That set up a semi-final showdown with Farwell. Among all other 1A schools in Texas, only Farwell--a 2A school--has former traveled and competed as much as BHS.

Farwell won the flip, chose to debate the negative stance, but fell to Rowdy and Rachel on a unanimous 3-0 decision for the affirmative team.

In the championship debate, Rowdy and Rachel met up with the #1 seed coming out of the preliminary rounds, the debate team from Thorndale.

Debating affirmative, Rowdy and Rachel had the definite edge in polish and debate fundamentals, but were unable to pull the swing vote and lost the split decision.

One judge who had voted against them approached them after the round, telling them he really had wanted to vote for them but did not based on one particular part of the affirmative plan that he felt contradicted itself.

The 2006 UIL State Meet concluded Tuesday evening around 8 p.m after two days of competition and eight rounds of debate.

The auditorium is all but empty when gold and silver medals are handed out, as most other schools have gone home and all that are left are a handful of finalists, their coaches, and a few family members that are able to come watch.

Not quite the same as an athletic event with thousands of screaming fans, but the intensity and desire to win are just as visible.

And next year, come spring break on the campus of the University of Texas, Rowdy and Rachel plan to be back in that empty auditorium with a gold medal draped around their necks.

Rowdy and Rachel won two tournaments this year: Abilene High and Frenship. They also advanced to the quarterfinal round at Midland High.

The longest trip of the year was to the State TFA Meet in Pharr, Texas, March 1-4.

Their overall record, including State TFA, is 19 wins and 9 losses. (State TFA—a tournament that involves mostly 5A schools from Texas's largest urban areas--is a type of debate where speed reading and analytics are acceptable and preferred. Though not the style that is taught and practiced in UIL debate, it does serve as a good warmup for State UIL debate. In West Texas, TFA debate mirrors the UIL priority: research, refutation, and communication)

The Tough People of **Cross Plains**

As I approached Cross Plains on Highway 206, I started noticing the black, charred ground. Partially burned fence posts hung from loose strands of barbed wire. It was like this for a couple of miles before I reached the city limits. When I got to town, the scene was horrible. Mounds of ashes were the only remains of blocks of houses. I went to see my friend David Estes at Texas Heritage Bank. He told me two people had died, 116 houses had been totally destroyed and 39 more damaged. That's about 25 percent of the housing in and near town. The home of Robert E. Howard, the author of Conan and other fantasy works, was not damaged, although fire burned the lawn.

The fire started around noon on Tuesday, December 27, about 3 miles west of Cross Plains. The temperature was 80 degrees and the wind was blowing toward the east at 30 miles an hour. By 3 o'clock, the blaze turned north and headed into town. 31 fire departments fought the blaze and stayed around until Friday putting out flareups on trees and bales of hay.

As soon as news of the fire spread, donations of food, clothing, furniture and money poured in from Texas and states as far and Minnesota Carolina. The First Baptist Church became a command center. The First Methodist Church was the only public structure completely destroyed. Flames got close to the school, but it was spared.

A Call for Fiscal Responsibility -UPDATE

Readers may remember that I have been working with some of my colleagues in the House to push for greater fiscal discipline in the budget process. I offered an amendment that would have removed Gulf Coast recovery money from the War on Terror emergency supplemental spending bill. If my amendment had passed, it would have allowed Congress to take a closer look at how taxpayer dollars are being spent along the Gulf Coast. My amendment did not pass, and, as a result, the price tag on the legislation swelled to more than \$90 billion, much of which is being spent on items that do not qualify as emergencies. When it came time to cast my vote, I voted for fiscal discipline. Here is an excerpt from the statement I released following last Thursday's vote (full statement can be www.randy.house.gov).

"...I fully support our military as well President Bush's request to provide further support for our troops as they fight the War on Terror. Unfortunately, the bill we voted on today in the House is a far cry from what the President

Along the way, this bill became unrecognizable, with \$20 billion inserted for hurricane relief, \$750 million for home heating assistance despite winter ending in four days, and millions more devoted to foreign aid. In the end, I could not support this bill because I could not in good conscience use our troops as an excuse to spend taxpayer dollars iresponsibly..."

Despite the result of last week's vote, I remain committed to the goal of fiscal discipline. It is my hope that last week's vote is the beginning, not the end, of the effort to bring serious reform to the budget process. My amendment garnered the support of 88 of my colleagues, and the number of members who want to restore fiscal sanity to Washington is growing stronger.

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Texas Port Security is Critical to America's Safety

The Texas Gulf Coast is one of our state's finest resources. The 367 miles of shoreline along the Gulf of Mexico has beaches that boost our tourism industry as well as natural resources that nourish our economy. Texas' position on the Gulf of Mexico has made shipping a bedrock of our state's commerce.

But, our coast is not being protected the way it should be. In the Senate, my highest priority is our country's national security, and I have been concerned that port security is not moving forward with the proper urgency. The planned transfer of American port management from a British firm to an Arab-government owned company brought port security to the national forefront.

Texas is home to 29 ports, including four of the 10 busiest in the country. Unfortunately, these thriving ports are inviting targets for our enemies. Only about five percent of containers arriving in our ports are inspected. This is unacceptable. Our ports must not continue to be a hole in our homeland protection.

Not only does shipping play a large role in our economy, it is also a national security issue. We learned on Sept. 11, 2001, that immediate steps had to be taken to protect our airports, and since then, the federal government committed to heavy investments in homeland security by providing \$18 billion to strengthen airline security. Yet in that same period, there has not been enough emphasis on securing our nation's ports.

Last year, a study by the Coast Guard and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security confirmed that significant gaps remain in our port security. The study

The Texas Gulf Coast is identified 66 of the nation's ne of our state's finest 359 ports as being especially vulnerable to terrorist attacks.

One of the most important ports in the world is in Texas. The Port of Houston ranks first in the United States in foreign waterborne tonnage, second in total tonnage, and is the sixth-largest in the world. It is also home to one of the planet's biggest petrochemical complexes and the \$20 billion U.S. Strategic Petroleum Reserve, the world's largest oil stockpile.

The Port of Houston's significance is unquestioned, and its stature has only increased in the months since Hurricane Katrina. It has become even busier by adding much of the business that used to go through the Ports of South Louisiana, New Orleans and Baton Rouge. With this additional traffic, strengthening its security is even more critical.

I recently met with officials from Texas ports, including officials from the Port of Houston, to discuss our security concerns. I am thankful for all of the hard work that local officials are already doing with the resources they have, but they need greater support to be sufficiently protected from potential threats.

As a result of the controversy over a company from the United Arab Emirates managing some U.S. ports, Congress is now focusing more attention on port security. We have the momentum for more comprehensive programs for port security, and I am pleased we

are finally moving more decisively in the right direction.

I first introduced the Shipping Container Security Act in 2004; and last November, most provisions of my bill were included in a comprehensive package of transportation security improvements approved by the Senate Commerce Committee.

This March 15, the Senate passed an amendment that I sponsored to the Senate Fiscal Year 2007 Budget Resolution. The amendment calls for \$978 million to improve measures. This is a positive start, but much remains to be done. In particular, we must require all foreign countries shipping goods to the U.S. to grant access to U.S. inspectors. This will permit containers headed to the U.S. to be inspected at their port of origin. In addition, we need to develop a comprehensive plan to increase the number of containers inspected as they enter the U.S. Finally, cargo transported within the U.S. should be monitored until it reaches its final destination.

Now is not the time for grandstanding about who manages the ports. The U.S. Coast Guard is responsible for port security and the U.S. Customs Service is responsible for container security. The level of the security they provide is the real issue that needs to be addressed. We must not simply talk about improving port security – we must continue to take constructive actions.

Top Five Questions about Stamps and Answers that Stick!

Stamp collecting is called the world's most popular hobby, enjoyed by millions of people in the United States and around the world. And yet, most of us know very little about stamps, except that you stick them on an envelope to mail a letter.

Here are the Top 5 questions about stamps, and answers that stick!

"Where did stamps come from"?

Postage stamps were invented in the 19th Century in Great Britain. English schoolmaster and government employee Rowland Hill suggested the postage stamp as a means of taxing newspapers and collecting prepaid mail fees based on weight.

In 1840, Great Britain issued what has come to be known as the "Penny Black," the world's first adhesive postage stamp. It (and all subsequent regular issue British stamps) carried the likeness of the reigning monarch, in this case Queen Victoria portrayed against a black background.

"What is the world's most valuable stamp? How much is it worth?"

November 2005 saw a blockbuster stamp trade that established a new world record for the value of a single stamp – nearly \$3 million.

Wall Street investment manager Bill Gross traded a plate block of four "Inverted Jenny" 24-cent airmail stamps to Donald Sundman, 0.02675 grams (0.0009 president of Mystic Stamp Co., for a 1-cent "Z Grill" stamp. Gross had just purchased the block of four at per pound. The most VA 22209-6432. Submit auction the month before for a total price - bid and fees of \$2.9 million. The "Z Grill" gives Gross the only known collection of every U.S. stamp from the 19th century.

The "Z Grill," issued in 1886 with a profile of Benjamin Franklin, is one of only two such stamps known to exist. Its name comes from the unusual waffle-like grill on the back of the stamp, employed at the time to better absorb postmarks and prevent people from reusing the stamp. The block of four stamps was part of a single sheet of 100 that survived from 1918 on which the border around the Curtiss JNmodel biplane, known as "the Jenny," was accidentally printed upside down.

Prior to this historic trade, the previous record holder was the 1857 Swedish "Tre Skilling Banco," also known as the Treskilling Yellow, at the time touted not only to be the most valuable single stamp in the world, but the most valuable thing on the planet based on its weight.

According to the book, The Treskilling Yellow, the stamp was discovered in 11885 by teen-ager Georg Wilhelm Backman, the only known example still in existence of the stamp printed in yellow instead of green. The David Feldman Zurich auction house sold the stamp in November 1996 to a dealer for 2.87 million Swiss Francs, approximately \$2.3 million in U.S. dollars at that

"When did the U.S. start making stamps?"

1847, George Washington and Benjamin Franklin appeared on the first stamps. postage Washington was featured as the first President and Franklin as the first Postmaster general, named so by the Continental Congress in

"How can I tell what a stamp is worth?"

Ask yourself two questions: "How rare is it?" and "What condition is it in?" the price listed in a stamp catalog gives you some idea of how rare it is. However, the stamp may sell at more or less than the catalog price, depending on its condition.

"Who decides what subjects appear on stamps?"

The Citizens' Stamp Committee Advisory (CSAC), founded in 1957, makes recommendations on stamp subjects. The Postmaster General makes the final decision.

The CSAC's 15 members are appointed by the Postmaster General, chosen for their interest iin philately and their backgrounds, which reflect a wide range of educational, artistic, historical and professional expertise. The Committee reviews tens of thousands of stamp subject proposals each year. Only a few dozen stamps are issued annually.

To suggest an idea for a Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee, c/o Stamp Development, U.S. Postal subjects at least three years in The Treskilling Yellow is advance of the proposed date of issue to allow sufficient time for consideration and for design and production, if the subject is approved.


