**DALLAS** (AP) — In the past three months, three deans at Southern Methodist University have announced

their resignations. The latest announcements came this week when David H. Blake, dean of the Edwin L. Cox School of Business, and C. Paul Rogers III, dean of SMU's School of Law, said

they will step down. Blake, who has been at SMU since 1990, said he will take a two-year leave of absence to work in industry and write. His resignation is

effective Dec. 31. Rogers, who is going into his ninth year as dean, is staying on through the end of the 1996-97 academic year. He plans a yearlong sabbatical.

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## Clinton's campaign cry: 'The best is yet to come'

CHICAGO (AP) - Using themes tested in the heartland, President Clinton sets the tone tonight for his last campaign, spelling out how he would take the country into the next century. "The best is yet to come, the best days for America," he promised.

In a distraction from the smooth progress of the convention, presidential political adviser Dick Morris was said to be resigning after publication of an account that he had a long-running affair with a Washington call girl and had allowed her to eavesdrop on a telephone call with the president.

Two party officials said they were told by a senior White House aide that Morris' resignation was imminent. An account of the story, from the Star tabloid, was published today by The New York Post.

Clinton was working on his acceptance speech and saving his hoarse voice as the Democratic delegates who nominated him Wednesday night awaited the climactic session of their national convention. But Hillary Rodham Clinton was up early, saying he was in high spirits.

"He's really fired up. He's very excited about this convention. He's excited about the campaign. But more than that he's very resolute about what he wants to do," Mrs. Clinton told ABC's Good Morning America.

The first lady also gave pep talks to delegations from states that loom large in planning for the fall campaign.

"We know that much of the work will be in your hands," she told Pennsylvania delegates. "There is no reason that Florida should not vote on the national level the way it votes on the state level," she said at her next stop.

Republican nominee Bob Dole was keeping a relatively low profile in California, with only one public event on his schedule – a rally in San Luis Obispo about three hours before Clinton was to speak. Dole's schedule had him en route to Orange County during the Clinton speech.

The president got some good news from a government report that said the economy is growing robustly. And a second report said sales of new homes in July unexpectedly shot up to the highest level in five months.

Sanding the auditorium floor

Looking to tonight's speech, Clinton campaign press secretary Joe Lockhart told "Fox Morning News" that "the president wants to lay out a specific agenda for both the next term, the next four years, and a road map for moving the country into the 21st century." One expected proposal: a modest tax break for homeowners.

After tonight's convention finale, Clinton and Gore reprise a bus trip they used to open their 1992 campaign.

"It will be the first American campaign for the 21st century and the last campaign for Bill Clinton," the president said as he arrived in the convention city Wednesday evening.

Asked what she wanted in tonight's speech, Iowa delegate Darlene Hill said, "I am looking for him to let the American people know what good he did for them.

Following a hallowed and long-winded tradition, state after state declared its unanimous support for Clinton, and incidentally took the opportunity to tout its own candidates.

## Gore recounts sister's cancer death, vows to fight tobacco firms

the Democratic convention hall to stunned silence, Vice President Al Gore spoke intimately of his sister's smokingrelated death and how it sharpened his resolve to take on tobacco companies.

The vice president's emotional account interrupted a 28-minute speech Wednesday evening that heaped criticism on the Dole-Kemp ticket and the Republicancontrolled Congress.

He contended Republicans want to replace Democratic achievements with conservative goals, and he led the crowd in the chant: "But we won't let them!

But the evening's dramatic moment came when Gore departing from his prepared speech - recounted his sister's final hours in 1984, saying she asked him: "Do you bring me

... All I could do was say back to her, 'I love you,' " the vice president recalled, the convention hall in silence.

A few minutes later, Nancy Gore Hunger, who had started smoking at age 13, died, he said. She was 45 years old.

But former congressman Roman Mazzoli of Kentucky wondered whether Gore was attacking adult smoking as well as teen smoking.

"It's a very different thing. She's 45," Mazzoli said of Gore's sister. "These are little kids," he said referring to the Clinton administration's new tobacco restrictions which are designed to protect children.

Gore has told the story of his sister's death before. And Republicans questioned his sincerity, saying that in Gore's 1988 presidential campaign, he bragged in tobacco states that her had grown the crop on his Tennessee farm. Gore's sister died in 1984.

## New Mexico won't take inmate escapees

inmates who tried to escape by overtaking two private prison transport guards near Amarillo won't be making the last leg of their scheduled trip.

Officials in New Mexico have decided they don't want to participate in the prisoner exchange.

Police apprehended the six inmates Wednesday morning after they took over a van and led authorities on a 100-mile high-speed chase. No injuries that began at a rest stop east of Amarillo and ended two hours later to the north in Perryton, near the Oklahoma border.

The guards were taking the prisoners, including five convicted murderers serving life sentences, from the Iowa State Penitentiary in Fort Madison to a facility in Grants, N.M., officials

Ochiltree County District Attorney Bruce Roberson identified the escapees as Jeffrey R. Ragland, Allen Eugene Langley, Joseph Hodges White Jr., Earl and Everett Ray Wagner. All but Wagner were serving time for murder.

The guards who were overtaken violated orders from prison officials by stopping at a Texas rest stop, Welder said.

The company contracted by the Iowa State Penitentiary, R & N Prison Transport Service, 'was under explicit instructions by penitentiary officials to make stops only at county jails or prisons during their trip," Welder

The inmates were being held Wednesday night in Ochiltree County. Welder said the contract with R & N Service has been canceled, and prison officials were on their way to Texas to bring the men back to Iowa; New Mexico officials said they do not want them any more.

Welder said it was his understanding that Michigan-based R & N guards did not have federal gun permits. The company had no telephone listing in Michigan.

It was the second time this month Ochiltree County officials chased down a van carrying an escaped inmate. A Wisconsin fugitive killed himself after a four-hour standoff on Aug. 8.

## Curiosity can be good in a species

Think a bit about all that had to fall into place for some NASA scientists to announce recently that some compounds on a meteorite "are evidence for primitive life on early Mars."

Some 15 million years ago, if the scientists are correct, a chunk of rock had to break away from the planet Mars, perhaps dislodged by a comet or an asteroid. The chunk then orbited the sun for a little while – like 12 million years or so – then was drawn into Earth's orbit by Earth's gravitational pull, and finally fell into the frozen Antarctic wastelands. There it stayed for another three million years until it was found by scientists doing research work at the bottom of the Earth about twelve years ago – a few seconds ago in cosmic time.

News stories haven't been clear on why that rock was chosen to be picked up and sent back to the United States for study and analysis. If it had happened, oh, 25 years ago, before spectroscopic analyses of Mars rocks were available for comparison, the rock might have remained a piece of mysterious space debris and forgotten in some dusty storage room. But the data were available, and analysis techniques were also available that could confirm that the chemical make-up of this piece of space debris was virtually identical to those found on Mars.

Two or three years ago, before the development of special analytical instruments for electron microscopes, that would probably have been the end of the story. But those instruments allowed scientists to analyze the rock practically to the atomic level.

It's not certain that these traces of microbes, "no bigger than a gnat's eye," as University of California Irvine astrophysicist Gregory Benford put it, mean there was life on Mars for sure. And if there was life, it probably died out three billion years ago.

aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs) were found, along with some car-

Does this change the way we view the universe? Probably not. But it's a tribute to the curiosity and inquisitiveness of the human species. We want to know the darndest things, and we'll go to a lot of trouble to find out. If we keep encouraging and celebrating that trait, the species just might make it for a while

# Perot: The pseudo-tough guy

After selling his company, EDS, to General Motors, Ross Perot delighted in ridiculing the new owners indecisiveness and inertia. "The first EDSer to see a snake kills it," he said. "At GM, first thing you do is organize a committee on snakes. Then you bring in a consultant who knows a lot about snakes ... then you talk about it for a year."

So what does this man of action suggest we do about the viper that worries him most, the federal budget deficit? "Develop a detailed blueprint to balance the budget," says his Reform Party's statement of principles, which is what it has instead of a platform. And what about entitlements, the fastest growing programs? "Carefully put together plans to deal with Medicare, Medicaid and Social Security," says the party statement. Perot's plan to deal with the budget is to make a plan to deal with the budget.

By now, everyone knows that the Texas billionaire is a bad-tempered authoritarian with a paranoid streak and an overactive imagination. But some people, convinced that the Republicans and Democrats are too irresponsible and cynical to devise real solutions to the nation's problems, are nevertheless driven into the Perot camp in the belief that he alone is prepared to take the courageous actions that need to be taken.

In fact, he's the spitting image of virtually everything he denounces in the two major parties. No one has gotten more credit for offering so many criticisms and so few solutions. Perot's idea of being tough is to tell you how tough he is, how tough he has been and how tough he is going to be not to actually do anything tough.

The federal budget has been at the center of the national political debate since at least 1981, when have done worse. the deficit began to soar. The various unpleasant

options for reducing spending or increasing revenue have all been examined and re-examined in White House proposals, congressional hearings, news media reports and endless commentaries.

And yet Perot, who affects profound outrage at the burden we are placing on future generations, has never roused himself to come up with even an outline for lightening the load. Fifteen years after the snake slithered into the room, he's still thinking about appointing a committee to propose a menu of possible actions to ameliorate the ongoing serpentine problem.

Nearly every issue of any complexity gets the same treatment. In his acceptance speech at the Reform Party convention in Valley Forge, he stressed the need to drastically improve American education. "We've got to have the finest schools in the world," he exclaimed. "It's that simple." And how are we supposed to get them? Perot urged nothing more than a laundry list of innocuous palliatives - local control, neighborhood schools, parental involvement and "greater emphasis on teachers." Bob Dole at his most weaselly couldn't

decline of American schools. But he then demands more early-education efforts, particularly for poor children - an idea that sounds an awful lot like a certain federal program called Head Start.

On taxes, Perot rails against Dole's tax-cut plan but panders to the same impulse as Dole by lamenting that the current level of taxation is "killing us." When it comes to the tax code, you'll be glad to know, he is armed with detailed, concrete specifics: "Now, the new tax system has got to be fair. It's got to be paperless. It's got to raise the necessary revenues.

Does he favor a flat tax? "If that is the best tax, that's the one we'll do," he recently announced. "But we're going to look at all of them carefully, thoughtfully and rationally. We're going to use the computer as our wind tunnel. We'll mail it, give it to you and then move on to the next problem." Everybody clear on that?

On most issues, Perot doesn't offer empty words he offers no words at all. His acceptance speech, which took nearly 50 minutes to deliver, completely ignored defense and foreign policy, even though those are the matters over which the president has the greatest power. He passed over welfare reform, federal regulation, the environment, affirmative action, abortion and dozens of other subjects that Bob Dole and Bill Clinton have somehow mustered the nerve to address. Perot talks about the handful of topics that he cares about - or that he thinks he can exploit for political purposes – and ignores all the rest.

Perot depicts himself as the only guy brave enough and rugged enough to take on the problems that Dole and Clinton run away from. But in Texas, they have a description for cowboys like

# Farrakhan's failure to accept reality

irritated at charges that he - of all people - has been covering up the enslavement of blacks by the Islamic government of Sudan. During one interview with a reporter, his incandescent smile suddenly vanished as the subject came up, and he exploded.

Finally, on May 14, speaking at the National Press Club in Washington, Farrakhan angrily presented the press with a challenge

"Where is the proof? If slavery exists, why don't you go as a member of the press, and you will look inside Sudan, and if you find it, then you come back and tell the American people what you have found. Accepting the challenge, the Baltimore Sun sent

two reporters to Sudan - Gilbert Lewthwaite, white, a foreign correspondent, and Gregory Kane, black, a columnist for the Sun. John Carroll, editor of the paper, explained that

their assignment was "to see if they could buy slaves. By this admittedly controversial means, we believed we could prove beyond a doubt that chattel slavery does exist in the Sudan, despite the denials of the Islamic fundamentalist government and its supporters.

Lewthwaite and Kane found clear evidence of slave raids on blacks in the south of Sudan – as has been abundantly documented by various human rights organizations - and they did actually buy two slaves, whom they immediately returned to

their families. The price was \$500 each. Starting on June 16, the Sun ran three front-page stories by Lewthwaite and Kane on their investigation, with powerful phoresponse - as reported in his newspaper, the Final Call - was that "the Baltimore Sun is not



a news source I should accept as gospel." Farrakhan also said that he had met in Sudan with Dr. John Garang, leader of the Sudanese People's Liberation Army, a rebel force opposing the Islamic government. "Not once," said Farrakhan, "did Mr. Garang mention slavery as an issue of conflict with the government of the North."

Yet an official of Garang's liberation movement sent me a statement by Commander-in-Chief Garang charging that the Islamic government army and its paramilitary auxiliary militias use slavery "to destroy the African/non-Moslem dimension of Sudanese identity."

During a brief recent visit to the United States, Dr. Garang said the same thing in a meeting with the editorial board of the Baltimore Sun. One result of this intensified focus on blacks in captivity has been an offer by the Sudanese government to permit international monitors to take a look. But Jemera Rone of Human Rights Watch/Africa points out: "There's going to be a herd of government escorts anywhere you go, so no one in their town, what protection do they have?"

Meanwhile, an article in the Final Call by Dr.

Kaukab Siddique revealed the conspiracy at the heart of the Sun's series. The Baltimore Sun, he said, "is a Zionist Jewish daily." An accompanying cartoon showed a man, wearing a yarmulke and a smug grin, carrying the Lewthwaite-Kane story.

I once asked Conrad Muhammad, Farrakhan's commander in New York, what the Nation of Islam would do if suddenly all the Jews on the face of the earth were to disappear forever. How could the Nation of Islam survive without the Jews to indict as the source of all evil? There was no answer, but I thought he looked worried. The Sun's series and continued pressure from

human rights groups has led to increased interest in actually doing something about slavery in Sudan. Congressman Donald Payne, D-N.J., has introduced legislation to toughen economic sanctions - excepting only humanitarian aid against the Sudanese government. He also proposes an international arms blockade.

The problem, Payne told the Sun, "is whether I can convince the Republican leadership to make slavery a priority. It's going to be tough to push it through." It would help if the Dole-Kemp team put in a few words. Clinton has shown no interest.

Farrakhan, now that his challenge to the press has backfired, proposes that a team of Muslim and Christian leaders and journalists go to Sudan to "verify" all these reports. Not surprisingly, Farrakhan has not suggested that representatives of Christian Solidarity International and Sudan's Human Rights Organization be included, despite their continuing extensive investigations there.

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





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## Farrakhan barred from accepting Libyan 'gift'

ment is denying Nation of Islam leader Louis Farrakhan permission to accept a pledged \$1 billion gift from Libya, contending the money would undermine U.S. anti-terrorism policy.

Farrakhan had applied last week for an exemption to U.S. economic sanctions against Libya, saying he wanted to use the money to help American blacks economically and politically.

But the request was denied Wednesday, just where he hoped to accept a second gift from Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi – a \$250,000 humanitarian award. That prize, too, was barred by the Treasury Department's decision.

For a decade, Libya has been the subject of U.S. policy that bars most financial transactions between the two countries and limits travel because of Gadhafi's support for ter-

Farrakhan arrived in the capitol of Tripoli, Libyan radio said today in a report monitored by the British Broadcasting Corp.

"I would like to thank the people of (Libya), our brother Colonel Moammar Gadhafi and this year's Gadhafi international human rights prize," Farrakhan was quoted as saying.

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


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## **Paramilitary** group shuns notorious 'King Rat'

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BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) - The Irish Republican Army tried several times to kill him, and failed. British anti-terrorist soldiers once had him in their sights. They lost him too.

Now, Billy Wright's own commanders in an outlawed pro-British Protestant paramilitary group have told him to leave the province - or be shut up for good.

Wright, who looks and talks as tough as his reputation, says he won't go.

"They know where I am," Wright told The Associated Pressfrom his steel-door safehouse in mostly Protestant Portadown, southwest of Belfast. "If I have to die for my principles, I'll die. But I won't die easy.'

The man dubbed "King Rat" for allegedly killing Catholics during a tit-for-tat campaign of intimidation against Irish Republican Army supporters has become a danger to his former leaders, now trying to seek

Wright, 36, has spent more than a decade with the Ulster Volunteer Force. It and other outlawed "loyalist" groups have slain 900 people, mostly Catholics, in hopes of maintaining Northern Ireland's link with Britain.

First attempt to resurrect Titanic unsuccessful

ST. JOHN'S, Newfoundland (AP) — A chunk of the Titanic sat stubbornly in its underwater grave of 84 years Wednesday despite attempts to lift it from the bottom of the North Atlantic using huge bags of lighter-thanwater diesel fuel.

The salvagers turned to a tiny submarine - with former astronaut Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin aboard - to cut the ballast holding down some of the flotation bags. The remote-control equipment that was supposed to release the ballast failed for some reason.

The foul-up left the 15-ton chunk of the luxury liner "sort of at an angle, revolving around and the cables are twisting around," said Alexandra Foley of RMS Titanic Inc., which owns salvage rights to the wreck.

The salvage team stopped work Wednesday afternoon, but planned to try again this morning, spokesman Miron Dion-Aribas said.

HOUSTON (AP) — James Mouton and Ricky Guttierrez are supposed to get on base and be ready to score when Jeff Bagwell hits a home run.

But on a night when Bagwell didn't get on base in four tries, Mouton and Gutierrez hit rare home runs to tie the score and Brian Hunter doubled home the winning run in the ninth Wednesday night, rallying the Houston Astros to a 5-4 victory over the Chicago Cubs.

Mouton's third homer of the year cut Chicago's lead to 4-3 in the sixth and Gutierrez tied it in the seventh with his seventh career homer, setting the scene for Hunter's ninth-

"He's (Gutierrez) been telling me he can hit them any time he wants," Bagwell said. "But he just wanted to get the singles out of the way first. I feel pretty good about his homer. It was a big league home run."

Gutierrez hadn't hit a homer since May 30, 1994 — a span of 517 at-

"When I first hit it, I knew I had good wood on the ball and I was just hoping it would barely get out," Gutierrez said.

Mouton was just as surprised by his homer.

"If the ball leaves the yard off my bat it's an accident," he said. "I just wanted to put the ball in play, but







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## Collection procedures to change

WASHINGTON - The U.S. Postal Service announced changes in mail collection procedures that will increase security of commercial airlines carrying U.S. mail.

"The changes are designed to enhance security measures and to protect the traveling public, postal employees and postal contractors who transport U.S. nail," said Postmaster General Marvin Runyon.

The changes exceed FAA requirements and are one of several important steps the Postal Service is "prepared and willing to take to improve the level of safety and security of the airlines and the mail," Kunyon added. Officials declined to discuss all of the security measures planned or already in place.

The typical consumer or business will notice very few changes, nor will service be impacted including Express

The changes, which were effective Aug. 16, affects packages mailed to international or domestic addresses deposited in mail collection boxes, such as street mail boxes, lobby and apartment drop boxes/receptacles, even rural customer mailboxes

Customers will have to bring to post offices for entry with retail clerks domestic mail bearing stamps and weighing 16 ounces or more and/or all international mail or military APO/FPO mail weighing 16 ounces or more and which in some cases may also require a customs declaration form. The Postal Service will retain a record of the international and military APO/FPO mailing and the customer will be advised of this when such items are mailed.

Packages found in collection boxes will be returned to the sender if the addressee is outside the local area identified for overnight First-Class Mail. Packages returned to senders will have an accompanying explanation advising them in the future to deposit this mail at the post office. Previously applied postage may be used when the item is re-mailed at a post office.

#### Judge rules mob boss competent to stand trial

NEW YORK (AP) - He roams his neighborhood in slippers, pajamas and bathrobe, mumbling to himself. Federal agents once found him in the shower, standing beneath an open umbrella.

Family and lawyers say Vincent Gigante is a harmless old man who's mentally unstable. The government claims he's the boss of the Genovese crime family, the most powerful family in organized crime, and his attire and behavior are an act to avoid trial.

A federal judge Wednesday agreed with prosecutors, ruling that Gigante, better known as "The Chin," is physically and mentally competent to stand trial on murder and racketeering charges.

U.S. District Court Judge Eugene Nickerson ordered Gigante to appear for arraignment on Sept. 6.

Gigante, 68, is charged with six murders, conspiracy to commit three other murders, crimes related to labor payoffs, extortion and mail fraud.

Gigante first raised claims of mental illness in 1971 to beat a conspiracy rap, and has avoided jail ever since. The latest debate over his competency dates back to when he was indicted in May


