`Tis the Holiday Shopping Season: **Better Business Bureau Offers Ten Tips to Avoid Online Fraud**

U.S. Internet users intend to do some holiday shopping online this year; however, their confidence in the security of the online shopping experiences points to a need for fraud prevention education.

According to an independent survey recently releases by the Business Software Alliance (BSA), more than 63 percent of Internet users in the United States will do some of their holiday shopping online. However, these same respondents voiced security concerns about making purchases over the Internet. Business The Better Bureau, which is partnering with BSA to advise Internet users how to shop safely online this holiday season, called the survey results the growth of high speed, enlightening.

"The BBB and other organizations have done a great job of alerting consumers to the risks they may face when making purchases online. It's time now to emphasize how to reduce those risks. If online exercise their shoppers common sense, trust their instincts, and take basic protective measures, they are likely to enjoy a safe, gift-buying comfortable experience this holiday season," said Ken Hunter, president and CEO of the Council of Better Business Bureaus and BBBOnLine (www.bbbonline.org).

Hunter noted that online

shoppers face two distinct challenges: identifying reputable merchants (and avoiding dishonest vendors) and protecting against online threats to their personal security.

The simplest advice for avoiding dishonest merchants is to ignore unsolicited e-mail offers or advertisements from unknown individuals or businesses. "Too-good-to-beprices are offered by toogood-to-be-true vendors," the CBBB President cautioned.

Instead of responding to enticing offers that arrive unannounced in e-mail boxes, the BBB advises from customer service contacts and exchange policy, shipping/ transaction costs and security and privacy protection information.

The second challenge for online shoppers, cybersecurity, has exploded with "always on" Internet access. "Online shoppers that don't take protection measures to secure their computers and personal information can fall victim to a silent, yet very successful intruder: the identity theft," Hunter warned. The BBB has established an Identify Theft Web site (www.bbb.org/idtheft) with helpful tips for consumers on how to protect their electronic files when shopping online.

Bob Kruger, BSA vice president for enforcement, agreed with the need to educate consumers on how to identify reputable merchants and improve their cyber security. "Our study showed

that U.S. respondents will use the Internet to purchase many different types of gifts this holiday season. By taking basic precautions, online shoppers can enjoy the benefits of legitimate, legal ecommerce."

The BSA study, conducted by the independent research firm, Ipsos Public Affairs, showed that 43% and 49% of U.S. shoppers will purchase software and computer hardware, respectively, online this year. The study also found that when it comes to purchasing software online, 75% in the U.S. say it is more important to obtain legitimate software than it is to save money and risk buying fraudulent products.

As two of the preeminent organizations dedicated to promoting a safe and legal digital world, the BBB and BSA offer the following 10 tips to online shoppers contemplating software and other purchases and guidance on how to improve their cyber security:

> 1. Do Your Homework. What do you know about the merchant or its Web site? A trust mark from BBBOnLine signifies the merchant has agreed to a code of business practices. Also knowing the retailer's address, phone number or URL permits you to check for a Reliability Report with the BBB (go to www.bbb.org, look for the "Check It Out" box and click on "Business"). Be particularly vigilant at auction sites; check the feedback section to find comments about the





Joining the thousands of motorists who will be hitting Texas streets and highways this month as the winter holiday and shopping season gets underway will be thousands of law enforcement officers. These officers will be part of the Thanksgiving Click It or Ticket safety belt enforcement and public education effort.

Texas is part of a national effort to reduce deaths and injuries form traffic crashes. From November 18th to December 1st, state troopers police officers and sheriffs' deputies throughout Texas will be cracking down on drivers and passengers who aren't using safety belts.

In addition to messages on television, radio and billboards, motorists on Texas streets and highways will see reminders to buckle up on more than 2,000 HEB trucks. San Antonio-based H.E. Butt Grocery Company will display Click It or Ticket decals on their entire fleet of vehicles which travel more than 50 million miles each year.

"As combining stepped up law enforcement with public education works to get people to buckle up," Brenda Mitchell, the Texas Department of Transportation's Abilene District's traffic safety coordinator, said, "focusing on seat belt law enforcement around Thanksgiving will save lives. The Click it or Ticket campaign should help give Texas motorists the extra incentive they need to always use their safety belts and make sure their children are properly secured."

Texas law requires drivers and front seat passengers to always use safety belts. Children and teens up to the age of 17 have to be buckled up in the front or back seat. Child safety seats are required for children under four years old or less than three feet tall. Fines for violations range from \$25 to \$200.

Mitchell said that as a result of the Click it or Ticket effort, first launched in Texas eighteen months ago, statewide safety belt usage has increased from 76% to almost 85%.

Officials estimate that maintaining safety belt use in Texas at this level means 200 fewer traffic fatalities and 5,000 fewer injuries each year.

the estimated retail value of the product you are purchasing. Whether it is being sold as new or used, if a price for the product seems too good to be true, it probably is.

Pay by Credit Card. Paying with cash, debit cards, ATM cards or electronic funds transfers offer less protection than using a credit card. If you use a credit card, you have the right to dispute the bill, your liability for fraudulent charges is limited to \$50 under the Fair Credit Billing Act and your card issuer probably provides additional warranty rights.

5. Security and Privacy Counts. Never give out your Internet password and guard all personal information. Only provide your credit card information in a secure environment. Look for the prefix https:// in the Uniform Resource Locator box which lists the web site's address to be sure that a site you are using is secure. Look for the Web site's privacy guidelines and make certain you agree with its privacy protection measures before you make a purchasing decision.

Be Careful When Crossing the Border. Be especially cautious when dealing with sellers in other countries. The physical distance, differences in legal systems, and other factors could complicate matters if the transaction goes awry.

7. If Purchasing Software Make Sure It's Authentic. Read the label. Be suspicious of software products that do not include proof of authenticity, such as original disks, manuals, licensing, warranties, etc. beware of products that do not look genuine, such as those with handwritten labels. Take special care to avoid sellers offering "back-up" copies. This is a clear indication that the software is illegal. Be wary of compilations of software titles from different publishers on a single disk or CD.

8. Install Anti-Virus Software and a Firewall. Does your have computer(s) anti-virus software installed? Most antivirus software includes an automatic update feature. Make sure it is activated. A firewall will protect computer(s) your from unauthorized access to and use by hackers. Check for Security 9.

Updates. Security updates should be checked every 30 days for programs installed on computers and operating systems. Allow for automatic updating and/or subscribe to a notifycation service provided by the vendor.

Money is tight, but you need to buy a toy for your nephew who is in his "terrible twos." You find a great deal on a stuffed animal at a small discount store. It is terrific or is it trouble?

Well, that depends. "Often product-recall information from manufacturers does not get to discount and bargain stores because they buy their merchandise through auctions rather than from the manufacturer," said Annabelle Dillard, product safety expert with the Texas Department of Health (TDH).

For that reason, TDH inspectors will focus on secondary markets such as discount and bargain stores during "Toy Sweep," an annual campaign to educate Texas retailers about the latest recall information and to remind consumes that certain items have been recalled and are not safe for children.

Each fall – just before the big holiday shopping season – TDH's product safety inspectors visit retail stores making sure that certain recalled toys are no longer available and giving retailers detailed information about each of the recalled items. This year's event was held

Houston, Dallas, San Antonio and Austin areas. Inspectors have 10 toys and five children's furniture

Nov. 17-20 in stores in the

products on their list this year. Some of the products that recently have been recalled the U.S. by Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) are a pendant that is high in lead content; pacifiers that come apart: a plush toy with small parts; bunk beds that pose a strangulation hazard because of the spacing between the guard rails; a changing table whose poor design could cause strangulation hazard; and children's chairs that tend to break.

TDH Targets Troubling Toys

"Chocking hazards are the common reasons most products are recalled," said Dillard, adding that toys or games with small parts cannot legally be sold for use by children under 3. Toys containing small parts that are for children must have a warning label, and toys that generate heat must have a warning to alert parents and children to the risk of burns or electrical shock.

Dillard said a new product that inspectors will be discussing with retailers this year is a yo-yo water ball. TDH has received complaints that the stretchy cord of the toy can wrap around a child's neck when the child swings the toy overhead like a lasso. No recall has been issued or them, but the CPSC has issued a warning.

Some tips for buyers:

- Buy toys that are ageappropriate for the child. Toy and game manufacturers test their products for safety according to how they should be used by children and include age-range recommendations on their packages.
- Look for quality construction and design. Can the product withstand an assault by your 2-year-old



- nephew? + Don't buy anything that has sharp glass or metal edges for children under 8.
- When shopping for children under the age of 3, avoid small toys or toys with small parts that could come off. A good rule of thumb: If the item is small enough to fit through the cardboard spool from a toilettissue roll, it's not appropriate for childen under 3.
- Assemble toys properly. Many manufacturers offer assistance by phone if you need help.

The CPSC Web site (www.cpsc.gov) is a good

resource for retailers and consumers who want the latest information on recalled products. The CPSC has a free e-mail subscription list that is notified each time a recall is issued.

People who have concerns about specific products can call TDH's product safety division at (888)778-9440 toll free in Texas. Inspectors follow up on complaints and investigate hazards associated with products. Products are tested and, if necessary, sent to laboratories for further testing. Findings are then evaluated and notices of violation will be issued to manufacturers if necessary. If the product is distributed nationally, these findings also will be forwarded to the CPSC for further enforcement action on the federal level.
