# Rescuers recover 17 bodies, search for 15 more underway

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — With 17 bodies recovered and 71 northern Idaho got relief as rain helped settle and clear the grit that persons missing near Mount St. Helens, search and rescue helicopters targeted 15 areas in the devastated region where they said more dead could be found today.

Flying conditions improved with the rains coming to an end and the forecast calling for partially clearing skies.

Late Thursday, U.S. Forest Service spokesman Terry Virgin said the death toll from Sunday's blast that leveled 150 square miles of trees stood at 17. Ben Bena, a Cowlitz County sheriff's deputy, said all 17 bodies had been recovered.

Helicopter crews Thursday were airborne despite foul weather, ferrying bodies to a temporary morgue being set up at the Toledo airport.

Virgin said a dog was found near the bodies of two victims and brought to safety Thursday, but he had no details on where it was located. He would not speculate on whether the animal's discovery could mean a chance of other survivors near the volcano.

Damage estimates from the blast, meanwhile, soared past half a billion dollars, and President Carter was visibly shaken the day after touring the southwest Washington region he earlier de lared a major

Robert Stevens of the Federal Emergency Management Agency disaster relief center would be established today in nearby o. He said the government was prepared to offer low interest loans, grants, unemployment compensation and housing assistance for up to one year for people displaced by the blast, which leveled thousands of acres of pristine forest and sent mud and debris racing down rivers.

The volcano ejected only steam from its gaping crater Thursday but shot its white displays up to 20,000 feet at least once. Seismic noise — which some geologists say could mean the movement of molten rock deep within the peak — was recorded in the afternoon.

And USGS scientists said Thursday that a huge dam at the top of the Toutle River formed by a slide of mud and volcanic debris may be a permanent fixture on Spirit Lake. They earlier feared it might release water in a devastating flood.

# Ash restricts Sheppard jet flights

**Businesses close for Memorial Day** 

WICHITA FALLS, Texas (AP) — Jet pilots at Sheppard Air Force Base have been restricted to fly no higher than 20,000 feet because of a thin layer of volcanic ash that has drifted over Wichita Falls, base officials said today

Most of the dust, blown high into the atmosphere by the eruption of the Mount St. Helens volcano in Washington state, missed Texas. But meteorologists at the National Weather Service in Fort Worth said shifting winds apparently blew some of the dust into North Texas

skies Wednesday and Thursday It was a very thin layer, and FAA officials in Fort Worth said it had not issued any restrictions to commercial aviation in it five-state region — Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arkansas and Louisiana.

At Reese Air Force Base, near Lubbock, officials said the dust blew over the northern Panhandle Wednesday and was mostly gone by today. Reese spokesman Lt. Randy Sipe said altitude restrictions were being lifted today, but pilots were still being warned to avoid any heavy concentrations of the dust they may encounter

Doug Moore of the Air Force's Air Training Command headquarters in San Antonio said the orders to restrict flying at Sheppard also included Vance Air Force Base at Enid, Okla.


Sipe and FAA officials said the ash contains corrosive chemicals and acids that can not only strip paint from an airplane but can also pit windows and damage jet engines.

NWS forecaster Jack Paup of Fort Worth said the volcanic dust could have ridden into Texas on northeasterly winds created by a low pressure system in the atmosphere over Arkansas and Missouri.



Jack Sullivan, president of the Fraternal Order of Police, said that at a meeting Thursday night, "Some of the more radical officers were talking about a walkout.

Sullivan, noting a walkout would be illegal, added the disgruntled officers "settled down.

Sullivan said he planned to meet with Police Chief Kenneth Harms today and scheduled a police rally for this afternoon. He said FOP officials and the chief would discuss amnesty proposals and the suspensions of five officers for conduct during the riots.

While some black leaders have asked for blanket amnesty for the more than 900 people arrested during the riot, Mayor Maurice Ferre and Dade County Manager Merrett Stierheim have proposed limited amnesty, decided on a case-by-case basis.

Four of the officers were suspended in connection with vandalism to cars at a looted discount store in the Liberty City section of northwest Miami. The fifth was accused of striking a looting suspect with a gun barrel

Opposing a call by some black leaders for amnesty for the 1,267 persons arrested during the riots, Graham said, "No citizen has the right to deny other citizens the respect to which they are entitled."

Schools reopened Thursday without incident under beefed-up security in racially-troubled areas.

Daily tours of Alibates Flint Quarries National Monument will begin Saturday, May 24, and continue through the summer season until Labor Day, September 1

Tours begin at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. from the contact station in Bates Canyon.

Persons planning to take the tours should arrive a few minutes before the tour time, wear comfortable shoes, and bring drinking water and a head covering. There is no charge for the tour.

The walking tour lasts approximately 11/2 hours and may include a flint chipping demonstration showing how Early Man fashioned tools from flint as far back as 10,000 years ago. Collecting the flint from the monument area is not allowed.

# Firefly could shed light on outer space

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Scientists are looking to the lowly firefly to help shed some light on the question of life in outer space. Thousands of firefly catchers

from Missouri to Pennslyvania - glass jars in hand - launched their annual assault on the incandescent insect this month.

"We got 2 million last year. and that was a pretty good year," said Jerry Kunkel, an official with the sponsoring Sigma Firefly Scientist's Club. "But we had a great year two years ago when we got 3 million. We hope to surpass that this

The club pays a penny for each firefly. Kunkel said a first-rate firefly catcher can bottle 100 insects in an hour.

The club is a division of the St Louis-based Sigma Chemical Co. Kunkel says the company wants the firefly because it is the only source of luciferin and luciferase, two chemicals useful in the search for extra-terrestrial life. They also are used in cancer research and in testing polluted water.

Fireflies turn "on" when luciferin and luciferase react with another chemical adenosine triphosphate or ATP.

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# Business world labels politicians

FORT WORTH (AP) - Top business executives, responding to a survey, said the nation's politicians are "ineffective and perhaps incompetent" leaders unable to instill confidence in their ability to quell a recession

Researchers said 71 percent of the executives polled rated the national leadership as poor and 20 percent said it was only fair.
Just 2 percent termed it "good," while the category of "excellent"

The survey was conducted for Paul R. Ray & Co., Inc., a national and international executive search firm based in Fort Worth. It polled the chief executives of Fortune's top 1,600 businesses, and received 220 responses.

Results were accurate within two percentage points, according to Moore Diversified Services, a Fort Worth market research firm which conducted the survey over the last 10 days of April. "This is a little harsh, but I would say the leadership of this

country has been ineffective and perhaps incompetent," said Charles M. Harper of Con Agra, Inc.

Eighty-nine percent of the executives thought the economy is already in a recession and another 10 percent said one is almost

upon us. Seventy-one percent felt the recession will be "very deep" or somewhat deep, and will last 12 to 18 months. The National Bureau of Economic Research, a private

organization that economists rely on to designate recessions, has not yet called the current slump a full-blown recession. However, the unemployment rate, a key indicator, equals the

levels of unemployment in four previous post-war recessions. Researchers said 17 percent of the executives indicated they will delay capital investments until they see how the economy

# Nuclear wastes from plants problem for state lawmakers

**Associated Press Writer** AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The 1981 Legislature must consider disposal of wastes from nuclear power plants but there is no mmediate crisis in handling low level radioactive wastes from

doctors' offices and hospitals, says Gov. Bill Clements. "We do not think there is a crisis situation as some have reported, and we think we can handle the disposal of low level wastes at this time," Clements told a Capitol news conference Thursday.

Clements replied to last Saturday's action of the Texas Medical Association's house of delegates in urging Clements to push the Texas Department of Health in immediately designating several temporary waste storage sites.

The 288-member governing body of the TMA said lack of disposal areas for low-level radioactive products used in diagnostic and therapeutic medicine created an "imminent peril" to the public health and welfare of all Texans.

The TMA said private physicians, hospitals and laboratories in Texas must send their disposable radioactive materials to dumping sites in Washington, Nevada or South Carolina.

Clements conferred earlier Thursday with Dr. Robert Berstein. state health commissioner, and officials of the Texas Energy and

# Rebellious Koreans holdout for resignation of leader

KWANGJU, South Korea (AP) - The rebellious civilians controlling Kwangju held out today for the resignation of South Korea's new military strongman, Lt. Gen. Chun Doo-hwan, as 3,000 youths patrolled the streets. Residents began cleaning up after four days of street fighting with troops and police in which at least 64 persons were killed and more than 400 were wounded.

"We will fight until the last one if Chun does not resign," one young worker said. In Seoul, Kim Young-sam, leader of the opposition New Democratic Party, said any further move toward military dictatorship would lead to bloodier revolt and he would be "in the forefront of the people.

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

majority segment of the state's population. Fact is, take all the ethnic groups out of the state and there would

hardly be enough Texans to shake a stick at.

You can read about the various groups of peoples in our large state, and you can talk about them in conversations wherever folks get together, but you really don't get the whole, vivid picture until you attend the annual Texas Folklife Festival in San Antonio.

It is held each year at the University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures in the Alamo City, and while one may encounter a diversity of cultures during one's week-day endeavors, you are literally drowned in "cultures" once you enter the gate of the festival.

On the 15-acre grounds of the Institute, about 6,000 Texans from more than 180 towns, cities and villages will be there to entertain, delight, feed and excite you with the colorful and interesting offerings of at least 32 ethnic groups.

Music, foods, crafts and endless other specialties of their cultures will be offered by the various ethnic bodies. One mingles among the crowds of festival-minded funmakers and comes face to face with the ways of life as at least they used to be of the Texas Swiss, Lebanese, Poles, Scandinavians, Chinese, Japanese, Indian, Blacks, Mexicans, Irish, Scots, Germans, Jews, Serbs, Italians, English and many others. You celebrate among them, as one of them, whatever your heritage and you learn of the total heritage of Texas. In the people you encounter, the Texas frontier lives again and you observe the folk arts and crafts demonstrated, note the historical emphasis on family, and delight in the excitement of sharing the cultures of others, at least for a little while.

You see much of the old way, the soap-making, the butter churning, the grist mill, the yoked oxen and the old red hot-dog and the fox hound. Walking the grounds is like turning the pages of a volume of Texas history from its very beginning.

We bring out these points for a purpose. This year's Folklife Festival will be on July 31 and Aug. 1-3. You may want to attend. It is like a refresher course in being Texan. Basically one enjoys the celebration and at the same time recharges his appreciation of the American Way, for our way was in the beginning and still is one of a nation giving haven to people seeking freedom.

What is most impressive is to be in the crowds of thousands representing so many ethnic groups, with cultures so widely different. having great fun together, and see on every face, in all the smiling eyes, the expression that tells what is running through their minds: "I am a Texan. I am an American.

# Awesome lack of acumen

By Robert Walters WASHINGTON (NEA) - From all around the globe they came - kings and queens, premiers and prime ministers, the leaders of the world's most-powerful and least-known nations - to the funeral of

On the day of that awe-inspiring ceremony - one of the most impressive gathering of world leaders in modern times

President Tito in Belgrade, Yuogslavia.

- President Carter was at home, preparing for his big trip to Philadelphia. Once again, Carter has demonstrated an acute lack of even the most fundamental comprehension of international politics, modern history, diplomacy and protocol.

Virtually all of the world's other heads of state understood the symbolic importance of paying tribute to the last of the men whose leadership had such a profound

impact on global politics during World War II and in the years that followed.

Roosevelt, Churchill, Stalin, De Gaulle and Mao all had passed away years earlier. Now the death of Josip Broz Tito truly represented the end of an era.

But there were more than sentimental reasons to compel a Carter trip to the funeral, for it was Tito's political acumen and force of personality that made him

both a highly respected "third world" organizer of non-aligned nations and the revered leader of a country uniquely and delicately balanced between political and economic forces of East and West.

What prevented Carter from making the trip? He was terribly busy, his aides explained, carrying the burden of too many domestic and international crises.

Students of the Carter presidency may recall, however, that only eight days before the funeral the president himself announced that "a lot of the responsibilities that have been on my shoulders the past few months have been alleviated to some

In proclaiming an end to his six months of self-imposed seclusion in the White House. Carter said the problems confronting the country now had become 'manageable enough'' to permit him to resume a "limited travel" schedule

"Limited travel" apparently included the trip to Philadelphia, for Carter's official out-of-town debut as a participant in the 1980 presidential campaign, but not a flight to Yugoslavia.

Exactly how busy is our hard-working president? On the day scores of other chiefs of state were assembling in Belgrade to pay homage to Tito, here's what a portion of Carter's schedule looked like: 12:15 p.m.: Greet the Goodwill graduate

12:25 p.m.: Greet the Multiple Sclerosis

Society's 1980 mother and father of the 12:30 p.m.: Lunch with the First Lady.

Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher of Great Britain, presumably burdened with a similar workload, managed to clear her desk in time to attend the Tito funeral, as did Hua Guofeng, the Communist Party Chairman in the People's Republic of China, and President Leonid Brezhnev of the Soviet Union.

West German Chancellor Helmut Schmidt was in Belgrade, as were Indian Prime Minister Indira Gandhi, Japanese Prime Minister Masayoshi Ohira, Sweden's King Gustav XVI and Norway's King Olaf V.

Even in the most cynical and selfish terms of Carter's single-minded determination to be re-elected, attendance at the Tito funeral would have been a domestic political bonanza

Nothing benefits a politician more than an opportunity to appear as a proper solemn world statesman at a major ceremonial event, rubbing elbows with other global leaders but temporarily relieved of the responsibility to perform any substantive work Fumbling for excuses and explanations,

White House officials said the president certainly would try to add Yugoslavia to the itinerary of his European trip beng. planned for later in the year.

Reunion in Vienna

The event is so fraught with historical significance that it's a wonder it doesn't founder from the weight of it all.

The four World War II victor powers have returned to the scene of one of their few successes in post-war cooperation at the precise time when two of them are in greater disagreement than at any time since the depths of the Cold War.

The foreign ministers of Britain, France, the Soviet Union and the United States are in Vienna to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the Austrian State Treaty, an event that is a landmark of recent history on a number of points. The agreement, signed with great

ceremony in Vienna's ornate Belvedere Palace on May 15, 1955, returned Austria to the status of a soveriegn nation after 17 years of occupation - eight of enforced union with Nazi Germany and nine of four-power control

It also was the first instance of voluntary withdrawal from territory in the physical possession of Soviet troops, an ebbing of Soviet power from what was until Aghanistan, the high water mark of Soviet

True, Moscow extracted a good price for the favor. Austria was pledged to neutrality between East and West and compelled to forswear union with Germany in any shape or form - an undertaking that continues to be read as barring even membership in the European Economic Community. The country was required to buy back, for the equivalent of \$150 million in goods and services, its own assets that had been seized by the Soviets and to continue to deliver a large portion of its oil production, one of its few natural resources, to the Soviet Union, the world's leading oil producer.

All in all, a pretty good deal for the Soviets. But one they most certainly would never have made under terms many times more advantageous had they had an inkling of what was coming in little more than a year.

That was the Hungarian Revolution. A free Austria next door did not make it possible to save Hungary. But it provided an escape route and haven for thousands of fleeing Hungarians. And it allowed the world an unimpeded and stunningly nformative view of the true sentiments of

peoples under Soviet rule and the ferocity of Soviet reaction to their attempts to regain control over their own destinies

Austria thus stands as not only the first but the only such instance of voluntary Soviet withdrawal. And its performance during the intervening quarter of a century has given the Soviets other good reasons not to repeat the favor elsewhere.

Austria has thrived in freedom, A largely mountainous territory smaller than the state of Maine and with less than eight million people, it has one of the sturdiest economies of the developed world, in sharp contrast to those of its immediate neighbors and former partners in the Austro-Hungarian Empire. Hungary, with rich agricultural potential, and Czechoslovakia, the industrial heartland of the old monarchy, in comparison are embarrassing indictments of the socialist

Austria is without question one of the great post-war success stories. In fact, as Austrians see it their State Treaty marked the acceptance by the superpowers of the principle of coexistence which has been more or less the basis of East-West relations during the subsequent decades.

All this considered, there is good reason for making an occasion of this anniversary, although the Soviets might be expected to approach it with somewhat less husiasm than their erstwhile partners.

But there is more to this reunion in Vienna than the remembrance of a success past. Thanks in part to new U.S. Secretay of State Edmund Muskie's determination that his inheritance from predecessor Cyrus Vance is not going to include a second-banana position to presidential advisor Zbigniew Brzezinski, the Vienna ceremonies are the setting for the first top-level U.S.-Soviet conversations in the half year since the invasion of Afghanistan.

They are described as primarily a et-acquainted occasion for Muskie and his Soviet counterpart, Andrei Gromyko. But they could be the start of something more

# \$18 million dollar gift boosts college coffers

STORM LAKE, Iowa (AP) - The nine-paragraph letter was signed simply "A Friend of Buena Vista College." Nothing more. But with it came a gift of \$18 million.

The bequest is more than double the current assets of the little Presbyterian school tucked amid rich farmland in northwestern

"No one ever offered this big a chance to this size school. We want to be worthy," says Keith Briscoe, president of the college that counts fewer than 1,300 full- and part-time students.

Buena Vista has 899 on-campus students who attend classes in tidy red brick buildings near the wooded shore of Storm Lake. It looks like a quiet, ordinary campus, but looks can be deceiving, Briscoe said. Buena Vista strives for excellence.

Full-time teachers hold masters degrees or higher and are among the highest-paid in the state. Freshmen are taught only by professors, and nine of 10 have high school grade averages of "B"

Sometimes they are taught one-on-one. More than 70 classes have fewer than 15 students; 40 classes have fewer than five.

Briscoe praises his faculty, acknowledging how difficult it can be to attract professors to remote colleges "But many want, and find here, a real collegiate environment

that serves as a haven. Here, they can do their research. There aren't the large-campus politics. There isn't the 'publish or perish' philosophy. We pay them to be outstanding teachers. Anything else they

do, they do for the sheer joy of it.' In the eyes of the donor, whose identity the school has sworn to

keep secret, Buena Vista is something special. His letter said he first was apprehensive about giving money to such a small school.

"I found, however, at Buena Vista College a jewel quietly and continually radiating its mission and services through a truly

dedicated teaching faculty and staff," the donor wrote. "Greatness can come from as small a place as Buena Vista College. Great teachers and high-potential students can come from small towns. Our country and the world needs our small

"Great" is a word not often applied to small colleges when most in Iowa are projecting enrollment declines up to 25 percent next

But it is a word Buena Vista officials dare to say out loud. Storm Lake attorney Edgar Mack, chairman of the school's board of trustees, said it as he noted that the University of Chicago and Buena Vista were founded the same year, 1891.

Rockefeller. Buena Vista did not. Any great institution requires one major, sparking gift. We believe this is ours," said Mack. "It gets you away from the struggle with poverty. It gives us an opportunity to do things we could never do.

"Chicago got gifts totaling \$35 million from John D.

Here are Buena Vista's preliminary plans for the \$18 million: -Establish an endowed business school and set up endowments for the college's six academic divisions and the library.

-Build a conference center. -Begin an "American heritage" lecture series featuring international leaders in business, academics, the press and

-Upgrade pre-med and pre-law curricula.

As a condition of the donation, Buena Vista must raise \$9 million on its own over six years, a figure that doesn't worry school officials. The fund-raising effort will become part of an existing 10-year program aimed at building school assets to \$54 million.

Founded 89 years ago, the college got by for years with about 125 students, Mack said. Only after World War II did it begin to



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# Commission dumps Starr County site

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -Board of Corrections members gave in to local opposition and voted to forget about building a prison in Starr County, but they said residents of the border community have missed out on a good thing.

One month after voting to spend \$7.8 million for La Casita Farm, board members voted unanimously Thursday to look for another location, although they still think the 5,293-acre farm is the best available site. They succumbed to

unwavering local criticism. "If they'd given us a year, we'd make useful members of their community," said James Windham of Livingston, chairman of the Board of Corrections. "The pluses would outweigh the

Several board members said they failed in efforts to sell that idea to the community. Ruben Montemayor of San Antonio, who made the motion to give up on La Casita, said public hearings in Rio Grande City showed the residents had wide-ranging fears about what a prison would do to their county.

"I believe that had they known more about how a prison system operates ... I believe that these fears were really not founded," he said.

Gov. Bill Clements, chairman of the Prison Approval Board, nended the corrections board for its decision. On April 22, minutes after the corrections board voted to buy the land, the Approval Board ordered a 30-day

The delay was sparked by complaints from Rio Grande City officials who said they had not been told of the deal. During the 30 days, prison officials wooed Starr County officials, but failed.

"It's just the board's decision that we don't want to move in an area where we overwhelmingly have no community support," said

Clements told Windham. "That was a very judicious decision. "You have reached a proper decision. I applaud

the governor. "You made the right recommendation, so let's find us another place," he

Starr County residents left their homes at 5 a.m. to make the trip to the Capitol They applauded Montemayor's motion and

Rep. Ernestine Glossbrenner, D-Alice, spoke for her constituents.

"I'm standing up to thank you for taking into account the hopes, the dreams, of the people of Starr County," she told the Board of Corrections. "You just gave them the news they came to

Talk quickly turned to other possible sites. Montemayor said Thursday's decision set a precedent - local opposition could kill attempts to put a prison where it is unwanted.

However, Clements said that is not a problem.

"There are areas in the state who are anxious to have a prison," he said.

Several areas were mentioned. The governor said he is "given to understand" that sites in nearby Cameron or Willacy counties might be available.

Texas A&M reports prepared for the prison board have said the Lower Rio Grande Valley best provides the fertile land and long growing season needed for a prison farm.

Previous efforts to buy land for a prison in Hidalgo County also fell through. Windham said.

# Religion in the news

NEW YORK (AP) — That bearded cleric roving troublespots of the Middle East in his black cassock and flat-topped kalimafi, Eastern Rite Roman Catholic Archbishop Hilarion Capudji, has become a familiar actor in events there, but to many he remains a little-known, ambiguous figure

It's highly questionable, under Vatican directives, whether he's even supposed to be in that region.

Various other anomalies and controversies surround the 58-year-old Syria-born churchman who has cultivated links with the Palestine Liberation Organization and the Iranian militants holding U.S. hostages and who presented himself as intermediary to retrieve bodies of Americans killed in a rescue attempt.

He says his actions are "as a pastor, as a Christian, as a man and as an Arab

But his background and role have been nebulous and unclear in some respects, including general Western unacquaintance with Eastern Rite Catholicism to which he belongs.

However, his official ecclesiastical assignments, since his release in 1977 from an Israeli jail where he served time for smuggling guns to Palestinian guerrillas, have been to Latin America and more recently to Western Europe, not to the Middle East.

Yet he has been back there recurrently. Iran's Foreign Minister Sadegh Ghotbzadeh describes him as friend of Iran who has shown "independence and strength of spirit."

'One thing is apparent," writes National Catholic News Service correspondent Gerard E. Sherry who interviewed Capudji while he was in prison. "He's acting like a free agent involved in all the intrigue that goes with Middle East politics and religion.

Capudji is part of the Syrian segment of Eastern Rite Catholicism. the Melkites, and was their patriarchal vicar in Jerusalem and had become an Israeli citizen when convicted in 1974 for smuggling arms, said to be for PLO terrorists, and sentenced to 12 years in prison.

Through Vatican negotiations he was released in 1977 after serving only three years, with a Vatican guarantee he would not be given any church post in the Middle East and would not publicly discuss Middle East issues. He was assigned to a vague post of archbishop visitor to Melkites in South America.

However, a little more than a year later, he was in Damascus, Syria, relates a U.S. Catholic weekly, Our Sunday Vistitor, and reportedly told a meeting of the Palestinian National Council he would fight "to the last drop of my blood" for the liberation of

# Money not raised for Katy sale

DALLAS (AP) - Texas shippers contributed little to the three-state drive for \$3.6 million to bankroll the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad's takeover of part of the bankrupt Rock Island line, fundraisers say.

Railroad officials said last month that the loan was essential to fund start up costs along the 600-mile line from St. Jo, Mo., to Dallas and that shippers would have to raise the money by May 22.

At a Thursday meeting, the Oklahoma-Kansas-Texas Shipper's Association told Katy management they had failed to meet the deadline

Katy attorney Arthur Albin said that although the shippers had not raised the entire amount, it had collected enough to warrant "continued efforts over the next few days to attempt to make up the shortfall

Representatives of the shippers' association said Wednesday that contributions from sources in Oklahoma and Kansas had reached \$2.25 million, but that Texas users'

were slow to pledge.

John M. McPherren of Dolese Brothers, an Oklahoma construction materials firm, said his company donated \$500,000 for the loan, and that

Sun Oil, also in Oklahoma, had added another \$500,000. McPherren said he wondered what was going on in Texas.

James Smith, a Herrington.

Kan., banker heading the fund drive, said the association had received hundreds of small contributions, many from unemployed workers on the bankrupt Rock Island railroad and from farmers along the

Albin said that pledges had been received from "some" Texas shippers, but he declined to state amounts or sources of the funds.

Ray Carter, spokesman for Ralston Purina Corp. which has a plant in Fort Worth, said his company has not received all the facts, has not attended any users-Katy meetings, and at this point cannot be interested in contributing.

He said his company had not been informed of Thursday's currently provided by the Santa Fe railroad in Fort Worth.

Albin declined to say how much money still needed to be raised, nor would he speculate about the chances for success. "All concerned are hopeful everything will fall into place,"

# Astros hold off Mets, 8-5

NEW YORK (AP) - Houston Manager Bill Virdon was a reasonally happy man considering the curious atmosphere surrounding the Astros' 8-5 victory over the New York Mets.

Two of the things that pleased him the most were home runs by Craig Reynolds and Cesar Cedeno. Those two homers lifted the Houston season total to 21 compared to the club's total of 49 for all of the 1979 season.

Reliever Frank LaCorte was another source of pleasure for Virdon as the hard-throwing right-hander earned his fourth save in relief of Joe Niekro, 5-2, who gave up 11 hits in less than seven innings

"We're way ahead of our schedule," said Virdon of the homers which were part of a 17-hit attack on five Mets pitchers. "We try to enjoy them when we can get them."

Reynolds' first-inning drive off New York starter Mark Bomback was his first of the season while Cedeno's two-run homer in the fifth off loser Kevin Kobel, 0-4, was his third.

"LaCorte has greatly improved his control," Virdon said after his reliever lowered his ERA to 0.45 for 15 appearances. "That's the thing he's done this season that he hasn't done before. The arm has always been there." LaCorte's career ERA coming into this season was 6.20.

LaCorte limited the Mets to two hits over the final 21-3 innings after New York had pulled within 8-5 with a three-run seventh that finished

Reynolds staked Niekro to an early lead but New York tied it with a run in the second on a double by Steve Henderson and two wild pitches

Niekro claimed that his position as Houston's player representative didn't distract him from concentrating on his pitching. But Virdon said,

"I didn't think he was real sharp tonight, he got the job done: that's about all Houston went back in front against Kobel in the third when Alan Ashby singled in one run and Niekro double home another. But the Mets scored again in the fourth on the first of Mike Jorgensen's two doubles and Henderson's RBI

Cedeno's homer put it out of reach despite Niekro's continued struggles.

"I made some good pitches," said Niekro, "but I also made some bad pitches. The bad ones were mostly the ones they hit. But we won the game and that's the important thing.

By scoring again in the sixth and twice more in the seventh, the Astros built an 8-2 lead before New York got three runs in the home seventh and brought on LaCorte.

Lee Mazzilli started the rally with an infield single and Frank Taveras followed with the third of his four hits. Jorgensen then doubled in two runs and subsequently scored on a throwing error by third baseman Julio Gonzalez which

Mazzilli was ejected for the first time in his major league career in the eighth, in another of the seemingly endless confrontations between the Mets and umpire Dave Pallone, who was stationed at home plate Thursday night. This time it was a third strike which he called a foul

NEW YORK (AP) - Baseball's longest night has resulted in a settlement of the lingering contract dispute between players and management and averted a strike which threatened unprecedented interruption of the major league season.

Marvin Miller, executive director of the union, and Ray Grebey, chief negotiator for the 26 owners, struggled through a marathon day and night of negotiations, finally hammering out an agreement in a seven-hour wrapup session.

Terms were not disclosed immediately because the settlement must be presented to the Player Association's Executive Board and membership for ratification. Neither party would comment on the final disposition of the difficult free agent compensation issue, the major stumbling block throughout the talks.

"We've reached an agreement for four years," said Grebey. "We think it's a good one. There's something in it for everybody." Miller called the settlement a victory for both sides. "That's what collective bargaining means," the union chief said. "When you reach an agreement without a strike, it's a great victory for everybody

concerned." The settlement means today's games will be played as scheduled Grebey said only one team might have transportation problems but

that he expected the schedule to be followed. "It's a good deal all around," said Commissioner Bowie Kuhn, who made his first appearance in the talks. "There was a lot of honest goodwill all around. The parties worked hard at it. I'm ecstatic."

This mutual victory was not easy to achieve and several times as the final day of negotiations stretched into night, it seemed a strike was inevitable.

The crisis atmosphere began at 10 a.m., EDT, Thursday when Miller and his negotiating team, which included attorneys Dick Moss, Don Fehr and Peter Rose, arrived for talks. The management team was one hour late, setting a pattern which was followed throughout the day. Grebey and the owners' negotiators were also close to an hour late for an afternoon meeting and a half hour late for the final night session. Miller was clearly annoyed by management's tardiness throughout the day.

The first meeting between the two sides lasted only 1 hour, 25 minutes, from 11:15, in the morning to 12:40. When Grebey and his people left the midtown hotel where talks were held, they seemed downcast


