## **Farmers Report Chemical Damage**

Several farmers in the area have complained of damages, ranging from light to heavy, from careless application of applying 2-4D week lilers near cotton and soybeans.

Dr. Robert Metzer, Extension area agronomist at Texas A&M University's South Plains Research and Extension Center, said "Farmers should exercise extreme care when applying 2-4D, Just because a compound is labeled as being safe from mechanical drift during the spraying operation.

mechanical drift during the spraying operation. "In many instances, farmers have misinterpreted the label as being safe to use around cotton and soybeans, Although a compound is marked as safe for vapor drift, applying it during a period of air movement or with a boomtype rig will cause the spray to d r i f t for considerable distances;" he continued.

"Several other herbicidal compounds such as MCPA are chemically similar to 2-4D," he adds, and will cause damage to cotton and soybeans.
Metzer stress the importance of reading the label on the compound and interpetting it can, and does, occur in many instances and can inflict sewere damage to nearby crops.

Pipe for some 88 miles of pipeline be in g put down yn Natural Gas Pipeline of America is on flat cars along side tracks here.

Each flatcar carries 15 joints, each approximately 60 feet long. The pipes are being unloaded noto ten trucks owned by Lewie Montgomery, sub - contractor for H.B. Zachry . Montgomery has one crane and two tractors working on the unloading operation.

Thirty-five miles of the pipe will go into the ground in Section two which is Stalley County and an addition 14 miles of this shipment of pipe will go to Lehman. 




