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## Another democratic disappointment

India is touted as the world's largest democracy. In a world aw ash
with dictatorship, free elections conducted in the planet's second most with dictatorship, free elections conducted in the planet's second most
populous nation may be reason for cheer. However, dem ocracy is no
guarantee of freedom - a point made abundantly clear by the results of India's recent electoral contest.
The Indian voters.
The Indian voters; much to the dismay of freedom lovers
everywhere, mandated the peturn to power of a woman who once attempted to destroy freedqm in that nation. This woman, Indira years ago it appeared that her political career was over. Then, because of charges of corruption, it looked as if she would be lucky to stay out of
jail. But the corruption of Indira Gandhi's regime was of little
importance when compared to the blatant violations of human liberty importance when compared to the blatant violations of hum an liberty
that took place during her tenure.
While oprime minister. Gandhi - she is no relation to pacifist While ${ }^{\text {oprime minister. Gandhi - she is no relation to pacifist }}$
Mahatma Gandhi - moved her nation toward socialism internally and
into a special relationship with the Soviet Union internationally. Over the years charges of corruption, including the charges against her son,
were never heard in court. But it was Gandhi's forced sterilization program that finally swelled popular opinion against her.
Proving that socialists believe that social problems just ify even the grossest violations of personal rights, Gandhi's Congress Party passed
legislation requiring the forced sterilization of all couples who had more than two children. Even considering Ind ia's population situation,
such a monstrous intervention in the fam ily is not justified - a thought echoed by most Indians at the time. Importantly, in a society with a
high mortality rate among its children, preventing parents from having more than two children condemns many to the plight of ending
their productive years with no one to take care of their needs. In a poor Organized opposition to Organized opposition to her population control program made
Gandhi politically vulnerable. When the opposition appeared on the
verge of success the iron lady struck with tactics that must have made her buddies in Moscow proud. Demonstrating her total contem pt for
freedom. Gandhi. in tune of 1975 . freedom. Gandhi. in' June of 1975, declared a state of emergency. The
only visible emergency at the time was a court decision finding her
guitty of election fraud in the preceding election. With emergency powers in her hands. Gandhi, now a dictator, arrested opposition party
officials, journalists. and anyone else who got in her way. She then
banned any public opposition to her regime. This despotic rule continued until 1977 when she mistakenly thought the public would vote
for her reelection.

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# Bomb terrorizes London residents 

LhonDo (AP) - A bomb explosion ripped
through six rooms of a popular London hotel this morning, killing a man of "Arab origin," inuring a west German and sending terrified
guests, many in nightclothes, fleeing into the chilly streets, police said. Nearly five hours later, a second bomb
exploded, apparently in the rubble. It injured no exploded, apparenty in the rubble. It injured no
one. police said, but it created a second emrgerifey and streets which had been reopened after the first blast were closed again. Commander Peter Duffy of Scotland Yard's very near the bomb when it went off, but he could
not say if he had been assembling the device a
the time. The injured guest -was named as
Gerhard Buhme and detectives wien and Cerhard Buhme and detectives were at his
hospital bedside. Both blasts were on the fifth floor of the
