

### **District 9-A Literary Champs!** Coyotes Throw the Book(s) at Competition

A sixth consecutive district literary championship will send fifteen students to regional competition April 21-22 in Abilene.

The fifteen, along with other BHS competitors, combined for 449 points to win last week's District 9-A title over eleven other schools.

The win had all the excitement of a down-to-the wire athletic contest as Borden County and Garden City were tied with 381 points going in to the final two events (persuasive and informative speaking) of the two-day meet.

The extemporaneous speaking contingency rose to the challenge as they swept persuasive speaking with first, second, and third place finishes. BHS also won informative speaking to seal the district championship. -

Garden City finished with 422 points.

The Bearkats, known for their dominance in the math and science events, held an

85-point lead after last Tuesday's contest. However, BHS also maxed out points possible (37) in Current Events, Spelling, and Social Studies to stay , within striking distance.

Some ground was gained after the writing results came in early Thursday (journalism and ready writing). Prose and poetry contestants added muchneeded points that afternoon.

After a 1-2 finish in LD debate for Borden County, the gap had closed and the stage was set for the dramatic finish.

Borden County Water System that the drinking water being supplied to customers had exceeded the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) for FLUORIDE. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) has established the MCL FLUORIDE at 4 mg/L, and has determined that it is a health concern at levels above the MCL. Analysis of drinking water in your community for FLUORIDE indicates a level of 5.4 mg/L in 1998, 5.5 mg/L in 2001, 5.2 mg/L in 2002, 6.0 mg/L in 2003, and 5.5 mg/L in the 1st quarter of 2004.

This is not an emergency. However, some people who drink water containing FLUORIDE in excess of the MCL over many years could get bone disease including pain and tenderness of the bones. Fluoride in drinking water at half the MCL or more may cause mottling of children's teeth, usually in children less than nine years old. Mottling, also known as dental fluorosis, may include brown staining and/or pitting of the teeth, and occurs only in developing teeth before they erupt from the gums.

You do not need to use an alternative water supply. However, if you have health concerns, you may want to talk to your doctor to get more information about how this may affect you.

We are working to correct the problem by investigating the possibility of connecting to another system.

Please share this information with all the other people who drink this water, especially those who may not have received this notice directly (for example, people in apartments, nursing homes, schools, and businesses). You can do this by posting this notice in a public place or distributing copies by hand or
