

Grand Jury at **Sherman Meeting**

SHERMAN, May 19. (AP)-Wheels of civil law were set in motion today in preparations for resuming their work after more than a week of military rule, since the mob riots here May 9.

The federal grand jury was called to convene and it was expected to consider information gathered Randolph Bryant, United States district attorney, and by the court of military inquiry under martial

Colonel L. E. McGee, military commander, had given no definite statement as to when martial law would be lifted.

The military court of inquiry had remaining the completion of its reports on the riots which resulted in the burning of the Grayson county courthouse and the death of George Hughes, negro, accuse of criminal attack upon a white woman. More than a score of suspects were held in jail here.

Sigmon Number 1 Still Runs Wild

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 19. (A)-Defying efforts of workmen to halt its spouting stream of oil and gas, the Sigmon Number 1 oil gusher today had covered the surrounding fields with a heavy coating of crude. Oil wells in the south part of the field shut down yesterday as shifting winds caught the stream of oil shooting high above the crown block and carried it to other derricks Work halted as the fire menace beame greater.


