Reagan to name transition team

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The trappings - and responsibilities — of high office already are beginning to descend on President-elect Ronald Reagan.

Among the trappings are beefed-up Secret Service protection, phones to connect him with any part of the world, and other special treatment that not even a Hollywood star can expect.

The responsibilities are more complex, including the naming of the task force that will guide the transfer of power to a Republican administration, the choice of Cabinet officers and other high officials, and the opening of relations with other world leaders.

Reagan scheduled a half-hour nationally televised news conference today with Vice President-elect George Bush to name the transition team. As for those being considered for permanent posts, sources say some well-known officials from past Republican administrations are included, among them Henry Kissinger, William Simon and Alexander Haig.

Expected to be clarified at today's news conference is the status of Richard V. Allen, Reagan's senior campaign adviser on foreign policy who was thought to have an inside track to become national security adviser before his abrupt resignation four days prior to the election

Allen has denied reports that he sought to use his White House post during the Richard M. Nixon administration for personal financial gain, but his future in a Reagan administration still is uncertain. However, he is expected to head the foreign policy

And among those reportedly under consideration for permanent posts are

-Kissinger, a former secretary of state who could get his old job

-Haig, a former NATO commander and Nixon's chief of staff, also being considered for secretary of

-Simon, former secretary of treasury who may return to his old post, too.

-Alan Greenspan, chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers under former President Gerald Ford. Greenspan is also mentioned for secretary of

-George P. Shultz, secretary of treasury under Nixon, reportedly in line for several positions. including secretary of state or a Cabinet-rank domestic policy coordinator.

-Caspar Weinberger, budget director under Nixon. on the list for the same position under Reagan

-Retiring Sen. Richard Schweiker, R-Pa., among candidates for secretary of health and human services or housing and urban development.

Reagan held the first of several meetings with Bush and other associates Wednesday to discuss appointment of the transition team and other officials.

The traditional White House guard was also holding meetings on leasing a house in Reagan's Pacific Palisades neighborhood — where homes sell for about \$750.000 — and the White House communications agency is to arrive in force in a few days to install the telephone network that will link the president-elect with anyone in the world within reach of a phone

Reagan is expected to take about a week's vacation at his ranch near Santa Barbara, beginning Sunday. before flying east. Aides say he will return to the West Coast periodically during the next 21/2 months

Various campaign aides have said that in Washington. Reagan would stay in Blair House, the government guest quarters across Pennsylvania Avenue from the White House.

Edwin Meese, Reagan's chief of staff, said some foreign leaders who are scheduled to be in Washington before the inauguration on Jan. 20 have expressed a desire to meet the president-elect, and Reagan plans to consult extensively with world leaders during the interim three months.

At a victory dinner Wednesday night. Reagan said that among the congratulatory messages he had received was one from Soviet Premier Leonid Brezhnev, which he described as saying Brezhnev looked forward to cooperation and so forth.

Reagan, who has promised to scrap the SALT II treaty with the Soviets and take a hard line in new negotiations, was asked how he felt about receiving a message from the communist leader

"I figured it was only protocol." the president-elect

Iranians predict delay in hostage release Carter reverses his

The deputy speaker of Iran's Parliament says he expects Ronald Reagan's election to delay U.S. acceptance of Iran's terms for freeing the 52 American hostages But one of Reagan's chief aides said the president-elect would cooperate with President Carter in the effort to get the hostages released

Because Carter was already in office, we would have reached a solution faster if he were re-elected. With Reagan's victory this will need a long time." Hojatolislam Musavi Khoeini said Wednesday in an interview with Greek television.

Reagan's campaign chief of staff. Edwin Meese, said the president-elect's staff would "work cooperatively with the present administration to provide for a continuity of government policy" and would "work out a way in which to cooperate in any fashion that might help our national interest and help in getting the hostages home

Asked if Reagan might try to veto Carter's plans

concerning the hostages if he found them unacceptable. Meese said he "would have a hard time believing that could happen.

Carter said he would keep Reagan informed but stressed to reporters in Washington that "I'll be the president for the next 21/2 months. The full constitutional authority of the office will be mine.

Carter said he doubted Reagan "would materially change the posture we are maintaining" in the effort to get the hostages freed. 'I doubt that anyone in my position the last 12

months would have done substantially different from what I did." he added.

The Carter administration has given no indication when it will reply to Iran's four conditions for the release of the hostages, who today were spending teir 369th day in captivity

Algerian Ambassador Redha Malek, who represents ran in Washington, met for the third consecutive day Wednesday with Deputy Undersecretary of State

Warren M. Christopher. The State Department said it was a routine meeting and refused to say whether any messages were delivered.

State Department spokesman John Trattner said the U.S. government was "definitely amenable" to face-to-face negotiations with Iran. But earlier this week an aide to Iranian Prime Minister Mohammad Ali Rajai said his government had no plans to deal directly with the United States.

Trattner also expressed disappointment that the Iranian government had not taken custody of the hostages from the young Islamic militants who have been holding them since they seized the U.S. Embassy in Tehran on Nov. 4, 1979

Iran's four demands are the release of the billions of dollars in Iranian assets frozen in the United States. return of the assets which the late Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi and his family transferred abroad. withdrawal of American lawsuits against Iran and a U.S. pledge of non-interference in Iranian affairs.

According to tallies from the Grav County Clerk's office, county voters disapproved of a single property appraisal district. They also turned down the formation of Courts of Appeals, now called the Courts of Civil Appeals

amendments, with 57 percent supporting the single property appraisal entity in each county. Once formed. the board will appraise property for all political subdivisions. The appraisals will be used for ad valorem tax purposes

review for criminal cases by a 56 to 44 percent margin. The current Courts of Civil Appeals throughout the state will become Courts of Appeals. The regional courts will hear appeals of criminal cases from the state district courts

-Amendment No. 7 - allows counties with less than

5,000 population to use county equipment for private road work. Citizens would pay a fair market price for

—Amendment No. 9 - permitting written agreements between spouses to maintain individual ownership of property. A majority of 70 percent supported this

Amendments No. 2 and No. 5 were turned down by both the Gray County and state voters.

The appeal of pretrial rulings by the state No. 2 failed to pass the vote. Under the proposal, a prosecution or defense lawyer could seek immediate appellate review of certain pretrial rulings.

In Gray County, 5,488 of the electorate opposed the amendment, 2.952 were for the proposal. It lost by a 52 to 48 percent margin in the state.

Opponents of the amendment claimed it would have a negative effect on the attempts to streamline the new appeal system

Carter pension \$69,000

WASHINGTON (AP) — When President Carter leaves office next Jan. 20, he will receive a \$69.630 annual pension, a share in \$1 million for administrative help in winding up his affairs. \$150,000 a year for office staff, and Secret Service protection for life.

The president's annual pension, which is the same as a Cabinet officer's salary, will increase as Cabinet salaries rise

Bill Nichols, general counsel of the Office of Management and Budget, said Carter and Vice President Walter F. Mondale will share up to \$1

million for six months for expenses in finishing

their official business. The money has been authorized by Congress and probably will be appropriated when the House and Senate return next week for their post-election session, he said.

In addition, for the first 30 months after his presidency ends. Carter is entitled to \$150,000 a year for staff help. After 30 months, that decreases to \$96,000 a year.

He and his wife. Rosalynn, will receive Secret Service protection for life, unless they decline it. So will the president's 13-year-old daughter. Amy, until she is 16.

Students protest Reagan victory, hope to form nationwide movement

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Campus activists who watched a rally against President-elect Ronald Reagan dwindle into a sit-in over a hodgepodge of university causes say they'll be back - and hope to build a new nation wide student movement

Fifty-two people were arrested Wednesday as police dragged protesters out of a University of California administration building. On Tuesday, 3,000 people marched in the streets of Berkeley to protest Reagan's victory.

Protesters said they planned another rally today. One demonstration "probably won't do anything. But more and more demonstrations are going to do something," said student Teresa Clarke. Others shouted they hoped to spark a student

movement similar to that of 15 years ago.

"We're going to be doing this a lot," said satirist Stoney Burke, one of the protest organizers. Campus police arrested 35 students and 17 others after a 51/2-hour protest that moved from Sproul Plaza, site of anti-war rallies of the 1960s and early 1970s, to the campus ROTC building and then to the

administration building, where 150 people occupied a stairwell. All 52 were charged with misdemeanor trespassing and 10 were charged with resisting arrest. They were released on their own recognizance and no arraignment date was set.

The rally was called "to build an educational movement against Reagan... when Reagan reinstates the draft and begins to cut back social programs," said Joe Lambert of the Berkeley Progressive Students Organization.

But the election was only a "catalyst" for a protest encompassing long-standing campus issues, Ms. Clarke explained.

Inside the occupied California Hall, dissidents handed out communist leaflets, denounced the campus ROTC - chanting "Hey, hey, ho, ho, ROTC has got to go" - and demanded an end to, the university's involvement in nuclear weapons research for the government, support for a campus child care center and increased Third World enrollment.

"I'm doing it (protesting) just to make a point about what's going on," explained one student.

The noisy sit-in between the first and second floors began about 2 p.m. As the protesters walked in, most university administrators walked out and the building was sealed off. Two men arrested then on counts that included disturbing the peace later were released on

Some minor damage reportedly was done to the walls near Chancellor Michael Heyman's office, and demonstrators outside later tried to toss food and other items through an open window to

The demonstration was legal until the building's regular closing time at 5 p.m., said campus police Chief William Beale. After that. the demonstrators were warned they were subject to arrest.

About 7:30 p.m., after more than half the group had complied with requests to leave, police entered the building, leading away some people and dragging others who went limp.



Mexico's oil reserve could be bad news

President Jose Lopez Portillo has again revised upward the official estimate of Mexico's petroleum and natural gas reserves — this time to the equivalent of 60 billion barrels of oil. Production is also rising. Mexico is the world's fifth largest oil producer - exceeded only by Saudi Arabia, Iraq, the United States and the Soviet Union.

With the Arab - dominated OPEC cartel struggling to maintain unity in its control of world prices and supplies, the emergence of Mexico as a major oil exporter, independent of OPEC, is good news. But there is growing awareness of the possibility that Mexico's oil bonanza could turn into bad news - for the Mexican people primarily and indirectly for the United States.

A study by the Rand Corp. for the U.S. Department of Energy explores the directions Mexico might take in developing its oil resources. The options range from keeping production relatively low in order to stretch out the lifetime of its reserves, to going all - out with production and exports to provide the capital for major development of the Mexican economy.

The temptation is to see the latter course as the best one, not only because Mexico desperately needs more jobs for its people, but for the sake of diversifying the sources of oil coming on the world market. But the Rand study concludes that Mexico is not likely to choose that path, for its own good, and recommends that the United States do nothing to encourage such fast - track

Potentially, Mexico within a few years could be exporting as much oil as formerly came from Iran. But look what happened to that oil - rich but ill starred country. Force - feeding Mexican development with big oil revenues could produce political, economic and social upheavals not unlike those that befell Iran. Mexico, then, would become a source of oil no more "secure" than present sources in the Middle East.

The Rand researchers point out that oil and politics can be a volatile mixture in Mexico. Pemex, the national oil company formed after the expropriation of foreign oil companies in 1938, has developed a mystique which "embodies the essence of Mexican nationalism." A government that cashes in too freely with revenues from oil exports would be seen as squandering Mexico's national

This philosophy came through in Lopez Portillo's recent state of the union message. "Mexico's oil is ours, and is for our own development," he declared. But that does not answer the question of how Mexico will transform a resource now lying in the earth into stable and fruitful economic growth, spreading its benefits throughout the population.

Synfuels boondoggle: let's get out of it

It's not surprising that the government's new synthetic fuels program bogged down in political disputes even before it started.

President Carter had sent five names to the Senate as directors of the quasigovernmental Synthetic Fuels Corp. The Republicans wanted him to fill only four positions of the seven - person board, leaving the balance for (they hope) a new president to fill after the election. One of Carter's nominees already has withdrawn his name from consideration.

The program has become a political football and is likely to remain one as long as it exists. It has authority to spend up to \$88 billion in loans and price guarantees for development of alternative fuels. That's a plum with terrific potential for patronage, pork barrel and influence - peddling. Congress would do better to reconsider and dissolve the program before it gets underway. We'd like to see the GOP candidate pledge to dissolve it if he's elected rather than squabbling about whether he'll get to appoint some of the directors.

The major premise of the program almost guarantees failure. It's designed to fund the most risky, most exotic kinds of projects, those that people who are putting up their own money rather than the taxpayers' have judged least likely to be successful. That should make it a haven for crackpots and fast talkers. Who gets the money will inevitably turn heavily on who has access to Congressmen, state and local officials and influential bureaucrats. Lobbying for the grants would create a whole mini - industry of consultants and line the pockets of the heavy - hitting lawyer lobbyists who throw their weight and contacts around Washington

We're aware that innovations often come from people who look or sound like crackpots who haven't been able to get themselves hardy by hidebound corporate research departments. The synthetic fuels program just might get lucky and fund a breakthrough. But the chances are pretty slim, and we don't see why the taxpayers should be funding this kind of gamble when the odds against success are so high.

This political flurry at the outset leaves no doubt about how highly politicized the synthetic fuels program will be. If politics already outweigh merit and promise, the odds against success become even heavier.

Congress should reverse itself and bail out of the synthetic fuels boondoggle immediately. Once it's established, it will become one of those sacrosanct pillars of the Washington establishment, and criticisms, no matter how justified, will be greeted with retorts along the lines of "are you against innovation and taking a few risks?

An intelligent observer can see the course the program is likely to take. We have an opportunity to cut our losses now. We should take advantage of it.

Taxes on stripper oil will destroy source

The United States has many sources of oil, foreign and domestic. One of the best known domestic sources is stripper oil - the oil obtained from wells producing only small amounts daily.

As often happens with government regulation, legislation aimed at big companies ends up destroying smaller companies. Such is the case with the stripper oil.

Stripper oil may appear to be a minor source of petroluem, but trickles sometimes add up to sizable streams. There are approximately 375,000 stripper wells in the United States with an annual production of 300 million barrels. That is close to the amount of crude coming from Alaska's North Slope or that derived from off - shore wells. Individually the wells may produce only a few barrels a day, added together that production plays an important part in supplying the nation's energy

The stripper wells, because of the tiny nature of their operation, have been exempt from many of the regulations that have plagued the rest of the oil industry. So since 1973, while oil prices in general were controlled, the stripper well operators were free to charge their own price. Of course, with only a few barrels a day to sell, no one was going to get rich, even with the price of oil at

The system seemed to be working, at least for the strippers, until the passage of the so - called windfall profits tax. Under the new tax, strippers must pay 30 percent of what they receive for oil sold above a specified price. It works out to about \$7.20 per barrel

The system is a disaster for stripper oil producers. Because the price of stripper oil has been deregulated all along the new system means nothing more than a massive tax increase to this part of the oil industry

The windfall profits tax will mean an average 20 percent reduction of income per well. People in the industry predict as many as 50,000 wells that produce over 75 million barrels of crude annually are likely to shut down. That's about

\$3 billion of oil per year at today's prices. * Stripper oil producers are pushing to have the windfall tax amended to leave them out. That makes sense. More importantly, why not repeal the whole thing in the process? This tax is going to do nothing more than suck billions out of the private sector and turn it over to the bure aucracy. That's no good

A 'clean hands' society

The decline of the American industrial system, which has become a major theme of the presidential campaign, results not only from counter - productive tax legislation but from a cultural bias.

In a tremendously informative article in The Atlantic, James Fallows, a former speechwriter for President Carter, cites the current dominance of what he calls the "paper entrepreneurs." By this, he means those Americans trained in law, finance, accountancy, who "manipulate complex systems of rules and numbers."

Mr. Fallows notes that our country's production of electrical engineers is down to 17,000 a year, whereas our law schools graduate 33,000 lawyers each year.

We have an adversary culture that depends on lawyers and accountants. Gone is the time when the principal focus of

manufacture of goods.

We also have, Mr. Fallows says, a "clean hands" society that looks down on heavy industry and employment in manufacturing. To be a factory owner or manufacturer has ceased to be a social ideal or goal for our educated youth. They think instead of careers as lawyers, doctors, and financial analysts.

Japan, which is fast overtaking the United States as the No. 1 industrial power, has 400 engineers and scientists for every 10,000 people. The United States has only

The clean hands occupations offer the most prestige and the most money. That's why we have a brain drain from manufacturing. This is a dangerous development, for our society as well as our real wealth depends on manufacturing, on

creating goods, not on manipulation of

In Mr. Fallows view, "our economic and social rewards have come unmoored from measures of true productivity." In great corporations, the leadership positions go to the financial specialists, not the engineers. Companies, under tremendous pressure from government agencies, turn away from building new factories to mergers and acquisitions -- again, a basically unproductive exercise

Much needs to be done to reverse this trend and to restore true entrepreneurship to its proper place as a social and economic ideal. Institutions of higher education must put new emphasis on careers in engineering. The government must get off the back of business so that it can invest in new productive enterprises and offer

rewarding careers to the engineering graduates

We need a fresh emphasis on invention, electronic, chemical and mechanical, and a de - emphasis of manipulative skills. This won't be possible, however, until the tax laws are changed so that companies can purchase the new tools and plant facilities that they need. Today, the government ignores the fact that the replacement for a \$40,000 machine tool may cost \$200,000.

This switch is necessary because the " gradual collapse of America's industrial system is resulting in a gradual collapse of our standard of living. As we turn to foreign made goods, automobiles and television sets, for example, more and more Americans are deprived of employment.

A significant change in social as well as political attitudes will restore American industry, renew employment opportunities and make possible the creation of new wealth. The change is necessary if American is to be No. 1 in the 1980s.

HELENA, Mont. (NEA) - The Texas congressional delegation is indignant about the tax laws here in Montana and neighboring Wyoming. Rep. J.J. Pickle, for example, claims they are "holding other states as economic hostages.

Reviling against the same "punishing" and "outrageous" taxes imposed by the two western states, Sen. Lloyd Bentsen claims the levies are unnecessarily inflating homeowners' electricity bills in

Dallas, Houston, Austin and San Antonio. Pickle and Bentsen, both Texas Democrats, are among the scores of politicians throughout the country currently attacking the severance taxes on coal production of 30 percent in Montana and 17 percent in Wyoming. (A severance tax is a levy usually imposed on non renewable resources.)

Joining in their campaign are mayors from Minneapolis and Detroit, senators from Arkansas and Washington, congressmen from Indiana and Mississippi and power companies from Wisconsin and Massachusetts.

But in almost every case, those protesters are responding to parochial interests while ignoring comparable taxes imposed by other states on other sources of

Pickle, for instance, insists that "Texas does not take advantage of other states who need our oil and gas." What he doesn't mention is that Texas this year will reap almost \$1.25 billion from its severance tax on fuels, compared with \$75.3 million collected in Montana.

Louisiana will receive more than \$540 million from oil and gas severance taxes, while Alaska will rake in a phenomenal \$2.3 billion from a mandatory 12.5 percent state royalty payment on oil production, a separate 12.25 percent production tax and a state income tax on petroleum companies. Indeed, oil - related levies have made Alaska's state government so wealthy that its legislature spent much of this year's session figuring out how to dispose of more than \$4 billion in windfall revenues.

While there's no clamor for a ceiling on oil and gas severance taxes, a concerted effort has been mounted in Washington, D.C., to limit to 12.5 percent the coalseverance taxes imposed by Montana and Wyoming

Why is the coal severance tax being attacked while oil and gas severance taxes are ignored?

The answer is largely related to the lack of political influence that make Montana and Wyoming appealing targets. The relatively small populations of the two states give them little numerical strength in the House, and neither state enjoys the advantages of representation by powerful legislators in either chamber of Congress.

Finally, the effort to place a cap on severance taxes is being orchestrated by the well - financed National Coal Consumers Alliance, a deceptively named group that doesn't even represent consumers. The organization has induced various state and local political leaders to serve on its "steering committee," but almost all of its members are utility companies holding long - term contracts to purchase vast amounts of coal from Montana and Wyoming.

If the severance tax is slashed, the savings won't necessarily be passed along to the customers of those companies -Chicago's Commonwealth Edison, Northern States Power, Detroit Edison, Iowa Power and Light, the New England Electric System and others.

Nationwide equalization of all states' severance taxes is a reform worth pursuing, but there's no justification for singling out coal from Montana and Wyoming as the target of the power companies' punitive legislation.

malice aforethought; and it was a willful, deliberate and premeditated killing; or done by means of torture or from a deliberate and premeditated design

Smith, of Kirtland, was found dead at the front entrance of Cellblock 4 with head and skull injuries, said an attorney general's report on the riot Feb. 2-3 that cost the lives of 33 inmates.

District Attorney Eloy F. Martinez of Santa Fe announced Wednesday that charged with first-degree murder by premeditation or by torture are Michael Colby, 24; Richard Chapman, 27; James Humiston, 29, and Richard Buzbee, 34. The four will be arraigned Nov. 13 before District Judge Lorenzo F. Garcia.

If convicted as indicted, under the New Mexico first-degree murder statute the four men could face either the death penalty or

Humiston was stabbed in a state prison recreation area adjoining Cellblock 3 on Oct. 22. Corrections officials said he suffered three stab wounds in the chest and one in the back.

Buzbee is serving a life sentence for being a habitual offender for sentences of forgery, issuing worthless checks, escaping from jail and failure to appear for trial. His crimes were committed in Curry and Chaves counties. He was born in Coolidge, Texas.

Humiston, born in Nebraska, was serving a life sentence for first degree murder in Bernalillo County.

Colby was serving a life sentence for the murder of another prisoner at the state penitentiary. Colby, from Canada, initially was sentenced to the prison for aggravated battery and robbery in Bernalillo County

Chapman, of Roswell, was serving life for felony murder and

The four are charged with killing Smith, who was 31. He was sent to the prison from San Juan County for armed robbery and sentenced to life as a habitual offender.

An attorney general's report on the prison riot said, "The violence, which varied in intensity throughout the riot, reached its peak in Cellblock 4 during the first few hours after sunrise on

Saturday (Feb. 2). Rioting inmates killed a full dozen residents of the cellblock including ... Larry Smith ... "

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals reversed a Harris County obscentty conviction on Wednesday because testimony was excluded about the local popularity of

After Michael Keller's punishment was assessed at 30 days and a \$500 fine, he was placed on probation. He appealed the conviction. Keller, who was charged with the sale of "Oversexed Secretary, an obscene film, contended the trial court erred in excluding testimony of a defense witness on the contemporary community standards in Harris County.

The defense witness would have testified he had seen "Deep Throat" and "Oversexed Secretary" and that "Deep Throat" was playing in its fourth year in Houston, making it the longest playing movie in Houston motion picture history.

The witness estimated 750,000 persons had seen "Deep Throat" in Harris County.

MOSCOW (AP) - The Soviet media said today that Ronald Reagan's landslide election victory reflected a widespread dissatisfaction among Americans with President Carter's policies-including his hostility toward the Soviet Union and his

oycott of the Moscow Olympics. "As for the U.S.S.R," the radio said, "our country has always stood for the normalization and development of Soviet-American relations on the basis of the principles of peaceful coexistence.'

Commentaries over the Soviet radio and the official news agency Tass explained the election results exclusively as a rebuff to Carter and gave no assessment of Reagan or his policies.

Soviet radio said American voters had demonstrated a desire "for a change from the profound political and economic crisis" in the United States.

Alexander Druzhinin, Soviet radio's correspondent in Washington, said Carter's drubbing was explainable "by the unhap- piness of millions of Americans" with the president's internal and external policies.





Ad for God' urges unity behind Reagan

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) - Blood oozing from a dead friend's ears and the recollection of a poor man singing brought a Lebanese teen-ager to his knees and to God on a sultry Middle Eastern day 33 years ago.

Now president of a huge Bible publishing company Sam Moore is urging Americans to stand behind President-elect Ronald Reagan.

Moore's company - Thomas Nelson Inc. - is spending \$50,000 for a newspaper "advertisement" which will run Friday in the Wall Street Journal and Nashville's two newspapers, The Tennessean and Nashville Banner. Moore said he decided to publish the message — entitled "A Prayer for Our President" — in the Journal to reach the nation's business community.

"The three leading presidential candidates — President Carter, Ronald Reagan and John Anderson - all claimed before the election they were born-again Christians. And there are as many as 80,000 born-again Christians in this country," Moore, 50, said in an interview this week.

"We ought to be the salt of the earth, but these people were divided among the candidates. Some Christians aren't talking to other Christians because of the candidate they support. There's infighting in the house

of the Lord.'

Drafted a month ago, the prayer says, in part: "Lord, You know everyone isn't happy. Many people are disappointed right now because their man didn't win...But whether or not we voted our man into office doesn't matter now. We have our elected President and

"Our country is in serious trouble, Lord, trouble from all sides. The problems our President faces here at home are already enormous. The cost of producing food, clothing and other vital necessities has skyrocketed....Millions of our workers - many of them veterans - are being forced on welfare rolls while billions of hard-earned American dollars are flowing

overseas to pay for grossly overpriced imports.
"Violence is in the headlines, pornography is on the newsstands and selfish pleasure is the goal....Please God, rekindle a new spirit within us, a new

Moore said he thought of the prayer because "our nation is suffering from a great malaise right now. As a people we need to open our eyes and see what's happening to us.

"We as a people ought to pledge our honor, integrity, support and loyalty to our president. We need to give a good day's work for a day's pay. And, we need to go back to our spiritual heritage. Our country needs God." Americans should praise the country's strengths rather than bemoan its weaknesses, Moore said.

"I want to tell people to look at the positive side instead of the negative," he said. "We've only got one president and we can't tear him up without destroying ourselves. Constant tearing down is no good....

"Like my son - I'd been on his back for a long time about all the things he was doing wrong. He was only 14 and one day after I'd been on him a long time, he looked me in the eye and said, 'Dad, can I do anything right?' When he walked out the tears started dripping down

Born in Lebanon, Moore - then named Sam Ziadi dreamed of becoming a doctor. He attended the Evangelical High School in Beirut and met an American doctor who the executive said opened his

would make me happy," he said. "But I was a very unhappy man.

"I thought medicine and the money it would bring

The doctor, Moore said, left his practice in the United States and built a hospital in Bethlehem for the

"He gave it all up to go out to the Middle East and heal the wounds of the broken-hearted and the homeless," he said. "I said, 'There is a happy man.'

That was the beginning.' Moore, whose company last year recorded \$35.8 million in sales, said he accepted God for good the day

"I saw him lying there with blood coming out of his ears, and I said to myself, 'What's happening to us all?' "And I remembered a man I knew who was poor but went to bed singing and woke up singing. I realized he had the joy of the Lord," Moore said. "I then knew I would rather be happy and poor than rich and

"I got down on my knees and accepted the Lord. I know the exact place and time. That was the beginning of a new life for me.

As a student at Columbia Bible College in South Carolina, Moore saved \$2,500 in the summer of 1950 by selling Bibles and dictionaries. He earned degrees in economics and religious education at the University of South Carolina. A job with the Chase Manhattan Bank followed.

"New York - what a place! You get lost, there's a lot of shoving and no one has time to say 'Good morning,'

Moore came to Nashville in 1957 and started a Bible and dictionary sales company. In 1961, he founded Royal Publishing Co., which bought Thomas Nelson in

"Our problem today is everybody is thinking only of No. 1 - themselves - and that hurts the country," he said. "People are starting to do only what they want to do as they see it in their own eyes. Someday, God is going to get fed up with us.'

Reagan to terminate grain embargo

WASHINGTON (AP) - If President-elect Ronald Reagan's actions follow his campaign rhetoric, Jimmy Carter's embargo on Soviet grain exports will be an early casualty of the new administration.

While many of Reagan's agriculture proposals have been only vaguely defined, his opposition to the

"I will, when elected, fully assess our national security, foreign policy and agricultural trade needs to determine how best to terminate yet another of the inequitable and ineffective policies of the Carter administration," he said of the grain embargo on July

And the platform adopted by the Republican National Convention also stated its flat opposition. "The Carter grain embargo should be terminated

immediately," the document said.
While the direction of the new administration remains somewhat murky when it comes to agriculture, there are clearer indications of the direction farm matters will take in the Republican-controlled Senate.

Conservative Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., who stands

to become Agriculture Committee chairman, said Wednesday in Raleigh, N.C., that he would make trimming the federal food-stamp program one of his top priorities.

Helms said he believes the Agriculture Department program, which is dependent on the committee's approval, "has got to be changed so you won't have so

many freeloaders on it.' The future, as far as I'm concerned, is to reduce it to those who are truly needy," he said, adding that he thinks as much as 40 percent of food-stamp assistance

is mis-allotted. The only factor that could prevent him from taking the agriculture post would be Illinois Sen. Charles Percy's refusal to accept the chairmanship of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, leaving Helms in

line to take over that slot. The new congressional lineups — Republicans took control of the Senate for the first time in 26 years and cut the Democrats' lead in the House by 33 votes - will come at a critical time for farmers.

The Food and Agriculture Act of 1977, the umbrella authorization for all the government's price-support,

subsidy and agricultural research programs, expires in 1981

Reagan, campaign sources said, will likely favor a moderate approach to Agriculture Department programs, including those expiring next year, and not massive cuts

Throughout the campaign, Reagan accused the Carter administration of undermining farm income by failing to control inflation. But his prime campaign farm issue was Carter's embargo of the sale of 17 million tons of wheat and corn to the Soviets.

The administration sought to minimize the embargo's impact by spending \$2 billion to \$3 billion to buy grain for its reserves that likely would have gone to the Soviets. But Reagan decried the embargo, claiming, as did many farmers, that the action had done more domestric harm than good.

Reagan has not said whom he will nominate as secretary of agriculture.

Sen. Roger W. Jepsen, R-Iowa, was Reagan's senior campaign farm adviser but has said he was uninterested in leaving the Senate to head the Agriculture Department

Prisoner captured after escape attempt

CUMMINS PRISON, Ark. (AP) - A 23-year-old Cummins Prison inmate attempted to escape Wednesday, but was captured before he left the prison grounds, Department of Correction officials said. Department spokesman Tim Baltz said inmate Douglas Lee Martin was a member of a "hoe squad" that was clearing underbrush and tall grass from an area near the prison landfill.

Baltz said a guard on horseback noticed that an inmate was missing during a routine head count about 4 p.m. and ordered the inmates back into trailers used to transport them to the site.

The guard and other officers then searched the area around the landfill and found Martin lying in some tall grass about 100 yards from where he disappeared, Baltz said. He said Martin offered no resistance when he was recaptured.

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) - The difference is apparent when you land at Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport.

You are in Minnesota, one of the first states to give non-smokers the legal right to breathe smoke-free air indoors.

The 1975 Minnesota Clean Indoor Air Act allows smoking only in designated areas of public places.

That includes restaurants. stores, hospitals, schools, buses, offices and all other enclosed, indoor areas used by the public or serving as a place

The exceptions are bars serving meals to fewer than 50 people and factories and warehouses

At the airport smoking isn't allowed in lines and most lobbies. Arrival-departure areas are divided into smoking and no-smoking areas.

Restaurants are required to set aside 30 percent of their seats for non-smokers and must ask whether patrons prefer the smoking or no-smoking area.

In businesses where there are no-smoking and smoking areas, each no-smoking area must be at least 200 square feet. Smoking is permitted in enclosed private offices

occupied by smokers. Restaurants can lose their licenses for non-compliance, and people who smoke in a prohibited area are subject to a \$100 fine.

A person can seek an injunction against a proprietor who repeatedly fails to comply with the law.

Donald Shopland, technical information officer for the Office of Smoking and Health in Washington, D.C., says about 30 states restrict smoking in certain places and legislation is pending in other states.

The idea for the Minnesota law was conceived by former state Sen. Ed Brandt. In 1973, Brandt and a small group of fellow non-smokers formed the Association for Non-Smokers' Rights. In a little over a year, the law was passed.

The Washington-based Tobacco Institute, which fights such laws, was caught off

'That was long before we knew of this as an issue," says Walker Merryman, director of communications for the

Merryman contends such laws provoke animosity smokers and non-smokers, cost restaurants money and never are enforced.

There have been two publicized altercations between smokers and non-smokers since the law took effect, with both settled out of court

On June 7, 1977, Steve Wrbanich was smoking as he sat in his wheelchair waiting to chat with then-Gov. Rudy Perpich, who was holding an open house at his Capitol office.

Nancy Leighton, also waiting to see the governor, walked over to Wrbanich and asked him to put out his cigarette. When Wrbanich took another drag, she doused him with a glass of

On Oct. 5, 1978, Willard Wolertz was at Chanhassen Dinner Theater and asked a woman smoking to put out her cigarette. When she allegedly told him to mind his own business and blew smoke in his face. Wolertz said he reached for the cigarette and the woman ducked.

"As far as I know, I didn't even touch her," he said. But Joan Cafarella said Wolertz punched her and filed an assault complaint

Charles Schneider, chief of the Environmental Field Services section with the state Health Department, says he gets about 100 complaints a month about non-compliance with the law. "At first, most of the complaints were about restaurants, but now most of our complaints come from work-related areas," he says.

Things are a lot better off for the non-smoker in Minnesota than they are in any other state." Schneider adds.

Court affirms woman's suit

AUSTIN (AP) - The Texas Supreme Court today affirmed a \$200,000 judgment for a woman who had corrective surgery on a bone in her left foot and suffered a leg burn from the cast placed on

The Clifford Marshalls sued Dr. A. Ross Davis in Harris County for malpractice and negligence after Joann Marshall underwent surgery in November 1974.

Following surgery, Davis placed a plaster splint from the bottom of the woman's heel to just below the knee. Three days later she complained of a burning sensation and a blistered area was discovered on her left calf. A scar 4 inches by 21/4 inches resulted.

The Marshalls alleged the dip water was too hot and too much plaster was used. They also contended Mrs. Davis' leg had been propped on a pillow, preventing ventilation, and pressurg points were created within the cast.

The trial court awarded damages to the Marshalls, and the 14th Court of Civil Appeals at Houston affirmed the trial court judgment.

The appeals court noted that Davis and another doctor had testified defective plaster was the cause of the burn but both admitted they had no idea what the defect was.

The two said their opinion was based only on the fact that something had gone wrong and they did not believe Davis was

The appeals court said the jury was free to reject the doctors' assertions and to accept the argument that the cast had been

The Supreme Court affirmed lower court rulings without writing its own opinion.

Gas vs. electric

DEAR CONSUMER REPORTS: Which is cheaper CONSUMER to operate — a gas dryer or an electric dryer?

DEAR READER: Running a gas dryer is usually cheaper. But, since gas prices are rising faster than electricity rates, the margin is narrow-

ing.
At typical U.S. electric rates of five-cents per kilowatt-hour - and with gas rates at an average 37 cents per therm (a therm is the equivalent of about 100 cubic feet) - an electric dryer costs about three times more to operate than a comparable gas dryer.

Even though a new gas dryer is more expensive to buy than an electric, you still could make your money back in utility savings. But it would take about 500 laundry loads to make back the difference. That's somewhat more than what the U.S. Department of Energy considers one-year's worth of laundry.

Of course, your utility rates may not be typical. If that's the case, use this rule of thumb to decide whether gas or electric would be more economical: the two types will cost the same to run when the price per therm of gas is about 25 times the price per kilowatt-hour of electricity.

If the cost per therm is less than that, gas is cheaper. If it's higher, then an electric model would be more economical to operate.

CONSUMER DEAR REPORTS: When I examined the sweaters that were advertised as "pure" wool on sale at a local department store, the only labels I could find were store tags that carried the price and size. I suspect this merchandise was not wool. How can I find out?

DEAR READER: The Federal Trade Commission requires content labels to be attached to all garments. Each label must be printed in legible, unabbreviated English and has to be attached at an easy-to-find part of the garment. Moreover, the fabric's composition must be stated in some detail on the

If you encounter mislabeled or unlabeled garments, complain to the store manager and report the finding to your local consumer protection agency or state attorney general's office. Also write to: Office of the Secretary, Federal Trade Commission, Washington, D.C. 20580.

DEAR CONSUMER REPORTS: I purchase large boxes of dishwasher detergent to save money. Someone recently told me that I should switch to smaller boxes because the longer these detergents stand around, the less effective they are. Is this

DEAR READER: It's not the length of storage time that causes the detergents to lose effectiveness but the environment in which they are stored. If the area isn't cool and dry, the detergent can lose both strength and dissolvability before it's used up. And incompletely dissolved detergents can cake in the dispenser or show up as a fine white powder distributed over the

detergents.
Actually, we see no real cost advantage to buying the 'family-size'' 50-ounce packages that are on the market today. Detergents we tested cost as little as five-cents per use in the small box. Any saving from buying the larger size might be offset by deterioration.

Tirade against doctors: practice makes profit?

In 1950 the bill for health care in the United States totaled \$12 billion. By 1980 it had soared to \$229 billion. In 1950 the average daily charge for a semiprivate hospital room was \$11.05. By 1980 it was \$149.38 — a 1,252 percent increase.

Who's responsible for this shocking increase? Doctors, mainly, claims practicing internist Keith Alan Lasko. His "Great Billion Dollar Medical Swindle" (Bobbs-Merrill, 237 pages, \$10.95) is a stinging rebuke of his own "money-hungry profession," peopled by "money-grubbing clay gods who drive Mercedes... and look at lives in terms of gold and silver coins."

Why would a doctor send a patient to a crumbling hospital across town when there's a modern one across the street? Because, Lasko charges, the doctor probably is getting a kickback for admitting patients to the former, including a cut of the X-ray, cardiogram or lab concessions. Worse yet, he may actually own a share of the hospital. Not surprisingly, Lasko says, every year thousands of unsuspecting souls are unnecessarily hospitalized, X-rayed, pricked, prodded, probed and cut open.

In a chapter entitled "The

In a chapter entitled "The Cancer Industry," Lasko laments that doctors are no closer to a cure for cancer today than they were three decades ago. But American medicine has conquered so many killer diseases. Why not cancer?

Because, Lasko answers, there's no incentive to conquer cancer. Too many doctors, researchers and administrators are making too much money from cancer. (So-called cures such as "mutilating surgery, burning radiation and poisonous chemicals" benefit only doctors and hospitals.) "When a cure for cancer is finally discovered, it will be a sad day indeed for the American Cancer establishment.... This would drive them out of business"

business."

Lasko doesn't like surgeons much, but he despises psychiatrists whom he calls "the worst trained medical men" whose techniques "only a shaman or a witch doctor would approve." "Shrinks," he says, pose a danger to the patient's physical as well as mental health.

They have brainwashed "real doctors" into believing that impotence is "all in the head." Because of their "obsequious devotion to psychiatry and its enshrined stupidity," research into a physical cause for this infirmity is at a standstill. Meanwhile, he says, doctors in Europe have discovered that impotence often is caused by blockage of the arterial blood supply to the penis and can be cured through a bypass operation.

through a bypass operation.

"Psychiatrists," writes
Lasko, "should be defrocked;
they should be deprogrammed, retrained and
taught a useful occupation
like farming, construction
work or carpetry."

work or carpentry."

Whew! After three pages in Lasko's company, his book begins to read like a tirade. If only his editor had deleted some of his more outlandish statements. For example: If a new surgeon in town has a waiting room full of patients, he's probably splitting fees with the general practitioner who referred the patients. Good point. Cutting in the GP probably results in the patient getting overcharged. But to what purpose the following? "Oh, that new surgeon, with warts on his nose, foul breath, body odor, shaky hands, running nose and feces on his pants. How loaded with referrals he is!"

Lasko is so cocky, so unequivocal that his tendency to exaggerate makes his whole case seem suspect. In describing electroconvulsive therapy (used to treat depression), he states that the patient's head is shaved and he's then shot through with electric current causing convulsions so violent he may fracture his spine and limbs. Pretty scary description, but terribly dated. The patient's head is not shaved and an injection of a muscle relaxant prevents muscle spasms, except in his right

Lasko now has a new target for his anger: the media, which, he claims, have deliberately ignored his book (he implies a sinister conspiracy). Reviewers and television producers probably read it and, not surprisingly, dismissed it as a diatribe — a shame, because while it's certainly that, it's also a provocative and revealing book by an insider, a courageous insider. Lasko better be on guard for psychiatrists and surgeons driving Mercedes. They may not be able to resist running him down. (NEWSPAPER ENTERPRISE ASSN.)

It's still not too late to put up some special treats, such as spiced apple rings, winter serve or pear honey. These canned items go well with hol-iday meals that feature ham or turkey, for example. They also make good holiday gifts.
SPICED APPLE RINGS

pounds Delicious apples (about 16 Soaking solution:

cups water, 2 espoons salt.

cups water cups sugar ood coloring

round cinnamon ground allspice

Prepare home canning jars lids according to manufacturer's instructions Wash and core apples. Slice into 1/4-inch rings and place in soaking solution to prevent

discoloration. Combine water, sugar and food coloring in a large (6 to 8 quart) sauce pot. Bring to a boil and boil 5 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Remove syrup from heat and add drained apple rings. Let the apples remain in the syrup for 10 minutes. Add spices to apples and return to heat. Bring to a boil, then simmer until apple rings are just tender, about 30 minutes.

Remove from heat and let cool. Pack apple rings in hot jars, leaving ½-inch head space. Return the syrup to heat and bring to a boil. Carefully fully pour hot syrup over apple rings, leaving ½-inch space. Remove air bubbles with a non-metallic kitchen utensil. As each jar is filled, wipe jar rim clean, place lid on and screw band down evenly and firmly. Place closed jar in canner.

doctor says that all men over 40 years old should take two aspirin with breakfast and with the evening meal to help prevent strokes and heart attacks. I would like your comments pro and con.

DEAR READER — Why

just take my word for it? The Food and Drug Administration has reviewed the available information and as of the last review does not recommend the regular use of aspirin to prevent strokes. They do recommend its use in men (not women) who have already had a stroke or TIAs (transitory ischemic attacks sometimes called little

And from the National Institutes of Health a long

study of aspirin to prevent recurrence of heart attacks has failed to show that aspirin is effective either. As a result the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute "recommends that aspirin should not be routinely given patients who have suffered a heart attack."

Now, I don't think the last word on all of this has been heard. But for the moment there seems to be very little reason to recommend that anyone routinely take aspirin to prevent strokes or heart attacks, particularly if he has never had either. The amount that might be most effective and when to take it has not been settled. And I might add that the routine use of aspirin is not without some complications. This includes irritation

of the digestive system. The dangers of aspirin as well as its uses are included in The Health Letter number 8-8, Aspirin and Related Medi-

25-year-old female and have not had my period for six months when I stopped taking birth control pills. At that time I also lost about 25 pounds on a strict diet. A month after stopping the pill I had surgery and was sterilized with a tubal ligation. Since I am not interested in

ecoming pregnant, should I be worried that I have not had my period yet? Is there any benefit to a period? I also have started noticing gray hair. Is this related in some

DEAR READER - Having a tubal ligation should not alter a woman's basic cycle. The ovaries should function just as they did before the surgery. I doubt that your failure to have menstrual periods at this time is related to your

surgery.
It could be related to basic hormone functions. These are really controlled by the brain. It might be related to taking the pill, but a better guess is that it is related to your

George Savalas: a versatile artist

George Savalas, who created the role of Stavros on "Kojak," was born in the Bronx. The product of a close-knit Greek family, Savalas believes that the traditional family is of utmost importance.

Savalas will appear in the comedy "Later, Leonardo" through Nov. 22 at the Country Squire Dinner Theatre in Amarillo.

After high school, Savalas joined the U.S. Navy. He served in the Pacific as a combat crewman during World War II.

While in the Navy, Savalas got his first taste of show business when the drummer with the Clyde McCoy Band became ill and he substituted for the drummer.

"I did good at it, and they kept me on," said Savalas.

His commanding officer noted Savalas' experience and directed him to write a stage show to raise morale. Savalas wrote, produced and was master of ceremonies for "Rock Happy Revue" and "Nautical Nonsense." The shows, which featured WAVES in grass skirts and blackface entertainers, were immensely popular and later toured other military bases in the Pacific.

Following the war, Savalas studied drama at Columbia University.

"The study of drama was a waste of time," said Savalas.

He did learn the nomenclature of drama, however, which actors need to know in order to follow a director's instructions.

For five years he taught drama at the Coliseum Studios. He was also a businessman for a time, but finally decided to move to Hollywood to become a full-time actor.

Among Savalas' television credits are "The Dick Powell Show," "The Virginian," "The Man from U.N.C.L.E.," "Divorce Court," "King of Diamonds,'' 'Combat.' "Mannix," "All in the Family," "Kolchak" and "Kojak."

He appeared off-Broadway productions of "Anna Lucasta," 'Death of a Salesman," "Arms and the Man," " 'Tis a Pity She's a Whore," and "I Am A Camera." Savalas' film credits include





Nation's grain crop harvest ahead of 1979

WASHINGTON (AP) - The harvest of the nation's grain crops continues well ahead of last year, particularly for the corn harvest, which is nearing completion, the Agriculture Department reports.

Some heavy rainfall in the eastern half of the nation last week slowed field work, but most farmers are 10 percent greater than in 1979. ahead of schedule, officials said.

The department said that the corn harvest in the 17 major producing states was 86 percent complete by the end of last week. That is well ahead of last year's pace of 54 percent at this time, as well as ahead of the

average of 71 percent. The progress in all 17 corn belt states was ahead of

The department said that the Great Lake states corn harvest, which had been slowed by wet conditions this fall, was also making rapid progress. However, some fields are still wet and farmers are planning to wait for the ground to freeze so it can bear the weight of harvesting machinery.

Winter wheat planting is 91 percent complete in the

15 major states, a percentage point ahead of last year but a little behind the average.

Planting of wheat is well advanced in all states except California, where it stands at 10 percent.

The wheat crop rates fair to good in most areas, the The 1980 wheat crop was a record 2.36 billion bushels

Global wheat production for the 1980-81 season is forecast at around 440 million tons, 5 percent above last

The Agriculture Department has forecast that 447 million tons will be consumed, reducing world wheat stocks by about 7 million tons. That would leave 72 million tons by the end of 1981, the lowest level since

The department also reported that the soybean harvest in the 18 major producing states in the nation is 77 percent complete, equal to last year's pace and three percentage points ahead of the average.

Michigan famrers reported harvesting 25 percent of their soybean acreage last week, the department said.

The harvest was slowed in the Mississippi delta and in the Southeast by wet weather.

Cotton harvesting is 52 percent complete in the 14 leading states, compared with 41 percent last year. But the Arizona crop is behind schedule as growers wait for

the crop to mature.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The new federal crop insurance law is designed to cover all crops across the nation within five years and is being phased in to eventually replace the current system of disaster aid

The Agriculture Department announced the first phase of the new act last week, adding 250 counties in 31 states to the areas that will be eligible for federal insurance programs for the 1981 season. There are now 1,650 counties and 28 crops eligible for

the programs prior to the expansion. WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Department has begun to examine blood samples from cattle in 22 states to see if any are infected with bluetongue

Silent majority speaks in national election

WASHINGTON (AP) - For years, Republicans have claimed that a great, silent, conservative majority was out there, waiting to

Ronald Reagan got his start in national politics trying to tap that vein in the cause of Barry Goldwater's presidential ticket. That put him on the losing side of a landslide five elections ago.

But the silent majority spoke Tuesday. Led by President-elect Reagan, the conservatives are coming to Washington next year. Republicans are taking control of the Senate, a prize they haven't held in 25 years. They have reinforcements in the House, and a chance at control two years hence, if all goes well for their new administration and they are able to reverse the historic trend of off-year election setbacks to the party in White House power.

There was more than conservatism to the astounding landslide Reagan gained Tuesday. There was deep dissatisfaction with the leadership of Jimmy Carter, the southerner who could not capture the South, the Democrat who could not win in the strongholds of his own party. An Associated Press-NBC News poll of voters

in 10 states across the nation showed that they just didn't consider Carter a good enough leader to merit re-election. Six of every seven who said firmness and

decisiveness were their criteria for choosing a candidate cast ballots for Reagan. Two voters in five said they thought Carter had done a bad job. Even the signs of an imminent break in the year-long Iranian hostage crisis worked to the president's disadvantage. Instead of providing him the lift the Reagan camp had feared, it served - in the view of campaign manager

Robert S. Strauss - to remind people of the

whole year's frustration.

Reagan always said that the real issue of 1980 was the record of the president and his Democratic administration. The voters obviously agreed, although the AP poll showed nearly half of those who sided with the president were swayed by Carter's contention that the Republican nominee might risk war.

But disenchantment with Carter isn't enough to explain Reagan's crushing margin, and the startling GOP gains in Congress. The last time a president won that big it was Richard M. Nixon over George McGovern eight years ago. The margin was even more lopsided than Reagan's over Carter, but it did not translate into Republican congressional gains.


McGovern was one of the Democratic casualties this time: South Dakota voters turned him out in favor of conservative Rep. James

The 1980 returns are evidence of a conservative revival, organized, mobilized and bankrolled to remodel American government.

It was not born Tuesday. Ironically, the one Republican senator who wound up in trouble on Tuesday was that very symbol of conservatism. Goldwater of Arizona. Seeking Senate election for the fifth time, at 71, he was in a back-and-forth race with a Phoenix businessman named Bill Shulz. The outcome was in doubt early Wednesday. The issue there, it seemed, was age, not philosophy.





Planned inquest creates furor

LOS ANGELES (AP) -Announcement of plans to conduct a coroner's inquest into the the death of British bantamweight champion Johnny Owen brought angry reaction from the local boxing community.

The 24-year-old Welsh boxer died at California Hospital Medical Center Monday more than seven weeks after he was knocked unconscious during a fight for the world ntamweight championship at the Olympic Auditorium.

County Coroner Thomas T. Noguchi's announcment Wednesday sparked criticism by boxing leaders saying there is apparently no local precedence for an official probe into the circumstances and responsibilities for a boxer's ring-related death.

Noguchi admitted there was no inquest into the last local boxing death of featherweight Davey Moore, 29. in 1963, but said the death of the Owen was sufficiently unusual to warrant an inquest

Brad Pye Jr., chairman of the California State Athletic Commission said he believes the scheduled Dec. 4 inquest will infringe on the authority of his agency and overlap what he and his fellow commissioners

already have done.

September, which included a review of the fight films, convinced the commission that everyone concerned acted

He said that although his commission will cooperate with the coroner's office, "it seems to me they should have consulted us" before announcing the inquest.

An inquest is basically a fact-finding procedure and although the coroner's jury can make recommendations, its decisions have no force of law and there is no finding of guilt or

Owen, a popular hero in his native Wales, had fought 28

bouts before the fatal fight He said a hearing in late in winning 26, losing one and drawing one. He had never even been knocked off his feet until he met Lupe Pintor at the Olympic on Sept. 19.

In the match, he was knocked down three times - once in the ninth round and twice in the 12th. Owen never regained consciousness. He underwent two brain operations, the first shortly after the fight and the other on Sept. 26.

Noguchi' office said Wednesday that an autopsy showed the physical cause of death was "hypostatic bronchial pneumonia due to subdural hematoma resulting from blunt force trauma of the

NEW YORK (AP) - From shoeshine stands to the Big Board, business was soaring as an elated Wall Street greeted Ronald Reagan's landslide victory with a record-breaking trading spree that left stock market computers buzzing.

A total of 84.08 million shares was traded Wednesday on the New York Stock Exchange, the largest number ever. The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials finished the day up 15.96 at 953.16.

"The market wanted Reagan," said Frederick Sullivan, a floor trader at the NYSE. "What they're hoping is that he will bring inflation under control."

Traders also thought Reagan will be good for military contractors and oil companies. Stocks of both groups rose sharply, reflecting the victor's promises to boost defense spending and encourage oil exploration.

"I can tell everyone who voted for Reagan," said Monroe Brown, who runs a shoeshine stand outside Trinity Church at the head of Wall Street. "They come up smiling," he said, adding his own trade

But by the end of the day, many stock prices were falling. The Dow Jones average was up more than 27 points at its mid-day high. Computers at the NYSE found it almost impossible to cope with record trading. The ticker tape ran more than 40 minutes late most of the day, making it difficult to learn current prices. And at the end of the day, it took more than two hours to calculate the final volume figure, usually a 15-minute job.

The previous record volume day on the New York Stock Exchange was Oct. 10, 1979, when 81.62 million shares changed hands. That was the only other time that volume topped 68 million

The surge in the financial markets also helped the dollar, which rose sharply against other currencies, and sent interest rates down in early bond market trading.

But interest rates began rising by noon, and finished the day higher than they started. Many observers think the Federal Reserve Board will tighten credit even further in an effort to fight inflation, and there is a widespread feeling that the prime lending rates charged by banks will rise from the current level of 14.5 percent.

Meanwhile, American business leaders were encouraged by Reagan's victory, although many executives warned that the nation's economic problems won't disappear right away. Auto executives also generally welcomed the prospect of

Reagan's presidency but admitted they were unsure how he would deal with key issues facing the industry.

Chrysler Corp. Chairman Lee A. Iacocca said he was "particularly encouraged by (Reagan's) understanding of the problems facing Chrysler Corporation.

Republicans backing Baker as next leader

WASHINGTON (AP) - Senate Republicans are closing ranks behind Sen. Howard Baker, a moderate whose own presidential bid was flattened in Ronald Reagan's march to the White House, as the chamber's next majority leader.

Baker, now the minority leader, said Wednesday that 40 of 53 Republicans in the new Senate have pledged to support him when it meets in January. He said conservative Sen. Paul Laxalt of Nevada, Reagan's campaign manager, would nominate him. That would seem to doom any attempt by the party's right wing

to push a more conservative senator for the post. With the GOP winning control of the chamber fo the first time since 1964, Baker will swap jobs — and offices — with Sen. Robert

C. Byrd, D-W. Va., majority leader for the last four years. Baker and Byrd, in separate news conferences Wednesday, disagreed on what the "lame-duck," Democratically controlled

Congress should take up when it reconvenes next week. Baker said he would oppose considering anything beyond "must" appropriations and budget bills needed to keep the government

Other matters, he said, including the Reagan-backed proposal for a 30-percent, three-year tax cut, can wait until Reagan takes office

But Byrd said he'd like to see the Senate quickly consider the Finance Committee's alternative to the Reagan tax-cut proposal, which the president-elect has made a top legislative priority. In the House, where the Republicans chopped 33 seats off the

Democratic majority, Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. conceded it would be tempting for Democrats to try to push administration proposals through the post-election session.

But he said he didn't think that would be practical or even possible in most instances. "I imagine there'll be a feeling on the part of the House to get out as quickly as we can, "O'Neill said.


