

Gold All Around BC U.I.L. Students Excel Once Again

Gold...The color of kings...the color of wealth...and for students of Borden County Elementary and Junior High, it is the color of champions.

When the final bus rolled into Gail last Wednesday night following the District 9-A, Zone 1 U.I.L. Academic Meet, the gold hardware on it was comparable to King Tut's tomb.

Both BC Elementary and Junior High more than doubled their next closest competitors in the overall contests to win the meet with yet another convincing reason that Borden County U.I.L. academic squads are in good shape for years to come.

In the elementary division (grades 2-5), Borden County amassed 713.3 total points in twenty-four events. Highland was second with 348, and Westbrook followed in third with 257.3. Ira and Hermleigh finished out in fourth and fifth with 133 and 111.3 points respectively.

Borden County Junior High students did more of the same in their own division, finishing with a whopping 1286 points in fortytwo events. Westbrook was second in this division with 663, and Highland was third with 498. Once again, Ira (225) finished in fourth, and Hermleigh (170) was fifth.

Borden County's production of The Shadow Box tells the story of three different cancer patients living in a treatment center and their fight against the terrible disease. Interspersed with hope, humor, and coming to terms with the illness, the play has been quite a challenge for junior high students. In the process of developing this 1977 Tony Award winner for "Best Play," the cast has learned a great deal about the disease's impact not only on the individual, but also on the families involved. Therefore, the students participating would like to dedicate the community performance to those in their families and our community who have so bravely fought cancer.

Eighth grader Chris Teel ("Joe"), along with sixth graders Meaghan Herridge ("Maggie") and Matthew Proulx ("Steven"), share the story of a couple who must come to terms with telling their son of his dad's illness. In another storyline, sixth grader Zach McMeans ("Brian") brings the reality of cancer to his best friend - seventh grader Steven Howard as "Mark" and to his ex-wife - Taylor Gass as "Beverly." Seventh grader Teryn Soto ("Agnes") presents a third plot in the play as she helps her aging mother - "Felicity" played by sixth grader Mollie McMeans - cope with the disease. Along the way, an "Interviewer," played by seventh grader Celina Guerrero, leads the cancer-stricken patients through the process.



Helpful Tips for Holiday Baking

On your mark, get set, GO! Does your holiday baking feel like a race? It can sometimes feel that way, especially with the many tasks we have to accomplish over the holidays. However, baking doesn't have to be one of them! Below are few helpful tips to help make your holiday baking (and baking anytime of the year) a "breeze!"

Ingredients

- * It is always best to use fresh ingredients in baking. Use the freshest ingredients you can for quality baked goods.
- * It is also important to make sure that refrigerated items are set to room temperature before incorporating them in your recipe (unless otherwise specified in the recipe). To bring items like eggs, milk, and butter to room temperature, set them out on the counter for 30 minutes prior to recipe preparation. Having these foods at room temperature will make a big difference in the product.
- * Sugar has an indefinite shelf life if stored properly (airtight container).
- * Flour and Meal (6 to 12 months depending on the type)
- * The original paper packaging is fine for long term cabinet storage as long as the package has not been open.
- * Most types of flour keep longer in a cool, dry cabinet if stored in a sealed plastic or glass container.
- * The refrigerator is a very good storage area for flour, but the use of a sealed container is

even more important to prevent the flour from absorbing moisture as well as odors and flavors from other foods stored in the refrigerator.

 - * Flour that does not look or smell good should not be used.

Follow these tips to help you use spices and herbs when flavor and quality are best:

- * As a general rule, keep:
- 1 year for herbs or ground spices
 - 2 years for whole spices
- * Buy a smaller container until you determine how fast you'll use a particular herb or spice.
 - * To test freshness:

If it smells strong and flavorful, it's probably still potent.

To smell whole spices, such as peppercorns and cinnamon sticks, crush or break them to release their aroma.

- * Initial quality will influence shelf life.
- * Label date of purchase on container with a permanent marking pen.

Measuring

- * Use the right tools: Liquid and dry standard measuring spoons and cups, and correct pan sizes. All recipes use a standard dry-measuring cup for dry ingredients, including flours, cornmeal, cocoa, granulated and powdered sugars.
- * Always stir flour to "loosen" before measuring. Sifting it first is necessary only if

the recipe calls for it. Spoon dry ingredients into the correct-size cups until they are overflowing. Level off with a straight edge (knife or metal spatula). Tip: Keep a spoon in flour bins for convenient stirring and measuring.

- * Measure brown sugar by packing it firmly into the dry measuring cup and leveling off. It should hold its shape when turned out of the cup.
- * Measure liquids such as water, milk, vegetable oil, honey or syrups in a clear glass or plastic liquid measuring cup that is placed on the counter. Bend down to check the amount at eye level. Use a rubber spatula to scrape out all the liquid. Tip: For easier removal of honey or molasses, grease or spray the cup or spoon first.
- * Use measuring spoons, not eating utensils, to measure small amounts. Don't guess. Use the exact measurements and level off spoons with a straight edge spatula or knife. For dry ingredients, dip the measuring spoon into the container until overflowing, then level off. For liquid ingredients, pour liquid until it reaches the top edge of the spoon. Measure over a separate cup or bowl so any extra does not fall into the mix.
- * Always use a thermometer to measure liquid temperature before adding yeast.

Baking Pans and Oven Tips

- * Don't crowd the oven. The pans should never touch each other or the sides of the oven, or be placed over or under each other on the racks.
- * Grease pans using a piece of paper towel, rub a small amount of shortening, butter or margarine evenly over the bottom and on sides of pans, if directed. A small amount of pan spray may be used and spread over the pan, also using the paper towel technique.
- * Prevent sharp edges on muffins, bar cookies or quick

breads by greasing the muffin cups or pans only on the bottom and halfway up the sides so the batter is higher than the grease line. This is one time you might not want to use a pan spray.

* To test for doneness in cakes, quick breads and bar cookies, use a toothpick inserted in the center. The toothpick should come out clean and dry, or have only a few crumbs clinging. Yeast breads, rolls and loaves should be golden brown



LEGAL NOTICE

STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF BORDEN

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning;

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners Court of Borden County that all outdoor burning is prohibited in the county for 90 days from the date of adoption of this Order, Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statutes. This Order does not prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality for: (1) firefighter training: (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting of agricultural crops; or, (4) burns that are conducted by a prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

In accordance with Local Government Code 352.081 (h) a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00

Backstage With Big Time Bands

During Charles Sweeney's high school years in Big Spring he started hanging out at one of the local radio stations.

He was fascinated with newsgathering and spent a lot of time in the newsroom listening to the police radio and scanning news coming in on the Associated Press teletype machine.

When he went away to the University of North Texas he got part time employment on the college radio station and at a commercial station in a nearby city.

After graduation he headed for Houston and joined the staff of KPFT, a community station. That means no commercials and not much money, but a lot of fun and creativity.

One of the things he did was to hand out recorders to staff members and go from one end of Westheimer street to the other, interviewing all types of people. At the time, Westheimer stretched across all of Houston. He took all the interviews and put together a two-hour documentarv

Charles had the nickname Chip while growing up in Big Spring. When he got out on his own people started calling him Scoop.

He moved to San Francisco and got a job with Zodiac News Service, which supplied offbeat stories to news outlets all over the country.

Later he became music editor for Zodiac and started covering the west coast music scene. Eventually he started managing bands and producing major concerts.

"Basically we'd arrive at some cow pasture at 3 or 4 in the morning with truckloads of equipment and literally build a city," says Scoop.

"It's a lot more than just putting up a stage. You have to have a complete infrastructure with a totally self-supporting electrical system to power everything. You have to bring in water, toilets, and vendors to feed the people and we do all this in about 6 or 8 hours. By the end of the night you have to tear it all down. It's a busy 24 hours." During the Judd's farewell tour in San Bernardino, the crowd was larger than expected and the diesel powered generators got a workout.

"Halfway through the show, I got a call that the low fuel lights were coming on all the generators. That was bad. We ended up having to get 5-gallon water bottles and siphon diesel out of every tour bus and truck on the lot.

The cops thought there was a

real crime wave going on and several of them came up and asked us what we were doing. We told them we were trying to prevent a disaster. We ended up with a fleet of golf carts driving around the outside of the crowd, then filling up the generators during the show."

The audience numbered 35,000, some 10,000 more than expected. 500 porta-potties had to be moved a hundred yards further back to make more room for the crowd.

"We sent forklifts back there to pickup these things and move them. Every once in awhile there would be a scream from one of them. We'd apologize for the surprise move, but we didn't charge them for the ride." Scoop now lives in Elgin.
