## Tough road games at Sands, Grady this week Varsity Girls at 5-0 after District Win Over Ira

On the bright side, as the third quarter ended Borden High School's Lady with the Lady Coyotes Coyotes are now ranked \#18 in the state in Class A Division I. And, they went through the first half of district play with an unblemished record.

Now for the tough part.
This week's contests will put the girls on the road for what will end up being three consecutive away games.

In Friday night's action, the Lady Coyotes had a battle the entire game with the Lady Bulldogs who had a definite height advantage.

Leading only 7-6 after one period, BHS got a little breathing room on Shayla Gass's first three-pointer of the game with $4: 45$ to play in the half.

The senior's trey put the Lady Coyotes on top 13-10, a margin that Gass at 4:15 on another bucket to make it a 16-10 advantage.

Cassidy Rinehart's put back with $3: 14$ was the last basket for either team in the first half as the Lady Coyotes went to the locker room with an 18-14 lead.
In the third quarter, it appeared BHS might be able to pull away.

LaShae Johnson came in and gave a spark to the offense with a basket underneath to make it a $23-17$ Lady Coyote lead.

She then made a pretty pass inside to Rinehart whose basket with $2: 52$ in the quarter put BHS up by a $25-$ 19 score.

Ira then went on a 7-0 run

The hosts actually led four times in the final quarter, but that's $\cdot$ when the three seniors took charge.

With her team trailing 30 28, Menda James hit a pretty jumper at 6:39 to tie the score.

Ira regained the lead, but Jami Gass hit a corner shot that was all net, tying the score at 32 with $4: 22$ to play.

Shayla went downtown for her third three of the game to answer Ira's field goal, giving the Lady Coyotes a $35-34$ lead with just 3:51 left.

The back and forth momentum continued when Ira went down and scored but left Jami Gass open in the corner again-this time the senior was behind the arc and added three more points.

The 3 -pointer made it a 38-36 BHS lead, but Ira tied it up one more time.

Rinehart's offensive rebounds-a big part of the Friday night win- gave BHS a $40-38$ lead with $2: 21$ on the clock. The Lady Coyotes never trailed again.

The girls went to the free throw line 11 times in the final quarter, connecting on seven of those, which helped seal the $48-43$ win.

Rinehart finished with a double-double, scoring 19 pts and grabbing 12 rebounds.
The junior also had six steals on the evening.

Ira then rattled off 24 points, and the Coyotes found themselves in comeback mode throughout the evening.

By half-time, BHS had chipped the lead for Ira down to 15 as they trailed 29-14 going into intermission.

Still, a 4 -of- 30 shooting performance from the field kept the Coyotes from mounting any serious surge in the first half.

In the second half, Ira continued to get too many
second-chance points as they hit the boards.

The closest the Coyotes would get came at the start of the fourth quarter when Griffin hit a free throw to pull BHS to within 12 at 42-30.

Griffin, averaging 13 pts. a contest, hit one more three in the last quarter, but Ira went to the line and kept the game out of reach.

## Say good-bye to dry skin this season

When winter temperatures leave you singing the dry skin blues, small changes in your daily routine can make a big difference.
"Dry skin is a problem for many people during the winter months," said Dr. Ida Orengo, an associate professor of dermatology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "When humidity decreases, the air becomes drier, which can cause skin to become dry and flaky.'
Lotions typically fall into one of three categories liquid, cream and ointment. All help the skin to retain moisture. When choosing moisturizers, liquids are good for use over the entire body since they are easiest to apply and don't stain clothing as much as creams. Creams are better for localized areas such as the hands, feet and face because they last longer on the skin. Since ointments are thicker and greasier, they are
most appropriate for exceptionally dry areas and are best to apply at night to avoid soiling clothes.
"The best time to moisturize is right after your shower because the skin is more receptive to moisture since the pores are opened up, "Orengo said.
