

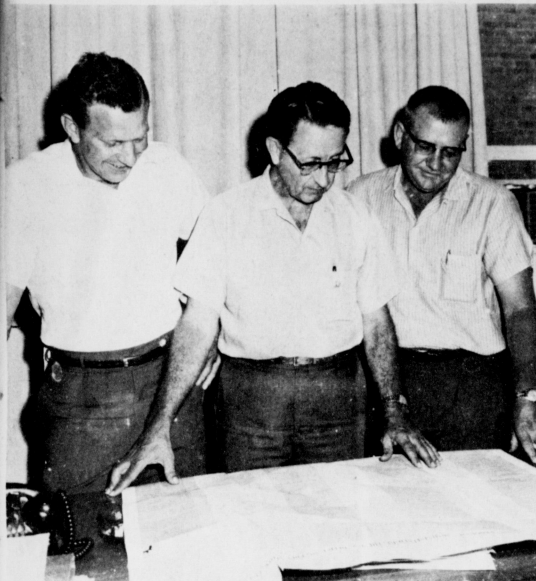

## Jinks is Named New Principal

Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce has started a new mailing piece to members "The Muleshoe Kicker", which says in its "flag" Published Semi-Occasionally. The new manager, Bob Janca, includes a personal note: "On behalf of my family and myself, I would like to take this opportunity to say we are happy to be a part of the Muleshoe community. Everyone has been nice, above explanation, to us since arriving in Muleshoe. I look forward to meeting each member, committee chairman and committee member in person as soon as possible."

Muleshoe school board has named Tom G. Jinks as high school principal, succeeding Ralph Stevenson who has been named director of the federal program for schools here, Superintendent Neal Dillman announced this past week. Stevenson will administer Title I and II of the federal elementary program and Title III and IV of the National Defense Education Act of 1958 in which Muleshoe has already been participating.

Vocational agriculture and the special education program also will be under his direction, Superintendent Neal Dillman, in announcing the expansion of the federal education program here, said the new program will be carried on (1) in the first and second grades, using equipment provided under last year's federal program, and (2) as reading stations in junior high. (A station is a teaching unit under the program.)

Most of the \$49,000 provided through the new program will go for teachers and director's salaries. Of course a part of the director's pay will come from the school district's regular funds since not all of his time will be devoted to the federal program.

"It has meant reams and reams of detail work - red-tape lining up our program," Dillman said. "We had hesitated to go into the full federal program until we knew exactly what it was all about, and then determined what was practical for our system and what would not be."

He explained that the child assigned to the remedial units did not necessarily stay in that program. "As soon as it is determined that he is good enough to carry on the regular program he will be moved out of Title I program," Dillman said.

Title II also will be included in the federal program here this school year. This phase, Dillman explained, deals with libraries and will utilize funds of \$2 per student (average daily attendance for last year) totaling around \$49000 per year. Dillman said the Title II lib-

# Federal Funds To Provide For Six Teachers, Director

## Remedial Project Due in 3 Schools

Six teachers, a nurse, a librarian, a counselor and a general director are being added to the Muleshoe school staff for the coming year as Muleshoe schools dive into a full federal education program under Title I and II.

It's all part of the Elementary Secondary Education Act, Public Law 89, a remedial program which will be financed by the federal government to the tune of \$49,000 a year.

To head the federal program in Muleshoe schools, Ralph Stevenson, former senior high principal has been named director. He also will head Title III and Title IV of the National Defense Education Act of 1958 in which Muleshoe has already been participating.

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## Motel Plans Studied

The Muleshoe Journal was informed Saturday that "plans are moving along nicely" for a \$284,000 motel complex to be built soon at the west edge of Muleshoe on U. S. Highway 84 and 70.

"Contractors are going over plans for the motel and restaurant," a spokesman for the project told the Journal Saturday. "And, we also will discuss the mobile part unit as well."

He said M. E. Lee & Sons, a Muleshoe Contracting firm, "probably will have the contract for the major construction work." He said Lee and the owners were going over plans "at this moment" for the big project.

The project is to be built on property occupied by part of the Muleshoe Ranch, the land now owned by W. E. Medlock, Sr., Lubbock.

The motel and restaurant units are to be owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Bill Shankles, and the entire project will be financed by the federal government.

## 75 City Blocks Get Topping

Muleshoe streets--many of them, at least--have a brand-new covering now thanks to a paving project just completed by Jake Diel, dirt and paving contractor.

In a record time, Diel's firm has completed resurfacing some 75 city blocks on an estimate cost basis, City Manager Albert Field explained.

"We have put most of our streets up in splendid condition now," Field said. "The hot, dry summer had 'bled' a lot of streets, making for bad driving conditions; the seal-coating put many blocks back in top condition."

Continued hot weather the first of the week, however, made it necessary for Diel to send crews back onto the newly paved areas to cover "bleeding" areas.

## Growers Seek More Acres

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association has called on Secretary of Agriculture, Orville Freeman, to release at least 10 million acres of feed grains from the Government program for the production of corn and grain sorghum for the 1967 crop, Bailey county members have been told.

The Association, through its executive vice-president, Bill Nelson, made the appeal in Washington this very week and presented the following reasons for the appeal:

- (1) Severe depletion of reserve stocks.
- (2) Prospects for a short feed grain harvest this fall because of reduced area and deteriorating crop conditions.
- (3) Increased feed grain use at home and abroad.
- (4) And the need for rebuilding adequate stocks.

In reviewing the feed grain stocks situation, the Association executive pointed out that as of July 1, 1966, Commodity Credit Corporation inventory of corn was only 91 million bushels compared to 477 million just a year ago. In reference to grain sorghum, Nelson said that July stocks in all positions were 534 million bushels, down 19% from the 659 million bushels figure just a year ago. Of the current stocks of grain sorghum, CCC owns only 355 million bushels as compared to 560 million in July, 1965.

Nelson said that on casual observation, it may appear that since grain sorghum stocks are equal to almost one full year's (Continued on Page 7)

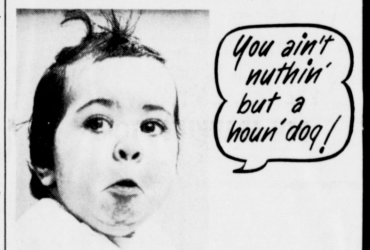





**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 69** proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section, Section 63, to Article III; authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for the accomplishment of governmental functions within any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants by the consolidation of the functions of government or by contract between any political subdivision(s) located within the county and any other political subdivision(s) located within the county or with the county; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section, Section 63, to Article III, to be known as Section 63, reading as follows:

"Section 63

"(1) The Legislature may by statute provide for the consolidation of some functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county in this State having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivision(s) affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these political subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require.

"(2) The county government, or any political subdivision(s) comprising or located therein, may contract one with another for the performance of governmental functions re-

quired or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require, including, but not limited to, the term 'governmental functions,' as it relates to counties, includes all legislative and operations of state-wide importance in which the county acts in cooperation as well as local importance, whether required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

**FOR** the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to be consolidated the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government.

**AGAINST** the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to be consolidated the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 79** proposing an amendment to Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding Section 1-d to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-d to read as follows:

"Section 1-d. (a) All land owned by natural persons which is designated for agricultural use in accordance with the provisions of this Section shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use. 'Agricultural use' means the raising of livestock or growing of crops, fruit, flowers, and other products of the soil for natural conditions as a business venture for profit, which business is the primary occupation and source of income of the owner.

"(b) For each assessment year the owner wishes to qualify his land under provisions of this Section as designated for agricultural use, he shall file with the local tax assessor such a sworn statement in writing describing the use to which the land is devoted.

"(c) Upon receipt of the sworn statement in writing the local tax assessor shall determine whether or not such land qualifies for the designation as to agricultural use being for agricultural use and require such evidence of use and source of income as may be necessary or useful in determining whether or not the agricultural use provision of this article applies.

"(d) Such local tax assessor may inspect the land and require such evidence of use and source of income as may be necessary or useful in determining whether or not the agricultural use provision of this article applies.

"(e) No land may qualify for the designation provided for in this Act unless for at least three (3) successive years immediately preceding the assessment date the land has been devoted exclusively for agricultural use, or unless the land has been continuously developed for agriculture during such time.

"(f) Each year during which the land is designated for agricultural use, the local tax assessor shall note on his records the valuation which would have been made had the land not qualified for such designation under this Section.

"(g) Designated land is subsequently diverted to a purpose other than that of agricultural use, or is sold, the land shall be subject to an additional tax. The additional tax shall equal the difference between taxes paid or payable, hereinafter assessed, and the amount of tax payable for the preceding three years had the land been otherwise assessed. Until paid, there shall be a lien for additional taxes and interest on land assessed under the provisions of this Section.

"(g) The valuation and assessment of any minerals or subsurface rights to minerals shall not come within the provisions of this Section.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

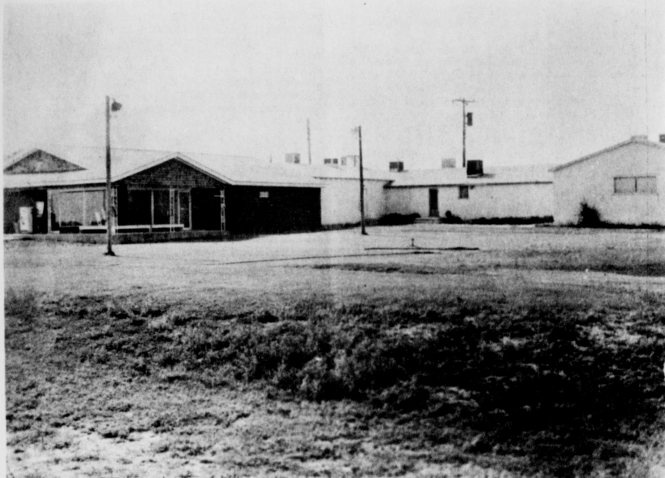

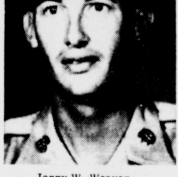

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by deleting the following language:

Section 2. That Section 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by changing the word "may" to "shall" in the last clause thereof and by deleting the words "in all cities containing a population of ten thousand inhabitants or more."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 2 as follows:

Section 2. The terms of office of persons serving on the governing body of a political subdivision of the State created to further the purposes of Section 52, Article III, or Section 59, Article XVI, of this Constitution, shall never exceed six years.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

 rary equipment funds were distributed in this manner: \$1000 each for Richland Hills, DeShazo and Junior high; \$600 for the professional library and \$300 for the senior high. It was also used for books, magazines and reference materials for the schools.  
 The federal education program, Dillman said, started as part of the National Defense Act of 1958 - after the Russians had sent Sputnik, a mongrel dog, spinning around the universe to set off a mad race for control of outer space.  
 Immediately science became the most important subject in the world, it was pointed out, and Title III was created to teach Tom, Dick and Harry all there was to know about science, foreign language and mathematics. The federal government reimbursed schools up to 50 per cent for their payments in those fields, especially for equipment. Such has been the case every year since 1958, although Muleshoe was not greatly involved in the programs.  
 Then last year five more areas were added to the federal program. These included

history, geography, reading, English and civics. As one educator explained: "We got so eager to teach everybody science that we forgot to teach them to read, and without reading and grammar they couldn't even understand the things they were being taught. Thus the new areas were added."  
 Last year, \$6000 went into this department here, Dillman said, and the federal government reimbursed the local taxes for half the expenditures.  
 Title IV was set up under a similar program. This phase deals with guidance and counseling, the funds provided on the ADA (average daily attendance) for the school each year. This program buys tests and grading equipment for the schools.  
 Then came the Elementary Secondary Education Act of 1964 PL 89-10. Title I is intended for the "economically deprived and for the educational deprived" children in the district. This program was not entirely new to Muleshoe; a pre-school program had been carried on previously.  
 Now the new federal program includes food, health and transportation in figuring needs for a school district.  
 Dillman said that the 1960 census is used as the basis, but only children from parents whose yearly earnings is \$2000 or less per year can be counted. He said that under this interpretation, 339 such pupils can be considered, or basing it on the per-capita payment, the program provided \$66,101 for the 1965-66 school year.  
 The program does not include only financially deprived children; it also can include "educationally deprived". Under this phase, three remedial stations have been established in each of the two elementary schools and three in junior high. It is for this program that \$19,000 were provided in federal funds for material. Grades covered are 1,2,3,6,7 and 8.  
 Dillman said the administration of the program on a local level involves much detail work; thus the need for a director. Stevenson has spent much of the summer months working on the federal program, and is "becoming thoroughly acquainted" with the vast federal program, the superintendent said.  
 He said the future of the federal program for education is "anybody's guess," but he added that "we know that it is going to be tremendous." He has been extremely cautious in entering into the federal program, accepting only those phases which we felt we could use to advantage here."

production that stocks would be adequate but he indicated that many people are overlooking the fact that we have new disappearance and use figures to look at. For instance, livestock feeding in the sorghum belt is up 4% over a year ago, while the increase is only 1% nationwide and in addition exports of grain sorghum during this marketing year ending September 30 are likely to be at least 100 million bushels larger than that of a year ago.  
 He said that these facts coupled with the fact that since there is a shortage of wheat -- and with the fact that there is a shortage of corn -- and grain sorghum is the nearest substitute for corn, that it can reasonably be expected that in the months ahead there will be a "rum" on grain sorghum stocks.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.  
 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 proposing an amendment to Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to omit the requirement that members of the armed services vote only in the county in which they resided at the time of entering the service.  
 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
 Section 1. That Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by deleting the following language:  
 "Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."  
 The text of this Section is shown below, with a broken line through the sentence which is to be deleted:  
 "Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided further that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like man-

ner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislative action."  
 Section 2. The only purpose of the amendment proposed in this Resolution is to make the effect of readopting the remainder of the Section, and if any other amendment to this Section, being for a different purpose, is adopted at an earlier election or at the same election, the adoption of this amendment shall not be construed as nullifying the change made by such other amendment.  
 Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:  
 "FOR the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."  
 "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."  
 Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.  
 Section 5. If the foregoing amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the amendment and the full text of the amended Section, as amended herein and by any other proposed amendment which is submitted by the 59th Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to such proclamation

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an amendment to article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a, to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President on all state-wide offices, questions or propositions by persons qualified to vote in this State except for residential requirements, and to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President by otherwise qualified United States citizens who have moved into or out of the State preceding a presidential election.

Section 1. Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a. Section 2a. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time of registration, for any person who is qualified to vote in this State except for residential requirements, and to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President in this State by otherwise qualified United States citizens who have moved into or out of the State preceding a presidential election.

(b) State agencies charged with the responsibility of providing services to those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped may accept money from private or federal sources, designated by the private or federal source as money to be used in establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitating and restoring the handi-
