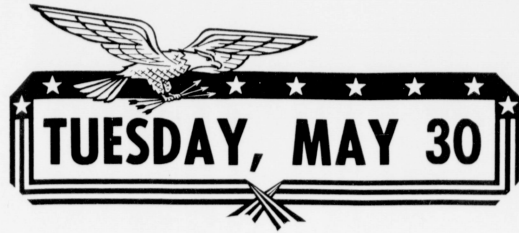

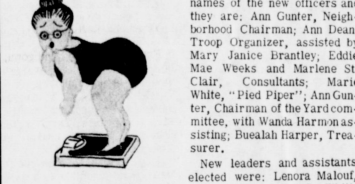

## High School Annual Goes to Publisher

The last pages of the 1967 Muletrain will leave for the publishers June 5, according to Ransom Jones, Co-editor. Students should expect the book to arrive about August 1.

The 67 Muletrain has been dedicated to Coach George Washington, Editors, Ransom Jones and Debbie Bryant presented Coach Washington with a plaque during awards assembly, Wednesday, May 17.

Two hundred and forty pages will make the volume, thirty of those being advertising pages. The cover is a Coper with a raised mule on capsule. The theme is "The Age of Discovery." Throughout the book, scenes from outer space have been used. All art work was by Elizabeth Black, art instructor, and it is done in abstract.

Under a proposed plan for free, state-supported "kindergarten" that the 21-member elected State Board of Education has announced it will ask the Texas Legislature to enact, 4-year-olds could begin public school in September so long as they are five or before the following January 1st.

The proposal was prepared for the State Board of Education by the Texas Education Agency (TEA). It recommends that subject matter include social studies, science and "number concepts." The latter would be an early foundation for mathematics. In fact, number concepts are a part of mathematics.

## 'Kindergarten' Program Is Seen As Benefiting Both Four And Five Year Olds

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With subject matter such as this recommended, it is easy to understand why calling the proposal a "kindergarten" plan is less than accurate.

**Support Grows**

Support for the proposal has grown since the State Board adopted it earlier this fall. The Texas State Teachers Association has given the idea its blessing and has agreed to support the measure when it is introduced in the Legislature next year.

The idea of earlier schooling is supported by a mass of evidence that in today's increasingly complex society, it is not only desirable but virtually essential that the schools take in those under age six.

"Research, experience, and technology," says Dr. J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education, "clearly indicate that age six is too late for children to begin their schooling."

TEA cites one researcher who has stated that 50 per cent of intelligence development takes place by the time the child is four years old, 30 per cent between four and eight and 20 per cent between ages eight and 17.

Therefore, thinks TEA, schooling must begin earlier than six.

**Not A Crash Program**

If approved by the Legislature the program could go into effect for participating school districts as early as the opening of school next year.

"It should not be a crash program," warns Edgar. "The proposal provides for a gradual, rather than sudden move toward the new additional year."

The program is to be voluntary--if a school district wants to participate the state will pay half the costs.

Drafters of the proposal go into detail to recommend that the new year of schooling should not be what we generally consider as kindergarten or preschool training but an actual part of the total educational program.
