wrongdoing within federal

departments and agencies. The need to protect courageous dissenters who reveal illegal or unethical practices on the part of other government workers is one of countless issues where President Carter's rhetoric always has far surpassed his commitment

During the 1976 presidential campaign, Carter repeatedly promised: "I intend to seek strong legislation to protect our federal employees from harassment and dismissal if they find out and report waste or dishonesty by their superiors or others."

But in 1978, when the president unveiled his plan for a comprehensive overhaul of the government's civil service system, the provisions for whistle-blower protection were pathetically weak and riddled with

Overriding objections from the White House. Congress substantially strengthened those provisions before transforming Carter's proposal into law. That effort was led by Sen. Abraham A. Ribicoff, D-Conn., and Rep. Morris K. Udall, D-Ariz.

The new law includes important guarantees to prevent supervisors from retaliating against whistle-blowers through arbitrary reductions in grade or pay, lengthy suspensions or removal from assigned duties.

If such an adverse personnel action is initiated, the employee has the right to a a charges, at least a week to offer a response, assistance from an attorney or other representative and, in some cases, a full hearing on the charges.

Now, however, those reforms are being threatend by the Office of Personnel Management (OPM), one of two new agencies created to repalce the Civil service Commission under the Carter-initiated reorganization of federal personnel practices.

OPM regulations now being drafted to implement the law give supervisors a virtual blank check to harass whistle-blowers by merely invoking one of numerous exemptions. Among them: The requirement for prior written notice

can be ignored in a case of job suspension if the employee's continued work "may be detrimental to the interests of the government" - a broad phase defined nowhere in the law or regulations. -Neither advance notice nor an

opportunity to reply are required for furlough without pay due to unforeseeable circumstances" - another vague, impercise and undefined reference. -The lawyer or other representative selected to aid an accused employee can be summarily disqualified if he or she is "an

or her official duties because of the priority needs of the gogernment. (That language is virtually identical to the excuses already behind widely cited to disqualify attorneys and others who are especially aggressive, knowledgeable and effective indefending accused employees.)

Henley attorneys counting on third trial for client

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) - Attorneys for mass murder defendant Elmer Wayne Henley, who were unable to prevent a chilling account of a two-year sex-torture and death spree from being admitted as evidence, are

banking on winning a third trial for their 23-year-old client

Henley's second trial enters its fourth week today, with defense attorneys continuing to hammer at the theme that the youth, who was 17 when he was arrested in the Houston killings. was not properly apprised of his legal rights.

Attorney Will Gray of Houston sought to have Henley's statements given to police suppressed. But District Judge Noah Kennedy ruled them admissible, which made for some gory reading during last week's proceedings.

The retrial stems from a two-year crime spree in the Houston area that left at least 26 youths dead. Henley, accused in six of the cases, revealed the killings when he phoned police in August 1973 and said he had shot Dean Corll to death at Corll's suburban home.

Henley claimed Corll, 33, masterminded the murders and used Henley to procure victims. Henley's first trial, in which he received six 99-year prison terms, was overturned because

the judge rejected a defense motion for a change of venue hearing

Gray told reporters last week that Kennedy had committed enough procedural errors during jury selection to warrant yet another trial.

Henley's statement, dated Aug. 9, 1973, gives a grisly account and says Corll talked Henley into inducing young boys to visit Corll's home so the older man could sell them to a prostitution ring. Henley said in the statement he received \$200 for the first boy, and later found out the boy had been raped and killed.

Henley said he brought another eight to 10 boys to Corll without pay, saying Corll would sodomize them and then kill them.

"I killed several of them myself with Dean's guns and helped him choke some others," the statement said. "Then we would bury them in different places." Henley led police to several of the buried bodies

According to the statement. Henley angered Corll when he brought a girlfriend to Corll's house, and Corll handcuffed Henley to a "torture board" where other young boys were sexually abused and slain.






Scattered showers and thunderstorms were reported during the night in Northwest Texas, along the South Plains and in Southeast Texas.

Police said they believed it took the gang weeks of work and

planning to carry out the daring robbery, which had the hallmarks of a similar theft in Nice, France, three years ago, when sewer robbers made off with millions in safe deposit box

13,000 forced into open sea by Malaysia

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — Malaysia forced 13,000 Vietnamese refugees in 60 boats out into international waters in the past week, raising to 55,000 the number expelled since Jan. 1, the government announced

Kassim Ahmad, the parliamentary secretary to the foreign ministry, revealed the numbers while answering questions in Parliament. He said the expulsions were in line with the government's get-tough policy of refusing sanctuary to A boy to Mr. and Mrs. Robert new arrivals. Malaysia already has 76,000 Vietnamese in crowded camps.

> Kassim did not say how many refugees managed to return to Malaysia or to land here despite the government crackdown.

Western refugee officials here said 500 Vietnamese in two boats were towed back into international waters on Sunday Reporters who talked to some of the refugees before they left. were told the two boats were attacked three times by Thai pirates during the five day crossing from Vietnam.

Beside the economic drain of the refugee influx, Malaysia authorities fear many will not find new homes in other countries and will remain in Malaysia upsetting the fragile balance between the nation's predominant Malay Moslem community and the ethnic Chinese and Indians who make up the other half of the population.

Urinary tract infections are nasty. They are also exceedingly Children from the Pampa common, and affect women 10 times more often than men. And drug companies Youngsters ages four to six tend to exploit some of the myths in their promotional campaigns.

One of the unproved assumptions has been graphically illustrated. In a recent medical journal drug advertisement, beneath a bold headline that states, "She's been feeling more pain than pleasure..., a young woman in her underwear looks uncomfortable. This titillating statement is followed by the declaration that "Sexually active women are especially vulnerable to urinary tract infection.'

The recommended solution, of course, is the brand-name antibiotic emplazoned across the bottom of the page. And in the last picture she is seen wearing a sexy evening dress with a big smile on her face and a young man nuzzling her. Clearly the drug did its job. She's feeling better and ready to boogie

The assumption that promiscuity is a major factor in cystitis is contradicted by a recent research report in the journal of the American Medical Association. The investigators found that sexual habits were unrelated to the number of urinary tract infections experienced by the young women they studied. Bathroom habits, on the other hand, were critical. Women who delayed urination for more than an hour after the first urge were far more likely to suffer the unpleasant symptoms of an infection.

What are the symptoms of cystitis? Most commonly there is a burning or painful feeling upon urination. Often you feel the need to go to the bathroom but the effort is unproductive. There may be low back pain and in some cases blood may appear in the urine. If there are chills, fever, nausea and vomit Services begin tonight at 7:30 ng along with the pain there is a good possibility the infection is in the p.m. and run through Friday

> No matter where the bacteria strike within the urinary tract it is imperative that the patient have a urinalysis and culture. In this way the doctor can determine which antibiotic is most appropriate. We are fortunate to have a large number of very effective medications available that can clear up just about any problem that develops. Some of the most popular therapeutic agents include sulfa drugs (Gantanol, Gantrisin), Nitrofurantoin (Furadantin, Macrodantin), Sulfamethoxazole - Trimethoprim (Bactrim, Septro), Penicillin, Ampicillin. Nalidixic Acid (NegGram) and Methenaimine Mandelamine). Watch out for large doses of Vitamin C in bombination with these medications. While it may make a drug like Methenamine more effective it can make sulfas more dangerous.

One of the nastier things about cystitis is that it keeps coming back Even after successful treatment about 80 percent of the women who suffer this problem will come down with another attack. However, the same article that recently debunked the significance of sexual practices as a factor, recommended a preventive regimen that dramatically reduced the incidence of re-infection.

The authors suggested that women drink at least two quarts of fluid each day and make regular trips to the bathroom to urinate (about every two hours). After sexual intercourse a woman should void within 10 minutes. And after urinating she should always wipe front to back.

Although it is too soon to hope that these infections will be a thing of the past, the proposed preventive program and the many effective medications available should help in turning this pain into nothing more than a memory for most women.

Hair transplants grow naturally

DEAR DR. LAMB - I would appreciate it if you would tell me how a hair transplant is performed and how natural it is. Can you get it cut and will it regrow? Is it like the rest of your natural growing hair?

DEAR READER - The usual technique is to take plugs of hair from the sides of the scalp where hair is abundant and transplant these plugs to areas where the hair is sparse or absent.

Much of the male pattern baldness as seen in men is because the hair follicles involved have an ingerited different metabolic characteristic. These hair follicles actually produced a form of male hormone, different from hormoses produced by the other hair follicles. This particular variation is associated with small or rudimentary hair growth, if any at all.

It's odd but every hair follicle that you have has its own genes which determine how the hair follicle behaves chemically. The ones at the side of the head are least likely to have these kinds of genes and, therefore, a man may become bald at the front of his head and still have an abundant quantity of hair on the sides of the head.

When the hair follicles are transplanted from the side of the head to the bald area, of course the follicles retain the basic genes that they inherited. That means that the hair in the new transplanted position behaves exactly as it should have behaved in the old position. So, it grows like natural hair and can be cut like natural hair

HERE'S THE WORLD WAR I

NEW YORK (AP) - Some of the players chosen during today's National Basketball Association college draft were better known than others, but virtually all of them were familiar to at least one man - Marty Blake, super-scout.

Blake, a former NBA general manager, runs a scouting service that is provided to all the league's teams. Some of them relied heavily on Blake's reports for the draft, which got under way at 11 a.m. CDT, while others used his information as a supplement to their own scouting reports.

Anyone can point to players like Earvin "Magic" Johnson of Michigan State or Bill Cartwright of San Francisco and see they are solid pro prospects. Blake's job goes beyond the obvious.

"Selecting the first eight or 10 players is no problem," the Atlanta-based scout said. "We seek to come up with 60 or 70 bona fide prospects who will go in the first three rounds of the draft."

Blake and his staff begin watching players in high school, noting 100 blue chippers each year and then following their progress through college. Files are kept on every college, major or minor, as well as the junior colleges. Blake also keeps tabs on postseason tournaments and all-star games as well as minor leagues and even European ball

Last month, Blake submitted an 89-page evaluation of 255 players, including rankings of the top 36 guards, 30 forward and 10 centers. Analytical reports were provided on players with pro potential, while others merely received a rating of CNP - can not

"There might be as many as 100 things to look for when scouting a player, and you've got to be able to judge him quickly," said Blake.

"Players should be able to shoot. Speed is a tremendous asset. Quickness, jumping ability and competitiveness are important. Desire is an intangible you look for. Some players make up with desire for skills they may not have."

Blake, 52, first got involved with pro basketball at the age of 12 as official scorer for Wilkes Barre of the Eastern League. He became publicity director of the NBA's Hawks, then based in Milwaukee, in 1954 and served as the team's general manager for 15 years. He also served as president of the Pittsburgh Condors of the American Basketball Association before developing his unique scouting service.

Of the collegians who were available today, Blake put a special value on Cartwright, the 7-footer from San Francisco who is the most prized of basketball commodities, a quality center.

Despite the presence of Cartwright and such outstanding guards as Johnson and Sidney Moncrief of Arkansas, Blake and other scouts agreed that position-wise, there were more quality forwards available than anything else.

Los Angeles opened the draft, having obtained the No. 1 pick from the Jazz several years ago as compensation for the Jazz' signing of Gail Goodrich. The Lakers announced last month that they planned to picktJohnson, and later said they had agreed to contract terms with the 6-foot-8 guard who led Michigan State to

Reggie's a great player." But Jackson, obviously choosing his words carefully, seemed down in the dumps.

Asked if Jackson had requested a trade, Tallis said, "Anything of that nature is for Reggie to answer."


Asked if he would trade himself if he were general manager, Jackson said, "With all the unrest and discomfort, I would have to analyze what's best for the club. Does that get me off the hook?"

However, both Tallis and club President Al Rosen said the waiver request was a "routine" baseball maneuver.

said. "I figured the punches I hit him with would discourage They didn't, though.

Chiaverini, while virtually defenseless against Leonard's sizzling jab, still made offensive moves and in the third round scored two good hooks to Leonard's head.

But Leonard said Chiaverini didn't cause any serious damage

"He didn't hit me with any scoring shots," he said. "But I felt his punching power when he hit me in the arms.

Leonard opened a ct under Chiaverini's right eye in the fourth round with one of dozens of head shots he took against the hapless 26-year-old.

Chiaverini's eyes glazed over

just before the bell and he stumbled back to the corner, not to come out again

"I'm a little disappointed that I couldn't stay in longer. Chiaverini said after the fight 'I wanted to (answer the bell) in the fifth round, but my trainer said no. My corner didn't want

me to get hurt any more. Leonard, who meets Wilfredo Benitez of Puerto Rico for the WBC's welterweight title on

Dec. 1, also said he was looking forward to a fight with Roberto Duran, another extremely fast and very powerful puncher.

Duran, who gave up the lightweight title to campaign in the welterweight division. defeated former champion Carlos Palomino at Madison Square Garden on Friday night.

"I hope to see that fight become a reality," Leonard said

Leon Spinks loses in first round

MONTE CARLO, Monaco (AP) — Gerrie Coetzee, a 24-year-old South African who prayed for help with his punches, has won a shot at a share of the world heavyweight title by flooring Leon Spinks three tims in two minutes and three seconds of the first round.

Spinks, 25, a product of the St. Louis ghetto and former world and Olympic champion, answered the opening bell Sunday night with a furious barrage of punches and then wound up bouncing on the canvas, the victim of a vicious right-hand attack. A series of terrific overhand rights by the South African suprised

and stunned Spinks as he was still trying to show he was unaffected and unfrightened by his opponent's hammer-like punches. "I asked the Lord to help me in this fight, and I want to thank him," Coetzee said. "I must tell the people the Lord answered my

Spinks' defeat by a first-round technical knockout could mean a long period of inactivity and little money. But Coetzee's convincing win made him the fourth South African fighter to get a world championship fight and, possibly, the first ever to gain a

Coetzee will fight John Tate of the United States in September for the World Boxing Association crown expected to be abandoned by Muhammad Ali. The fight will probably be in South Africa, according to promoter Bob Arum.

Tate. who came here to see who his next opponent would be, said he was unimpressed by the South African blitz.

However, he was one of the few not impressed by the awesome power of Coetzee, who got a big boost from reports that the championship fight could be staged in South Africa before a crowd of 100,000 and a purse certainly higher than the \$105,000 he won in Monte

"I was in good shape, but I really did not expect this." the victor said. "I thank Spinks for having proved to myself and to the world

After the fight, Spinks went to his corner and started crying. He locked himself in his dressing room and refused any interviews. Leaving the dressing room, he declined to answer any questions. saying only: "I got beaten. What else can I say."


