





## Seadrift tensions draw government specialist

SEADRIFT, Texas (AP) — A community relations specialist with the Justice Department planned to intervene today in a dispute between Vietnamese fishermen and their Seadrift counterparts that erupted into violence last week.

Seadrift Mayor Rayburn Haynie — who lifted an 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. curfew Thursday in the South Texas fishing village of 900 — indicated that he was pleased with Justice Department interest in the conflict.

Robert Alexander of the department's Dallas office said he would meet with Haynie to discuss problems in the village, located 60 miles up the Gulf Coast from Corpus Christi.

"I'm going to let Mr. Alexander decide what to do," Haynie said. "I'll take his advice."

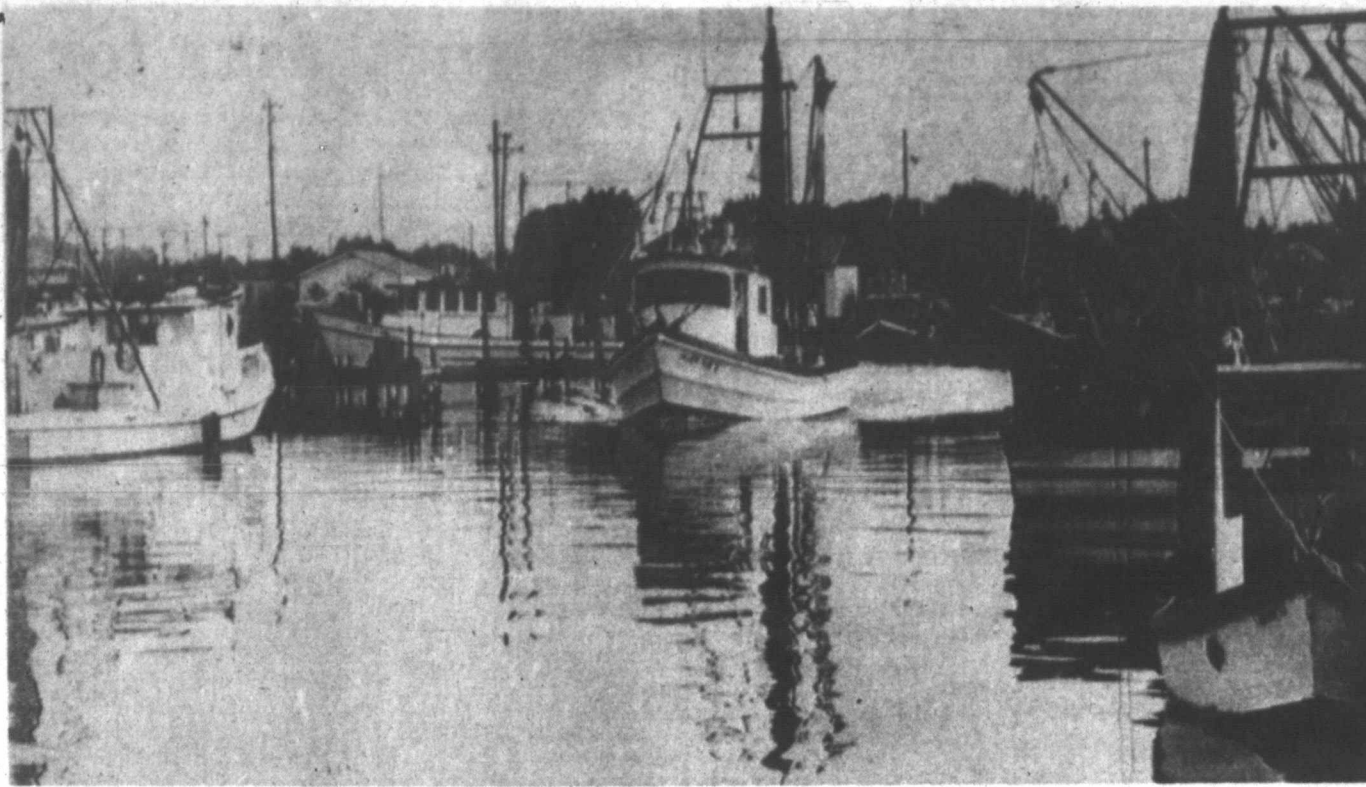
Alexander said he has no authority to act in the matter, but can make referrals to other government agencies.

"There are some trends here we're concerned with," Alexander said. "Bad publicity at a time close on the heels of President Carter's increasing Vietnamese immigration allocations does not do that effort any good."

"These people are shot through with fear," he said.

The dispute began simmering three years ago when The Bo Brooks of Texas, Inc., crab packing plant began hiring Vietnam refugees. The newcomers and longtime Seadrift fishermen soon began arguing over traditional fishing territories and techniques.

Last Friday, tensions erupted into violence with the shooting death of Billy Joe Aplin, 35, a Seadrift crab fisherman, during a dockside argument. A 21-year-old Vietnamese refugee and his 20-year-old brother were charged in connection with the slaying.

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## Cullen Davis trial to begin Monday

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — A state district judge sent a jury of eight men and four women home for a three-day weekend prior to the scheduled start of prosecution testimony Monday in the second murder-for-hire trial of millionaire Cullen Davis.

Attorneys completed two weeks of questioning potential veniremen Thursday, selecting a panel that ranged in age from 26 to 63.

District Judge Gordon Gray warned jurors to avoid news reports of the much-publicized case.

Davis, 45, heir to a family-owned, worldwide industrial empire, maintains he was framed on a

charge of soliciting a gunman to kill the presiding judge in his protracted divorce case against ex-wife Priscilla Davis.

An earlier attempt to try Davis on the murder-for-hire charges resulted in a mistrial last January. The Houston jury deadlocked 8-4 in favor of conviction after a three-month trial.

The alleged target, State District Judge Joe Eidson, was not harmed in the purported scheme and is expected to be among the first of perhaps a dozen prosecution witnesses.

"I don't know how long this trial will last," Gray told

the jury, which includes two blacks and a Mexican-American. "The best guess is two months."

Outside the courtroom, Gray repeated the two-month estimate, but added, "I wouldn't bet on it." The presiding judge decided not to sequester the jury, but warned that he would reserve the option to do so at a later date.

The newly empaneled jury included only one housewife and appeared to represent a broad cross-section of the Tarrant County community.

"I wasn't going for any kind of stereotype," chief prosecutor Jack Strickland told reporters.

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## Pampa army air field reunion

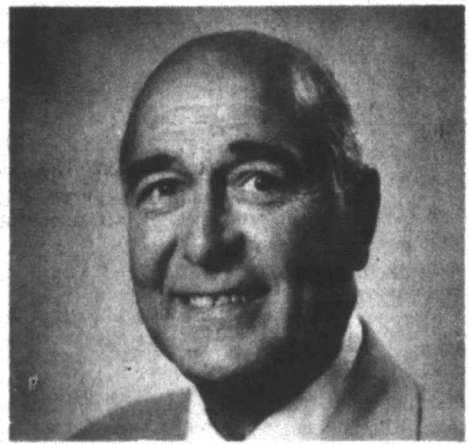
Mr. C. Ralph Blodgett of Spearman is the president of the Reunion Association of veterans and civilians stationed at the base, which closed in 1945.

## DR. LAMB

### Liver enlarges for various reasons

**DEAR DR. LAMB**—I would like to know more about an enlarged liver. I'm 66 and have been told that my liver is enlarged. Could you tell me what causes it and if it's serious? My doctor just told me that I had it and said no more. I have never indulged in drinking.

**DEAR READER**—Your liver rests against the diaphragm just underneath the right ribs. When you take a deep breath, the diaphragm moves down and pushes the liver down. That's why the doctor places his fingers just underneath the right ribs and asks you to take a deep breath during your abdominal examination. He's feeling to determine the size of your liver. It's not uncommon to find a slight enlargement of the liver. In many instances, it has no important significance. I'm sure in your case that if the enlargement had been an indication of a medical problem, your doctor would have told you.

The liver can become fairly large from

heart failure which would present other symptoms that you would be aware of: It can enlarge from a number of liver diseases which tend also to produce symptoms. Fat can accumulate in the liver, particularly if a person is on a very low carbohydrate diet or in certain medical problems such as diabetes. And alcoholism can contribute to a fatty liver but since you've never used alcohol, that couldn't be your problem.

Knowing how often a person can have a slight enlargement of the liver without having any medical problems at all, I think you can safely assume that your doctor's silence means that he doesn't think it's important to your health. However, I am sending you The Health Letter number 7-8, Living With Your Liver. **DEAR DR. LAMB**—I have been having thyroid trouble for the past six years. I had thyroid surgery eight years ago. I'm still losing my hair and now I have hyperpigmentation. Will you please explain the increased pigmentation to me and if there is any cure for it?

**DEAR READER**—Your letter suggests that you have an overactive thyroid problem. One of the complications of this in a few cases is an increase in the pigmentation of the skin. The skin pigmentation depends upon the activity of the melanin cells deep in the skin. These are affected by hormones. Perhaps the most striking example is a person with advanced disease of the adrenal glands, the small glands over the kidneys. This is sometimes called Addison's disease. The skin may be a very deep bronze color from the increased formation of pigment.

The best control of almost all of the symptoms of an overactive thyroid gland is optimal regulation of thyroid function.

### Furniture design profession sees an increase of women

Why is it that women with a flair for design and who know how to draw frequently pursue careers as interior decorators but rarely aspire to the role of furniture designer?

"Furniture designing has always been a man's profession, perhaps because it requires dealing with workers as well as a knowledge of mechanics," says Elyse Lacher, one of today's few successful, woman furniture designers.

"But, a woman's designs can often be superior to a man's, because she automatically considers questions of maintenance and use, which men sometimes ignore," she added.

Ms. Lacher is the designer for Cy Mann Designs, Ltd., a New York-based manufacturer. Like most women in the field, she got into furniture designing by accident. Although she had always been able to draw and studied art in college, she did graduate work in order to become a speech therapist.

However, when another designer failed to produce some needed work for the family firm her uncle asked her to step in. She did, and joined the family firm for good.

At first, her efforts involved styling furniture purchased mostly from European designers to suit them to the American market. But, eventually, she began to design on her own, acquiring the necessary technical knowledge on the job.

When she started 10 years ago, there were few opportunities for formal education in furniture design. She learned how to do scale drawings and blueprints by studying on her own.

In the ensuing years, she has learned that the commercial furniture field requires considerably more flexibility from the designer than do other creative efforts.

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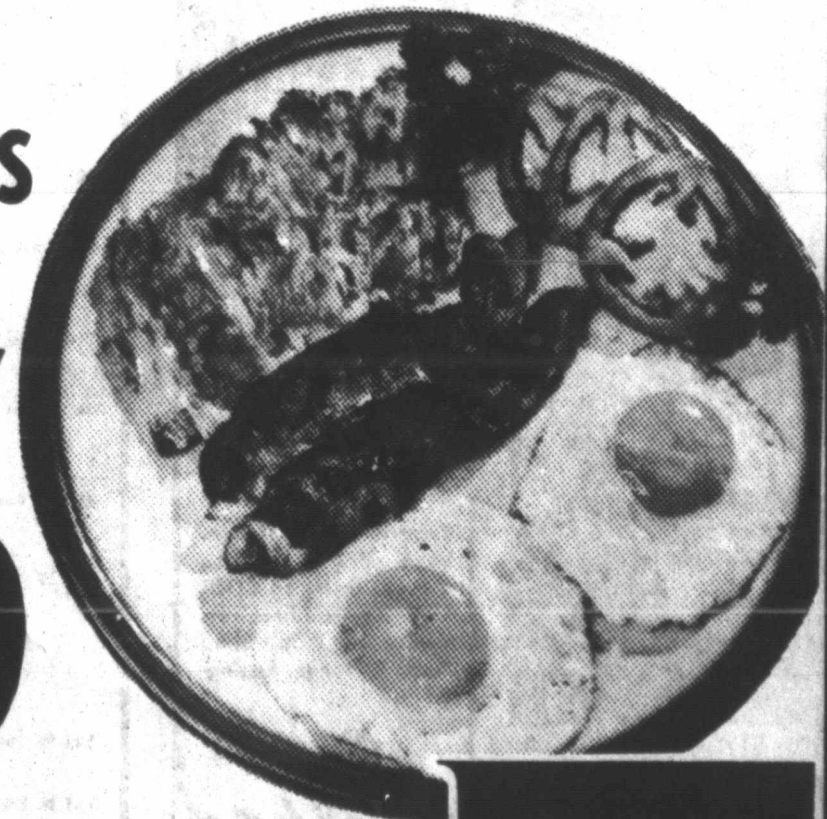

## RELIGIOUS ROUNDUP

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. Roman Catholicism has adopted an "affirmative action" plan to give particular consideration to groups that may be under-represented in jobs of the church's national operations.

The guidelines have been approved by the National Conference of Catholic Bishops and their national action offices, and the U.S. Catholic Conference, which employs about 350 people in Washington.

Although dealing mostly with hiring, promotion and compensation of employees, the guidelines also call for positive steps to assure equal opportunity in purchasing services and products.

The plan is effective only for the national office; but copies were sent to the church's 170 dioceses, which remain free to accept, reject or modify the guidelines.

LINDSBORG, Kan. (AP) — While Christians in some countries are paying with their lives for their faith, Christians in the affluent West may have to "live with their way of life" — their high living standards — to be true to their faith, a church leader says.

The Rev. Emilio Castro, a Methodist and official of the World Council of Churches, told a Lutheran meeting that Christians in many lands are in conflict with their governments, but that for western Christians, following Jesus means reducing consumption to share with needier peoples.

NEW YORK (AP) — A Jewish leader says revisions in the 1980 Passion play in Oberammergau, West Germany, have significantly reduced anti-Semitic potential from it.

Nat. Kamenny of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith commended Oberammergau officials and villagers "for their willingness to listen to Jewish criticism of the traditional pageant and to make changes" in the spirit of Roman Catholicism's Second Vatican Council, which affirmed historic ties to Judaism.

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod at its biennial convention admonished its pastors against participating in non-Lutheran wedding services.

The conservative branch of Lutheranism also warned against some practices of the charismatic movement, terming false the idea that God gives guidance to the church today through "visions or dreams or direct prophecy."

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# Baltimore snaps losing streak with 3-2 victory

The Baltimore Orioles ended a four-game losing streak, and 15-game winner Mike Flanagan had some thoughts about responsibility.

"I started the losing streak; I thought I might as well finish it," he said. Flanagan struck out 10, scattered six hits and worked out of a jam in the ninth inning for a 3-2 victory over the Milwaukee Brewers.

**Red Sox 3, Indians 2**  
Boston right-hander Dennis Eckersley joined Flanagan and John as the league's

only 15-game winners, allowing nine hits in his seventh consecutive complete-game victory.

Eckersley got most of his offensive support from Carl Yaztrzemski, who drove in two of Boston's three runs with a single and a sacrifice fly.

**Tigers 3, Rangers 2**  
Steve Kemp clubbed an RBI double to snap a 2-2 tie in the fifth inning, backing Mike Chris, 2-0, and Detroit over Texas.

Chris lasted five innings, and Tigers reliever Aurelio Lopez got his 11th save of the season.

"My bullpen is about used up after five games in three days, but it helps ease the pain knowing that we took four out of five," Tigers Manager Sparky Anderson said.

Champ Summers led off the Detroit fourth with a home run, his 12th, tying the game 2-2. Eric Soderholm had homered for Texas in the second.

**White Sox 2, Yankees 1**  
Rich Wortham tossed a two-hitter — giving up the only Yanks' run on a homer

by Lou Piniella, his 11th — to subdue New York. Wortham, 12-11, who brought a 5.08 earned run average into the game, struck out three and walked two.

The other hit he surrendered was Lenny Randle's infield single.

Mike Squires and Chet Lemon each had three hits for Chicago.

**Royals 10, Blue Jays 3**  
Amos Otis and Al Cowens hit consecutive home runs in the eighth inning, and Larry Gura, 8-8, went the distance for Kansas City, allowing 10 hits and striking out four. It was Gura's fourth complete game.

Otis' homer was a two-run shot, his 13th of the season, and he had a sacrifice fly in the second inning.

**Cubs 11, Pirates 3**  
Chicago's Steve Dillard could only shake his head in wonder and surprise at what he had done.

After three hits, two of them homers, and four runs batted in against the Pittsburgh Pirates Thursday, all Dillard could say was: "I don't know what it is. I'm just hitting the ball well."

When the smoke had cleared, and the Cubs had routed the Pirates, Dillard found himself batting .323 (a mere 72 points above his lifetime average) with three home runs this season — one more than he tallied for the first 263 games of his major league career.

"I just happened to hit it solidly today," said the 28-year-old utility infielder. "Hitting two in a game is something I thought I'd never do in the big leagues."

**Padres 4, Giants 0**  
San Diego scored four ninth-inning runs with the help of a pair of errors by San Francisco shortstop Johnny LeMaster, backing three-hit pitching by John D'Acquisto and carrying the Padres past the Giants.

The shutout for D'Acquisto, 8-9, was his first since he came to the Padres in 1974. The complete game also was the first this season for the right-hander.

**Phillies 6, Expos 4**  
Manny Trillo and Bob Boone cracked two-run singles around an RBI double by Mike Schmidt as Philadelphia scored five

unearned runs in the fifth inning to complete a three-game sweep of Montreal.

The Expos led 2-0 when a miscue by third baseman Larry Parrish opened the gates. Parrish fumbled a grounder by Garry Maddox, and after a force play, Larry Bowa singled.

**Dodgers 4, Astros 3**  
Dusty Baker's two-run double in the fifth snapped a 2-2 tie and helped rookie Rick Sutcliffe to his 10th victory — tied for tops on the Dodger staff with Burt Hooton.

After the game it was disclosed that Dodgers reliever Terry Forster would undergo elbow surgery for the second time in a year. The operation, scheduled next week, will be to remove a bone spur.

**Cardinals 4, Mets 0**  
John Denny pitched a two-hitter and Jerry Mumphrey hit a two-run single as St. Louis completed a four-game sweep of New York.

Lou Brock went 0-for-5 in the contest and remained eight hits short of 3,000 for his career.

## Bucks' boss set to reverse trend

**WHITE DEER** — There's new paint on the walls, new all-weather carpet on the floors, and a new man sitting in the head coach's office here for the Bucks.

While the first two additions are not expected to do much for the win-loss record, the latter is being counted on to reverse the trend that has seen White Deer slide to a dismal 1-19 mark over the past two years.

Earl Byerley has been on the scene here since April after coming from perennial AAA powerhouse Dumas where he was the defensive coordinator and head baseball coach. Although he has been in the coaching profession 14 of the past 15 years at Gruver, Kress, Matador, Kirville - Tivy and Dumas, the White Deer post is his first time in the hot seat as the head coach.

A 1957 graduate of Petersburg High School, Byerley is well acquainted with what it takes to rebuild a class A school back into prominence. As a player, he was part of the building program at Petersburg which saw them transformed from a mediocre class B school in the mid-50s to the class A state champions in 1963.

Sensing that the Bucks need a new mental outlook almost more

than they need wins, Byerley has already set out to accomplish his first goal.

"The biggest thing I want to see (this year) is for the whole athletic program to start going back in the right direction," he said. "Whether we go 2-8 or 10-0 this first year, if we are making strides toward reversing the negative attitude then I'll feel like we have accomplished one of our major goals for this year."

"The self discipline and pride of the kids is what we have to have first and we can already see that happening," he added. "We have had 42 kids that have shown up at this point and expect over 50 by the time school starts. We are on our way."

**WETHERSFIELD, Conn. (AP)** — George Cadle fired a record 9-under-par 62 to take the first-round lead in the \$300,000 Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open.

Cadle's score is the best first round and his 3-stroke lead over J.C. Snead and Jay Haas is the largest for any leader after 18 holes of play in the 28-year history of the GHO.

**JERICHO, N.Y. (AP)** — Kathy Ahern, who has not won on the Ladies Professional Golf Association tour since 1972, shot a 2-under-par 71 to take the first-round lead in the \$100,000 WUI Classic.

Second-seeded John McEnroe advanced with an easy 6-1, 6-1 victory over Ricardo Ycaza. He will play eighth-seeded Manuel Orantes of Spain.

In women's quarterfinals, top-seeded Chris Evert Lloyd, a four-time champion, rallied to beat Mima Jausovec 6-7, 6-2, 6-3.

**THOUSAND OAKS, Calif. (AP)** — Dallas Cowboy quarterback-punter Danny White is expected to be out of action for three weeks with a broken thumb — joining running backs Tony Dorsett and Scott Laidlaw on this week's list of pre-season casualties.

White complained of soreness and swelling Thursday after injuring his right thumb in a passing drill Wednesday. An X-ray examination revealed the fracture.

Dr. Marvin Knight, the Cowboys' team physician, said White would have his hand in a cast for about three weeks, and a further diagnosis would be made at that time. Knight said White may be able to resume punting when the cast is removed, but a return to quarterbacking would have to be considered later.

"He was following through on a pass and hit (defensive lineman) Larry Bethea in the chest," team spokesman Doug Todd said. "It was swollen and sore this (Thursday) morning. He went to the trainer and they did some X-rays and it's fractured."

Former Cowboys punter, Duane Carrell agreed to terms late Thursday and was to report to training camp for possible duty. Carrell punted for the Cowboys in 1974, and also has seen duty with the New York Jets, Los Angeles Rams and St. Louis Cardinals.

Placekicker Rafael Septien is listed as the club's backup punter. "But he's no punter," Todd said.

In the past, linebacker D.D. Lewis and safety Charlie Waters have punted without notable success.

The Cowboys are in better shape at quarterback, where Roger Staubach starts. Third-stringer Glenn Carano also has been impressive in preseason.

White had been scheduled to start at quarterback in Sunday night's exhibition game against the Seattle Seahawks. Coach Tom Landry indicated that Staubach would be inserted in the signal-caller's position.

Team doctors discovered Tuesday that Dorsett apparently fractured a toe prior to the Cowboys' first exhibition game.

## RELIGIOUS ROUNDUP

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. Roman Catholicism has adopted an "affirmative action" plan to give particular consideration to groups that may be under-represented in jobs of the church's national operations.

The guidelines have been approved by the National Conference of Catholic Bishops and their national action offices, and the U.S. Catholic Conference, which employ more than 350 people in Washington. Although dealing mostly with hiring, promotion and compensation of employees, the guidelines also call for positive steps to assure equal opportunity in purchasing services and products.

The plan is effective only for the national office; but copies were sent to the church's 170 dioceses, which remain free to accept, reject or modify the guidelines.

LINDSBORG, Kan. (AP) — While Christians in some countries are paying with their lives for their faith, Christians in the affluent West may have to "live with their way of life" — their high living standards — to be true to their faith, a church leader says.

The Rev. Emilio Castro, a Methodist and official of the World Council of Churches, told a Lutheran meeting that Christians in many lands are in conflict with their governments, but that for western Christians, following Jesus means reducing consumption to share with needier peoples.

NEW YORK (AP) — A Jewish leader says revisions in the 1980 Passion play in Oberammergau, West Germany, have significantly reduced anti-Semitic potential from it.

Nat Kameny of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith commended Oberammergau officials and villagers "for their willingness to listen to Jewish criticism of the traditional pageant and to make changes" in the spirit of Roman Catholicism's Second Vatican Council, which affirmed historic ties to Judaism.

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod at its biennial convention admonished its pastors against participating in non-Lutheran wedding services.

The conservative branch of Lutheranism also warned against some practices of the charismatic movement, terming false the idea that God gives guidance to the church today through "visions or dreams or direct prophecy."

### TV talk: Ralph Renick 29 years later

MIAMI (AP) — In 1950, a scrubbed-faced youngster set up a movie projector in the men's room at WTVJ and used the inside of the washroom door to preview the nightly newscast. Every few minutes, the door swung open and his screen disappeared. The tall, skinnny 21-year-old was Ralph Renick, who now at age 50, with 29 years on the air at WTVJ is the longest tenured television anchorman in the United States. The seemingly indestructible Renick has had the highest rated local news show here since he did his first one in July 1950 to report the Korean War. At that time, it was the only daily television news

show in South Florida. The competition came to town six years later, but only once back in the 1960s was his supremacy challenged. The ratings were close, but Renick came out on top. Why does this man with the stately, serious style draw so many viewers nightly to his 6 p.m. newscast in an era when the emphasis in television news is on happy talk, rapid-fire pacing and youth? "It's certainly not my looks," Renick shrugs. This tall, attractive man with the graying hair and dimpled smile says viewers tune him in because he has good backup support from his news team and management doesn't interfere with the news operation. But there's more to Renick's long tenure and high ratings — news teams at WTVJ have changed over the years while Renick still is going strong. And WTVJ gets beat in the ratings for the 11 p.m. news — the one Renick doesn't anchor. Possibly, in such a transient area, a man like Renick who moved to Miami at the age of 12 represents stability. "I know this town. I like this town. I saw the potential here. Just remain in place in Miami and you have to go forward," says Renick, whose prominence led to his election as national president of the Associated Press Broadcasters.

## What's happening in Pampa

### MOVIES

A tidal wave of nostalgia will hit the Capri Theater with the opening of *Same Time, Next Year*, starring the familiar Alan Alda (of "o nah" fame and dead - pan comic fortitude) and the excellent Ellen Burstyn (splendid in "Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore"). It won't be nostalgia for a particular time or place, just a general nostalgia about the passing of time and its effects on people. Alda and Burstyn are a pair of unmarried lovers who meet, in the movie, annually at a preselected spot. The film follows their affair from '41 to the present. The star of this movie is the make up artist who makes the changes very believable. Finally winding its way into Pampa is the Academy Award winning *The Deer Hunter*. This film follows the lives of two young men from a Pennsylvania steel town to the jungles of Vietnam. A highly controversial film—decried and applauded by persons on both the left and the right of the political spectrum—the director, Michael Cimino, nevertheless contends that he was making a film about young men who happened to go to Vietnam, not a film which claims historical accuracy. The scenes in the mill town are strikingly evocative of time and place, though Cimino tries too blatantly to connect the ritual of hunting in the Pennsylvania woods with the fact of fighting in Vietnam. (At Side two.) Those who do not want to cast a backward glance at the actual horror of Vietnam will find at the other turn (Side one) the gaudy fictional horror of a movie called *A Force of One*. This horror may be better suited for the drive in, however. Patrons advised to bring blankets—not for warmth but security.

### RADIO

The Texas Rangers will take on Cleveland as the race for the pennant continues on KPDN beginning at 7:30 p.m. Immediately after the game stay tuned for *Jamboree U.S.A.* with guest star Con Hunley, which will be aired live from Wheeling, West Virginia. Most of the time she hangs her head on her chest and cries. But the activity of the institution brings Sanjo back to life. When she goes on a trip to the zoo, and is given a rabbit to hold, she finds that "The good feeling woke up."
