Lothian Dies After Pleading For U. S. H SH SEIZE 20,000 IT/

FDR To Face Aid Question On His Return

British Envoy To United States Taken By Death

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)-Lord Lothian, the British Ambassador to the United States, died today.

Lothian, 58, had been indisposed several days. He cancelled an aplast night before the American Farm Bureau federation in Baltimore and the speech he had prepared for delivery before the federation was read for him.

His embassy made this announceent on the death of the man who had represented Britain's interests in the United States since four days before his country declared war on

Germany:
"The British Embassy deeply regrets to have to announce that the Marques of Lothian died early this morning.

"Lord Lothian was taken ill on Sunday night and although he continued to improve during Monday and Tuesday, he suffered a relapse last night.

"The cause of death was a uremic

Death occurred at 2 a. m. (EST) The six-foot envoy, who succeeded Sir Ronald Lindsay as the British Ambassador here, had won a high place in the esteem of members of the diplomatic set.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)-A British plea for assistance from the United States on the seas posed a major "aid-short-of-war" question today for President Roosevelt's decision upon his re-turn from the Caribbean.

The need now for such assistance to maintain the vital food and supply lines to the beleaguer-ed British Isles was emphasized by Lord Lothian, the British Ambassador, (who died today) in a speech read for him last night before the American Farm Bu-

"With your help in airplanes, munitions, in ships and on the sea, and in the field of finance," the ambassador declared, "we are

"If you back us," he pledged,
"you will not be backing a quitter. It is for you to decide whether it is to your interest to give necessary in order to make cer-tain that Britain shall not fall."

As early as 1916 he took an important place in the British government. In that year he became secretary to Prime Minister Lloyd George. He was known as Lloyd "Col. House," and was credited with having written many sections of the Versailles treaty. Lord Lothian was a Christian Scientist and had written much about that faith

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, Dec. 12-With the British claiming more than 20,000 prisoners and reports to London of a general Italian retreat, Prime Minister Winston Churchill told commons today it would not be surprising if at least the best part or three Italian divisions were trapped in the Egyptian desert. A communique from Cairo said

Thus was summed up briefly the British view of the results of the four-day British offensive which carried their mechanized forces to Mediterranean coast and into the Italian base at Sidi Barrani.

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

RAF Bombs Power Station In Germany

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, Dec. 12-High explosives station at Mannheim, Germany, "main objective" of last night's raids, the air ministry news service said today.

Fires broke out and were still raging when the last RAF planes turned homeward, the service said. 

Get Your Social Security Cards First, Says Reed

No doubt there will be a large number of individuals, especially students, heretofore not employed to his nearest Social Security board and without social security account field office. A worker should keep his numbers, who will secure employ-ment in shops and other business establishments during the holiday gardless of the nu season, according to Dewey Reed, which employ him. manager of the Amarillo office of the Social Security board. He urged all persons who contemplate such employment to secure their account numbers before applying for jobs.



By DEWITT MACKENZIE The British victory over the Italians at the desert station of Sidi Barrani, important as it is, doesn't in itself represent a disaster for the Pascists, but the lack of resistance may indeed portend a major ca-tastrophe for Mussolini's dream of empire and control of the Mediter-

Much will depend on the British ability to capitalize this achieve-ment and carry the war to Marshal Graziani in his own Libyan stronghold. The Britons have made a bril-liant start in capturing the chief Italian base in Egypt, together with thousands of prisoners and much

Marshal Graziani would seem to

me to be facing three possible handicaps which, if they exist, are most serious. They are:

1. Shortage of supplies of all sorts, owing to the virtual severance of his communications with Italy by his communications with Italy by the British blockade. 2. Lowering of the morale of his

troops due to inactivity and that same need of essential supplies.

3. Lack of sufficient fighting planes, owing to the urgent calls imposed on Italy now from Albania

The question of air control is of the utmost importance in the forthcoming operations. Indeed, the Britannia ish in Egypt indicate that the ques-tion of whether they are able to invade Libya will depend on air su-premacy, since all movements of troops and equipment on the unpro-tected desert are vulnerable to air

Marshal Graziani invaded Egypt from Libya September 14 with a fan-fare from Rome. He reached Sidi Barrani after a heroic forced march in which his troops endured the terrific desert heat (the soil tempera-ture often hits 175 degrees Fahrenheit) and choking sandstorms on short rations of water, which is worth more than pearls in this sun-scorched region. Having achieved this sensational feat, the marshal sat himself down and has waited

three months.

Why? He had a force far superior numerically (and still has) to that of the British. He is well equipped mechanically. According to a re-port Mussolini was urging the com-mander to continue his drive for the

Suez canal and imperial glory, but the marshal refused.

I don't believe the answer is that Graziani was short of supplies and wouldn't venture farther into the killing desert waste without them. He is largely dependent on auto-hindi—a type of armored car—and on motor transport. The picturesque camel transport which I saw used so much in desert fighting in the World War has given way to mo-torized units.

torized units.

A camel can go without a drink for many days, but motors won't run without gas and oil.

The Italian marshal is practical and efficient, and never has been willing to stage any military "shows." During the Ethiopian campaign, where Graziani shone, Mussolini was said to have urged that the general start the Italian offensive against the Ethiopians from Dosive against the Ethiopians from Do-la, on the south, a full two months

before the marshal would move.







Rising employment, low prices, bigger savings totals in the banks. There are the ingredients for the liveliest Christmas trade on record, according to business observers. Manufacturers and merchants, not to mention children, welcome this development.

There are other interesting features of the current Christmas trade. It is likely to deplete this coun try's stock of foreign goods. Imported lines of pottery, lamps, giftware and fabrics of all kinds are running low with little hope of replacing some of them for a long time to come. Just as the war has cut off some foreign merchandise, it has stimulated manufacture of the same or similar goods in this country. Refugees from other lands are teaching us how to make their specialties

Furthermore, American concerns are introducing new lines of their own, many of which are of better quality, sturdier construction, new interesting designs more suited to the needs and temperament of users here. Children's toys for example, have "gone American" in a sensible and beneficial way.

There will come a day when trade must again flow freely from country to country and continent to continent. The world cannot thrive divided into tight compartments with no interchange of materials, manufactures, travel, or service. For the present however, it is good that we may "keep our Christmas merry still."

In any country of Europe what is being done now in the United States would be called mobilization. It would be recognized as having the most serious and impressive import. They have devoted so much time in their college studying the culture of Greeks and Romans, where they did not believe that each man was the owner of himself and believed in slavery, as people are coming to believe nowadays, that they are using the Greek and Roman culture as a guide rather than the culture of Jesus.

Many of the so-called liberal preachers have little conception of what Jesus was really teaching. It is my contention that if the youth of the land had proper education, both in week-day schools and on Sundays, they would come to have respect for the rights of other people and would not sanction collective robbery, as is so generally sanctioned now, due to our miseducation. All we need to do it to give the youth of the lana decent chance and he will stand for just thing Man was intended to be a rational being and : reason demonstrates the fact that honesty pay big rewards in happiness, contentment and peace: and robbery and thievery and corruption, when done as individuals or collectively, always leads to sorrow, misery, poverty and even death.

POVERTY ABSOLUTELY NECESSARY

What few people realize, especially the white collar, self-proclaimed humanists, is that poverty is as necessary as prosperity in order to educate people how to act in our social organism. If the social organism did not suffer when it disobeyed natural laws, if there were not great poverty and misery when these laws were violated, errors go on indefinitely destroying the body politic just as the human body would destroy itself, if it were not subjected to pain when it violated natural laws. If the human body did not feel pain when it got close to a hot object, it would burn up.

While poverty, of course, is something disagree able and something we want the least possible amount of, it is a necessary remedy and the poor will always be with us, as Jesus pointed out. Our aim should not be to eliminate poverty but our aim should be to bring about a social organisma government, if you please-and a culture that will permit people to constantly get more reward and happiness for a given amount of sacrifice; in other words, constantly get a higher wage for the work done. 



Asks Credit Be Given To Britain

BALTIMORE, Dec. 12. (P)-A proposal that the American Farm Bu-reau Federation urge congressional repeal of the Johnson Act so that credit might be extended to Great Britain, was weighed today by the organization's resolutions committee. Such a proposal was advanced by the federation's president, Edward A. O'Neal, in a speech in which he declared the United States should place its "full industrial resources




