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### GETTING MOST OUT OF AGRICULTURE

Formation of the Gray County Agricultural council may be of more importance than even its founders realize. The idea is a good one.

In the first place, the county's divergent interests may be made known through this clearing house of opinions. Instead of working separately, the various communities may correlate their efforts so that whatever benefits arise may be mutually enjoyed, and plans will not be in conflict. Moreover, each will more appreciate what the other is doing. There are many ways in which countywide cooperation will be more effective than sectionalized work.

The county agents, moreover, should find this plan ideally suited to their needs, for they must serve the whole county. The council will, of course, require time to develop its program. In agricultural development conditions change slowly and too rapid progress of any plan of action may be unsuccessful.

It should be understood, at the outset, that the purpose of the council is not to tell the farmer how to run his business. Rather, it is to give the farmer the recognition he deserves and to give him an opportunity to display his products and expand his markets. There are numerous ways to benefit agriculture without trying to work a revolution in methods. Experimentation and demonstration tend to indicate profitable sidelines which make farming more profitable, without too much encouraging abandonment of the main crop.

### PAMPA CAN GAIN MUSIC DISTINCTION

It is to be hoped that Pampa school children may have the opportunity of having instrumental instruction such as "Pop" Frazier of Breckenridge outlined to The News Saturday. Just imagine one hundred pupils studying band and orchestral instruments under an expert teacher for three or four years. There would be material for bands and orchestras galore.

Pampa can become famous as a music center if the necessary steps are taken. So few cities stress music that any place that does so is outstanding. The boy who is tooting a horn is not in mischief, and he is getting an understanding of the better things of life. Let's continue the excellent musical development that has been started here in the last few years.

## Chicago Bomber Caught in Act

CHICAGO, May 19. (AP)—In Frank R. Phillips, police believe they have found the answer to several of the city's recent bomb outrages.

They trapped Phillips yesterday in the act of bombing a restaurant at 507 North Clark street. Acting on a tip, the officers lay in wait. The man placed the bomb in the restaurant doorway and ignited the fuse by pressing the lighted end of his cigar against it. Police rushed, firing in the air. One of them trampled the sputtering fuse. The other captured Phillips.

The prisoner, police said today, has confessed to other bombings of recent weeks. For one of these bombings, he said, he received \$100, for the other, \$150.

## Highway Meeting Will Be Held by Commission Today

AUSTIN, May 19. (AP)—The State Highway department met today for its regular monthly two-day session, with 10 projects advertised for letting, the construction to include 44 miles of concrete highway, 35 miles of surface treatment and three bridges.

Several county delegations were booked to discuss highway problems with the commission, which planned to take up the matter of designating one of the intrastate highways as the old Chisholm trail in memory of the drivers of Texas cattle up the trail to Kansas before advent of the railroad.

Mitchell county was to award contracts for 15 miles of concrete pavement on highway one. Ellis county was to let 12 miles of pavement on highway six.

## Houston Man Is Shot to Death

HOUSTON, May 19. (AP)—A shotgun roared last night on a still residential street here, and the body of W. L. Edwards was dropped face down in a ditch. The police were working today on the theory that hired gunmen did away with him.

Two men in an automobile bearing a California license, Edwards with them, left a garage an hour or so before the shooting. The body was found by F. B. Kemp, who was walking home.

Edwards, about forty, a well known aviator, had feared "imported gunmen were coming here to get him," he had told Frank Williams, a reporter, and others Friday.

The last few months of his life had been tumultuous ones. He recently was charged with violation of the liquor laws and answered with the contention that it all was a frame-up. He had been divorced by his wife and had filed a suit for alienation of affections against T. P. Lee, millionaire oil man and Republican party leader.

### Trains in Collision

PHILADELPHIA, May 19. (AP)—One man was killed and nine persons including one woman, were injured when a passenger train on the Schuylkill division of the Pennsylvania railroad struck a work train north of Ebanmoot station, near here, today. The man killed was Alexander Fager, 68, of Philadelphia, engineer of the passenger train.

MIDLAND, May 19. (AP)—Miss Mary Briggs, 28, died here today of injuries suffered in an automobile accident Wednesday.

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DOUBLE WIN OVER PHILLIES IS INSPIRING

The leading teams are so closely bunched that Pittsburgh, in fifth place, is only one full game behind the Robins.

The Braves captured the first game from New York, 4 to 1, as old Tom Zachary, until recently with the New York Yankees, made his debut by making nine Giant hits almost useless while Boston made the most of five off Walker and Fitzsimmons.

The Cubs drove out 16 hits, including Hack Wilson's tenth and eleventh home runs of the year, to stop the St. Louis winning streak at nine games. The Cubs won the first game, 9 to 6, the Cardinals took the second, 8 to 2.

Ervin Brame gave Pittsburgh a 2 to 1 victory over the Cincinnati Reds. Besides pitching a fine game, he scored both Pirate runs, one on a homer.

Three American league games produced no changes in the standing. The St. Louis-Detroit contest was rained out.

The Philadelphia Athletics did the most with the least in the hit line, making three blows off Lloyd Brown good for a 1 to 0 victory.

Cleveland and Chicago engaged in another close battle with Mel Harder of Cleveland opposing Dutch Henry. It was a draw for six innings, but the Indians found Henry for two runs in the seventh and got one more off his successor, Hal McKain, to win, 7 to 4.

The New York Yankees did the heavy hitting for the American league. They pounded three Boston pitchers for 13 hits and an 11 to 0 victory while George Pippen held the Red Sox to three safe bids. Babe Ruth started the affair with a home run in the first inning, his sixth of the season and his third for as many Sundays.

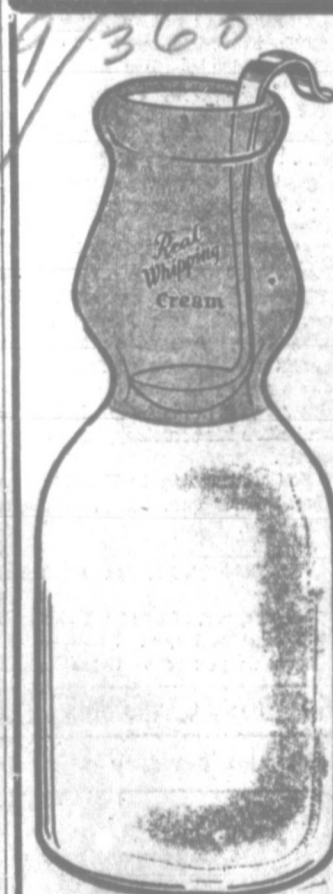
