

Oil less deadly after long trip

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — Scientist say tests indicate the world's largest oil spill, weathered. diluted and broken down by its two-month advance on the Texas shores, is less deadly than first feared for the lush, delicate ecology of the Gulf Coast.

The results are pretty encouraging. We did not find that the oil was significantly toxic. This oil has changed drastically. What we tested is much less toxic." said Dr. Patrick Parker, director of the University of Texas Aransas Pass Marine Laboratory.

Meanwhile, the leading edges of the oil from a runaway Mexican offshore well 500 miles south of Texas continued its unpredictable drift several miles off the white resort beaches of southern Texas.

Those tourist-laden beaches have only had light spotting by small globs of tar carried in by the surf.

"I would have expected a little more impact by now." said Dr. John Robinson of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. "The impact has been very light - unexpectedly light.

"It's not as bad as I expected. " said task force commander Capt. Roger Madson, who added he is optmistic the beaches will not become much more soiled

Madson said the spill had been broken up by gulf currents and partially disintegrated in the salt water. The U.S. task force was set up here as the oil neared

U.S. waters and threatened to kill wildlife in the lush Laguna Madre. damage offshore shrimping and fishing and put an economic dent in the coastal tourist industry at the height of the season.

However, Parker said preliminary test indicated adult shrimp, crabs and spotted sea trout have a relatively high tolerance to the contaminated water

"The bad news is that it was somewhat toxic to the fish eggs and newly hatched fish," said Parker, who added it was to early to determine the long range impact on the fishing and shrimp industries.

Carl Posey, a NOAA spokesman, said Thursday that a 40-mile long tongue of oil jutting out from the main spill still drifted parallel to Padre Island. But he said the sheen was not as well defined.

He said the main body of oil. about 50 miles offshore near the border between Texas and Mexico, moved ft ty slightly north Thursday. pushed by southeasterly breezes that pick up slightly in the afternoons.

Robinson and other officials said they could not predict where it will drift. "The weather is the dominant factor that will make the difference here." said Robinson.

Divers found a small amount of tiny tar balls floating behind tgc boom strung across the Port Mansfield cut Thursday. But Posey said that no oil has been detected in the Laguna Madre.

Vietnam willing to discuss refugee plan

HANOI, Vietnam (AP) - Vietnam is willing to discuss airlifting refugees directly out of the country on American planes, but it has vowed to stop illegal exits by sea, U.S. congressional sources say.

Acting Foreign Minister Nguyen Co Thach told a congressional delegation Thursday that fleeing refugees have stolen half the nation's fishing fleet and that some who were captured had been executed.

About 4,000 would-be escapees have been arrested. Thach said, and 1 million ethnic Chinese are waiting to get out of Vietnam. Some 400,000 refugees are already jamming camps in Southeast Asia.

The sources were among a nine-member delegation headed by Rep. Benjamin S. Rosenthal, D-N.Y., who met Thursday with Thach and Deputy Foreign Minister Hoang Bich Son, before leaving for Hong Kong en route home. Another delegation, led by Rep. Lester L. Wolff, D-N.Y., arrives today

The sources, who asked not to be identified, said in addition to the American airlift that Thach said his government was willing to accept three consular officers in Ho Chi Minh City, formerly Saigon, to process refugees under U.N. auspices

Thach said the officers could be American. In Washington Thursday, the State Department said it was sending two consular officers to Thailand and hoped to have them go to Vietnam to process refugees.

Thach also said Vietnam had dropped its demand for reconstruction aid as a condition for normalizing relations with the United States, the sources said, and Rosenthal later told reporters as Thach stood alongside the congressman that Vietnam was "very, very anxious for relations with the United States.

Thach told reporters earlier the United States backed down on a pledge to normalize relations last fall because of the refugee problem and Vietnam's

invasion of Cambodia eight months ago to oust the pro-Chinese government there and install a pro-Hanoi

But Rosenthal said after his talks Thursday that the two sides had moved closer together on the refugee issue and that there had been a "narrowing of viewpoints" toward the goal of achieving an orderly emigration of refugees from Vietnam.

Rosenthal said, and Thach nodded in agreement. that Vietnam's moratorium on the unauthorized exodus of refugees by sea was "a permanent policy that would go on forever." and that Thach had informed the delegation that 4,000 people were awaiting prosecution, half the fishing fleet of Vietnam had been stolen by refugees and some would-be escapees had been executed

will continue to pay \$1.50.

The new charges reflect a 6.68 percent increase in the Consumer Price Index for food away from home during Nov. 1978 thrf pI h May 1979 and inflation.

J & K Contractors of Pampa will be responsible for the maintenance of the elementary school facilities as it was the only bidder for the job at \$9,916.

The deadline for bids was set at 4 p.m. Thursday and just one company had submitted an amount by this time, said Julian.

Continuing to take care of business for the coming school year, the board approved a request of its Pampa depository, First National Bank, to replace a matured \$36,000 bond with a \$35,000 general bond.

The bank will cash the matured bond and has replaced it with a like amount, he said. In more routine matters, the board considered and approved its current bills for payment. The bills showed the school spending \$14,563.49 the past month.

Deer dressed for celebration

WHITE DEER- Last Saturday, just in time for the annual White Deer Parade, Mayor Virgil James and Fire Chief Plez Meadows climbed atop the small stone tower at the intersection of Main and Third streets and properly dressed the town's main trademark for the coming celebration.

To the heavy metal facsimile of an albino deer, they bolted a new set of natural deer antlers.

The antlers were the last of a stock of spare horns stored at the fire station, and the chief is now requesting deer horn donations because "All spare horns have been used due to vandals."

Frozen in eternal vigilance at the center of downtown White Deer, the white deer statue is a silent symbol of the city and the perennial victim of pranksters.

Shortly before quitting time Thursday afternoon City Secretary Paulette Craig sat behind her desk at City Hall and talked about the tribulations of White Deer's white deer.

"It sure makes me mad. Oh, once they put tires around its neck, and wrapped a water hose around it. I don't know why the kids do that. It just upsets me because I love that deer. That's one thing"--Mrs. Craig nearly laughed -- "I didn't do as a kid."

Mrs. Craig, who has lived here since she was eight years old, didn't sound angry about the vice of teenage vanadalism so much as affectionate about the statue -- which she spoke of as if it were the family pet

"That's the pride and symbol of our town and I think it's a bad reflection on our kids when they vandalize it;" she said. "They didn't mess it up when I was in school. Oh, during football season the opposing school might come over and do a few things to the deer, ha, and then we might return the favor.

"But we didn't do it so much. We had more pride then," Mrs. Craig said, adding with a laugh, "Oh don't print that, they'll egg my house!

"I'm real sensitive about our deer," she said seriously.

Mayor James, who had just ambled in, said, "One year it got everything-- the horns taken off. And they'd hang things on it-brassieres, women's pants. And then in '76 it got painted with black paint to where it looked like a Holstein cow.

The mayor said he believed the latest theft of the horns, around rodeo time two weeks ago, was the first incident involving the deer in "about two years."

"When we got this deer, you know," he said. "It had metal horns. But they broke them off. So we put on regular deer horns." Although the deer is always in some danger of mishap,

particularly during football season, when intense interschool rivalry churns up excess mischief. James said incidents had decreased since a White Deer youth was charged with the 1976 black - paint job.

"We've had a fifty dollar reward for information leading to the persons who deface it," James said. Also a \$200 fine, added Mrs.

Craig, and a jail term as well, she believes, for defacing a historical monument

The original white deer statue, constructed in 1918, by the estimate of Mrs. Viola Coffee, a long time White Deer resident, was built by an itinerant concrete artist.

The artist's name, and the chain of circumstances which led him to work out the CSrte deer piece are, at press time, elusive history. But another long - time White Deer resident, W.J. Stubblefield, recalled this week that the statue "still wasn't completely paid for in 1924. It runs in my mind that the original cost was \$400. And it lacked \$50 or \$100 of being paid off.

The unrecalled artist "was paid with pennies, nickels, dimes, collected from door to door canvassing by our proud pioneer forefathers," according to former resident Mrs. Roy Simmons, in her play for the White Deer Bicentennial Celebration.

"We had, I think, a little Chamber of Commerce in those days, though it later faded out for a while in the depression." Bill Stubblefield said. "I recall that the thing was very loosely put together by the Chamber. I think they were kind of proud of it.'

Stubblefield, who is regarded by many in Carson County as the "bottom line" for local oral history, also couldn't fish from memory the circumstances by which the original statue came to be built. But he warmly recalled a particular 1930s and 40s custom which often involved the white deer statue.

"When we had local marriages," he said. "They'd sometimes chain the groom to the monument. Then they'd have him make, public speeches and so forth. I remember they chained one old boy ... a prominent citizen ... to that thing and made him sell, oh. about a hundred rolls of toilet paper. This was in the days when they cost about ten cents a roll. They made him sell them for four bits -- all of them -- before they let him go.

"It (the statue) has been a victim of quite a few pranks," said Stubblefield who, like a lot of people in White Deer, acknowledges the fact with just enough mirth compatible with good citizenship. "But there used to be a lot of tourist attention to it. I used to have a store down there in the center of town and it was a fairly common occurrance back then to see people snapping pictures of it. But people in this day and age- they travel so fast.

The original concrete statue, weathered, Mayor James said, by years, chips, cracks and, finally, decapitation, --and all too often "dressed up, you know, in various disrespectful clothes," as Mrs. Coffee put it -- that original survived until several years ago. (It's now stored by the city "We couldn't throw it away, it was the original," said Mrs. Craig). The present statue was obtained in Oklahoma by former White Deer Fire Chief Ike Richardson, the mayor said.

In the meantime, Plez Meadows may be stocking up antlers for the small but important emergency of White Deer's white deer discovered without its crown of cranial thorns.

"Little did the wandering cement artist realize," wrote Mrs. Simmons. "The legacy that he left us."



Right to work

For those of us who are common wage earners, a good job is one of the most important things in our lives. Without a good job we can't pay or bills, eat, feed our families or buy the things that make our lives easier

What would you do or say if someone told you that you were not qualified to work at your job because you were not a member of a certain club?

You would be upset, right?

But thousands of jobs are lost each year that way.

If you don't belong to the right union, you don't get the job. It doesn't matter if you have been trained for the job'you are seeking and have years of experience. You don't get the job

Because you are not a member of the union.

Pampans don't have to worry about the problem as much as some people in other parts of the country. Texas has a right to work law

The right to work is - or should be - a matter of sustaining individual liberty by protecting anyone from having to join any organization or pay any dues as a condition for making a living. The totalitarian idea of forced membership has no place in a free society

The right to work stands solidly on its own feet, without regard to economic considerations. But it is nice to know that consideration given to personal liberties also pays off handsomely in economic terms

Between 1967 and 1977, manufacturing jobs in states with have right to work laws totaled 1.010,500. During the same period, states that don't have such laws reported a net loss of 889.000

Spending curb solution to national malaise

President Carter has recently popularized the word "malaise". Webster defines malaise an an "indefinite feeling of lack of health often indicative of ... an illness or a vague sense of mental or moral ill-being." The president accurately identified the problem but not the solution. Thermostat cops and cabinet-level musical chairs are not the answer to the nation's malaise. These are politicial bandaids, not a cure. Sure, there's an energy problem. But seeking an emotional response to a purely pragmatic issue of supply and demand, by framing it in terms of patriotic duty, is to confuse the issue and denigrate those things about which we truly ought to be partiotic. The "crisis" will wither, as it did in 1973, when the lines at the gas pumps disappear as we adjust

consumpiton because of price -- not patriotism. Although little solace, gasoline prices, which have risen about 220 percent in the last quarter century, have not inflated as much as housing, automobiles, movie tickets or hamurger.

A real fear is that a political response to energy problems will distort the marketplace through gas rationing. unbending allocations and rigid price controls -- creating an even greater problem.

The far more serious crisis - directly influencing our energy woes -- is wild federal government spending and the inflation it causes. A recent Gallop Poll reveals that by a margin of 57 percent to 33 percent, Americans consider inflation a greater problem than energy. National Tax Limitation Committee polls show that

nearly 80 percent of the people share a deep-seated concern over the broad range of government-induced ills -- inflation, spending, waste, corruption and inefficiency in government and excessive taxation.

Unfortunately, President Carter neglected to address this problem and intends to make things worse by adding \$142 billion more federal spending on energy. As such spending fuels further inflation, the dollars's decline will continue, prompting even more increases in import oil prices.

The harsh reality of life is that we will remain dependent on imported oil to meet our energy needs for the foreseeable future. No amount of wishing by Carter or anyone else will change that unless we bring the entire nation to half-throttle.

artificially triggering severe depression. "We can make OPEC the political boogieman - as Carter has tried to do - to shift the blame. But that only obscures the issue and makes us easy marks for quack political fixes. The real culprit is runaway inflation which we, through our government, have caused

While OPEC actions have erased any favorable American sentiment toward oil-producing nations, the price increases are a fact of life. OPEC has increased oil prices (in terms of dollars) as our dollar value has declined. But price increases to Germany and Japan have not been nearly as severe. Why? Because the Germans and Japanese have controlled their inflation. Their marks and yen have retained value when they buy oil. (In 1950 an ounce of gold purchased 14 barrels of oil, at then current prices. In 1979 an ounce of gold still buys 14. or possibly more. barrels of oil - an interesting insight into price stability.)

The lesson for America is clear -- if we want to find our way out of the malaise that grips our people -- we must get a handle on federal government spending and inflation. That is the root cause of our problem. Less spending, not more -- on energy or anything else -- will provide stability, predictability and certainty -- so individual American citizens can spend their own earnings and plan for a more certain future.

Uncertainty, is a natural part of life --and we all accept that reality. But beyond a certain level of uncertainty, we get all get "an indefinite feeling of ... mental ill-being." Our response is to "duck into a foxhole." That, I believe, is what inflation is causing in America and why we are gripped by malaise.


whether we like it or not -- but let's not pay three times - through higher pump prices, more taxes to sustain greater energy bureaucracy and inflation. Already, the current budget of the Department of Energy exceeds the combined profits of the major oil companies. Let's spend for energy, not bureaucrats. No bureaucrat has ever found one drop of oil shoveled one lump of coal or produced one solar converter. Let's get government out of the energy business and pay only once.

There is an answer: Americans can do more than simply worry about gasoline lines, excessive federal spending and inflation. We can insist that Congress amend the U.S. Constitution to limit spending and inflation. Senators John Heinz (R-PA) and Dick Stone (D-FL) have introduced Senate Joint Resolution 56, the NTLC - designed federal spending limit amendment. The amendment is the only sure way to stop inflation cold, get government back in our hands and lock the door on thermostat-checking Keystone CODS

Give steel a shot

The 2.5 million U.S. duck hunters soon will face total bans on waterfowl hunting if industry and the National Rifle Association persist in resisting the switch from lead to steel shotgun loads

That's what an official of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service says. He feels environmental groups are on the verge of suing the Interior Department, of which his agency is an arm, to force an end to waterfowl hunting because it "adversely affects the environment," as defined under the National Environmental Protection

since the late '50s. In some states the lead-poisoning deaths are much higher than 3 percent. A third of Louisiana's waterfowl, for example, die of

lead poisoning But industry - specifically, one big company - and the National Rifle Association have held out. They claim steel pellets are inaccurate, leaving more crippled birds. They claim the steel pellets' price is too high. They challenge the proof of lead pellets' toxicity, though hardly anyone else does these days.

It took the Interior Department a decade o bite the bullet. Finally, in 1976,

Rep. Sidney Yates, D.-Ill., it was agreed to let the states decide whether or not to bar lead shot.

So we have a situation where eight states - Arkansas, Idaho, Louisiana, Nevada, North Carolina, Utah, Arizona and Oklahoma - have decided not to enforce the federal lead-shot ban. Five other etates - California, Iowa, Ohio, Oregon and Washington - have let the federal lead-shot ban stand only for a few areas. Now Yates' subcommittee has decided to

continue the states' option. The Senate subcommittee is likely to agree, leaving the whole issue up in the air, undercutting enforcement of the lead-shot ban everywhere, leaving questions of steel shot supply unresolved.

Libertarians vs. Liberals

Liberals see inequities in the possession of assets, then concentrate their efforts in attempts to "improve" the distribution of assets by government action.

Libertarians recognize that whatever inequities exist tend to result from prior government actions and cannot be corrected by government

Government interference with the free market in such forms as franchises subsidies, tariffs, regulations, etc., etc. results in favoring some individuals at the expense of others. The libertarian answer to this problem is to remove the franchises. subsidies, tariffs, regulations, etc., not to add additional government interference in the form of special favors for other groups.

The libertarian decries government favor for any group.

He recognizes that the main problem is that of production, not distribution. All government interference reduces total production. although some particular production may be encouraged at the expense of other production. The end result of government interference with the free market always is less total production.

We can't consume what is not produced. The free market will result in unequal distribution of assets, but since only under free market conditions are all exchanges voluntary, distribution of assets by the free market causes the greatest total production. That is the highest standard of

living possible under prevailing conditions.

Will Government make sure it works

When you pick up your telephone to use System will not be allowed to offer us under it, it works That's true more than 95 percent of the time

And the cost is extremely reasonable Telephone prices have risen at less than half the rate of the Consumer Price Index during the past 12 years.

So what? Isn't that what the phone company is in business for -- to give good service at fair rates

Yes, it is. But unlike many other parts of our nation's economy, our communications system continues to get better and better.

If you have spent much time in foreign countries, you know a telephone that works isn't something that God willed on us.

The upshot of this is that current legislation now before Congress seeks to revamp completely the telephone industry. We commend Congress for its efforts to inject competition into the telephone business, increasing the power of consumers to choose

But we believe bills set forth by Senator Hollings and Representative Van Deerlin contain features that may severly damage the quality of telephone service. And all proposals seem to promise higher prices for the residential telephone user as well as for residents of small towns ane rural areas

The bill invites IBM, RCA, ITT, etc. to compete but then restricts the Bell System from competing equally. For instance, Bell Labs has invented a remarkable new automobile phone service that the Bell

the Van Deerlin bill.

Legislation prohibits Bell from working closely with Western Electric in producing and developing phone services. Such a provision does not apply to Bell's competitions who may manufacture their own equipment as they wish.

The legislation doesn't assign anyone the responsibility of seeing that the entire phone network works. Currently, the Bell "System has responsibility for seeing that your long distance call gets from your house to its destination. With other companies providing a range of networks and services, no one will have ultimate authority to make the system work. That is especially important during catastrophies--like tornadoes.

And the Hollings bill unnecessarily complicates growing international communications

We believe that competition ought to be the rule whenever and wherever it would benefit the public. Regulation should be the rule when necessary to assure 1) service is available at reasonable terms to all people. 2) the service works, 3) it is the type of service people need

Let's phase competition into the phone business. But let's make sure that Bell gets an equal regulatory chance.

And when all is said and done. let's make sure the telephones in our homes work. Like they do now.

then-Interior Secretary Thomas Kleppe ordered a ban on lead shot over three years on the three flyways. An NRA suit against the ban was thrown out of federal court.

But last year the biggest lead-pellet maker, Winchester-Western, and NRA pressured Congress. They got a Senate appropriations subcommittee, headed by Sens. Robert C. Byrd, D-W. Va., and Ted Stevens. R-Alaska, to cut off money for enforcing the lead-shot ban.

When the money bill went to a compromise conference with a House appropriations subcommittee headed by

WOULDN'T REDISTRICTING BE WORTH FIGHTING FOR? How much more taxes can we stand - just to keep the elite happy? We know the board will say that in no way will this increase our taxes. How many times have we heard this - from Washington right down to our present

our taxes, but one must remember they're making a tremendous profit. Each of us as individuals pays a larger proportion of our income to school taxes, and realizes very little 'profit' at the end of the year.

Seadrift tensions draw government specialist

SEADRIFT, Texas (AP) - A community relations specialist with the Justice Department planned to intervene today in a dispute between Vietnamese fishermen and their Seadrift counterparts that erupted into violence last week.

Seadrift Mayor Rayburn Haynie - who lifted an 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. curfew Thursday in the South Texas fishing village of 900 - indicated that he was pleased with Justice Department interest in the conflict. Robert Alexander of the department's Dallas office said he would

meet with Haynie to discuss problems in the village, located 60 miles up the Gulf Coast from Corpus Christi. "I'm going to let Mr. Alexander decide what to do," Haynie said.

"I'll take his advice." Alexander said he has no authority to act in the matter, but can


make referrals to other government agencies.

"There are some trends here we're concerned with." Alexander said. "Bad publicity at a time close on the heels of President Carter's increasing Vietnamese immigration allocations does not do that effort any good.

"These people are shot through with fear." he said

The dispute began simmering three years ago when The Bo Brooks of Texas, Inc., crab packing plant began hiring Vietnam refugees. The newcomers and longtime Seadrift fishermen soon began arguing over traditional fishing territories and techniques.

Last Friday. tensions erupted into violence with the shooting death of Billy Joe Aplin, 35, a Seadrift crab fisherman, during a dockside argument. A 21-year-old Vietnamese refugee and his 20-year-old brother were charged in connection with the slaying.

Cullen Davis trial to begin Monday

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - A state district judge sent a jury of eight men and four women home for a three-day weekend prior to the scheduled start of prosecution testimony Monday in the second murder-for-hire trial of millionaire Cullen Davis.

Attorneys completed two weeks of questioning potential veniremen Thursday, selecting a panel that ranged in age from 26 to 63.

District Judge Gordon Gray warned jurors to avoid news reports of the much-publicized case.

Davis, 45, heir to a family-owned, worldwide industrial empire, maintains he was framed on a charge of soliciting a gunman to kill the presiding judge in his protracted divorce case against ex-wife Priscilla Davis.

An earlier attempt to try Davis on the murder-for-hire charges resulted in a mistrial last January. The Houston jury deadlocked 8-4 in favor of conviction after a three-month trial

The alleged target, State District Judge Joe Eidson, was not harmed in the purported scheme and is expected to be among the first of perhaps a dozen prosecution witnesses.

"I don't know how long this trial will last," Gray told

the jury, which includes two blacks and a Mexican-American, "The best guess is two months."

Attorney asks for charge to be dropped

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - An attorney for Las Vegas gambler Jimmy Chagra has asked the judge in Chagra's "Colombian Connection" dope smuggling trial to acquit Chagra of a "kingpin" charge that carries a possible life sentence.

U.S. District Judge William Sesions of El Paso said he would announce his decision this morning.

A directed verdict of acquittal on any count of the indictment against Chagra would remove that matter from the jury.

"I have great difficulty determining whether proof has been produced from which the jury could decide the elements (for conviction on the 'kingpin' charge) have been met." Sessions said Thursday

Chagra. 34, has been on trial since Aug. 1 on a four-count federal indictment alleging conspiracy to smuggle cocaine and marijuana from Colombia, possession of cocaine and "continuing criminal enterprise" in the drug traffic:

The continuing criminal enterprise charge carries a maximum

penalty of life imprisonment, a \$100,000 fine and confiscation of any money made in the illicit drug traffic.

"Continuing criminal enterprise" is defined by federal law as organizing or managing at least five other persons in repeated drug law violations that produced "substantial income or resources" for the defendant.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Carl Pierce said at the trial's outset that the law is known as the "kingpin statute.

"The government has shown that Mr. Chagra was not a small-time operator." Pierce told Sessions on Thursday.

Defense attorney Oscar Goodman of Las Vegas said the government had not proved Chagra earned a "substantial income" from drug ventures about which his alleged accomplices had testified under grants of immunity.

The final government witness, Las Vegas real estate woman Mary Broder, said Chagra made a \$75,000 cash down payment on a \$245,000 house last September - six months after the last drug transaction alleged by the government.



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
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Appeals court orders judge to restudy plan

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
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

Bishop College still facing problems DALLAS (AP) - Bishop College apparently will for the funds "is the difference between 'go' and 'no

open its doors for the 98th time this fall, but its financial and legal entanglements are far from over.

The school's first order of business will be to meet three conditions set forth by the Department of Health. Education and Welfare before the government will hand over \$600,000 in funds.

The conditions require the school to negotiate an agreement to repay missing federal funds, obtain HEW approval of administrative and financial management plans and accept strict guidelines for its participation in federal programs.

HEW hopes that by placing the college's finances under federal supervision, the college can remain open and the government can get the \$2.8 million it says **Bishop** owes

But college administrators have disputed that figure. and trustee Chairman J.K. Haynes said HEW owed Bishop \$472,000 as of June 30. HEW and school officials have been trying to decide how much is owed since April

Even if Bishop receives its \$600,000, all but \$100,000 will go to faculty and staff members, who have not been paid in three months.

The HEW announcement that Bishop was certified

go.' We wouldn't be in business for the fall term without it," said P.W. Gifford, a Bishop board member.

The predominantly black college was allowed to open last year under a similar rehabilitation plan that failed to solve the school's multitude of problems. Funds were cut off in March after Bishop failed to account for federal funds and loans.

President Milton K. In August, the college requested \$969,500, but in November, zero. A notation said the inconsistency was the result of "lack of clarification on expenditures."

One trustee called the roller-coaster figures an example of "bad management." The trustee also said up to twice as many support personnel worked at Bishop as teachers - even before the number of teachers was cut in February.

"We (the trustees) probably should not have (approved the budget with so many support personnel." the trustee told the News.

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




SHOWERS are expected from Friday until Saturday morning from the upper Mississippi Valley to Northeast coastal areas.

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB - I would like to know more about an enlarged liver. I'm 66 and have been told that my liver is enlarged. Could you tell me what causes it and if it's serious? My doctor just told me that I had it and said no more. I have never indulged in drinking

DEAR READER - Your liver rests against the diaphragm just underneath the right ribs. When you take a deep breath. the diaphragm moves down and pushes the liver down. That's why the doctor places his fingers just underneath the right ribs and asks you to take a deep breath during your abdominal examination. He's feeling to determine the size of your liver. It's not uncommon to find a slight enlargement of the liver. In many instances, it has no important significance. I'm sure in your case that if the enlargement had been an indication of a medical problem, your doctor would have told you.

The liver can become fairly large from

heart failure which would present other symptoms that you would be aware of. It can enlarge from a number of liver diseases which tend also to produce symptoms. Fat can accumulate in the liver. particularly if a person is on a very low - carbohydrate diet or in certain medical problems such as diabetes. And alcoholism can contribute to a fatty liver but since you've never used alcohol, that couldn't be your problem.

Knowing how often a person can have a slight enlargement of the liver without having any medical problems at all. 

DEAR READER - Your letter suggests that you have an overactive thyroid problem. One of the complications of this in a few cases is an increase in the pigmentation of the skin. The skin pigmentation depends upon the activity of the melanin cells deep in the skin. These are affected by hormones. Perhaps the most striking example is a person with advanced disease of the adrenal glands, the small glands over the kidneys. This is sometimes called Addison's disease. The skin may be a very deep bronze color from the increased formation of pigment.

The best control of almost all of the symptoms of an overactive thyroid gland is optimal regulation of thyroid function

Furniture design profession sees an increase of women

"But, a woman's designs can often be superior to a man's, because she automatically considers questions of maintenance and use. which men sometimes ignore," she added.



At first, her efforts involved styling furniture purchased mostly from European designers to suit them to the American market. But, eventually, she began to design on her own, acquiring the necessary technical knowledge on the job.

When she started 10 years ago, there were few opportunities for formal education in furniture design. She learned how to do scale drawings and blueprints by studying on her own.

Sanjo lives at home with her elderly parents. When her mother dies, her father is unable to cope with his grief and his responsibilities to Sanjo.

Not even understanding that her mother has died, the child - woman is sent to an institution. She is convinced that her "Ma sleeping. She tired..." in the hospital. But she is deeply upset because she feels that something is wrong.

Things that she has learned to do for herselflike dressing-she forgets to do. Most of the time she hangs her head on her chest and cries. But the activity of the institution brings Sanjo back to life. When she goes on a trip to the zoo, and is given a rabbit to hold, she finds that "the good

feeling woke up."

Gradually, she begins to make progress, remembering to dress herself. She combs her hair and brushes her teeth. And begins to learn new things.

The difficulties in living with a mentally retarded person are not ignored in this novel. Nor is the struggle by the mentally retarded to face the demands of life.

When Sanjo sees two neighborhood children stealing her collection of Bugs Bunny comic books, she screams, "Bugs, come back here." But the adults in the room believe she is yelling about insects and do not help her prevent the theft.

This is a book about feelings. Good feelings. bad feelings, and feelings that, in Sanjo's words, "Hurts me -Associated PraR



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
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
