



Plan Now for Holiday Spending

If you are a typical American household, spending hundreds of dollars (or more) during the holiday season (on gifts, food, decorations, parties, child care, and more), then you'll need a few months to come up with the needed funds. The good news? Starting now will give you a really good chance of avoiding debt this holiday season!

Start by identifying your basic monthly income and your basic (essential) living expenses (rent, utilities, food, clothing, etc.). Use that information to decide how much money you can set aside for holiday spending each month prior to the holidays.

For example, suppose that you have \$200 available in October, \$240 in November and \$175 in December. That means that your total holiday budget is \$615. Each month, set aside the planned amount. In October you plan to set aside \$200 for holiday spending. If you get paid weekly that might mean setting aside \$50 per week OR it might mean setting aside different amounts each week to fit your bill-paying schedule (for instance, \$100 in the 2nd week and \$80 in the 3rd week and \$20 in the 4th week).

Stash your holiday money somewhere special - in a designated bank account or perhaps in cash (keep it in a safe place). Mark down how much you put into your holiday fund, and whenever you spend on a holiday item, take the money out of the holiday fund. This lets you know how much is available for holiday spending and helps you make sure your use ONLY that much money, not more.

Planning ahead will work best if you set limits for different types of holiday spending. Continuing with the example, here is one way a hypothetical person might divide their \$615:

- \$400: gifts (\$300 for family, \$100 for friends, teachers and coworkers)
- \$100: annual holiday party (\$65 for the dinner, \$35 for the babysitter)
 - \$25: new decorations
 - \$35: special groceries
- \$30: gas for two trips to Grandma's house (this might be more depending on how far Grandma's house is!)
- \$25: extra in case some thing comes up

Of course, each family's holiday spending plan will be different - make a plan that meets your needs.

Key rules to follow when planning for holiday spending:

- 1. Basic household needs come first. DO NOT skip paying the phone bill or the utility bill in order to make more money available for holiday spending.
- Keep track of your holiday spending so you don't spend more than you planned. If you are tempted to spend extra in one category (such as gifts), then reduce another category accordingly. Be sure to keep all the receipts from holiday purchases in one envelope for easy reference - it will help in returns if needed as well.
- Remember the payoff for all this care and planning comes in January, when you'll start the year without any big debts or back bills to worry

about. Also, remember the reason for the season - it isn't how much you spend on your loved ones, but how much time and love you give!







Connie says there was one thing that made the event special. "A guy from Los Angeles named Jim Killeen googled his name, just out of curiosity. He found there were six other people in the world named Jim Killeen."

Jim Killeen of Los Angeles found Jim Killeens in Scotland, Ireland, Australia, Denver, St. Louis and New York. The LA Jim is a filmmaker, so he decided to make a documentary of his name search and subsequent events.

"In his googling, he found our 125th was going on," says Connie, "so LA Jim flew the other six Jims to Killeen, Texas for the celebration. They were here about three or four days and were a delight. They had a blast."

Connie says their coming was a surprise. They just called and said they were coming to the party. The Jim Killeens were given the royal treatment during the event and they got into the spirit of things. They cooked some horrible chili, enjoyed Texas wines and met lots of people. Connie had Jim Killeen name badges made with their hometowns on them. She arranged press conferences, which the Jims loved.

"They were given prime seats, but they hardly ever used them. They were on their feet most of the performance. The announcer got into it, too. He asked if there was a Jim Killeen in the audience. "They have found some sponsors and are ready to go in to production. The name of the documentary is GOOGLE ME, THE MOVIE."

NRCS Texas Accepts Applications for EQIP Funding

Texas agricultural landowners interested in participating in the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) need to apply by Nov. 16, 2007, if they have not already done so to be eligible for the next round of funding, according to the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

"Although EQIP is a continuous sign-up program, some producers may not have signed up yet," said Don Gohmert, NRCS state conservationist for Texas. "We will rank all eligible applications received by the end of the ranking period on Nov. 16 for 2008 funding. There is a strong possibility that EQIP funds will become available in October."

EQIP promotes agricultural production and environmental quality. Through EQIP, farmers and ranchers receive financial and technical assistance to help install conservation practices and to implement management systems that promote conservation. Financial assistance is on a cost-shared basis with the producer. The technical assistance is provided at 100 percent of the cost by NRCS.

According to Gohmert, there are a few changes in EQIP for 2008

NRCS is adding another statewide resource concern to the program at the recommendation of the State Technical Committee. Funding will be provided in 2008 specifically for conservation practices that improve habitat for the pronghorn antelope in west Texas.

Also new in 2008 will be a process to streamline payments. Instead of the traditional percentage-of-cost rates, NRCS will offer flat-rate payments based on a schedule for each conservation practice. "Landowners will know up-front what the payment in dollars will be," Gohmert said.

"One important component of EQIP that remains the same is the input needed from the local level to make EQIP address the most pressing resource concerns there," Gohmert said. "Our Jocal offices may be holding program development group and local working group meetings very soon to gather that input." NRCS offices and local soil and water conservation district officials will have more information about local meetings.
