**City-Wide Golf Tourney Opens; 60 Are Entered**

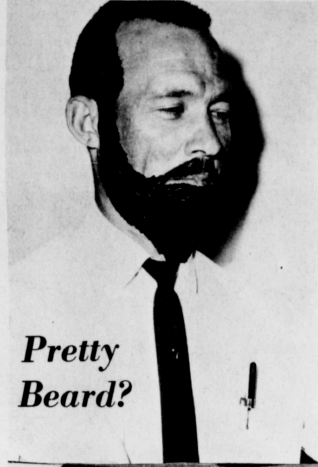

Fee is \$7.50 and those wishing to enter may see Wash at the Club or call 272-4250. First and second place winners will be given merchandise.

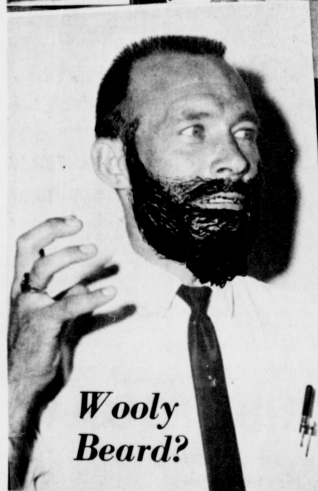

nearly 2 inches were reported. The half-inch measurement came from the Cecil Cole farm near Stegall.

At Needmore, the fall was .4 inch, and at Lazbuddie, gauges showed as much as 1.1 inch.

Little damage from the late-in-the-week rains was reported in the immediate vicinity of Muleshoe, but in other areas farther to the east, considerable damage was reported. Hail, hard winds, even a tornado or two, raked the South Plains in the vicinity of Hale Center and Olton.

The latter town for its part, measured 1.74 inches. Lockney got 1.4 inches that came in a very short time, sending 1 1/2 feet of water across the highways. Cotton Center received .9 with strong winds and small hail.

Plainview got a quarter-inch but high winds affected power lines. Brownfield got hail, and a "tunnel-like" cloud was seen near Halfway, 40 miles east of here on U. S. 70. Shallowater reported .4 and Levelland only .25. Anton got one inch.

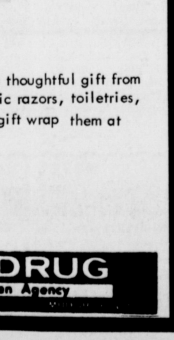
