Concluding a 12-hour session early today, the House passed the antibusing bill by a 282-102 vote. The measure now goes to the Senate, where it may die of inaction.

The bill would: -Prohibit busing except as the last resort for desegregation. Even as a last resort, a child closest school to his home.

-Permit school districts already under desegregation orders to petition a court to reopen the case and modify the orders to meet the new restrictions. Most such orders involve

Atty. Gen. Richard H. Kleindienst has said all desegregation orders could be reconsidered-not just those involving busing.

Rep. Albert H. Quie, R-Minn., who proposed a similar reopener clause, said it could result in

landmark 1954 Supreme Court decision that struck down "separate-but-equal" facilities for blacks and whites.

Nixon's original proposal would have allowed cross-town busing-that is, busing past the two closest schools-of junior high and high school students if nothing else could bring about desegregation.

It carried the clause allowing extension of the new curbs to old cases. But that provision had been removed by the House Education

Nixon's backers said the House ban against cross-town busing threatens Supreme Court invalidation of the entire bill-if it gets through

the Senate. But Rep. Edith Green, D-Ore., author of the amendment that wrote both the cross-townbusing ban and the reopener clauses into the bill, scoffed at assertions that she had made it unconstitutional

"Waving the Constitution is the last refuge for those who have lost their case," she said

Connally a stooge. McGovern's comments about Kissinger came in a sharply worded rebuke Thursday to White House suggestions that the South Dakotan could have imperilled the Paris peace negotiations by making his own inquiries of Hanoi's representatives about American prisoners

Kissinger **Concludes** Viet Visit

Kissinger arrived in Tokyo tonight after two days of talks with President Nguyen Van Thieu in Saigon. There was no hint of what they had told each other

The presidential adviser will discuss with Prime Minister Kakuei Tanaka and Foreign Minister Ohira Saturday the U.S.-Japanese summit meeting scheduled later this month in Honolulu. Then he will fly home to report to President Nixon at Camp David.

Brief statements issued by the U.S. Embassy and by Thieu's office said the nearly six hours of talks had dealt with the "general situation" in Vietnam and the peace negotia-

If there were any significant disagreements between Kissinger and the South Vietnamese. they were not revealed by the statements, even though they were issued separately. But the total time consumed by the se-crecy-cloaked talks heightened speculation that new peace proposals had been carefully explored during the two days of

The U.S. Embassy statement said the talks "provided an opportunity for a general review of all aspects of the situation in South Vietnam as well as of the talks which have taken place in Paris with representatives of the Democratic Republic of Vietnam.

The South Vietnamese communique said they had 'reviewed the general situation of the Republic of Vietnam and questions related to the Paris peace talks."

The Democratic nominee told newsmen in nearby Racine. peace talks is Kissinger's highly publicized global junket on the eve of the Republican

convention. President Nixon, McGovern said, has "manipulated Mr. Kissinger and American public opinion to appear to be negotiating when actually he has been stalling to prop up Gen. Thieu's government in Saigon.

'That is what is interfering with quiet, serious, professional negotiating far more than anyone else could possibly do," he

McGovern's schedule today called for only one public appearance, a midday tour of the Eaton Corp 's drop-forge plant. He was to spend the rest of his time filming television spots before returning to Washington

On one such filming session Thursday, political film-making Charles Guggenheim took the candidate and a few newsmen to a machine-shop area of Teledyne Wisconsin Motors for an hour-long exchange with labor-

Plane Ordered To Vancouver

A United Air Lines jetliner carrying an armed hijacker who is demanding \$2 million ransom was reported circling above Vancouver International airport at 8:50 PDT today. The unrdentified hijacker was reported demanding the cash in small bills along with 15 pounds of gold bars plus a new aircraft. Police streamed to the airport as the Boeing 727 passenger jet headed for Vancouver.

The man, armed with an Army-type carbine, rushed the three-engine Boeing 727 at Reno International Airport just as the early morning flight to San Francisco was about to take off.

a spokesman for United said. The spokesman here said the hijacker, described as a middle-age man wearing a ski mask, ordered the passengers and three stewardesses off the jetliner. A United spokesman in Chicago, where the airline is headquartered, said, however, that no passengers were on board when the hijacker board

ed the plane Three male crew members were on board the plane when it took off, the airline said. Fifty-two passengers were sched-

uled to have taken the flight. United said the man was demanding a total of \$2 million-\$500,000 in \$50 bills and the remainder in \$20s. In addition to the cash. United said he also was demanding 15 pounds of gold in 1-pound bars.

He also was said to be demanding two Magnum pistols and three submachine guns, as well as a flashlight. 20 containers of pep pills, walkie-talkies and a radio that United said would enable him to monitor

any broadcasts. It was not immediately known where the money and material was to be delivered. United

A spokesman for United said the plane was headed for Vancouver, B.C., with the only occupants being the three crew members and the hijacker. The latter was reported in the cock-

Walkout Hurts **Texas Strikers**

EDITOR'S NOTE: A typical American prescription for economic tragedy is a long strike in a small town of the principal employer. When some 3,400 workers walked off the job almost two months ago in Freeport on the Texas coast that would have been the forecast. But people here say it hasn't happened.

Associated Press Writer FREEPORT, Tex. (AP) - On June 23 some 3,400 employes of Dow Chemical Co. struck and the 50,000 residents of the seven communities which make up what the Chamber of Commerce here calls the Brazosport area got set for hard

On Forgiveness Loans

"One of the more significant pieces of legislation that affects the Texas Panhandle was passed this week by the House of Representatives," according to Congressman Bob Price of Pampa.

In a statement issued today, Price said:

Each year we are plagued with tornadoes, blizzards, and drouth in various parts of the area and disaster relief has been forthcoming from the Federal Government

'In a bill sponsored by Congressman Patman of Texas, provision is made to expand this assistance through the Small Business Administration to allow a forfiveness of \$2,500 on loans originating during calendar year 1971. On loans

originating between Jan. 2, 1972 and Jan. 1, 1973, there will be a \$5,000 forgiveness.

The existing requirement for repayment of the first \$500 of any loan is eliminated for both categories. This legislation, which expires on July 1, 1973 has been designed primarily for those who suffered the devastation of Hurricane Agnes, however, it is extremely beneficial to our area which regularly experiences tornado. hail, high wind, drouth and blizzard damage.



The Debate Challenge

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Question Box

QUESTION: Why does The News profess to believe in freedom and show partiality to ONE Bible? Freedom begins with freedom of thought. A study of many Bibles has made me come to realize I am almost completely ignorant in comparison to Supreme intelligence.

ANSWER: The question is really two questions. First, may one show partiality and still be a true advocate of freedom? Second, why does Freedom Newspapers show partiality to One Bible?

As to the former query, let us start with understanding by defining terms. We believe that freedom is complete control over one's own life and property, and no control over the lives and property of other persons. Property means those things that belong to you. Since a man must eat daily, he doesn't have any latitude to anything else unless he has the "things" necessary to acquire food.

What is required to attain control of your own life and belongings and no control over the lives and belongings of others? As the questioner said. freedom begins with freedom of thought. It begins with the spiritual and mental attitude that can be calculated to lead to self-control. The freedom advocate must be willing to refrain from forcing his way, legally or otherwise, into business that does not belong to him and in which he has no property interest. Second, he must be willing to insist that would-be intruders stay out of his business.

Now, then, if you choose to associate with certain friends, what is that to others? If you choose to read certain books and to refrain from reading other books, who has privilege to say that you shall not? If you choose to place greater reliance upon one book than upon other books, indeed if you choose to attach supreme importance to a single book, on whom have you trespassed? The very objective of freedom is that each individual obligation, to retain the latitude to exercise choice for themselves and to insist upon the same latitude for

It so happens that a number of persons exercise the latitude to choose by selecting the one

Bible? Why that book? The most obvious reason is that the Bible is the documentive charter of property. "In the beginning God created... (Gen. 1:1) is another way of saying that the universe is the property of God "Have dominion..." (Gen. 1:28) is another way of saying that roperty was transferred. "And Abel, he also brought of the firstlings of his flock..." (Gen. 4:4) is an expression of private ownership; that is, Abel owned

A second obvious reason is that the Hebrew and the Christian Scriptures contain the elemental rules that, if followed, result in liberty. It was Moses who showed how to have national defense without a military draft (Deuteronomy 20:8). It was St. Paul who advised. "Where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty" (2

Cor. 3:17). For a number of associates of Freedom Newspapers to esteem this Bible, to quote from it approvingly, or even commend it to others, is different from attempting to coerce others to believe likewise. One is an appeal, having no more effect than a request. The second would be a forceful trespass upon the belongings of others, a conduct that the Bible forbids.



GOVERNMENT TELEVISION Government subsidization of the arts is a constant threat to a free society. The least danger (which is bad enough) is that of burdening the taxpayers moneywise, when equal and usually superior programming can be gotten on the

commercial networks. The greatest danger is that government broadcasting can become a tool of the government. Used as a propaganda tool, it can guide and sway the people greatly in the direction in which the government wants to go. Joseph Goebbels, as minister of propaganda under Hitler, had a devastating effect on Germany

in the 1930s and 1940s. Now, we in the United States, have what is called the Public Broadcasting Service (PBS) But it is really government television. PBS receives \$35,000,000 per year from the government, now, and it's asking \$65,000,000 for next year and \$90,000,000 for the year

following Therefore, it is apparent that it is already costing the American taxpayer a large sum and it looks like larger sums are in the immediate future. Worse still, the programming seems to be slanted away from the

constructive side. Government subsidization of the arts has been threatened many times and it has been tried in this country on a small scale. But it seems that something which does not show a profit or pay taxes and has such a potential for power is very dangerous. Government television could eventually become a pipeline for the party in power. We can defeat government television by writing our officials and by writing letters to the editor, and forming groups against

it is unfair to the poor? Well, believe it or not, it's true. A recent Wall Street Journal article by Barry Newman outlines the left's new anti-ecology fever and ironically enough, many of their arguments are similar to the ones that more moderate citizens have

held all along. For instance: "Ecologist failed to take seriously the loss of jobs resulting from Congress" decision to halt the supersonic transport (SST) program.

"In the name of environmental protection, opposition to new power plants is aggravating the 'energy crisis' and imperiling economic growth that could help the poor.

"Zoning and other restrictions aimed at protecting open spaces in the suburbs help price housing out of the reach of the poor.

"Pressures for birth control are aimed maily at the poor.

"The movement to stall economic growth to contain pollution could doom underdeveloped nations to stagnation and poverty..."

Being "for pollution" is like being for poverty; only Scrooge could argue on the affirmative side. But must the cure be worse than the disease? Industry will have to pay for anti-pollution measures, and the consumer will have to pay as well. When he does, he must realize that it isn't 'big business' that is straining his wallet. Abolishing factories and industry might produce clean air - but in the process it would also produce a lack of consumer products, a cessation of even the most rudimentary of conveniences, and perhaps making all other considerations academic vast unemployment.





Agnew Is A Serious, Hard Working, Loyal Man, Says His Aide

about a man. You can look him in the eye and know he's got it. This guy has got it."

-Richard Nixon, 1968

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WASHINGTON-(NEA)-Just what has Spiro Agnew got in his eye? Four years ago Republicans obviously felt he had a glint there that would please the South while not displeasing the Norththus he was lifted out of the Maryland governor's man-sion, fitted with a pair of outsized political boxing gloves, given perhaps the most negative assignment in the history of the vice-presidency (the "king's taster," says Edward Brooke), and deposited in Middle America to begin the legend of Spiro

Today, 500 pages of Roget's Thesaurus later, the eye of Ted Agnew may be reflecting something more than controversy, calliope commentaries and finking for the Man. According to those who know him, and those who do not, what Agnew has got these days is a wish to discard his court jester image and become the King himself.

How else to explain his acceptance, his relieved enthusiasm, for a second run at the office Harry Truman called "as worthless as a cow's fifth teat?" Agnew himself has admitted the v i c e-presidency "creates some sort of debility."

True, there are the compensations: A nine-room residency in this city's veddy posh Sheraton Park Hotel: \$75,000 a year for showing

Also, there are the adornments: "Besides presiding over the Senate," smirks a Congressional correspondent. The veep also wastes his time on about a dozen federal committees - hot jobs like attending, when he can't find any way out, meetings of the President's Council on Physical Fitness." Like the man said when facing execution, "If it weren't for the honor of the thing

Spiro Agnew is a proud man. He has been buffeted for the past three and a half years, by the press, by the public, even by his boss, more than has been justified. He cannot look happily on the prospect of four more years of the same and nothing more. So. As the gamesheet goes. His idea may be estep more of the same and concentrate on something more.

Twelve American vicepresidents have gone on to be presidents (eight by way of presidential deaths), and they have served a total of tom. However, he has an IQ

the top office.

"Agnew is not really desperately ambitious man, says a friend. "But I think he wants the presidency. If only to show that he is not a cluck. I think he has already started to change his image for 1976. If I may say so, I don't think Mr. Nixon or the press will have Spiro Agnew to kick around any more."

Indeed, whether or not the speculation on Agnew's ambitions are true, or not, one thing about the man is perfectly clear: He wants to change his image. And the indications are that he will use the coming campaign to this, as well as other, ends. Those close to him deny he will sell out "on principles" to win new friends ("He's not going to stop giving his honest opinions, press secretary) but staffers admit few in the Agnew retinue are satisfied with their man's national por-

"This isn't going to be a 'New Agnew' as opposed to the 'Old Agnew' thing," says aide Victor Gold. "But what we do hope is that people will come to know about the Vice President as he really is. I don't think any man has ever grown so much in this office as has Agnew. He's not what you read about in some of the papers. He's a serious, hard working, loyal man. But he's a fine human being as well.'

Gold believes, with some conspicuous justification, that public exposure has created an Agnew that does not exist. He says some facets of the man have been so exaggerated, like the lines of a cartoon caricature, that much of the public now sees what they want to see in him, not what he is but what they believe him to be.

"There are," says Gold, 'two great lies about Spiro Agnew. They have been repeated so often that many people now simply accept them as fact. Well, the hell with that. They aren't fact. They are just two lies and I think it's a damn shame."

Lie No. 1: Agnew the buffoon. Aides say the charge is a hangover from such incidents as when, in New York City, Agnew once declined an invitation to tour a black neighborhood, saying: "If you've seen one slum. you've seen them all." Gold says the boob tag is

Lie No. 2: Agnew the aloof. Well, all right, says Victor Gold, so the Vice President isn't the kind of fellow "you slap on the back." He is a single-minded chap, a trait which carries with it an air of aloofness. He doesn't run the Washington party circuit. Doesn't loiter for chit-chat after publice appearances, doesn't "good-guy" it with the press.

"He's a very private per son," says one of his advance men. "He still has the same close friends he had before he took office. His idea of a nice time is playing the piano at George White's house (White is a Baltimore lawyer, and Agnew confidant), or watching the Colts play football on TV. Listen, why should he be anything else? The Vice President doesn't like contrived things. I remember once somebody set up a picture with him and a crippled war veteran. He was absolutely furious. He doesn't want anything set up. He but what he is. I saw this guy eat dinner once with seven complete strangers because they said they were in his old Army unit. Now, is

that snobbery? I think not."

To be sure, the public picture of Spiro Agnew is at least somewhat shaded.

"I'm still," he once said, fighting the idea of being a rather ill-equipped, fumbling, obtuse kind of person." He is not any of these, if fairness is the measure. He is, quite simply, Middle A) erica's Mr. America, and despite propaganda to the contrary there is nothing wrong with that. Like many Americans he

Just look at the actual situation. South must play his next to last trump to get rid of the last one held by West. Then, South simply continues with his last trump.

A club is discarded from dummy to leave dummy with four diamonds and a club. East has to hold onto four diamonds and must come down to one club also. Now South plays three rounds of diamonds and winds up taking the last two tricks with his ace-jack of



Gray Panthers Say Power to Oldies

Early retirement is a form of premature death for some people. Yet thousands are discovering that the later years of one's life can have a dimension and perspective not known or appreciated in the flurry of youth or middle age. Unfortunately our culture has yet to measure the gift and enrichment of common life that comes from the aging. We offer as a compliment the remark that someone has "young ideas," indicating in our judgment that perhaps old ideas are not worth hearing or

Senior citizens represent the largest single minority in North America. Their needs, hopes and participation in our land generally go unrecognized-but not if the GRAY PANTHERS have anything to do about it. Formed by the leadership of Margaret Kuhn, a retired church executive in Philadelphia, this group expects to exert power and persuasion in politics, religious organizations and in education.

Miss Kuhn gave nearly 25 years of professional skill to training adults in the Presbyterian Church in the art of social education and action. Now she expects to apply the same outreach and vision to Senior Citizens. Her contention is that older people have wider interests than the size of food trays or the number of hours set aside for crafts at the County Home.

These interests include politics, publishing, travel, new forms of worship, civil rights and sexual satisfaction. They are but a few of the topics that show up on the Gray Panther agenda.

With or without the advocacy of the Gray Panthers older people have some tough opposition in this country. Their real and most consistent enemy is Playboy magazine and the old lady skirts presented by the Tonight Show. Playboy considers old age a disease and its most vulgar humor, cartoon or otherwise, is reserved for the elderly. Most editions treasure some put-down of the aging, draped around the theme of sexual senility which its publisher Hugh Hefner ascribes to anyone over 30.

The Tonight Show sees the world view of the aging through the antics of Johnny Carson dressed up as a grandmother in a wig plus long black dress, cane filled with whisky and mind filled with sexual frustrations. This mocking charade must appeal to Carson for the sketch is now a regular feature of the program. Carson frequently turns to his version of an elderly cackle when interviewing guests. For him to be old is to be funny or, rather, the target of nightclub humor.

But all is not lost and one group that has given aging the right place and proportion is working in northern New Mexico. In Dixon, Taos, Truchas and other ancient settlements young people can be seen interviewing their parents and grandparents. The Spanish youth want to recover their history and heritage. By tape-recorder and notebook they are recapturing the stories and history

Only the aged can help them, for much is oral history Out of this funded project (some church, some federal) a new awareness and respect for older people has come to their youth. Once again people discover that a vital living community is all ages, all races, founded on respect and sharing.

Patriarch Named Amid Difficulties

westerners, the ways of eastern Christianity always have seemed somewhat strange and mystifying - its awesome liturgy, its icons, its elaborate vestments, its refusal to reduce theology to technical formulas, its deep sense of divine mystery.

But its qualities have sustained it through harshly trying circumstances, both now and in the past, under hostile regimes. as in modern Russia, and amid the shifting powers of the

Middle East. Now, under another strained situation, the church has taken on generally unknown lead-

ership He is the new Archibishop of Constantinople (modern Istanbul), the eastern counterpart of the Pope of Rome, the preeminent spiritual guide of the world's 250 million Eastern Orthodox believers. Patriarch Dimitrios I.

His elevation this week was surrounded by difficulties and question marks that involved restrictions imposed by the Turkish government and left uncertainties about the church's future course and the status of its historic principal

Will it gradually be forced to move elsewhere? Will it do so by its own choice to preserve its rights? Might the new Patriarch voluntarily go into exile in defense of the church's prerogatives?

"No one really knows what may happen." said the Rev. George Bacopoulos, chancellor of the Greek Orthodox Church in the Americas. "We'll just have to wait and see whether the Turkish government takes further steps to demean the Patriarchate.

Pressures on it by the government of the predominantly Moslem country were obvious in the election of the new Patriarch, successor to the internationally esteemed and ecumenically influential Athe-

nagoras I, who died a week ago. Among American churchmen who attended the funeral, their ranks thinned by Turkish restrictions, sources said the government there had barred the five most likely candidates from election to the office, and also ordered it filled hastily.

This was unprecedented to force an election in 72 hours." Father Bacopoulos said. Historically, it has taken at least a month to allow time for deliberation and global consultations among leaders of the East Eastern Orthodox branches.

But under the circumstances. the Holy Synod of the Patriarchate apparently had no choice, other than outright defiance, except to comply. So it acted immediately to elect a new primate of the church from the limited roster allowed. resulting in the surprise choice

'He is unknown to most of us. but we understand he is a very pious and good man," said Father Bacopoulos, a keenly versed and experienced hand in the church's worldwide affairs.

In the new Patriarch's installation address, he said he hoped to continue in the footsteps of Athenagoras, the warm, expansive churchman who had led Eastern Orthodoxy out of centuries of isolation and into increasing alliance with Roman Catholicism and Prote-

But what obstacles the new Patriarch may face - or what particular qualities he possesses for leading and inspiring the vast, loosely linked branches of Eastern Orthodoxy - remained clouded both by the circumstances and his own previous relative obscurity.

He himself had been shocked by his election, according to Bishop Silas, of America's Greek Orthodox Church, who attended the funeral. He said Dimitrios previously had no inkling he was being consid-

Bishop Silas is auxiliary to Archbishop lakovos, head of the Greek Orthodox Church in America, who had been considered in world inter-church circles as the foremost prospect to succeed Athenagoras.

TORONTO (AP) - Mothers who use tranquilizers and other pills on a daily basis are likely to encourage their children to be drug users. Dr. Reginald G. Smart of Toronto's Addiction Research Foundation studied 14,800 students. 



It was a birthday present Steve Carlton had been saving for three weeks. And when he presented it to his wife, she had to share it with 53,376 other delighted onlookers.

"I was very happy I could give it to her," the Philadelphia Phillies' left-hander said Thursday night after winning his 20th game of the baseball season, the first National League pitch er to reach that plateau.

For awhile, it appeared he'd have trouble getting it. Then the Phillies unlimbered their muscles and, battering three Cincinnati hurlers for 16 hits. ripped up the Reds 9-4. providing Carlton with his 15th consecutive victory.

Elsewhere in the National League, the New York Mets edged Atlanta 2-1. Houston destroved Montreal 17-5, the Chicago Cubs nipped San Francisco 2-1. San Diego clipped St. Louis 3-2 and Los Angeles whipped Pittsburgh 4-2.

In the American League, the Chicago White Sox beat Baltimore 6-1. California defeated Cleveland 42. Boston topped Texas 4-3 and Detroit split a doubleheader with Minnesota. winning the opener 12-2 before the Twins took the 10-inning nightcap 7-6. The New York Yankees, Kansas City, Oakland and Milwaukee were idle.

It was about three weeks ago just after Steve had won his 15th game of the year and 10th in a row, that Beverly glanced at the Phillies' schedule and figured he'd be going for No. 20 on Aug
