Weather turning oil cleanup into guessing game

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) - The Coast Guard said today the Padre Island beach cleanup is going pretty well but they cannot expect 100 percent completion before the holiday weekend because of theavy concentrations of crude washing up on the island.

At the same time, said Coast Guard Capt, Roger Madson, tropical storm Elena still could be an aid in the fight against the massive oil spill. The storm was waffling about 175 miles east-northeast of Corpus Christi this morning.

"Tropical storm Elena is expected to pass onshore to the north of us and she has north northwest winds which will assist us and be a benefit to us." Madson, in charge of the government oil spill task force, told the morning press briefing.

He said there's a one-mile-long patch of sheen, or light oil, about 100 miles offshore from Matagorda Bay. If Elena moves in as expected into Matagorda Bay, she would would pull in pancakes of

The captain said workers hope to have couple of hundred yards of clean shore along the stretch of South Padre where tourists flock to

He also said that tropical storm Elena should not bother the booms protecting the bays and backwaters from the oil.

A federal multi-agency force monitoring the spill at first thought gulf currents were working in their favor Thursday by flowing south and taking oil away from breeding grounds for marine life.

However, the fickle currents reversed direction and began heading

Reconnaisance flights resumed Thursday after being grounded by a tropical depression that washed South Texas with heavy rains this week. Survey teams reported heavy concentrations of thick brown oil rolling up along a 25-mile stretch of the Padre Island National Seashore. Additional patches were sighted just off those beaches.

oil in certain checkpoints in the southern Laguna Madre. The area is home to many marine wildlife and is a breeding and nesting ground for numerous species.

A similar check of the northern end of the Laguna Madre detected some oil, but officials said it could have seeped in from a tanker that overflowed with diesel oil in a ship channel on Wednesday.

A system of floating, rubber barriers has been stretched across several entrances to the Laguna Madre, which lies behind the narrow, 130-mile long Padre Island. Those booms should remain in place as Elena advances, officials said.

Scientists were unsure what would happen if Elena drifts further south and blows across beaches stained with oil patches.

Some experts say the storm could push the crude further away from the shoreline and towards dunes and marshes, while others predict it could carry piles of goo back to sea

A trip along Mustang Island north of Corpus Christi showed beaches and park areas almost deserted, except for the curious getting a look at the brown globs and work crews trying to remove

Federal officials, however, reported a "safety hazard" above the beaches of private helicopters and planes crowded for aerial views of the brown muck

Robert Furr of the Federal Aviation Administration said a four-mile wide area stretching from Matagorda Island to Brownsville has been declared restricted to allow Coast Guard



County to stay out Animal control of new tax district

morning not to enter the new county wide central Austin. tax appraisal district to be established by law in January of 1980.

The decision to remain out of the district followed several strongly worded statements. against the central office by Pct. 3 Commissioner J.O. McCracken

"I feel like this is the biggest setback for the democratic system the taxpayers have ever seen." McCracken said. The taxpayers don't even have a vote in the directors of this office yet how can we stay out of it?

The new appraisal district was established for ach county by House Bill 621. Centralization of appraisal offices is required for city and school governments, but county membership is optional until at least 1980.

A vote on a constitutional amendment requiring county participation in the district is set for November of 1980. Commissioners said they were gambling that the amendment will not

In order to participate in voting for the five-member board which will oversee the new central office, counties are required to pass resolutions to join the appraisal district by Sept.

Commissioners said they were concerned

Gray County Judge Carl Kennedy said he thought "the idea of combining tax offices for greater efficiency is a sound one." But he said he was "worried about what kind of state monster was being created (by the central districts)."

The central appraisal office will handle all appraisal of property for ad valorem tax purposes. Individual government units. however, are still responsible for tax collection.

The amount of actual taxes levied will still be determined by local governments when they set their tax rates

Under the appraisal district, property will be assessed at 100 percent of its fair market value. Since city school and county taxes are presently assessed on a percentage of total value. local governments will have to lower tax rates to avoid an astronomical rise in taxes.

School officials have said the lowering of the tax rate will be a matter of course.

Commissioners received a letter from representative Foster Whaley strongly discouraging participation in the district. Whaley described the legislation as an "urban versus rural bill, meaning "less local and more state control

Hurricane David heads for Dominican Republic

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP) - Hurricane David headed for the Dominican Republic today after killing at least 16 people on the devastated little island of Dominica and one man as it skirted Puerto Rico.

Meanwhile, the season's third hurricane was building up in the Atlantic, midway between the northwest coast of Africa and the Windward Islands that David lashed two days ago.

The U.S. National Weather Service in its 3 a.m. advisory said David's center was about 110 miles southwest of the southwest tp of Puerto Rico and 120 miles southeast of Santo Domingo, the Dominican capital, at 17.1 degrees north latitude and 68.6 degrees west

west-northwest with maximum sustained winds of 150 mph, but the speed of its advance had dropped slightly from 15 to 13 mph. Hurricane-force winds of 74 mph and more extended for 50 miles out from the center.

Police in the southern coastal city of Santo Domingo, capital of the Dominican Republic. evacuated residents from low-lying areas.

The advisory said David should maintain its course and speed through Friday, which would take it on toward Cuba. There was no prediction what it might do after that. The hurricane's center stayed


more than 80 miles south of Puerto Rico as it passed Thursday, and the U.S. commonwealth island It was still moving experienced only a tropical

pelting Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, and heavy seas were flooding parts of the southeast coast of Puerto Rico. the Weather Service said.

Police said one man was killed on the south coast by a tree limb torn loose by the storm. The national power company said 200,000 homes in 19 cities and towns were blacked out

But David devastated the little island of Dominica, in the Windward chain, as it entered the Caribbean Wednesday. The Caribbean News Service reported 16 bodies had been recovered and said it was feared more were buried in the debris.

Apartments on schedule

Of The Pampa News

A housing complex now being built for elderly persons in Pampa "should be ready for occupancy sometime either in January or February 1980." its developer said Thursday.

Ronald Friedman, president of Friedman and Associates, said applications for the PAM Apartments will be solicited "well before the first units are completed. The 96-unit apartment complex, located

near the intersection of Kentucky Avenue and Sumner Street, is being developed by Friedman and Associates for its subsidiary, PAM Apartments Associates Ltd. Construction began in March and is proceeding on schedule, Friedman said. The Herman Bennett Co. of Brownwood is general contractor for the project. John

Beall, an estimator with Herman Bennett. was in Pampa Thursday to check on the progress of the apartments. "From our standpoint we're in pretty good shape as far as construction goes.

Beall said. "We're getting about all the materials we need, and getting them fairly on time. However, the construction crew

"desperately needs roofers and carpenters." Beall said. "We have had problems finding efficient carpenters."

To provide easy access to the new apartments. Wells and Somegville streets, will be extended so they intersect at the southwest corner of the complex, Beall

"We're going to try to get the units all bricked and get all of the roofing completed by the end of October." he added

The apartments are being financed by \$2.3 million in revenue bonds issued by the Panhandle Elderly Apartments Corp., a non-profit housing corporation formed in November 1978 by the Pampa City Commission.

Ten of the 96 apartments are being designed specifically for the handicapped and the remaining units are for persons 62 years of age and older.

PAM Apartments will be subsidized by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Eligible tenants those making no more than \$8,000 in median yearly income - will pay no more than 25 percent of their total income for rent. The difference will be made up by

Friedman said the maximum rent. including utilities, for each of the one-bedroom apartments will be \$240 a month. "Everyone will be paying from \$240 on down, depending on their income," he

Tenants will be able to individually adjust the heat and air conditioning in their apartments, Friedman said. Each 525 square-foot apartment will be equipped with smoke detectors, deadbolt locks and

peep holes at the entry doors and emergency call buttons in the bedroom and bathroom.


When the emergency call buttons are pushed. Friedman explained, lights will go on in the main office of the complex and on the front porch of the apartment tenant in distress, and a buzzer will sound.

"If there's nobody in the office at that point, at least the neighbors will hear the buzzer and then they can go out and see which porch light is on," Friedman said.

Preliminary applications for PAM Apartments are now being taken by Joyce Puckett, director of the Pampa Senior Citizens Center at 500 W Francis. Over 150 persons have so far expressed interest in living at the complex. Puckett said Thursday.

A copy of the plans for the apartments is available for inspection at the senior citizens center. Puckett is accepting pre-applications during her office hours. from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

The apartments will be managed by National Living Centers Inc. of Houston. owner and operator of the Pampa Nursing Center. Before construction is completed an office will be opened to take applications, probably on the construction site near the extension of Wells Street. Friedman said.

Chrysler moves make sense

The Chrysler Corp., it now seems, has a good chance of survival

It will rebate to the buyers \$400 on each 1979 car or truck except its subcompacts. This should quicken its sales.

It also has sold large bundles of its accounts receivable, that is, its right to collect for cars already sold but not paid for. It even sold \$230 million of these. accounts to a competitor, General Motor Acceptance, the financing subsidiary of the big car maker.

There's nothing like having a competitor collect your bills for you. However, GMAC took pains to state that it was not buying the accounts receivable to do Chrysler a favor but rather because they were a good buy. This means it bought them at so low a price it stands to make a substantial profit.

These two actions by Chrysler apparently were not unrelated. Reducing the price of cars by means of rebates will increase sales, bringing the dealers an influx of cash with which they can pay their bills, including those which they now owe to GMAC, Household Finance and other holders of Chrysler receivables. One may

hand in these moves, perhaps even suggested them.

Chrysler's fundamental error was overestimating the demand for their vehicles. They produced cars much faster than these sold, and as a result the company and its dealers piled up huge unsold inventories. Iacocca and associates were over-optimistic

Early in August, Chrysler asked the U.S. government for \$1 billion to help it over the hump. To its credit, be it said, Washington hesitated. Chrysler then took these other, hardline measures to raise cash. The government probably will chip in, but not to the extent of \$1 billion.

A further action, expected at any time, is a layoff of some 15 to 20 percent of Chrysler's 35,000 white-collar workers. If these can be spared without paralyzing operations, there must have been some payroll padding. At this writing, Chrysler also had laid off some 27,000 blue-collar

Wages appear to be a sacrosanct area. When the Chrysler management suggested that wages not be raised for the next two surmise that Chrysler's bankers had a years, union council backed them up. Note

hold them at the present level for the next two years was proposed. When an employer is on the verge of bankruptcy, a reduction in its chief cost. wages, is only

Wouldn't the workers prefer that their wages be reduced than they be laid off and receive no wages? Apparently not. When auto workers are laid off, their wages cease, but they can register at the U.S. employment office and collect unemployment compensation equal to 95 percent of wages. Why work when you can be "unemployed" and get paid 95 percent as much?

This sort of thing has been done ever since the Social Security Act was passed in the 1930s. In 1964 I wrote a book about it, "Paying Men Not to Work" (Caxton Printers, Caldwell, Idaho)

In the journal of Political Economy for June, 1979, Daniel Benjamin and Levis Kochin tell how in Britain in the 1930s a veritable army of unemployed were recruited by the government's payment of liberal unemployment benefits.

John Maynard Keynes saw them

that no wage reduction but an agreement to spending their easy money freely and wrote a book saying this was the way to prosperity. For a generation the book determined economic policy worldwide. It still does, largely.

Douglas Fraser, head of the UAW, says he does not care a whoop for Chrysler as a company, whether it survives or perishes. but he wants to save the jobs of the union members. To have a job, you sort of have to have an employer. Employer gone, job gone. To Fraser. Chrysler is not a manufacturer of automobiles but of jobs.

So far as I know, nobody is stopping the UAW from setting up a corporation and going into the automobile manufacturing business, thus making jobs for its members. It would be an educational experience for Fraser and his colleagues. They would learn things that might increase their respect for Iacocca and his

Chrysler's costs have to be reduced if the firm is to survive. It stands to reason that executives, sub-executives and workers all should take cuts in pay until the business gets on its feet. When one offers goods for sale and they do not sell, he must offer more per dollar received. This is a fairly basic rule of marketing.

If the UAW does not agree to a cut and Chrysler folds, it will be the union that is responsible for the workers' loss of jobs and the American people's loss of a great

The Kurdish Tragedy

Ayatollah Khomeini's Islamic Republic is trying to reassert its authority in the outlying districts peopled by the Kurds, a separate ethnic group that has been trying to gain autonomy. With slightly different details, the same news could have been written 4,000 years ago

An identical political process can be discerned on clay tablets from the reign of the Emperor Sargon and for most of the central rulers from his time to ours. A strong monarch falls. For a year or two, his heirs or supplanters struggle to establish themselves in the capital, and in the meantime the tribal outskirts of the empire enjoy an interlude of self-rule. But when the new king gains control of his throne, he turns to subduing the rebellious provinces. and an oppressive peace prevails until the next succession


The Kurds have been the oldest running victims of this "process," and their position today is little better than it was in 2000 B.C. The eight million or more mountain-dwelling members of this group live, with their own language and culture. in adjoining regions of Turkey. Iraq and Iran. Since these three countries are. respectively, pro-American, pro-Soviet and neutral, no great power can support an independent united Kurdistan. So the Kurds are doomed to sporadic minority uprisings, apparently in rotation, in each of

This situation jars sharply with the Western diplomatic mind as shaped by ethnic nationalism and Woodrow Wilson's principle of self-determination. So, with a three-year exception during the break-up of the Ottoman Empire, the West has tried to ignore the Kurdish existence. There've been no UN resolutions on their behalf. No international committees of intellectuals have organized, even though for perhaps because) the Kurds have decided to eschew terrorism and fight like men. International human rights groups have been so indifferent that, during the revolt in Iraq, a Kurdish student in England claimed that the only resolution he could obtain on their behalf was a resolution from the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals condemning the indiscriminate bombing of

An independent Kurdistan is not exactly-

donkeys and farm animals

a human right, of course, any more than an independent Ukraine or an independent Confederacy. But the plight of the Kurds is at the very least a grim reminder that happy endings do not abound in foreign affairs. They may live for the next 4,000 years through the same cycle of rebellion and repression. The U.S. seems willing to let it happen that way, and this tragic realism only leaves us wondering why our diplomats have such a Pollyannish urge to find a quick fix to so many other foreign



After the Ayatollah

Holding the Ayatollah Khomeini's coat must be a full-time job for someone in what passes for a government in Iran these days. That grim eminence shows no hesitation whatsoever in taking on all comers in the factional infighting into which the glorious revolution against the shah's tyranny has degenerated in less than a year.

He has suppressed dissident Arabs in the vital oil-producing region at the head of the Persian Gulf and launched a military campaign against a Kurdish rebellion that turned out to be mostly his own

He has silenced press critics of his authoritarian policies and in recent days appears to have gained the upper hand over an array of leftist groups that once were key allies in bringing the revolution to

Meanwhile, his firing squads continue to pick off individual undesirables at a steady

His has been the type of ruthless performance that gives revolution a bad name. But it has been successful in guaranteeing that one question that need not be asked about Iran today is who's in

In charge of what and for how long are. however, entirely different matters. Khomeini's Iran is coming more and more to resemble that of the shah -- only in

some unpleasant respects even more so.

assembly to complete a new constitution is packed with his like-thinking mullah colleagues. He talks now of an Islamic state of one or at most two ideologically similar parties. Government is not a matter of laws but of

repressive force. This may be effective for a time but, as the shah discovered, not indefinitely

In the Kurds, with centuries of struggle for a national identity already behind them, and the leftists, dispersed but far from destroyed. Khomeini faces formidable opponents who are not going to be bested through thundered quotations from the Koran. And it is not beyond possibility that Western-exposed liberals, who had hoped for genuine democratic reforms from therevolution, may yet find a voice and their strength.

The economy is also a problem. Even at reduced levels of production. Iran continues to accumulate oil revenues, more than it can productively spend. Which is part of the problem. The economy, functioning at less than half the pre-revolution output levels, cannot absorb large inputs of fresh capital. Unemployment is high, inflation unchecked and developmental projects at a

The Iranians are reported to be sounding out the European Community concerning

Politics are still tightly controlled. The prospects of long-term economic cooperation. The Europeans have the capability to replace the American expertise and presence that vanished with the shah. But even if agreements result, the effects will be some time in being felt in the

Iranian economy While the ayatollah may be in charge, he is far from unchallenged. And even should all these adversaries be no match for him. there is another that surely will.

Khomeini's performance is remarkable for an 80-year-old. But he is an 80-year-old. And for all that he may be in complete control of the situation today, the time is very short in which to establish an order and assure a succession that will maintain it after his passing

The history of revolutions is against it. suggesting instead a progression through greater turbulence, more repression and bloodletting, to the emergence of new forces who may give a new direction to the The real cause for concern in Iran may

not be what has come to pass but what is coming. It could be that the revolution is (NEWSPAPER ENTERPRISE ASSN.)

Confusion in the Court

Many people are confused about the import of recent U.S. Supreme Court decisions.

Including, according to Chief Justice Warren E. Burger, numerous judges whose responsibility it is to apply them as precedents.

He observed the otter day that lower courts seem to be misreading one decision that is widely regarded as of the landmark variety. It authorizes a court to bar the public. Since the justification is to protect defendants from damaging publicity, the ban is understood to include the press.

But it is meant to apply. Burger explained, only to pretrial hearings, not actual trials. Judges around the country who are entertaining requests for closed trials may be making the mistake of taking their cue from "newspaper reports of what we said," not the court's actual opinion.

It is no surprise that the chief justice has taken the opportunity to get in a lick at the press. He rarely overlooks one.

But it is surprising that he should suggest that his colleagues of the lower courts are lax in their homework, and that he should be himself so vague as to precisely what his own court has decreed.

He has repeated his view, also stated in a separate concurrence, that since the decision was based on the language of the Sixth Amendment, dealing with the rights of accused to a public trial, the question of the rights of the press under the First Amendment is still open.

PUC appointment questioned

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Sen. Lloyd Doggett, D-Austin, who previously thwarted one would-be high state office holder, wants to talk personally with Henry Rollins before clearing him as a new member of the Texas Public Utility Commission. Doggetts's office said the Austin senator was not given the usual courtesy of approval before Gov. Bill Clements appointed Rollins Thursday to the three-member regulatory commission.

Rollins, 57, a University of Texas lecturer and former oil company executive will join the commission on Sept. 2, with his first task to sit in on the statewide rate request from Southwest Bell Telephone Co. two days later, on Sept. 4.

Rollins'six-year appointment must be approved by the Senate when the Legislature next meets. The next regular session is January 1981 but Clements has said he will call a special session during 1980.

Doggett's executive assistant, Nancy Williams, said there was no word Clements planned to appoint Rollins until Wednesday.

Normally, gubernatorial appointees are cleared in advance with their hometown senators

Ms. Williams said Doggett, out of town on vacation, was informed of Clements' action by telephone. He dictated a letter to the governor saying he could not give his consent without first evaluating Rollins and discussing the commission post with him.

She said this did not mean Doggett would oppose the appointment but merely that he would suspend judgment until after a talk with Rollins. During the 1979 Legislature, Doggett refused to

approve the appointment of Hugh Yantis as a member of the State Insurance Board, and Yantis was turned down by the Senate. In the Sept. 4 hearing, Southwest Bell

Prior to entering UT-Austin in 1967 for graduate study, he was vice president for engineering and manufacturing of Drilco Oil Tools Inc., a company he helped organize in 1951 in Midland Drilco merged into Smith International Inc. in 1967

From 1947 to 1951, he was employed by Hughes Tool Co., Houston, as a product engineer in the design and testing of oil well drilling tools. He is a native of Gulfport, Miss.

Angry crowd vents its feelings

Refugees worrying state's fisherman

PALACIOS, Texas (AP) - Truyen Van Trhn stood calmly before an angry, hostile group of 125 Texas fishermen in this sleepy little fishing community Thursday night and told them what they least wanted to hear - he had just bought a fishing boat.

"I borrowed the money from my father and my brothers," the Vietnamese refugee said. "I've had it for about two weeks, but I'm not doing too well,

Trhn stood as the lone representative of his countrymen before a hostile, angry crowd wary and fearful of their new competitors. The refugee fishermen have become the focal point of loud protests from native fishermen who claim the foreign influx will force them out of business within five years.

Trhn sat quietly in the rear of the Palacios Recreation Hall and listened as veteran Texas shriump and crab fishermen discussed ways to end the migration of Vietnamese fishermen to this area.

They mostly feared having their fishing grounds overpopulated and depleted by the refugees, but there were other, more bizarre worries expressed.

"They could be setting up a whole network of mines along the coast." one woman said emotionally. "I see them out there in their boats, but we don't know what they're doing.

Bo Cunningham, spokesman for a group called 'PISCES," was far more concerned with too many fishing boats flooding into the area.

We understand there will be about 600,000 Vietnamese coming into this country next year, and it seems like they are all coming to Texas," Cunningham said. "A great number of them will settle in the east, but they are a warm-climate people and when the first of winter hits, they will come to the coast.

"At the present rate of escalation, within the next five years you're going to see people who were born and raised in this industry looking for other jobs.

Another fisherman, Ed Lambright of Port O'Connor, said the refugee fishermen did not observe common courtesies normally practiced by native fishermen. "We have what you call a gentlemen's agreement

that we don't crowd each other," Lambright said. "But the Vietnamese will pull right across our rigs, and this is the type of thing that causes bad feelings. Lambright charged that his civil rights were being violated because Vietnamese fishermen were taking

away from his income. Cunningham added, "I think every senator and representative in Washington should have to share his wages with a Vietnamese and we'll see how they like it.

At a nearby trailer park where most of the Vietnamese refugees live, Dang Lan Ba talked quietly while watching his countrymen mend their nets. "We don't want any trouble," he said. "We just want

to live here peacefully and live by the rules. Ba said prior to leaving his native country his family received only six pounds of rice per month for each person. "To get enough to eat, we'd have to go to the black market," he said. "We didn't have any freedom

H.M. Forester broached a subject that had been raised by others in private. "I'd like to know how these people can come in here in five years and buy a boat when it took me all my life," he said.

"I fought in World War II and didn't even get the GI

That question was addressed earlier in the day by U.S. Rep Joe Wyatt, D-Texas. He said there has been plenty of conversation to the effect that Vietnamese are receiving subsidies or low-interest loans to buy

"I could find that they are getting no preferential treatment," he said.

Tensions between local and refugee fishermen passed the boiling point early this month at nearby Seadrift. An American fisherman was shot to death. and two Vietnamese have been charged. Vietnamese boats were burned, and feelings in Seadrift continue to



AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - State Insurance Board Chairman William Daves says Texans can soften the blow of an 8.9 percent statewide average rise in auto rates by price shopping for coverage. The board ordered the increase Thursday, taking effect with

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB - I'm a 24 year - old female and I weigh 116 pounds. I eat very little meat. I just do not like it. I eat dried beans occasionally. I eat the gravy from meat, rice potatoes, vegetables, an egg almost daily

My mother is concerned that I'm not getting enough protein. Am I harming myself by not eating meat? What other foods have protein? Should I take vitamins? Also, how much protein does a 29 - year - old man weighing 130 pounds need?

DEAR READER - Your mother has a right to be concerned. The two major sources of good - quality protein in our diet are the meats, which include red meats, fish and poultry, and milk and milk products such as cottage cheese and yogurt.

I don't know what kind of gravy you eat since it's made in different ways, but if it's made as milk gravy, that's one way to get some additional protein into your diet. Mature bean seeds do contain quite a bit of protein and I noticed that you only eat them occasionally anyway.

If you're not going to eat meat, I think you must include in your diet an increased amount of milk, cottage cheese and yogurt. These are also good sources of calcium. You need around 50 grams of good - quality protein a day and the man you asked about needs about 56.

To give you more information about sources of protein in your diet and how much food you need to provide it. I'm sending you The Health Letter number 3 6. Proteins: Part II. Other readers who want this issue can send 75 cents in check or coin

with a long, stamped, self addressed envelope for it. Send your request to me at P.O. Box 1551, Radio City Station, New York, N.Y. 10019.

In the list of the foods that contain protein in The Health Letter I'm sending you, you'll note that protein makes up 3.5 percent of the weight of whole milk and 4.2 percent of the weight of skim milk fortified with 2 percent non - fat solids. That means in a liter (a little more than a quart) of fortified skim milk. you'd get about 42 grams of good - quality protein.

About 18 percent to 20 percent of the weight of the edible portion (after bones and unedible parts are removed) of red meats, fish and chicken is good - quality complete protein.

DEAR DR. LAMB - I would like to know if a person's blood can change by itself. Before I became pregnant, my blood was O positive. After I had the baby, the doctor said I had Rh negative and gave me an injection for it. Is it possible that a person's blood can change?

DEAR READER - No. If you were O positive before your pregnancy, you're still O positive. That has nothing to do with your being Rh negative or Rh positive.

The Rh factor is unrelated to the basic blood types - A. B. AB and O. It's sometimes called a subtype. A person is either O. A. B or AB, and also either Rh positive or Rh negative.

Your doctor did the right thing in giving you an injection after your baby was born. It's to help prevent you from developing problems related to being Rh negative, most specifically if you bear an Rh positive child in

I hitchhike whenever I can't get a ride from friends or family. - Brad. Dubuque, Iowa





Hog farmers may get psychological boost at least

WASHINGTON (AP) - Hog farmers, who have seen their market prices plummet this year, may get a least a psychological boost by an Agriculture Department decision to buy pork for this fall's school lunch program.

More poultry also will be bought than in previous years in an effort to trim costs of buying more expensive beef, mostly in the form of hamburger, for the school lunch program.

Assistant Secretary Carol Tucker Foreman said Thursday the purchases of canned pork will be the first by USDA in significant quantity in at least five years. Records show the last substantial pork purchases were in 1974-75.

Last April, the Council on Wage and Price Stability told Agriculture, the Defense Department and the Veterans Administration to reduce beef purchases as a way of fighting inflation and to buy more less-expensive pork and poultry.

Ms. Foreman told a reporter that the pork buying for schools is

primarily a result of the White House order.

"We are seeking ways to avoid reducing (total) meat purchases and still stay within our budget, and we will be reducing beef," she said.

Noting that meat prices, including those paid by USDA for school donations, have climbed sharply the last couple of years. Ms. Foreman said pork is a relative bargain right now

Cattle prices have dipped this summer from their peaks of last spring, but hog prices at the farm have declined even more

The department also is buying ground beef for schools, beginning with purchases announced on Aug. 16. Those will continue until enough is bought under the reduced program for the 1979-80 school year

Last year, ground beef pwrchases totaled 80.6 million pounds at an average wholesale cost to USDA of about \$1.16 a pound.

Previously, in 1977-78, ground beef for schools totaled 93.9 million pounds at an average of 72 cents a pound.

So far in the current program, about 4 million pounds have been purchased at an average cost of \$1.19 a pound, with some as high ' as \$1.26 a pound in the most recent weekly orders.

The meat is offered by processors under bids, and USDA has rejected many of the offerings because of prices being too high. In the latest bids, for example, a top of \$1.42 a pound was rejected.

About 26 million children regularly eat in cafeterias in the 94,000 schools that participate in the program. The donated commodities from USDA are in addition to federal and state money that is allocated to help schools operate their meal programs.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Charles B. Jennings, who has been in charge of packers and stockyards regulatory operations in the Agriculture Department the last two years, says he plans to leave his \$47,500-a-year job in a few weeks.

Jennings, 61, said Thursday he has set no date for leaving the post but hopes to make the move "fairly soon" and probably no later than Oct. 1.

Before being named to the post by Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland on June 30, 1977, Jennings for seven years was president of the Kansas City Stock Yards Co. Earlier, from 1962 to 1970, he was president of the American Stockyards Association headquarted here.

Asked about his plans, Jennings said, "I have none at this time. I'm going to wait until I'm out of this job and see what develops." Of his decision to resign, Jennings said, "I didn't come in planning to make a career out of government, it was a temporary

Another factor in his decision to leave, Jennings said, is the changed character of the job.

Instead of confidence problem

Crisis may be cause of economic blues

confidence President Carter diagnosed six weeks ago may really be a case of the economic blues.

And if that's the ailment, Carter is going to have a hard time changing the mood in time to shore up his own standing for the 1980 presidential campaign.

In his July 15 report to the nation, Carter said a "crisis of confidence" was eroding the national will. He said the way to begin changing it was for the government and the people to confront and solve the nation's energy problem.

Carter's assessment seems to have stemmed in large measure from the findings of his pollster, Patrick H. Caddell, who reported widespread pessimism among Americans about their own futures and about their ability to change things.

The Caddell surveys, like those of other

opinion analysts, found the average American thinks things are getting worse and doubts that the average person really has any influence on the government.

But an analysis by the journal, Public Opinion, published by The American Enterprise Institute, suggests that the mood may not be as down as some of the statistics.

"Despite this long, gray line of numbers, ... there are many other findings that suggest the idea of a 'crisis' is badly overblown," the journal says. Social scientists have long pointed out. for example, that at the same time that Americans are expressing a sour note about the country, they usually feel much more buoyant about their private lives.

According to Public Opinion, the level of American confidence in the leaders of the nation's government and institutions declined markedly in the late 1960s,

during the Vietnam War, and has remained in a valley since the early 1970s.

Confidence levels began to climb in 1972, but plunged again because of Watergate, the oil embargo and worsening inflation.

The polls reflected another upward turn with Carter's election and the end of an economic recession, but turned downward again in 1978, as the president's own ratings began to sag.

In his own assessment, Carter said the decline in public confidence had its roots in the assassinations and war of the 1960s. in Watergate, in a decade of inflation, and in the energy wees that began with the Araboil embargo of 1973.

"Conveniently, all of those root causes predated his own entry into office, a theme that is sure to be repeated on the campaign trail," the Public Opinion account says.



Leaders want impassioned crusade against nuclear arms

Leaders of the world's various religions want an impassioned crusade, like those that abolished slavery or ended the Vietnam War, to rise up in tidal force against the nuclear arms race.

They see such a movement as imperative to save civilized life and build global human brotherhood. "We are at a turning point in history," says Roman Catholic Archbishop Angelo Fernandes of New Delhi, India, president of the World Conference on Religion and Peace.

"The signs of the headlong race towards destruction and death are there for all to see. There is urgent need to act... The challenge of our time is for the unification of mankind."

That cause, he adds, demands mustering of the "entire human and

spiritual" resources of mankind.

Such rallying calls for combined religious effort marked the opening this week of the conference's 10-day assembly at Princeton Theological Seminary in New Jersey, bringing together 350 leaders of 10 major world religions.

It's the first time that the 10-year-old conference has met in the United States, following prior assemblies in 1970 in Japan and 1974 in Belgium.

Also for the first time, religious leaders from communist China — nine Christians, Buddhists and Moslems — are participating, along with those from 45 other countries and all continents.

Terming presence of the Chinese religious leaders "an event of

historic importance." Nikkyo Niwano, head of Japan's Buddhist lay movement. Rissho Kosei-kai, an an honorary conference chairman, said:

"It is not possible to discuss 'the true world' at an international conference without representation from China, with its one billion people."

Besides Christians, Buddhists and Moslems, delegates also include Hindus. Confucianists, Jains, Jews, Shintoists, Sikhs and Zorastrians.

The Rev. Dana McLean Greeley of Boston, a Unitarian-Universalist leader and conference cochairman, urged a massive religious groundswell, greater than the U.S. movement in the 1960's against the Vietnam War, to stop the arms buildup.

The Rev. Homer Jack of New York.

dsmiry-general of the conference and also a Unitarian-Universalist, called for a "new Abolitionism" against the "obscenity which is called the nuclear arms race."

He said the conference should "launch a great new movement, a worldwide moral and religious crusade which will say no to nuclear war and no to the nuclear arms race as the old Abolitionists launched a crusade to say no to slavery."

Declared Archbishop Fernandes: "The military budgets of the two super powers are a scandal and those of even developing countries a shame...

"Alongside the fabulous sums wasted on destructive purposes, the sum total of economic cooperation for humanitarian goals appears a mere-flea-bite, a piece of sham, a brazen mockery of the poor of the world... The total picture is shocking."

Ad draws protest from Catholic rights group

MILWAUKEE (AP) — An ad appearing in newspapers in 30 cities seeking to get Roman Catholics to work for change in their church's position against contraception has drawn a protest from the Catholic League for Religious and Civil Rights.

Michael Schwartz. executive director of the league. told the Providence. R. I., diocesan newspaper, the Providence Visitor, that the ad seeks to "divide the Catholic community and interfere with an internal affair."

Werner Fornos. director of the Washington-based Population Action Council which placed the ad. maintains it seeks only to bring the issue into wider discussion since many Catholics "obviously disagree" with the birth control ban.

The ad invites Catholics to join in working for change in the church teaching. as was recommended by a majority of a special commission set up on the subject by the late Pope Paul VI. who rejected its advise and reaffirmed the ban in 1968.

ATLANTA (AP) — Sputhern Baptist leaders say they have received protests from the Greek Orthodox Church at the appointment of two Greek-speaking Southern Baptist missionaries to work among Greek-speaking people in the Boston area.

A letter from Archdeacon Methodios G. Tournas of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of North and South America branded the appointments "blatantly unChristian, nothing short of proselytism."

The Rev. Adrian Pagers, Southern Postist annidate and William.

The Rev. Adrian Rogers. Southern Baptist president, and William G. Tanner, head of the denomination's home missions board, replied that the apppointment of the missionaries was not to proselytize but to reach persons who have not been reached with the gospel of Christ. Tanner says field studies indicated that a "spiritual vacuum exists"

among a segment of Greek Americans. He says Greek Americans in the Boston area had requested the appointments and "we simply responded to a request from the local area."

GREENCASTLE. Ind. (AP) —An Indiana minister is going on the road to tell the gospel story through art.

The Rev. Howard W. Ellis, known for his gift of "preaching with pictures," is taking early retirement from the pastorate to resume his unconventional ministry with easel, chalks and paper.

The artist-preacher, a protege of the late Chicago artist Warner Sallman, says his aim is to provide "an occasion of worship through art" at the churches where he appears.

Housing industry volatile CARPET CLEANING sector of U.S. economy

NEW YORK (AP) - The housing industry has a long-standing reputation as one of the most volatile sectors of the U.S. economy

Its cycle has traditionally run from boom, in

times of easy credit, to bust whenever money But dramatic changes in the mortgage markets - the mechanism that supplies the industry with its lifeblood - may be changing all

In the 1980s, predicts Jonathan Golfarb, building industry analyst at Merrill Lynch, Pierce. Fenner & Smith, "the housing cycle. while still in evidence, will be significantly less volatile than it has been during the last 15

In the past, the ups and downs of home-building have been influenced not only by fluctuations in demand for houses, but also by what happens in the money markets.

In bad times for the economy, demand for houses was reduced by normal economic forces. On top of that, many potential buyers were shut out of the market because savings institutions didn't have the mortgage money to lend them.

The lofty interest rates of the 1970s compounded this problem, attracting deposits out of savings accounts into other. higher-yielding investments, in a process known as disintermediation.

But several things have happened in recent

years to alleviate that threat. Goldfarb noted in a recent report.

First of all, the rules have been changed to allow the savings and loans and savings banks to combat disintermediation with a number of "new products" that are more competitive than the standard passbook account. These include the six-month money market certificates, or MMCs, which pay rates equal to those offered by six-month Treasury bills.

"MMCs have been successful in maintaining deposit flows during the last year and have provided critical support to housing," Goldfarb

At the same time, he added, "Elimination or reduction of usury ceilings on mortgage rates in some states have also helped to make it possible for lending institutions to earn portfolio returns sufficient to permit higher-rate accounts, and increased use of variable-rate mortgages should have the same effect."

Perhaps the most important change of all, however, has been the rapid growth of a secondary market for mortgages, in which they can be bought and sold much like stocks on Wall

An institution such as the Government National Mortgage Association or a private bank bundles individual mortgages into a single package, and then sells pieces of the package to

Wallace reluctant to give up House news position

NEW YORK (AP) - Chris Wallace says he was reluctant at first to give up his assignment in Washington as House correspondent for NBC News, but there was something about "Prime Time Sunday" that aroused his interest.

"What intrigued me was the opportunity to spend more time on a story, for reporting, digging, more interviews, better writing, Wallace says, "the chance to give 10 minutes to a story rather than a minute and a half."

Wallace was recruited, with Jack Perkins, as one of the program's two roving correspondents. And in the two months since the mid-summer premiere of "Prime Time Sunday." his generally hard-edge reporting has been one of the show's strong points.

"It hasn't all been smooth," he says, "but I feel I've worked out a lot of the kinks, and I think the

"We came into this with no bag of stories, so to speak, and I must say, we're tired. But we all feel it's been worth it.

Indeed, NBC scheduled the first edition of "Prime Time Sunday," with Tom Snyder, host of the network's late-night "Tomorrow" program, as anchor, for the evening of June 24. That was primarily to give the newsmagazine a running

"Prime Time Sunday" has stumbled a bit in the ratings so far, but enters the new television year with the support of NBC's president, Fred

"Surely, we'd all like to be better in the ratings." Wallace says. "but there's hardly a great despondency here. The comparison with CBS' super-successful

"60 Minutes" - Chris Wallace's father, Mike Wallace, has been a "60 Minutes" correspondent from the start - was inevitable. Indeed, the contrast probably contributed to the demise of "Weekend." the predecessor of "Prime Time

NBC, at the outset, emphasized "Prime Time Sunday" would be different - portions of the new program would be live.

"It's been an evolving thing, we're constantly developing the program." Wallace says, "and the exciting thing about the live format is the opportunity it gives for change

Recruits to be treated with respect

WASHINGTON (AP) - From now on. Army recruits won't have to endure "skinhead" haircuts and will be treated "with the same respect and dignity accorded to all

That's an order from the Army's Training and Doctrine Command to all recruit reception stations and basic training centers.

Although the Army didn't say so, the new policy undoubtedly is intended to avoid "turning off" potential volunteers the Army badly needs because it is failing to meet its recruiting goals.

"Receptees and trainees are soldiers...from the moment they watake the oath of enlistment," the order said.

"Receptees and trainees will be treated as soldiers and as adult individuals, with the same respect and dignity accorded to

In a message circulated through the Army, it was said the underlying philosophy is to "train soldiers by building on their strengths and by shoring up their weaknesses...not to tear them down and build them up

The command specifically

ruled out the "shock" tactics training bases. used in the past on recruits as they reported to receptions

stations to enter the Army. "This includes such practices as making receptees stand at a brace, run on and off buses with luggage and other forms of harassment," the order said.

Among the reforms likely to rate high with recruits is a new rule sparing them from having their hair clipped almost to their scalps when they arrive at

"Haircut standards in Army training centers will be the Army standards," the order said. "Trainees will be allowed to wear mustaches in accordance with current Army regulations."

Years ago, the Army relaxed its restrictions on hair length and style for everybody except recruits, and that has caused considerable grumbling among trainees ever since.







Chrysler money problems showing up in economy

NEW CASTLE, Ind. (AP) - Bill Vaught aimlessly wipes the counter of his bar, wishing for the afternoon crowd of Chrysler workers that usually fills his modest tavern.

The patrons will not be there in force today. Feeling the pinch that has hit the financially troubled automaker, the Chrysler parts plant across the street from Bill's Bar and Lunch shut down Monday for two weeks.

"It's been real slow," said Vaught, who worked for Chrysler for 10 years before opening

"I've seen it slow before," he said. "I was laid off a year and two months one time, nine months another. When they were down for a strike, everybody figured they'd be back pretty soon. Now, they're running scared and I can't say as I

At the end of the bar, Jerry Davis nurses a beer. He is among the 2,500 Chrysler workers in this eastern Indiana community of 22,000 who are affected by the production shutdowns.

"If it goes. I'm going." the 30-year-old Davis said of the plant. "I got 13 years in there. You hate to give it up.

Working for the automaker has been a family tradition for Davis. His father worked there, and so do his two brothers-in-law. He graduated from Chrysler High here. But if the plant closes, he vows to take his wife and two children and move

"There goes part of the problem right now." Davis said, nodding toward the street where a city-owned vehicle, a Chevrolet, stopped at an won't support Chrysler. They go out of town to buy their cars. They don't have no support

around here like they used to. "A lot of the uptown businessmen say if Chrysler folds, this town wouldn't be hurt any," said Davis. "I don't know what they be thinking, but I think they're crazier than hell. It's a Chrysler town, that's what it is.'

William Clements, executive director of the Chamber of Commerce, disputes claims like Davis' that New Castle is a company town in the classic sense of the term.

"I lived in the Pittsburgh area and I know what a company town is. It's where the houses are owned by the company and the stores are owned by the company and the businesses are owned by the company." he said. "We are not a company

But with the automaker representing 10 percent of the work force of Henry County "for me to say that Chrysler is not important is a darned ridiculous statement.

Chrysler, which has lost more than \$460 million in the last 18 months, is asking the federal government for \$1 billion in aid until 1981, when it says it should be profitable again.

Some 25,800 employees, more than one-fourth of its U.S. hourly work force, have been laid off Unemployment in this city, about 50 miles east

of Indianapolis, is about 7.8 percent, but when Chrysler shuts down the figure jumps to 17.8 Pointing to the diversification in New Castle

industry. Clements is optimistic about the town's economic health in the face of Chrysler's difficulties. "There's lots of gloom and doom talk, but

really there's been no announcement that Chrysler is going to close," he said. "They're in trouble, sure. Everybody knows that. But even though Chrysler shuts down part of its operation. it's got to have a parts plant.

Chrysler has been an institution in this town since 1926, when it bought the New Castle plant from the Maxwell automobile company. And ever since, it seems. Chrysler has been dogged by rumors of financial distress.

"I've been over there 34 years and they've been closing up since they've been there.' quipped one old-timer at the bar.

McHenry chosen to replace Young

Young resigned Aug. 15 amid a furor created by his meeting with a representative of the Palestine Liberation Organization. He has remained in the post until a successor could be named.

McHenry, 42, would not comment on his reported nomination when reached at his home Thursday night, the Times said. The appointment would be subject to Senate approval.

Neither the State Department nor the White House would comment on the report, the Times said.

In contrast to the free-wheeling style of Young, McHenry is regarded by colleagues as a master of reticent diplomacy, always ready to deflect questions and politely decline those that he might consider sensitive, the Times said.









Lone Ranger to take off his mask

LOS ANGELES (AP) - What no black-hatted cowboy villain could accomplish in more than 200 episodes of "The Lone Ranger," a Superior Court judge has ordered actor Clayton Moore to do - take off his mask

Moore, who played television's "masked rider of the plains" from 1949 to 1957, had tears in his eyes when he heard of the decision by Judge Vernon Foster. Moore waited outside the courtroom Thursday because he refused to take off his white cowboy hat.

"I have been the Lone Ranger for 30 years, and I will not give up the fight." said Moore, who left with his black mask still in place. Foster granted a preliminary injunction sought by Lone Ranger Television Inc., a subsidiary of the Wrather Corp., which bought all

rights to the Lone Ranger character for \$3 million in 1954. He ruled Wrather Corp. has a property right in the character, and upheld Wrather's claim that Moore had signed away for a handsome

price all rights to portray himself as the hero of the Old West.

The injunction forbids Moore to wear in public "the Lone Ranger mask or any mask substantially similar in appearance.

a treasured mystique if he forced Moore to show his face in public.

The Lone Ranger has never been unmasked," said Michaels, and I don't think it's proper that this court unmask him."

Irish police hunting for four IRA members

DUBLIN. Ireland (AP) — The Irish police are reported hunting at least four more members of the Irish Republican Army for the bomb murder of Earl Mountbatten.

Two men were charged in court Thursday with the murder of the 79-year-old soldier-statesman. and one police source said at least six IRA men were involved

The police were rounding up known IRA activists all over the country. At least 100 men were reported pulled in Thursday. Most of them were questioned and released, sources said, but some were held for further interrogation.

Meanwhile. John Taylor, a Protestant politician in Northern Ireland and one of Britain's representatives in the European Parliament, asserted that Protestant guerrilla groups should stage attacks in the Irish Republic if they felt compelled to avenge the killing of Mountbatten and three others aboard his fishing boat as it set out into Donegal Bay, on the northwest coast.

Roman Catholic leaders in Northern Ireland accused Taylor of incitement to hatred, a criminal offense, and Northern Ireland's director of public prosecutions was studying his

The two men charged with Mountbatten's murder. Francis McGirl and Thomas McMahon. were stopped at a roadblock in western Ireland

They were ordered held without bail until Oct. 2 on a charge of "murdering Lord Louis Mountbatten contrary to public law," and were not required to plead innocent or guilty. Neither one said anything in the courtroom

The two men face life imprisonment, not death, if convicted Ireland retains the death penalty for murders of policemen, soldiers, heads of state and ambassadors, as well as for murder "committed in furtherance of the activities of an illegal organization.

The IRA is an illegal organization in the Irish Republic as well as in Britain and in Northern Ireland, but it appeared that the prosecutor felt he might have difficulty proving McGirl and McMahon were members. After their arrest, they were charged initially with belonging to an illegal organization, but that charge was dropped





Detroit, Tampa Bay kick off 60th NFL season

AP Sports Writer They finished last season with identical §-7 records, a slim one game behind the American Conference champion Denver Broncos. Now the Seattle Seahawks and San Diego Chargers have playoff ambitions of their own and they'll test them out on each other Sunday as the National Football League's 60th season gets underway.

Actually, the earliest-ever NFL season starts Saturday night when the Detroit Lions visit the Tampa Bay Bucs.

In Sunday's other games, Atlanta visits New Orleans, Dallas is at St. Louis, Green Bay plays at Chicago, the New York Giants are at Philadelphia, San Francisco travels Minnesota. Houston plays at Washington, Los Angeles hosts Oakland, Baltimore plays at Kansas City, Cincinnati visits Denver. Cleveland goes against the

Jets in New York and Buffalo hosts Miami. The opening weekend concludes Monday night with Super Bowl champion Pittsburgh playing at New England.

Don Coryell, in his first full year on the job, has Charger followers excited. The club won seven of its last eight games last season after he took over in the fifth week. Now with newcomers like running back Mike Thomas and All-Pro cornerback Willie Buchanon added to the cast along with tight end Kellen Winslow, a No.1 draft choice, the club seems improved.

Quarterback Dan Fouts threw 24 touchdown passes last year when San Diego led the NFL in passing with 210.9 yards per game.

Seattle has a high-powered offense, too, with quarterback Jim Zorn directing an attack that generated 55 points in the final preseason game against San Francisco. Wide receiver Steve Largent led the American Conference with 71 catches last season. Veteran Carl Eller, obtained from Minnesota, adds experience to the defensive line

Detroit, which turned a dismal 1-6 start into a nearly respectable 7-9 first year for Monte Clark, faces a major problem at quarterback with the loss of Gary Danielson, who was hurt in the final preseason game

The Lions will use Joe Reed and Scott

Hunter to fill in and you can expect running backs Dexter Bussey and Horace King to

carry much of the offensive load. The Selmon brothers, Lee Roy up front and Dewey at linebacker, are key men in the Tampa Bay defense that was fourth best in the NFL last year.

Doug Williams is back at quarterback for the Bucs with Rickey Bell and Johnny Davis the starting running backs.

Minnesota and Los Angeles are both shooting for record seventh straight division titles

The Vikes' task seems more difficult because of the retirement of quarterback Fran Tarkenton, one of the NFL's alltime

greats at the position Rebuilding San Francisco welcomes back running back Wilbur Jackson, who missed last season with a torn-up knee, and introduces ex-Philadelphia running back Mike Hogan, who'll probably replace O.J. Simpson in the opener.

The Rams promise a more wide-open offense built around quarterback Pat Haden. Los Angeles is still deep at the runningback positions with Lawrence McCutcheon and Elvis Peacock, both coming off injuries last year, and Cullen Bryant

Oakland quarterback Ken Stabler looked sharp in the preseason and hopes to wipe out the bad memories of last season. The Raiders, who dipped to 9-7 a year ago, are starting Raymond Chester at tight end while late-reporting All Pro Dave Casper gets in shape

Dallas is shooting for a fourth straight NFC East title and a third straight trip to the Super Bowl. The Cowboys' Flex Defense has a new look with Larry Cole and Dave Stalls up front replacing retired Too Tall Jones and Jethro Pugh, and Randy Hughes at strong safety in place of All Pro Charlie Waters. Roger Staubach still runs the offense but Tony Dorsett (broken toe) may miss the opener against St. Louis.

The Cardinals won six of their last eight after an 0-8 start under Coach Bud Wilkinson last year. The club depends on quarterback Jim Hart and wide receivers Pat Tilley (62 catches for 900 yards) and Mel Gray (44-871).



Now at the big tournaments such as the U.S. Open, now in its first week - Ralston never wanders far from Roscoe's shadow. Tennis super stars, most of

them now millionaires with endless commercial connections, carry private entourages as they would suitcases and have their shotmaking choreographed from the sidelines like some artisan in the theater. Now every 14-year-old kid.


