Commodity Organizations Ask U.S. Senate To Oppose Effort to Gut Farm Bill Safety Net

— Twenty-six organizations representing farmers and ranchers from coast to coast are calling upon the U.S. Senate to oppose an effort to gut the safety net provided to America's farmers in the 2007 farm bill. The November 16 letter urged Senators to oppose the Farm, Ranch, Equity, Stewardship and Health (FRESH) Act (S. 2228) as either a standalone bill or as an amendment to the 2007 farm bill. "The FRESH Act eliminates the current safety net provided to US producers. It is critical to remember that farm bills are written for the long-term rather than

short-term," the letter stated. According to the groups, the commodity title of the farm bill has already been reduced by \$57 billion: "All told, the commodity programs are projected to be about 10 percent of total farm bill spending, while more than 80 percent of the farm bill spending is already slated for nutrition and conservation programs." Trade is also a major concern for U.S. producers: "US farm policy should continue toward a more level playing field in the global market by providing assistance to America's farmers. However, this goal is not achieved by writing a farm bill that complies with what someone assumes will be the potential outcome of the WTO negotiations." The letter concluded, "While we support strong conservation, nutrition, and energy programs, additional support for these programs should not come at the expense of adequate funding for the safety net for American farmers." 

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Tips for Safely Receiving and Sending Food Gifts

It's that time of year again refrigerator or freezer.

and we know the holiday season can't be far away! Maybe you are looking to make your holiday shopping a little easier by ordering and sending some of your friends and family gift boxes of cheese, meats, or delicious desserts. If you are planning to send or receive perishable foods that will decay rapidly if not refrigerated by mail, follow these tips to keep them safe. Meat, poultry, fish and other perishable foods need to be handled carefully and in a timely manner in order to prevent the growth of harmful bacterial which could cause foodborne illness. During the holidays, many people send food gifts. These items, whether store bought or homemade, need to be handled properly.

Commissioners Court of Texas Cooperating

According to figures from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), about 76 million cases of foodborne illness are reported each year. About 325,000 of these cases require hospitalization; about 5,000 people die. All foods should be handled safely, including food gifts.

Perishable food gifts must arrive cold to be safe to eat. If you receive a gift that is not cold at the time of delivery, do not eat it! Instead, notify the sender. It=s better to be safe than sorry. Food gifts marked APerishable@ or AKeep Refrigerated(a) need to be opened immediately and placed in the

If you are ordering food gifts, specify overnight delivery and request a frozen gel pack or dry ice in the packaging. Transit time and product packaging B foam or heavy cardboard designed to keep them cold B are also vital.

Foods prepared at home may also be shipped to friends and family, but care is required. First, be sure to follow proper food safety procedures such as hand washing and prevention of cross contamination when preparing foods. Visit www.fightbac.org for more information about basic food safety.

Once you are ready to ship the foods, make sure items are frozen solid or refrigerator cold prior to shipping. Pack in an insulated cooler or heavy cardboard box with a frozen gel pack. Dry ice can also be used, but don=t let it touch your hands or the food. Let the recipient know the box contains dry ice. Wrap the box in two layers of brown paper and mark it APerishable B Keep Refrigerated@.

Ship perishable food gifts by overnight mail and try not to send packages at the end of the week because delivery could be delayed over the weekend. Let the recipient know a food-bearing package is on its way so someone can be home to accept delivery and get the food under refrigeration immediately. It's best to send food gifts to

someone=s home. If you send them to a workplace, the food could be accidentally left at the office or in the trunk of a car. Confirm that someone will be home and send your surprise to their house.



thank Bill and Beth LaRue from Brownfield and their family for providing horse drawn surrey during the Lighting of the Star festivities. It was a highlight for many that attended.



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LEGAL NOTICE

STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF BORDEN

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning;

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners Court of Borden County that all outdoor burning is prohibited in the county for 90 days from the date of adoption of this Order, Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statutes. This Order does not prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality for: (1) firefighter training: (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting of agricultural crops; or, (4) burns that are conducted by a prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

In accordance with Local Government Code 352.081 (h) a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor. punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00 ADOPTED this 13th day of November, 2007 by a vote of 4



Performing A Family's Oral History

Jan Hart of Temple goes to schools, churches, synagogues and libraries performing the actual words spoken by her grandmother, Annie Harelik Novit.

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Jan's presentation is called Annie the Immigrant. It all stems from some tapes she found in storage closet.

In December of 1968, Annie sat down with her children, grand children and great grandchildren and told about her life as a young immigrant from Russia in the early 1900's.

A recording of the event was made and it stayed in that closet until 1986, when Jan got it out and listened to it.

Her grandmother had been dead five years and when she listened to the recording, Jan says she felt that her grandmother had returned to speak to her.

The tape begins, "My name is Annie Harelik Novit. I was born in the Russian village of Slavan in White Russia August 3, 1886."

One story tells about iceskating on the Berezina River in wintertime. In 1906 Russia was experiencing revolutionary times and it was becoming harder and harder for Jews in Russia.

They were beaten and their businesses and homes were burned.

Thoughts turned to immigrating to America. The family eventually settled in Dublin, Texas and opened a store. "I felt compelled to capture our family history on paper as a gift to future generations of the family," says Jan.

She transcribed the recording onto 37 pages and turned them

into a book. She included copies of naturalization documents. After she passed it out to family members, she heard from cousins shortly after they received it. "They told me they cried and laughed and went back to re-read parts of it. They had the best time remembering our grandparents and told me I needed to get it

published." Jan wrote a children's book titled *Hanna the Immigrant*, published by Eakin Press. She got the idea to get out the recording of her grandmother because she was looking for a project. "My kids were all grown up by that point and I was bored, suffering from empty nest syndrome. It has just snowballed. I had no idea what would happen from my listening to those tapes."

Jan dresses in a Russian peasant costume and talks with a
