Coyotes Go Into Overtime to Beat Gorillas in District Thriller

Homecoming 2007 will be remembered for a long time as one of the most exciting homecoming contests in school history.

The 2007 Coyotes equaled their season win total and evened their district record with a dramatic overtime victory over the visiting Trent Gorillas.

The Coyotes got things off to a good start as Senior Quentin Shafer took the Miles Valentine pitch and scampered 36 yards to the end zone to give the Coyotes a quick 6 to 0 lead with 7:37 left in the opening period. Flynn Chapman kicked the PAT to make the lead 8 to 0.

As would be the case all night long, no team would get further than 8 points ahead and the visitors quickly responded with a 37 yard touchdown run of their own and the PAT knotted the score at 8 with 6:31 left in the first period.

On the Coyotes next possession a dropped pass and a penalty was followed by the first of 4 crucial turnovers on the evening, this turnover however was not a factor as the Coyote defense stiffened and then moments later freshman John Hensley made up for his earlier drop by catching a perfect strike by classmate Miles Valentine on a nice 39 yard pass play and after another Chapman kick the Coyotes regained the lead at 16 to 8 with 1:53 left in the initial quarter.

The Gorillas drove inside the Coyotes one yard line, but three tremendous defensive plays by the defensive group of Chapman, Valentine,

Shafer, Logan Howard, Karl Lamming and Hensley the Gorillas were held out of the end zone.

Unfortunately, on the very next play, Shafer had the ball jarred loose at the Coyote 4 yard line and one play later we were again tied with 7:20 remaining in the 2nd quarter.

The Coyotes had another drive stall inside the Gorillas 30 yard line but another good defensive stand gave the Coyotes the ball back and this time they would make good on the drive that was capped off by a nice 14 yard Quentin Shafer run followed by a third consecutive PAT by Chapman to

Pups Pound the Gorillas in District Victory

The Borden County Pups got off to a fast start on the beautiful field turf at Gorilla Stadium in Trent.

The Pups got a quick interception by 8th grader Blake Turner and classmate Austin Fields wasted little time as he carried the ball over from 24 yards out on the first play to give the Pups a quick 6 to 0 lead.

The Pups forced the home team Gorillas into a quick 3 and out and then 7th grader Tanner Richey took the Pups first offensive play for a second score covering 48 yards to push the lead to 12 to 0. Classmate Steven Howard was stopped just short of the goal line on the extra-point.

The Pups would take over on downs as Chance Taylor sacked the quarterback to give the visiting Pups the ball.

The Pups decided to go to the air on this possession as Tanner Richey connected on a quarterback screen pass for 15 yards followed by a nice 18 yard hook up between 7th grader Riley Smith to 8th grader Austin Tyler. Riley connected with his center and classmate Matthew Roberson for a 4 yard touchdown pass on the next play and then followed that with a connection to another classmate Valerio Hernandez for the extra-point and a comfortable 19 to 0 lead.

After forcing another punt by the Gorillas, Austin Fields set sail on his second carry of the contest and traveled 63 yards to pay dirt behind some solid blocks by Austin Tyler, Mat-

thew, Steven Howard, Tanner, and Blake.

Riley Smith connected with 8th grader Luke Burkett for the extra-point to extend the lead to 26 to 0.

The Gorillas returned the ensuing kick-off to cut the lead to 26 to 7 only to see the favor returned as Tanner Richey took the Gorilla kick-off back 56 yards to regain the lead. Riley Smith again threw for the extra-point as he connected with 8th grader Chance Taylor on a screen play for the extra-point and a 33 to 7 lead at halftime.

On the Pups first possession of the 2nd half Austin Fields followed a couple of plays by the 2nd team offense of Chris Teel, Luis Andrade, Luke, Steven, Chance, Valerio and Riley, with his third touchdown of the game on his 3rd touch of the game as he carried the ball into the end zone from 30 yards out.

Chance ran the ball in for the extra-point and a commanding 40 to 7 lead. After the home team Gorillas scored a touchdown of their own against the Pups 2nd team defense, the Pups continued to rotate plays between the 2nd team and the 1st team offenses.

Tanner Richey pushed the lead to 46 to 14 on a 33 yard run behind great cut blocks by Austin Fields and Blake midway thru the 3rd quarter.

On the next offensive possession, Austin Fields converted a 3rd down play into his 4th touchdown on the evening covering 52 yards in a very short time. This pushed the score to 52 to 14.

The Gorillas would get another touchdown to make the score 52 to 20 before the Coyote second team ran out the final 3:30 of the contest behind some solid running by Chance and Steven.

The victory moves the Pups to 2-0 in district play and 6-0 on the season.

The Pups will have a showdown with the Hermleigh Cardinals here at 6:00 Thursday. The winner of this contest will be the district champion. The Cardinals are very good ball club and this should present a serious challenge for the young Pups. Good job guys and good luck in your quest for a district championship.

regain their 8 point lead at 24 to 16 lead going in to half time. The 2nd half started out good for the Coyotes as they got the solid defensive effort to produce a quick 3 and out. The Coyotes then moved the ball inside the Gorilla 15 yard line and looked primed to take a two touchdown lead, but as has been the case much of the season a miscue put the Coyotes in a long yardage situation and they could not overcome the situation as they would turn the ball over on downs.

The Gorillas would capitalize on the Coyote miscue and tie the game with :43 left in the 3rd quarter. In the 4th quarter, the coyotes would again regain the lead as Michael Cooley would join in on the scoring act as he carried the ball over the goal line from 14 yards out to push the score to 30 to 24 but this time the PAT was blocked.

The Coyotes defense looked primed and ready to put the finishing touches on the game as they forced the visitors into a 4th and 13 play at their own 22 yard line, but a busted defensive coverage resulted in a 58 yard touchdown play to tie

the score at 30. The Gorillas had the opportunity to take their first lead of the game, but the PAT was just wide and the score remained knotted at 30.

The Coyotes had no success on their next possession as they were forced to punt for the first time on the evening. The Gorillas took possession of the ball on their own 20 yard line after a nice 49 yard punt by Shafer. The Gorillas converted another huge fourth down play, but Shafer turned in the biggest defensive play of the game for the time being as he intercepted the errant Gorilla pass and returned it to the Gorilla 35 yard line.

After moving the ball inside the 20 yard line, the Coyotes looked primed to win the game in the final seconds, but the Gorillas stepped up and ended the Coyotes threat with an interception inside the 5 yard line to send the game to over time.

In overtime, the Gorillas won the toss and elected to go on offense first. The young Coyote defense stepped up and forced the Gorillas into a 4th and 4 situation and after Karl Lamming and Flynn Chapman closed down the play the Go-

rilla runner tried to reverse his field, but John Hensley, and Michael Cooley tripped the runner up before Flynn Chapman put the finishing touches on the Gorilla runner to end their offensive possession.

The Coyotes would then have their offensive possession.

The Coyotes wasted little time as a nice 8 yard run by Michael Cooley followed by a nifty 10 yard run by Quentin Shafer set the Coyote up at the 7 yard line. Flynn Chapman carried the ball inside the one yard line on first down play.

The Coyotes were held out of the end zone on the next play and then were pushed back by a procedure penalty, but that just gave the Coyotes more room as sophomore Michael Cooley took the Valentine pitch and scampered the 7 yards to victory lane. The Coyotes added their fourth PAT to give us our final and homecoming classic victory at 38 to 30.

Leading the way for the Coyotes was Quentin Shafer with 12 carries for 129 yards and two touchdowns. Quentin also had 16 tackles and an interception.

Michael Cooley added 110 yards on 16 carries and two touchdowns while contributing on defense with 12 tackles.

Logan Howard had a team high 21 tackles, John Hensley added 18 tackles and one completion for 39 yards and a touchdown.

Miles Valentine was 3 of 7 for 61 yards and a touchdown, and was in on 3 tackles.

Flynn Chapman was in on 15 tackles and had one completion for 24 yards and 3 carries for 17 yards.

Karl Lamming was in on 10 tackles, while Brendan Tarleton played some quarterback and Carlos Hernandez snapped the ball most of the evening.

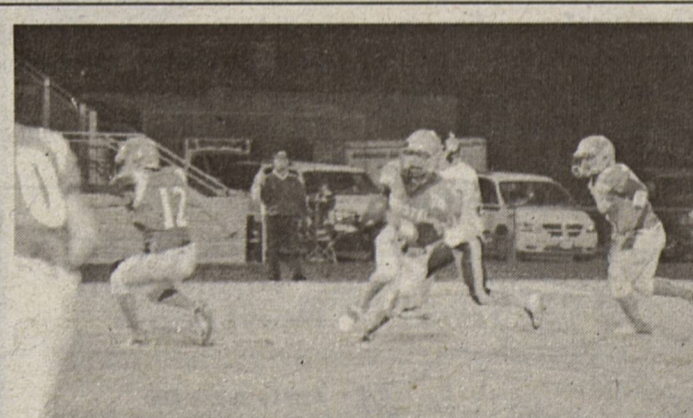

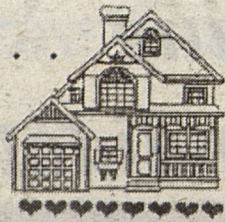

Taking Care: Tips for Making Cleaning Easier on Your Body

Regardless of whether you are doing deep cleaning or just following your basic cleaning routine, it is important that you take it easy on your body.

There's no need to strain while you clean. There are many great products out there today to make cleaning a lot easier on you, your body, your pocketbook and even help you save time! You just have to find those products that fit your lifestyle. Until then, here are some back-saving tips and tricks.

* You've heard of tennis elbow, but who would have thought you could actually injure yourself while scrubbing the tub? It happens all the time, according to David Lipetz, director of rehabilitation for Westside Spine and Joint Rehabilitation in Los Angeles. "If you're bending incorrectly while cleaning the tub or twisting to get to a hard-to-reach spot in the shower, you can hurt yourself." Lipetz says doing the wrong thing over and over again takes its toll on your body. Here are some common mistakes people make while cleaning house—and some tips for avoiding injuries.

* Double kneeling. Avoid kneeling on both knees to scrub the floor, tub or shower. If you

have to get down on your knees, try kneeling on one knee and then switching to the other one every minute to minimize the pressure and disperse it.

* Bending at the back. When tackling household chores, follow the old saying "bend at the knees and not the back." While your knees are slightly flexed, keep a hollow in your back, the opposite of rounding your back. This will help minimize back strain.

* Overreaching. When cleaning windows that are beyond your reach, use a stool or a step ladder so you don't hyperextend your back. Or, better yet, try a cleaning product with an ergonomic handle. Whenever you're reaching, keep your reach just shy of your full arm extension to minimize straining your shoulder and spine.

* Stretch when you're done. Cleaning is exercise, and, just like after finishing a workout, you should stretch when you're done. Take a few minutes to roll your head from side to side, stretch your arms over your head, and touch your toes when you're done scrubbing. You'll be glad you did when you're enjoying your clean house without back pain!

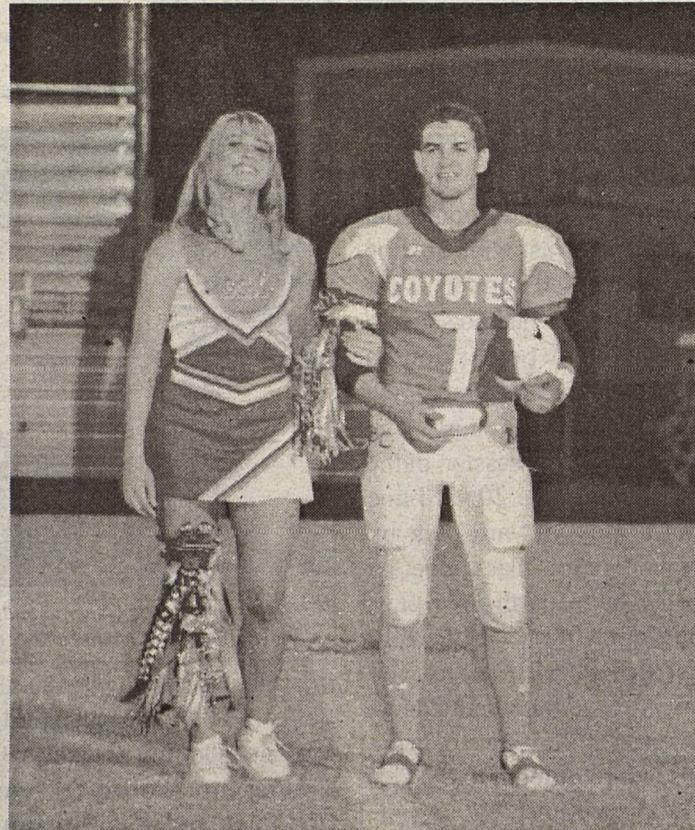

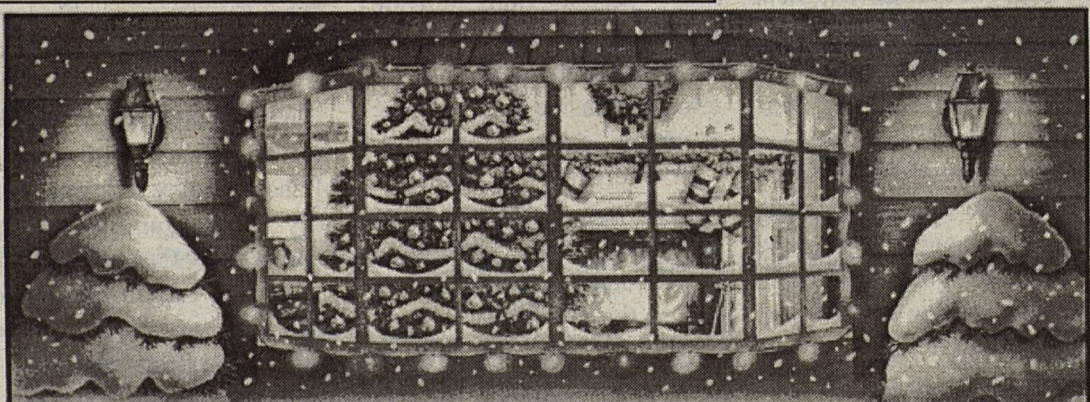

Borden County's Own... Artist in Residence

If you've never been in a boys' football dressing room, now might be the time to visit one, especially at Borden High School.

A visitor today would see the typical smelly work out clothes, the weight machines, the cleats, and the pads.

Thanks to Borden County artist Kevva Anderson, anyone taking a peak inside will now see a work of art—and no, we're not talking about an old poster of Emmitt Smith on the wall.

A major art undertaking by Anderson greets the coaches and players now and reminds them of what their ultimate goal should be: **meet the challenge.**

Anderson, prompted by a call from Coach Peter Benavidez, attempted something she as an artist had not done before: paint a mural and paint a mural on a rough brick wall. The endeavor had several

stages.

"I got on the internet for ideas and then drew a sketch to scale," Anderson said. "The wall is rough brick so after they primed it for me I used a joint compound to smooth out where I was going to paint objects."

With help from coaches, maintenance workers, and some teachers, Anderson completed the mural logging thirty-eight hours of work. One portion of the mural has a 3-D effect, a new Coyote logo painted on 1" plywood and placed in the center.

The objects Anderson created definitely have a sports theme but a unique rural touch to them that are reflective of Borden County's multi-faceted athletic program. The finishing touch is a quote from the late Brandon Adcock, a talented Borden County athlete who died in 1991. "Meet the Challenge" was Adcock's signature reminder to himself and to those

around him. That legacy now will live on in Anderson's mural, a personal reminder to student athletes that their contribution goes way beyond touchdowns and winning.

Even though the mural is the first for Anderson, other works of hers grace school property. The Coyotes in the new gymnasium as well as the Cheerleader Coyote on the south wall of the new gym are her handiwork.

"I painted the Coyotes in the gym and the Cheerleader Coyote in memory of my friend, Karan Key," Anderson said. "There will never be anyone with more school spirit than Karan."

Anderson admits that her talent is God-given. Her mother and maternal grandfather both had artistic and creative interests, but Anderson never had any formal training in art until she attended Southwest Texas State University (today Texas State University) in San Marcos.

Today, the local artist stays busy with numerous projects ranging from painting on boards to carving rocks. She is now taking orders for Christmas notecards which she de-

signs and paints.

"I always have a lot of projects in mind. It seems like just finding the time to get them done is always the problem," Anderson said.

Borden County students are thankful Anderson made the time to create such a special gift that will last for years. Ander-

son is thankful to the coaches and Mr. Thomas for the opportunity to free lance on such a large canvas.

Meeting the challenge—something Kevva Anderson has done well by using her talent in, of all places, a sweaty boys' dressing room.

Now that's art.

House Joint Resolution 36, which passed the Texas House unanimously, will appear on the ballot on November 6, 2007, as Proposition 14.

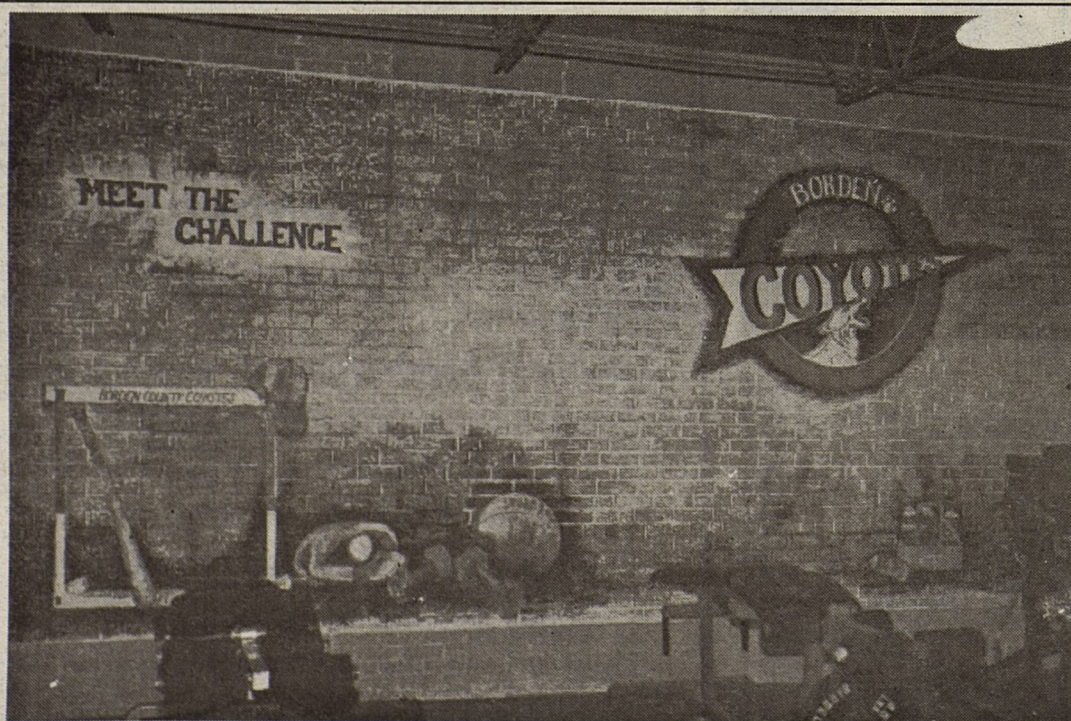

Proposition 14 would not create any additional expense for the State and would bring an end to the delay, expense and inefficiencies in the administration of justice created by the vacancy in a court when a judge reaches the mandatory retirement age of 75 and is required to immediately retire.

We respectfully request that you support Proposition 14 at the polls on November 6, 2007, or at early voting beginning October 22, 2007.

Comanche Has A Windmill Man

"They're the sentinels of he plains, they called them. Lot of people used windmills for landmarks, for navigation, for travel. They stuck up above everything, so they could see them a long ways off.

People used windmills for scouting the territory, looking for their kids, they'd get up there to signal their neighbors, they did a lot of things on their windmills."

Cliff Conway has a windmill business in Comanche. "There's plenty of windmills to work on. I work around a hundred mile radius of Comanche trying to keep these old things going. I've been doing it now for 24 years."

Cliff says the major problems he encounters on windmills are from wind damage and neglect. "Biggest thing is lack of oil. If people would just put oil in them when they need it, they wouldn't have near as many problems with them." He says a lot of people collect windmills.

"At one time there were over a hundred companies making windmills in the United States. The Aermotor Company out of Chicago made windmills until 1960. Out of all the mills that have ever been made, theirs is kind of the Cadillac. They've had the best lastability, therefore I work mostly on Aermotors. There are a few Bakers, a few Dempsters, and a few Heller-Allers. There are several other different brands that I work on, but mostly Aermotors."

Aermotors are still being made in San Angelo. "A lot of these windmills that I work on have never been overhauled. And they've been up

for 80 years. It's just amazing that there's never been a mechanical invention that man has come up with that seems to last as long as a windmill."

Cliff doesn't mind climbing a windmill tower.

"It's pretty rewarding. That's I guess what fascinated me about getting into this business. The view from the top of the windmill. I just love to see scenery and you can really see it from up there."

People who grew up to the sound of a windmill still love that sound today.

"A lot of folks have a sentimental value attached to their windmills. They tell me 'that was my grandpa's windmill.' I think they like the little rhythm that it makes as the rod goes up and down. That's what most people prefer." Cliff says as long as he's able to climb windmills, he'll be working on them.

The windmill meant a lot to the early pioneers. It was their own personal statue of liberty. Descendants of those early pioneers may live in the city, but they go to the old home place and listen to the sound of the windmill. And they remember.

In the 3 1/2 roping, Max Jones and Ray Paul took 1st place. Max Jones won the horse blanket for high money winner of the day.

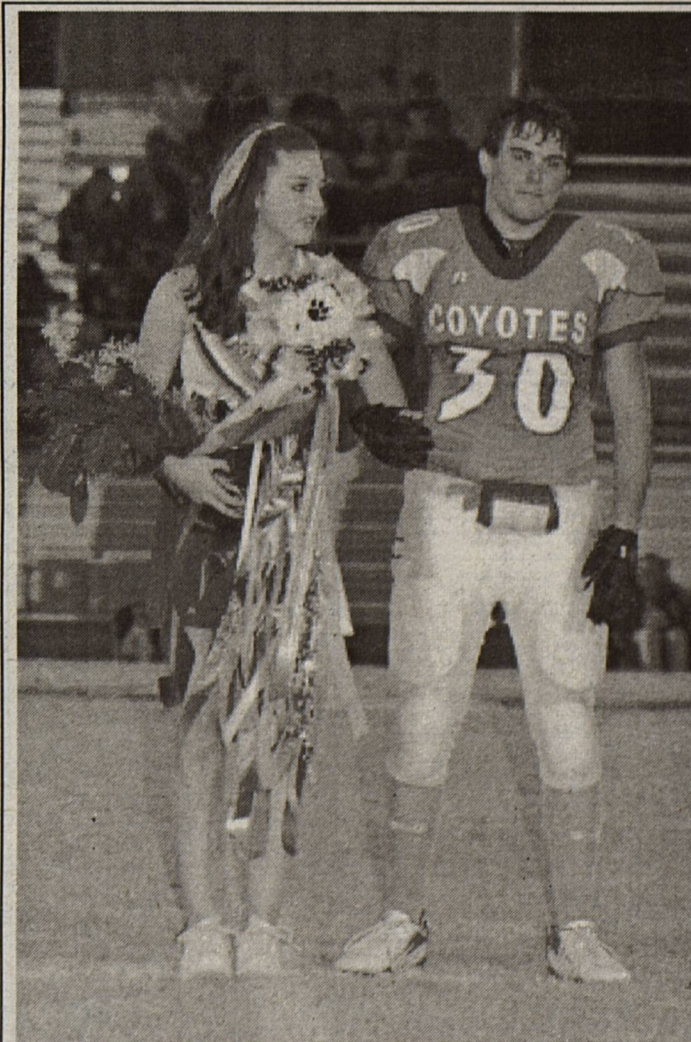
A concession stand was also provided. It went over very well with great food, drinks, and homemade brownies.
